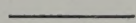

### SCHOOL REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDING FEBRUARY 1913

The school year ends with the school houses looking neat and tidy owing to last summer's painting and repairing and the committee feel that the scholars and teachers are also doing pretty well. The Village school under Miss Patenode and Miss Burge, have done good work but they have suffered somewhat from the measles, it having been deemed wise to close the school for two weeks. The Forrestall school is the only one which has finished the 34 weeks and closed, the others all still being in session. Miss Straw, who last year taught the grammar school in the village, has had charge of the Forrestall school during the fall and winter terms, making a great success of it.

Thanks to Mrs. Taylor and Mrs. Chase, who have helped with the salary, we have been able to keep Miss Fisher at the Center, while Miss Messer and Miss Cantlin have been at East Alstead. The greatest stride forward has been, we think, in furnishing new books for all the schools, but, since there was no appropriation made for this purpose the bills for these new books are still unpaid. All the schools now have the same books and all those not in use are kept upstairs in the Village school house, to be ready for use when needed. A large book-case in which to keep them, so that they can be catalogued and easily handled, is sadly needed. One more step forward, of which the committee is proud is the introduction of manual training in the schools. The Center has its cooking and sewing classes. Mrs. Chase, who teaches the cooking, is trying to make the children understand food values and how to have

a "balanced ration" and also how to gain variety. For instance, one lesson was on cooking vegetables, the next how to cook them over, the third how to use them as salads. Mrs. Chase has also laid great stress on the chemical effects of cooking foods; the result of over-cooking and of under-cooking, and what is the proper time. Mr. Wharton has started the "wood work" in the village school, and free hand drawing, which last is to enable a boy to draw a chest with its dimension and then take it to the carpenter shop and make. Also for one hour, once a week, Mr. Wharton has the boys at the Town hall for athletics, and the girls also, another day, have the same. At East Alstead they are learning the freehand drawing and raffia work, and if we can only arouse interest enough to raise some money we hope to get wood tools there. The teachers in all the schools make enthusiastic Manual Training assistants.

The committee begs the co-operation of **all** the citizens, not only that of the parents, in the school work, for without it little can really be accomplished. The children are the future of the village, and what shall it avail us to have good roads and all good things if when the children grow up, they shall reproach us, saying that when they were young they were not properly taught. Not book-learning alone, but respect for others, pride in their village and a desire to see all things, mental, moral and physical, clean and wholesome without and within.

The teachers are ready to do their part but if the children are not helped to be conscientious in attendance, not even angels could get good results.

This year has seen clean and tidy school houses and new books. Will not all the citizens help us in the coming year to have every child at school, and to provide the necessary interest to keep them there profitably occupied?
