To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hollis, in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Lower Town Hall in said Hollis on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.

3. To hear the report of the Selectmen and other Town officers and committees.

4. To appropriate money for the Town Library.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate money as required by law to obtain State Aid.

6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute the blank inventories at the time of appraisal.

7. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Treasurer, under order of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make such abatement or refund in taxes to resident property owners who have lost their buildings by fire, total not to exceed two-thirds of the real estate tax.

9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell any property bought by the Town for non-payment of taxes.

10. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue road between Harry N. Smith's on the Nashua Road to the Depot Road.

11. To see what action the Town will take in regard to reduction in wages.

12. To see what action the Town will take in regard to Daylight saving.

13. To appropriate money for Memorial Day.

14. To transact any other necessary or proper business.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Hudson, N. H., February 15, 1932.

To the School Board and Citizens of the town of Hollis:

GREETINGS:

The following is the number enrolled in each grade in your schools on January 4, 1932: Grade 1-10, Grade 2-14, Grade 3-12, Grade 4-22, Grade 5-16, Grade 6-21, Grade 7-24, Grade 8-8, Grade 9-13, Grade 10-16, Grade 11-12, Grade 12-11, making a total of 134 in the elementary schools and 49 in the high school.

Due to the unusually large number in both the present sixth and seventh grades, there will be over 40 in the seventh and eighth grades next year.

There was but one change in the teaching staff in Hollis this year; Mr. Kenneth Lane taking the place of Clayton C. Barton.

Due to the fact that there were a very small number of pupils to attend the Pine Hill school, that school has been closed and these children are transported to Hollis at a considerable saving to the town.

The teachers are each continuing with the same efficiency and co-operation which made their work a success last year.

There has been a great improvement this year in the quality of the work being done in the agricultural course. The agricultural shop has been remodeled and some new equipment added so that more efficient results are now being obtained.

Miss Margaret Cronin has again been employed as your school nurse and her report is included.

Professor John M. Priske is also continuing with his good work in music.

The pupils of the Hollis schools last year presented a very creditable operetta consisting of the following parts: Palace of Carelessness, Grades 1 to 4; Robinson Crusoe, Grades 5 to 8; Rip Van Winkle, High School.

The high school party held on April 10, 1931 was a very successful social function. The play "A Cousin From Coon Ridge" was very successfully presented by the Senior class last year.

Graduates of Hollis High School who started additional training last fall were two girls at Union Hospital, Fall River, Mass.; two girls at Memorial Hospital, Nashua, N. H.; one girl at Keene Normal School, and two boys at the University of New Hampshire.

General Science was offered as a new course last September in Grades 9 and 10, to alternate with Junior Business Training which was started the previous year.

The boys and girls of Hollis High School are continuing with their usual enthusiasm in basket ball. Howard Marvel of the class of '29 is coaching the boys' team this year in place of Willis Spaulding who has so successfully done this in past years.

This being the 200th anniversary of the birth of George Washington, the Hollis schools very successfully presented for their annual musical entertainment on February 19 the following: Washington's Boyhood, Grades 1 to 4; Betsy Ross, Grades 5 and 6; George Washington, The Father of Our Country, Grades 7 and 8; and Braddock's Defeat by the High School.
