## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Wolfeboro qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Brewster Memorial Hall in said town, on the second Tuesday of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, three Selectmen, two Auditors, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Prosecuting Liquor Agent, one Library Trustee, and one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years.

Article 2. To elect one or more, not exceeding three, Highway Agents or instruct the Selectmen to appoint one expert Highway Agent.

Article 3. To choose all other necessary Town Officers.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum necessary to secure State Aid for the improvement of highways, under the law passed at the January session of the General Court, 1905.

Article 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs of the highways and bridges in addition to that required by law.

Article 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the redemption of Bonds (Sec. 2) and interest on its indebtedness.

Article 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to pay each Fireman legally returned in addition to that required by law.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Town Public Library in addition to that required by law.



Article 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay James R. Newell Post No. 61, G. A. R., to defray Memorial Day expenses, May 30, 1919.

Article 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and pay to assist the Huggins Hospital.

Article 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Town expenses for the ensuing year.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire a sum of money on the credit of the Town necessary to pay Town expenses in anticipation of the assessment of 1919 taxes, not to exceed twenty thousand dollars.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise two hundred and fifty dollars to be used in connection with the state and federal money for the suppression of White Pine Blister and rust diseases.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars to aid in the suppression of the Gypsy Moth.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars for the maintenance of the East Side Trunk Line, the State to appropriate three hundred dollars.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen hundred dollars to secure a like sum from the State for the maintenance of the state roads in said town.

Article 17. To see what action the Town will take as to payment or rebonding its issue of water bonds due February 1, 1920, and in what manner and at what rate of interest, and to take any any action relating thereto.

Article 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to build a gravel road from the Watering Trough at Wolfeboro Falls, to the Hersey Hill (so called) agreeable to a petition signed by Virgil P. Hersey and others.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to accept the funds left in trust to said town by the will of the late Edward F. Cate as per condition of said will.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of two per cent. from the taxes of those who pay the same on or before September 1, 1919.

Article 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to macadam Factory Street from Glendon Street to Center Street.

Article 22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for repairs on sidewalks.

Article 23. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

### COMMISSIONER'S REPORT

To Charles R. Grant, Stephen W. Clow, and Lewis P. Goodhue, Selectmen of Wolfeboro, N. H.:

I hereby submit the following report as Highway Commissioner of the Town of Wolfeboro for the year 1918.

The Spring of 1918 found the town roads, considering the winter, in very good condition. The road machine was not used as extensively as the previous year, but the King drags were used to good advantage throughout the season. A portion of road near the Center was resurfaced. Three of the largest bridges in town were newly planked, one with new stringers, and several small bridges were repaired.

One carload of Tarvia B was used. This was applied on the village streets with gravel. The amount of Tarvia B used for our Trunk Line maintenance was very small; only about one third of the road received any.

Beginning on North Main Street, near the cemetery, going as far as McDonald's, beginning again near Daniel Rendall's, extending to Tuftonboro Line. The Ossipee and Suncook road has been extended through the Falls to the residence of John Jackson—making 1000 feet of Bituminous macadam, using 73 barrels of Tarvia X, and 550 feet of Water Bound Macadam.

On the Farm or Lake Wentworth road 700 feet has been straightened and graded with gravel near the lower bridge. Also 2500 feet has been widened and graded with gravel. On the south end, one half of the cost of this end of the road was donated to the Town by a friend.

On the Mountain road, \$59.75 has been expended, leaving a balance of \$40.25 of the appropriation.

## REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN

To the Board of Trustees of the Wolfeboro Town Library:  
Gentlemen:

The thirteenth annual report of the librarian is herewith presented.

As one considers the work of the public library of today, it is somewhat puzzling to know how to meet its many-sided demands. No longer is the library a place where one finds a few scholarly books for the few scholarly people. We must have these and many of them. We also must have such works as will meet the current needs, from the latest *Who's Who in America* and good books on automobile driving to Zane Grey's best novels and the Burgess books for the children.

The questions that come over the charging desk range from requests for the first line of Gray's elegy, material for a debate on "The Initiative and Referendum" and a map of the White Mountains, to something on grape culture, designs for a bunga-

low, and how to feed a pet rabbit. The reference librarian is ever alert to answer such questions, and to make the library of real service to the people.

During the winter months, there has been for the first time since the war broke out a slackening in the regular work. This is not surprising, when one considers how many of our patrons have entered the war service.

The total circulation for the year has been 16,643, of these classes: fiction, 7,920; non-fiction, 2,972; children's books, 5,751. During the epidemic, the library was closed for four weeks. This somewhat lessened the total circulation for the year.

The number of books added to the two libraries has been 335, of which 40 were contributed. There are now 3,000 books in the town library.

But little has been done in the way of branch work, a fact due to the absence of persons in the outlying districts who are willing to take the responsibility. With the revival of the woolen industry at South Wolfeboro, we are wondering if in the near future a regular branch library might not be established at that place open perhaps every Saturday afternoon, and with a paid attendant. As for many years, books have been sent regularly to the Huggins Hospital.

During the winter months, a Story Hour for the children is being held weekly under the efficient management of Mrs. Alice Hersey. The purpose of this is not merely to entertain. The children are told some of the great stories in literature, history, folk-lore, and art, and are encouraged to read these stories for themselves.

It has been a privilege to assist in that part of war work apportioned to libraries. 850 books have been collected in town and sent to the boys in camp or overseas. The many government bulletins received have been exhibited, and those considered of permanent value preserved as history. All local material has been kept, and will ultimately be put in shape for ready reference. At the recommendation of our state historian, we are making a permanent record of each man from Wolfeboro who



has enlisted in any branch of the service together with a photograph and brief sketch of his life.
