This case having been heard it is found that said Samuel Eaton the testator named in said bill and answer, died November 26, 1871, and that his wife, Mary Eaton, died August 8, 1872, and that George R. Bennett, the beneficiary named in said will, died in March, 1910, without issue.

That said Samuel Eaton made his will, the fifth clause of which is set forth in said bill, on November 25, 1871, and that at that time there was no high school in said Danville and there has never been one there.

That on April 27, 1910, at a legally called town meeting to act upon an article in the warrant for said meeting "to see if the town will vote to accept the legacy of Samuel Eaton to establish a high school" the town "voted to accept the legacy of Samuel Eaton."

It is decreed that the fifth clause of said will established a trust to a charitable use and the same creates a valid gift to the town of Danville of the real and personal estate named in said clause to be held by the town in trust to carry out the intent and purpose of the testator to establish a high school in said town at or near the locality named in said will; that the vote of said town on April 27, 1910 was a valid acceptance of said gift.

That it is the duty of said trustee, Clarence M. Collins, to settle his account in the probate court and to turn over the balance of the funds belonging to said estate found in his hands upon settlement of said account to the selectmen of said town of Danville acting in behalf of said town, taking their receipt therefor, said fund to be forever held by said town in trust for the purpose of carrying out the intention of said testator as expressed in

the fifth clause of said will as nearly as the same can be carried out in conformity with the law existing from time to time with reference to the management and conduct of high schools.

That as the law now in force confers upon school districts the exclusive control, conduct and management of high schools and power to establish the same it is the duty of said town, if said district shall vote to establish a high school in the locality named in the will, to expend a reasonable sum of money out of the principal of said fund to purchase a lot of land suitable for the purpose at or near the locality named in said will, the deed to the same to be in the name of the town, the land constituting a part of said trust fund, and to erect thereon a building or buildings suitable for the purpose of a high school to accommodate such number of scholars as are likely to attend such a school in said Danville, and to provide the same with suitable furniture, said buildings and furniture to be and remain a part of said trust fund.

That should said district neglect to keep said building or buildings in suitable repair, and the furniture therein, said town may do so out of the income of said fund, and from said income said town may pay insurance premiums, if not paid by said district or by said town from its own resources, and the balance of said income as the same shall from time to time accrue said town shall pay over to said district toward maintaining and supporting said high school.

In case said district shall refuse or neglect to establish a high school by vote of the district in the manner designated in said will this court will give further directions as to the management of said trust upon motion of any party interested.

Clarence M. Collins, Trustee, v. Danville and Others**COPY OF MODIFICATION OF DECREE**

In the above entitled action one of the defendants, the School District of Danville, in said county, having filed a petition to have the decree in said action made at the January term, 1911, modified, and the town of Danville as trustee of the fund named in said decree having accepted service of said petition and asked that the prayer of the same be granted, upon certain conditions named in its assent to said petition, it appearing that they are the only parties interested in the matters set forth in said petition,

It is decreed that the original decree made at the January term be modified as follows:

In case said school district shall vote to establish a high school in accordance with the terms of said original decree said town as trustee is authorized to proceed according to the terms of said decree, or to join with said district in the purchase of a lot of land at the place named in said decree, one-half of the cost of said land, including grading and fencing, to be paid by said town out of said trust fund and one-half by said school district, and to join with said district in the erection of a building thereon, including necessary out-buildings, suitable for the use of a high school and a grammar school, one-half of the cost of said building to be paid by the district and one-half by the town out of said trust fund, said undivided half of said land and buildings to be and remain a part of said trust fund, the deed of said land to be in the name of the district and the town as trustee of the Samuel Eaton fund.

If the building be erected for two schools as herein provided and the district shall neglect to keep in repair the whole of said building said town may expend a sum not greater than one-half of the cost of repairs and insurance out of said fund.

No part of said fund shall be expended by said town for the purpose named in said decree in excess of one-half the cost of land and buildings in case said district votes to erect a building in conjunction with said town as trustee to be occupied for a high school and a gram-

mar school, and no part of said fund shall be expended until said district has legally established a high school in accordance with the terms of said decree.

The original decree except as herein modified shall remain in full force.

Owing to the resignation in June of Miss Fronie Towle, teacher of the primary school, Miss Elizabeth MacNeff was elected to fill the vacancy. The grammar school was fortunate in retaining Miss Foss and the North school Miss Towle. In the judgment of the board the work of our teachers is characterized by faithfulness and efficiency.

The present school year has been lengthened to thirty-six weeks. If this can be followed in the future it will be possible to come nearer the standard required by the State as the State Program of Studies is based on a year of thirty-six weeks.

During the year the primary and North schoolhouses have been insured, flags supplied to schools without them as required by law, and with the approval of the School Board the local W. C. T. U. introduced into all the schools, the Schools Saving Bank System. Already there are forty depositors in all schools. This is encouraging. The habit of saving is one of the essentials of education.

During the past year the District has paid tuition at secondary schools for eleven pupils, ten at Sanborn Seminary and one at Pinkerton Academy.

It is recommended, as required by law, that four hundred dollars be raised to pay High School tuition and one hundred dollars for supplies for the coming year.

The Eaton Fund having been paid to the town to establish a high school, the District at its coming annual

meeting will be asked to take action concerning said school.

In April, the lease of the building occupied by the grammar school expires and we have no assurance it can be renewed, making it imperative that the District provide a building for this school. In view of these facts the next District meeting is of unusual importance and should have our best thought and consideration.
