

What I want is an informed vote nobody will speak over three minutes, and any negative comments will be removed. Approach the mike, identify yourself, be courteous and be quick. We can disagree without being disagreeable. All are to stick to the question at hand. If not be prepared to be stopped. Only one amendment to a motion. All motions must be in a positive manner so that in voting, yes will be in favor and no will be against. All amendments must be in writing and handed to Doralyn M. Harper, Town Clerk. He then recognized the non-voters. My intent is to read the articles in order.

I will read article one and then ask for a motion to accept the articles. Second and then discussion. We may hear from a few committees and then voice vote taken.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$17,600 for the purpose of purchasing new ambulance equipment and to authorize the withdrawal of said amount from the Ambulance Replacement and Equipment Fund established for that purpose which is funded from the receipts generated from the operation of the ambulance service. RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE. RECOMMENDED BY THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN.

Article #4 was read by the Moderator. Motion to accept was made by John Thomas, seconded by Reginald Caldwell. No discussion. Article carried by voice vote.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$29,852 for the purpose of purchasing a new ½ ton pickup truck for the highway department and to authorize the withdrawal of said amount from the Capital Reserve Fund established for the purpose. RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE. RECOMMENDED BY THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN.

Article #7 was read by the Moderator. Motion to table was made by John Thomas, seconded by Reginald Caldwell. Article 7 is an alternative to Article 6. Article tabled by voice vote.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will enter into a two year contract for the re-mapping of the Town's Tax/Zoning maps with a cost of \$49,350 in year one and \$49,350 in year two, and that the aforementioned sum of \$49,350 be raised and appropriated and said sum be added to the appropriate line items in the 1998 Annual Town Budget. RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE. RECOMMENDED BY THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN.

Article #8 was read by the Moderator. Motion to accept was made by Gary Flack, seconded by Albert Akerstrom. No discussion. Article carried by voice vote.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to ratify a two year contract between the Town of Belmont and the AFSCME Local 534, with a cost of \$19,696.00 in year one and \$23,150.00 in year two, and the sum of \$19,696.00 be raised and appropriated and said sum be added to the appropriate line items in the 1998 Annual Town Budget. RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE. RECOMMENDED BY THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN.

Article #13 was read by the Moderator. Motion to accept was made by John Thomas, seconded by Reginald Caldwell. Ronald Mitchell spoke to this motion. He said that this money would help developers and to help get industrial development into town. No further discussion. Article carried by voice vote.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for improvements to the Belmont Library as required by the Americans with Disabilities Rights Act. RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE. RECOMMENDED BY THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN.

Article #14 was read by the Moderator. Motion to accept was made by Dawn Kidd, seconded by David Morse. Ronald Mitchell spoke of the motion. The Boy Scouts have a scout who wants to build a handicap ramp in front of the library toward becoming an Eagle Scout. This will help towards this project. No further discussion. Article carried by voice vote.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund in accordance with RSA chapter 35 for the purchase of a new fire engine and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000 to be placed in this fund. RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE. RECOMMENDED BY THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN.

Article #15 was read by the Moderator. Motion to accept was made by John Thomas, seconded by Gary Flack. No discussion. Article carried by voice vote.

To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund in accordance with RSA chapter 35 for improvements to the Winnisquam Recreation Area and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,000 to be placed in this fund and authorizing the Selectmen to act as agents to expend such funds in accordance with the desires of the Winnisquam Recreation Area Development Committee. ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Resolution:



SELECTMEN'S REPORT

Last year brought about a number of new projects in the Town of Belmont. As you can see from the cover of the Town Report, the Belmont Mill's renovation is complete. This project costs over \$1.4 million and has become the cornerstone of the Belmont Village. It is the Selectmen's hope that the Town can build on this theme and eventually establish a "village green". The Selectmen are eagerly pursuing the purchase of a piece of land owned by Public Service Company that is sandwiched between the Mill property and the Town Library. Similarly, the Selectmen are exploring grants and other means of funding the revitalize the downtown area.

As many of you are aware, the Town was able to pave the remaining section of Brown Hill Road from Route 107 to Sargent Lake. This section of road has been a great source of distress for our residents during the spring. With this reconstruction we can rest assure that this road will provide better service to our Town's residents for many years into the future.

The Town also completed the reconstruction and resurfacing of Cotton Hill Road from the Gilford line to Route 107. The Selectmen consider this project a huge success in that an agreement was finally reached with the residents and a design was undertaken that met the needs of all involved. This project involved the extensive reconstruction of a complex road drainage system, reconstruction of the road base and resurfacing. All this was accomplished with minimal impact to the neighborhood and the scenic beauty of this road. The Selectmen are very pleased with the outcome of this project and commend the Belmont Highway Department for it's hard work and dedication in bringing about this success story.

Progress on the Town Beach continues to move along steadily. The progress this year has been somewhat slowed by the fact that the Town is seeking to gain access to the Town Beach at the intersection of the Route 3 & 11 bypass and Route 3. Plans have been drawn up by Steven Smith & Associates and have been submitted to the New Hampshire Department of Transportation for approval. Progress on the preliminary approval of the plans has been slow in that the State of New Hampshire is currently looking at means of redesigning the on and off ramps of Route 3 & 11 bypass in a manner that will serve motorists better. We're working very closely with the New Hampshire DOT to ensure that the no efforts are wasted.

The Town recently reached preliminary agreement with the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services on the layout of the Town Beach. This project involves relocation of a brook and extensive work along the shoreline of the lake. The plan of the new project will be available for your review at the Annual Town Meeting on March 13, 1999. This plan will be going to the New Hampshire Wetlands Board for final approval and permitting. It is hoped that construction of the Town Beach can occur during the Summer of 1999. The Selectmen, in consultation with the Winnisquam Recreation Area Development Committee" have endorsed a plan that calls for the bonding of \$160,000 for the complete construction of the Town Beach area. While the Selectmen have indicated that they are supportive of developing the area as the

Town Budget permits, current interest rates suggest that it may be more prudent to bond rather than complete the project in phases. When escalating construction costs and the costs of remobilization are factored into the overall costs of developing the project in four phases, the cost of bonding seems to be of no consequence. Most importantly, completing the construction in 1999 would give the Town immediate use of this great resource which in and of itself is of great value.

Lastly, the Belmont Board of Selectmen is proud to announce that the Town Administrator, Matthew H. Upton, has agreed to a new three-year contract. This will keep Matt with the Town through January 1, 2002. We have all seen the improvements in the Town since Matt's arrival. We look forward to working with Matt and all the Department Heads in continuing to improve Belmont while keeping tax rates under control and not sacrificing our quality of life. We thank all of those who have supported us through 1998 and we look forward to serving you this coming year.

Fire Department Report for 1998

During 1998 the Belmont Fire Department saw a decrease in the number of emergency calls that we responded to. Our 1998 figures show that we responded to a total of 688 calls which is a decrease of 115 calls from 1997. The following is a breakdown of the calls for 1998.

The fire inspections that were made by the department covered school inspections, foster home inspections, daycare inspections, oil burner inspections, chimney and woodstove inspections and many other types of inspections. The different types of inspections that are being done keeps our personnel on the go most of the time.

Even with the decrease of calls for 1998 the members of the department put in over 5,200 hours on emergency calls and members also put in over 900 hours on training. During the ice storm in January department personnel worked around the clock when the station was opened for a shelter. I would like to thank each and every member of the department for the many hours that they have put in during 1998.

In June of 1998 we received our new ambulance that we purchased from the Horton Company. With the purchase of this new ambulance we have upgraded our level of service that we provide for the citizens of Belmont. A request was made to the Board of Selectmen to keep our old ambulance and this move was approved and with us keeping our old unit, it has been used over 22 times when our new unit has been tied up on other medical emergency's. By using our old unit as a backup we are able to provide a much better service to everyone. This backup unit also allows us to keep more funds from ambulance billing. Without this backup unit, other towns would be receiving these extra funds. Also if we are requested to respond to assist another community we still have a ambulance in service.

In 1998 many members of the department were able to upgrade their E.M.S. skills when they completed the EMT-I course. This will allow those people to start I.V. on patients that are in need of these fluids. Replacing these body fluids is very important to a lot of the people that we transport and it could mean the difference between life and death. Again the more training that our E.M.S. personnel get the better off we are. Our E.M.S. personnel do a very good job and each member is always looking to better their skills.

At the present time we are working on specifications for a new tanker to replace our 1974 International. This new tanker will allow us to provide a much better service to every property owner. Having this new unit will also allow us to reduce fire insurance rates for those property owners living outside the hydrant district. If we are able to drop from a class 9 down to a class 6 it will save each property owner about 26% in there insurance rates. Back a few years ago we were able to reduce the insurance rates for those property owners that live 1,000 feet of our pressure fire hydrants and we went from a class 6 down to a class 4.

At this time I would like to thank the Board of Selectmen, Budget Committee Members, our Town Administrator, Department Heads and the citizens of Belmont for their assistance and support during the course of the year.

This year saw the continuation of several successful programs run by the department. D.A.R.E. for the elementary school, S.A.F.E. for the middle school, Bicycle Rodeo for all children, and Seatbelt Safety for the Driver's Education Class. We are always looking toward the future for new or expanded programs.

The officers of this department received in service training in the following courses: Domestic Violence, Community Policing, Problem Oriented Policing, Advanced Driver Training, Officer Survival, Advanced Driver Training, Officer Survival, Advanced Officer Training, F.A.T.S. Training, Rifle Instructor Certification, Warrants & Complaints and D.A.R.E. Re-certification.

From July to November the Board of Selectmen were involved in a selection process to replace Chief McCarty. As a result of that process I was promoted to Chief of Police. I would like to thank the Board of Selectmen for this opportunity to serve the Town of Belmont in this new capacity.

The police department is going to be working toward a Community Policing philosophy. I am sure that you will hear more about this process in the future. We would like to take this opportunity to invite you to visit your police department. If you have a complaint, concern, suggestion or request please feel free to call or stop by. Thank you for letting us serve you.

Report of the Belmont Parks and Recreation Commission December 1998

Sargent Park accomplishments in 1998:

The construction phase of the bike/skate area was completed after overlaying the cold mix asphalt base with 1.5 inches of 3/8 inch hot mix asphalt for a finished surface. Approximately two hundred and twenty five (225) linear feet of five (5) foot high galvanized chain link fence was installed along the perimeter to contain activity and reduce bike traffic in the playground section of the park. The bike/skate area covers over ten thousand (10,000) square feet. A permanent, heavy duty, low maintenance picnic table was installed within this area. Thank you M&D paving for your generous donation of labor for the paving. Thank you B.I.I. Fence for a job well done.

Temporary ramps, jumps, pipes and rails were constructed to initiate activity in the bike/skate area. Thank you Russ Walsh, Sean Wells, Bill Divers, Andy McSheffrey, Joe Walsh and others. No thanks to the users and abusers. Right Russell!

The damage to the fence and lights from the lightning storm of 1997 was repaired. At the same time the security lighting was upgraded and the vandal damage to the lighting system was repaired. Thank you Hutchins Electric for a job well done.

The roller hockey rink was resurfaced.

The tennis court bangboard was removed and replaced with a heavy duty low maintenance one. Thank you Tennis Courts of New Hampshire.

PROPOSED IMPROVEMENTS FOR 1999:

Resurface the asphalt walkway through the playground to the horseshoe pits.

Install heavy duty low maintenance astroturf eighteen inches (18") out along the perimeter fence and under the picnic tables of the bike/skate area. Also install same under the picnic tables in the roller hockey and tennis court area. Doing this will prevent grass and weeds from growing in and along the chain link fence and under the tables. The result will be a more attractive, cleaner, cheaper low maintenance surface mat.

Reseed grass area at entrance to park and along bike/skate area between the walkway and the bike/skate area.

Address drainage and erosion problems at the rear of the roller hockey rink and the tennis courts.

Repair and resurface the basketball courts.

Initiate professional design and construction of safe, permanent low maintenance ramps and equipment in the bike/skate area.

Consider options for safe, permanent low maintenance matting under the playground equipment and eventually reseed this area.

Consider potential future best use for the rear of the park. Any ideas folks?

These projects will go only as far as the 1999 budget allows.

Report of the Town Forest Fire Warden and State Forest Ranger

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Ranger, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. Violations of RSA 227-L:17, the fire permit law and other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

There are ten Forest Rangers who work for the New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Protection Bureau. State Forest Rangers are available to assist communities with forest fire suppression, prevention and training programs as well as the enforcement of forest fire and timber harvest laws. If you have any questions regarding forest fire or timber harvest laws, please call our office at 271-2217.

There are 2400 Forest Fire Wardens and Deputy Forest Fire Wardens throughout the state. Each town has a Forest Fire Warden and several Deputy Wardens who assist the Forest Rangers with forest fire suppression, prevention, and law enforcement. Early in 1998 we experienced an ice storm, which caused severe damage to forest of New Hampshire. This damage created a greater potential fire hazard as well as safety hazards to many areas of the state. Your local fire warden and Forest Rangers need your assistance in preventing wildfires in these hard hit areas and throughout the State. If you need assistance or information dealing with ice damaged woodlands, please call 1-800-444-8978.

The State of New Hampshire operates 15 fire towers, 2 mobile patrols and 3 contract aircraft patrols. This early detection and reports from citizens aid in the quick response from local fire departments. This is a critical factor in controlling the size of wildland fires and keeping the loss of property and suppression costs as low as possible.

GENERAL ASSISTANCE ANNUAL REPORT

The total amount of funds spent on general assistance this year was approximately \$70,400. This was the second full year of State and Federal Welfare Reform. The object of this reform is to limit the length of time a family can receive assistance to five years. While the intent behind these reforms is applaudable, the resultant effect is to send those who cannot transition to self sufficiency to their Town governments for continued assistance. This means that those who have the least ability to help themselves are now turning to local towns for help. Often these individuals need more time and effort to address their immediate needs.

Over the years , Belmont has grown to include seven mobile home parks, and approximately 575 apartment units. This large pool of what used to be considered "affordable housing" has attracted a large number of working poor that have come to the area seeking employment and rental units. As a result of the increased demand, rents in the town have grown at an astronomical rate. These increases in rents have forced a larger number of individuals to seek assistance this year. While the primary purpose of local assistance is to assist individuals on a temporary basis, the current market conditions and the absence of other programs is resulting in a greater percentage of chronic cases.

While unemployment is at an all time low, unskilled labor is only paying \$5.15per hour. For a single parent trying to provide for the household with rents in \$550.00 to \$675.00 per month range, child care at \$95.00 to \$125.00 per child, payroll deductions for medical and dental benefits, it's becoming increasingly more challenging for these families to make ends meet. Until we can attract higher paying jobs to the area, these families will continue to struggle.

Because of the growing complexity of these cases, much time is spent pursuing referrals or assisting applicants on how to take control of their lives and/or improve their job search skills. These efforts often involve providing the "one on one" time that these individuals need but have been unable to obtain through the ever shrinking State and Federal programs. While this added time may cost the Town more on a short term basis, in the long term the only solution for many of these individuals is to help them transition to self sufficiency. A very special thanks to all the social services that have assisted our residents in time of need, The Community Action Program and Fuel Assistance, Subsidized Housing, Open Arms Outreach, Community Health and Hospice, Healthlink, New Beginnings, St Vincent DePaul, NH Job Training Council and all our local Church Community Support.

We are pleased to announce the delivery of our new Freightliner Pumper. Since its arrival in February, it has proven its worth, as it has already responded to a number of structure fires in our primary response area and in mutual aid.

The department spent \$11,000 this year refurbishing our 1981 International engine without asking for any additional funding from the towns. Also, \$2,000 was spent rebuilding a military M-37 4x4 to be used as our forestry unit.

We have a total of 26 members in the department with 6 Intermediate EMTs and 5 Basic EMTs, and in addition, one of our members has advanced to the Paramedic Level. This allows our ambulance responses to be at the Intermediate Level on most calls, with some at the Paramedic Level.

We are asking the towns for funding to be provided this year and next towards the replacement of our present ambulance which will be 20 years old next year. The WFD will be contributing at least \$25,000 towards the cost of the new unit raised through large and small donations we have received over the past years.

We thank all of you for your continued support of our work in the communities so that we may continue our 57 year tradition of being there when help is needed.

Although there was a decrease in residents participating this year we seemed to have collected similar amounts in gallons to last years totals, and assume this is to due to these persons collecting and disposing at the site since our first collection day in 1996. As part of the collection, residents were asked to fill out questionnaire's upon arriving at the site. This served to gain information as to whether the 10 gallon limit was sufficient, whether they had additional materials at home they did not know how to dispose of, how often they thought a collection was necessary, and what type of materials did they bring to the collection site. This data showed that most were satisfied with the current limits and that an annual collection was sufficient.

Some common materials brought to the collection site that were not excepted consisted of latex paint and tires. Latex paint is not considered to be hazardous, and proper disposal consists of merely opening the can, exposing it to the air until it dries out, and then tossing the can into regular household trash for curbside pickup. Tires cannot be disposed of in the regular curbside pickup. Tires, refrigerators, stoves, furniture, and other hard to dispose of items can be taken to the Transfer Station on Meredith Center Road in Laconia (for a fee). Belmont residents wishing to use the Laconia facility must have an orange sticker in order to use the site for disposal. These stickers can be obtained at the Town Clerk's window at no cost. Items listed above can be disposed of at the **4th Annual Household Hazardous Waste Day on Saturday, July 31, 1999 from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon at the Belmont Fire Department.** Anyone having any questions regarding waste disposal please contact the Selectmen's Office at 267-8300.

It is important to note that this event was in part huge success due to the efforts of those who volunteered their time. We would like the opportunity to recognize those individuals and thank them for their contribution to keeping our community a clean and safe environment.

Belmont Planning Board Annual Report 1998

The Planning Board saw the number of commercial Site Plan applications increase during 1998 to twenty-five while the number of subdivisions decreased.

The Board spent a considerable amount of time during 1998 reviewing and commenting on NH DOT road improvement projects scheduled for Belmont. Improvements to the intersection of Rte 3 and Union Road are planned which will include realigning and signalization. Work has begun on the interim upgrade planned for the Rte 106/Concord Street intersection. This upgrade includes turning lanes for Concord Street and Post Office Road, road widening, and realignment of the Concord Street intersection. Future interim upgrades are also scheduled for Rte 106 at Farrarville, Leavitt, and Plummer Hill Roads. Meetings are also progressing to identify a corridor for the construction of a Rte 140 bypass which would provide an alternate route for through traffic around the immediate village area. The bypass should also allow easier access to existing industrial zoned land for better development potential.

In January, the Board adopted a revision of the Subdivision Regulations and is currently considering amendments to the Site Plan Review Regulations. There are currently vacancies on the land use boards for alternate members. Three alternate positions are available on the Planning Board and five on the Zoning Board of Adjustment. This is a good way to become more involved in the community. Prior experience in land use is not necessary and meetings are scheduled for only one or two nights a month. Please consider helping your community in this way.

The Board wishes to express its appreciation for the support shown by voters in adopting all of the proposed zoning amendments on the 1998 ballot. After three public hearings to discuss possible amendments for 1999, voters will find amendments dealing with issues such as minimum design specifications for campgrounds, adopting the State's setback for buildings from cemeteries, adopting a definition for "sludge", the use of recreational vehicles and manufactured housing issues including a petition amendment which the Board supports to decrease the unit density currently allowed in manufactured housing parks for 4 units per acre to 2.

In 1998 the Board also acted to make information available to the residents in several new ways. The Board distributed their first informational brochure which highlighted many issues of interest throughout the community. Each month the Board also writes a letter for publication in the local newspapers. It provides information on what action the Board has taken on applications, and allows other departments to add information that they may wish to have included.

We expect 1999 to continue to be busy. We are already looking at new site plan applications for commercial developments, will be finalizing our land use web page, and mailing out our first annual letter to all town businesses. Thank you for your continued support and please let us know if there are other ways in which we can provide service to you and the community.

Report of the Trustees of the Cemeteries

Time moves slowly in our cemeteries and this is fortunate. Time is the cause of our cemetery problems and given time and some funds we will endeavor to make improvements. We will know around the end of the month (March) about anticipated private funds to restore the Prescott Cemetery.

Most of this report is a copy of the 1998 report just slightly updated.

It is again important to state that the South Road Cemetery is a private corporation governed by its own directors and thus is separate from the Town. There are still two private cemeteries in town governed and maintained by the families who established them.

We are responsible for the remaining TWENTY-SIX cemeteries and burial grounds in Belmont.

The private cemeteries are Chertok on Shaker Rd. and Deroyn on Leavitt Rd.

If anyone knows of additional cemeteries, burial grounds or indication of the same please let us know.

Prior to 1995 the Trustees of the Trust Funds were responsible for these cemeteries and around 1985 started a program of maintenance and restoration. We are continuing and expanding that program.

We continue to visit all the cemeteries and have discussed plans for gradual restoration, protection and maintenance of every cemetery without putting the Town Budget in a hole. Inspection of each cemetery every year, to determine its needs, is expected to vary any plans.

Completed and ongoing work (1985 through 1998) includes:

In almost every cemetery listed below serious and extensive brush control, brush cutting, tree trimming, and tree removals have been done. This will always be an ongoing, time consuming, labor intensive project. Each cemetery is mowed according to its needs.

The condition of each cemetery (within the walls) will be indicated after the name G=Good, A=Average (does need work), P=Poor and VB=Very Bad.

Bartlett (A); removed huge amount of debris and rebuilt part of the stone walls 1990-1995, repaired monuments 1998,

Bean Hill (P); rebuilt some of the stone walls about 1993, repaired gate 1993 and removed many years of fallen leaves,

Dow (A); fence repaired in 1989 and scheduled to be replaced in 1999, trees removed 1996,

Folsom (A); stone walls rebuilt and trees severely trimmed in 1993, hundreds of saplings will be removed in 1998, some monument work is needed.

Gile (G); monuments cleaned, repaired and replaced in late 1980's , eradicated woodchucks 1991.

Hackett (A); stone wall repaired 1993 and door sealed 1998,

Highland (G); extensive monument repairs completed about 1985 and in 1996 due to natural weathering, two hundred feet of picket fence replaced both in 1996 and 1997 and the last two hundred feet of fence were replaced this year,

Jackson (A); monuments cleaned, repaired and replaced, most of stone wall rebuilt and eradicated woodchucks 1991 through 1994,

Jamestown (G); monuments cleaned, repaired and replaced, also fences and wall repaired 1990-1995, many years of fallen leaves and branches removed,

Judkins (A); extensive rebuilding of the stone wall about 1993,

Lamprey (G); monuments cleaned and repaired, fence repaired from 1990-1992,

Leavitt (A); monuments cleaned and stone wall repaired about 1993, entrance gate replaced 1998,

Perkins (P); several trees will be removed this year and about thirty monuments must be replaced or repaired in the future. Also aided a gentleman in finding his grandmother's grave,

Page (A); a single monument was placed about 1990 to remember many buried here whose headstones were destroyed by vandals, some repairs made to the stone wall about 1995,

Prescott (VB); (possibly our oldest cemetery) the grounds have been cleaned and a positive restoration may soon take place, additional monument found (by a neighbor doing some clean-up) in 1996,

Randlett (VB); (possibly second oldest cemetery) it is expected that a local family/business will soon start volunteer tree work in here,

Spiller (G); this burial ground was just located in 1988 and is cared for by the landowner,

Swallow (VB); this was found by Ken Roeder about 1983 and the broken headstones were found in 1990. This cemetery needs extensive work but plans are not set yet,

Weymouth (A); hundreds of saplings will be removed in 1999,

Woodman (P) re-erected some monuments, rebuilt stone walls about 1993,

Young (G); monuments cleaned and repaired about 1991 and stone walls rebuilt in 1993, this cemetery now abuts a private cemetery and that family is maintaining it.

No matter how much work has been done the condition of some of our cemeteries remains grave. There is much more work to do.

In most cases the cemetery vandalism that has occurred was never reported timely, by neighbors, to the police. We must all take a proprietary interest in guarding and maintaining the records and poignant memories that are contained in each cemetery.

If anyone has historic records, genealogy records and photographs of our cemeteries could we see them? We would like to make copies and enter them into the computer records that Judy Pilliod is compiling. We have the ability to scan photographs and they will also become a part of the computer record. Your photos are not damaged by this scan.

Belmont Fire Department's Report on Emergency 911

Over the past three years, the Town of Belmont has been assigning new numbers and street names throughout the town for the purpose of the statewide E-911 dispatching system. The Town, in conjunction with the State of New Hampshire and United States Postal Service, have worked hard at this process with the goal of improving Public Safety. It is important that all residents realize that the purpose of these changes were made to increase the response time for ambulances, fire engines, and police services in the event of any emergency situation.

On October 16, 1998, a letter went out instructing taxpayers to look for name and number changes in the "Property Location" box on their next tax bill which was mailed on October 23, 1998. This letter contained information regarding the Public Hearing that was held on Monday, November 23, 1998. In addition, this letter instructed landlords to contact the Belmont Fire Department with tenant information, and explained the responsibility of the landlord to notify tenants of their new addresses. Taxpayers were told they would be notified by the United States Postal Service (USPS) of the effective date to begin using their new addresses.

At the Public Hearing, individuals were instructed to submit written petitions to the Board of Selectmen regarding any disputed name or number changes. Those owning private roads were instructed to contact the Belmont Fire Department to propose a name to ensure that it would not be in conflict with any other names being used in town. Those attending were also told not to begin using their new addresses until notified by the USPS. Sometime in mid-December, USPS sent a letter to all residents telling them their new addresses will become effective January 2, 1999. This letter gave instructions on how to number homes and mail boxes.

To date, most taxpayers have begun using the E-911 addresses as instructed, while others have not, this has created some confusion for the Town as well as the USPS. This type of confusion is expected, and should dwindle away as more people begin using their new addresses. Home owners and businesses can assist us by properly addressing their homes as soon as possible. This can be done by affixing a minimum of a 3 inch high number, in a contrasting color, to their homes or businesses if they can be seen from the road and are not set back more than 50 feet. If your home or business can not be seen, or is set back more than 50 feet, your mailbox should be numbered. We recommend numbering both sides of the mailbox if it is on the same side of the road as your home, and on the front of the mailbox if it is across the street.

If you are a Post Office box holder, you still must take note of your new E-911 address. While you will continue to use your Post Office box number to receive mail, you must refer to your new E-911 address in case of an emergency. If you do not have a mailbox, a post should be placed at the end of the driveway with the house number on both sides of the post. This will help any personnel responding to an emergency find the address more quickly. Your patience and cooperation has been greatly appreciated through this long endeavor. Emergency Management Report of 1998

As everyone knows the month of January proved to be a very hard month on everyone. The ice storm that hit the state was very costly to the state and to every town and city within the state. In the Town of Belmont we were not hit as hard as our neighbor's to our East and North were. Our emergency shelter was set up at the fire station and we were able to house 15 people for two days. With Belmont not being hit as hard as our neighbors we were able to assist Gilmanton with manpower and generators. Parts of Gilmanton were out of power for 10 days.

In June of 1998 we were hit very hard with rain storms, and we received over 18 inches of rain. This rain caused many thousands of dollars worth of damage across the town. Many roads were washed out and your Highway Department did a outstanding job in getting these roads back in shape. Your Director of Public Works worked very hard and was able to recover most of the cost of the damage through FEMA and your Emergency Management Director and our town Accountant were able to recover the total cost of damage do to the ice storm in January. The town received over \$70,000.00 for these two storms.

Also during 1998 we were able to purchase many items for the town through the Federal Surplus Program. We were able to save up to 95% off the book price on the items that were purchased.

At this time I would like to thank the Board of Selectmen, Budget Committee, Department Heads, Town Administrator and the citizens of Belmont for their support.

ARTICLE 2. To see what the Town will do with the income from the John M. Sargent Trust Fund.

ARTICLE 3 To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$160,000 for the construction of the Town beach along with two bath houses and a secondary parking area and to authorize the issuance of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA Chapter 33) and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and determine the rate of interest thereon. Requires Ballot Vote.
RECOMMENDED BY THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN AND THE BUDGET COMMITTEE.

ARTICLE 4 . To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$55,000 and to authorize the withdrawal of the entire amount from 1998 Budget surplus to cover cost overruns associated with the renovations to the Belmont Mill. RECOMMENDED BY THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN AND THE BUDGET COMMITTEE.

ARTICLE 5. ARTICLE 6. THIS WARRANT ARTICLE IS AN ALTERNATIVE TO ARTICLE #5. RECOMMENDED BY THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN AND THE BUDGET COMMITTEE.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 31:95,C to restrict the revenues from ambulance billings to the replacement and repair of fire and ambulance apparatus and equipment. Such revenues and expenditures shall be accounted for in a special fund to be known as the Fire/Ambulance Equipment and Apparatus Fund, separate from the General Fund and shall be non-lapsing and shall only be expended by vote at a Town Meeting, provided however, that the Selectmen shall be authorized to withdraw, at the end of the Town's fiscal year, an amount equal to the fees charged by COMSTAR, or its successor, for the collection and administration of such fees. ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$210,000 for the reconstruction of highways, said appropriation to be funded by \$122,915 from Highway Block Grant funds provided by the State of New Hampshire, the balance of \$87,785 to be raised from general taxation. RECOMMENDED BY THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN AND THE BUDGET COMMITTEE.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund in accordance with RSA 35 for the purchase of a new ambulance for the Winnisquam Fire Department and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000 to be placed in this fund and authorize the Selectmen to act as agents to expend such funds in accordance with the needs of the Winnisquam Fire Department.
