SCHOOL REPORT.

The School Board submit the following report for the year ending March 1, 1889. With one exception the schools have continued throughout the year under the charge of the same teachers. Miss Alice W. Batchelder in the North School, Miss Edith S. Brown, in the West School, Miss Ednah M. Hardy, in the South school, Miss Ella A. Tilton, continuing for two terms in charge of the East School, being succeeded by Miss Lucia S. Carver the third term. The schools, have run with very little frictions throughout the year, and the relation between teachers and pupils have been pleasant. The attendance has not been as constant as we could desire but with the exception of unavoidable absences we think there has been an improvement over former years. We would urge upon the citizens of the town the necessity of constant attendance in order that teachers and pupils may do justice to themselves. While our schools are perhaps not models, a commendable interest has been shown by teachers and pupils in their work which we hope may continue in the future. The scholars of the East School by their own exertions purchased Yaggy's Anatomical Study which will be of great assistance to them in the study of Physiology. We express the hope that this and other schools may be successful in their efforts to secure in the near future, books of ref-

erence which are much needed and with intelligent teachers aid materially in school work.

ARTICLES IN WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN
MEETING.

1. To choose a Moderator to preside in said meeting.
2. To choose three Selectmen, Town Treasurer, and Clerk.
3. To choose a Collector of Taxes, and all other necessary town officers and agents for the year ensuing.
4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of schools; for paying the town debts and defraying the interest thereon, and for other necessary charges arising in said town; for laying out and repairing highways and sidewalks, and building and repairing bridges; for the maintenance of the poor; for school-houses; and to establish and maintain public libraries, cemeteries, and parks or commons, and to improve the same; to prepare and publish the early history of the town.
5. To hear the reports of the Town Treasurer and Board of Selectmen to the Town Auditors; the reports of the Auditors, Agents, Committees, or other officers heretofore chosen or appointed, and to pass any vote relating thereto.
6. To see if the town will fund its debt, or any part thereof, and to pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To take the sense of the qualified voters whether the alteration and amendments of the constitution proposed by the constitutional convention shall be approved, and to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars to paint and make other needed improvements in the town hall.
9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars to repair the town landing and appoint agents to expend the same.
10. To transact all other business which may come before said meeting.
