

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Wilmot in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Wilmot on Tuesday, the 11th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the maintenance of Town Highways.
- 4. To see if the Town will accept State Aid Maintenance on the 4th N. H. Turnpike and raise and appropriate the money for this purpose.
- 5. To see if the Town will accept State aid for Trunk Line Maintenance and raise and appropriate the money required for this purpose.
- 6. To see if the Town will accept State Aid Construction on the 4th N. H. Turnpike and raise and appropriate the money required for this purpose.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$100 to repair the Chadwick road so called, leading from near the former John Carr buildings to the old Chadwick buildings.


- 8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate any money for Old Home Day.
- 9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate any money for Memorial Day.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to install electric lights in the Town Hall and raise and appropriate the money for this purpose.
- 11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to plow the roads next winter and appropriate \$300 from money in the treasury to procure equipment for this purpose.
- 14. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$100 to clean up and reset the gravestones in the old cemetery near the former Carr Farm on Kearsarge Mountain.

### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

### To the School Board of the town of Wilmot:

I submit, herewith, my first report as superintendent of schools.

The report is largely of a statistical nature due to the fact that I did not begin my duties until July 1st and that I have only the attendance and financial records of the year 1928-29.

I have changed somewhat the form of arrangement in the printing of the financial report. This change is not revolutionary and need cause no alarm.

The four columns of figures give the voters a chance to compare the expenditures, item by item, of last year's business with current year, and also shows how much has been expended to January 15th, 1930. The fourth column is the amount of money the school board would like to spend during 1929-30, not necessarily the sum to be raised. The statement of the financial standing of the school district on January 15, 1930, gives an idea of the solvency of the district on that date. I have added a column of figures to show how the Wilmot School dollar was spent in 1928-29,

### Recommendations

Some change should be made at the Langley School in the toilets. An amount has been put into the budget to defray the cost of any work done there.

It would seem nice to employ a full time school nurse. The State allows approximately one dollar and a half per pupil towards the salary of a full time nurse. A school nurse usually averages a visit a month to each school. From the standpoint of economy this would be a wise step to take.

I wish to thank the board for its co-operation and for making my first year as superintendent a pleasant one.
