To the inhabitants of the Town of Langdon, County of Sullivan, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs: You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Langdon on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, at ten of the clock a.m. until seven p.m. Regular business meeting will commence at seven p.m.

Article 1. To choose all necessary officers for the ensuing year.

Article 2. Are you in favor of amending Building Code for the Town of Langdon as proposed by the Planning Board by changing Section 4 Accessory Buildings as follows: The phrase "not used for living purposes" shall be deleted from "B" and "C." and "D. No detached accessory building shall be used for living purposes" shall be added. This article has the approval of the Planning Board.

Article 3. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$241,020 for the following purposes:

The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$170,000 for the maintenance of highways and bridges. The State of New Hampshire to furnish approximately \$48,482 in State Aid. The Town will raise the balance. (Approximately \$121,518). The Selectmen recommend this article.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$56,000 for the purchase of a new Backhoe/Loader; to authorize trade-in of current backhoe/loader in the amount of \$6,000; to authorize the withdrawal of \$15,000 from the capital reserve fund previously established; and the remaining \$35,000 to be raised by taxes.
The Selectmen recommend this article.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200 for Fire Department Equipment.
The Selectmen recommend this article.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 for Police Department Equipment.
The Selectmen recommend this article.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 for the purchase of two recycling containers.
The Selectmen do not recommend this article.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for the Cemetery Fence Capital Reserve Fund previously established.
The Selectmen recommend this article.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500 for the Cemetery Land Capital Reserve Fund previously established.
The Selectmen recommend this article.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 for the Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established.
The Selectmen recommend this article.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to send the following resolution to the New Hampshire General Court: Resolved, in its first two years of operation, the Land and Community Heritage Investment Program (LCHIP) has helped communities throughout New Hampshire preserve their natural, cultural and historic resources and, therefore, the State of New Hampshire should maintain funding for LCHIP in its next biennial budget.
The Selectmen recommend this article.

Article 13. Whereas, New Hampshire residents pay the 12th highest cost of insurance in the country; and

Whereas, the cost of health insurance premiums for families has increased by 45% over the past three years; and

Whereas, 100,000 New Hampshire residents have no health coverage and 77% of them have a full-time worker at home; and

Whereas, due to these rising costs almost half of New Hampshire's small business cannot afford health coverage for their employees, therefore be it resolved

That we, the citizens of Langdon, New Hampshire, call on our elected officials from all levels of government, and those seeking office, to work with consumers, businesses, and health care providers to ensure that:

- Everyone, including the self-employed, unemployed, un – and underinsured, and small business owners has access to an affordable basic health plan similar to what federal employees receive;
- Everyone, including employers, consumers, and the state, local and federal government makes a responsible and fair contribution to finance the health care system;
- Everyone receives high quality care that is cost efficient and medically effective; and
- That these efforts help control the skyrocketing cost of health care.

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 PM. Moderator Donald Malcolm led the townspeople in the Pledge of Allegiance and prayer. Each warrant article was read as it came up for discussion.

Article 1. To choose all necessary officers for the ensuing year.

Article 2. Are you in favor of amending the Zoning Ordinance by adopting the Telecommunications Facilities Ordinance proposed by the Planning Board of the Town of Langdon under the authority of RSA 674:16&21,II, that would establish general guidelines and regulate the placement, location, construction, size, buffering, and other aspects associated with any telecommunications facilities requesting location in the Town of Langdon. This article has the approval of the Planning Board, and a copy is available for review at the Town Clerk's office.

The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.

Discussion: The School Resource Officer (SRO) was the center of discussion. The Town of Langdon's only full time employee is being funded for three years by a COPS Grant from the Department of Justice, and was hired in cooperation with Fall Mountain Regional School District. It is estimated that 85% of her time will be spent in the high school. The fourth year's salary will be picked up the school district.

ARTICLE 3 PASSED UNANIMOUSLY WITH HAND VOTE

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$152,000 for the maintenance of highways and bridges. The State of New Hampshire to furnish approximately \$46,914 in State Aid. The Town will raise the balance. (Approximately \$105,086). The Selectmen recommend this article.

Discussion: It was questioned why road jobs over \$20,000 are not being put out to bid. The Selectmen stated that most of Langdon's road projects are not big enough to generate any interest from construction companies. The town's experience with the Crane Brook Road project revealed that Pelton Construction was \$25-\$30,000 under the next lowest bid due to minimal administrative and engineering costs. It was also noted that whenever the town can use town vehicles, town equipment, and part time help for part or all of a project, the town is getting "the most bang for their buck."

ARTICLE 4 PASSED UNANIMOUSLY WITH HAND VOTE

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200 for Fire Department Equipment.

The Selectmen recommend this article.

ARTICLE 5 PASSED UNANIMOUSLY WITH VOICE VOTE

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 for Police Department Equipment.

The Selectmen recommend this article.

Discussion: The equipment to be purchased is a bulletproof vest and an updated computer system.

ARTICLE 6 PASSED UNANIMOUSLY WITH VOICE VOTE

Article 7. Shall the town accept the provisions of RSA 31:95-b providing that any town at an annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the town meeting, unanticipated money from a state, federal, or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year? This authorization will remain in effect until rescinded by a vote of the town meeting.

The Selectmen recommend this article.

Discussion: The Selectmen are required to hold a public hearing to accept and expend any fund that become available between town meetings, even with the passage of this article.

ARTICLE 7 PASSED UNANIMOUSLY WITH VOICE VOTE

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts of personal property, other than cash, to the town for any public purposes. This authorization in accordance with RSA 31:95-e shall remain in effect until rescinded by a vote of the town meeting.

The Selectmen recommend this article.

Discussion: The Selectmen are also required to hold a public hearing to accept any gifts for public use that may given between town meetings, even with the passage of this article.

ARTICLE 8 PASSED UNANIMOUSLY WITH VOICE VOTE

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000 for the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established.

The Selectmen recommend this article.

ARTICLE 9 PASSED UNANIMOUSLY WITH VOICE VOTE

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000 for the Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established.
The Selectmen recommend this article

ARTICLE 10 PASSED UNANIMOUSLY WITH VOICE VOTE

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500 for the Cemetery Land Capital Reserve Fund previously established.
The Selectmen recommend this article.

ARTICLE 11 PASSED UNANIMOUSLY WITH VOICE VOTE

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for the Cemetery Fence Capital Reserve Fund previously established.
The Selectmen recommend this article.

ARTICLE 12 PASSED UNANIMOUSLY WITH VOICE VOTE

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50,000 for the purchase of a 2002 Ford F-550 Highway Truck and to authorize the withdrawal of \$32,000 from the capital reserve fund previously established and the remaining \$18,000 to be raised by taxes.
The Selectmen recommend this article.

Discussion: The 86 Ford will be up for sale with the purchase of a new truck. There were suggestions of taking advantage of state or federal surplus vehicles.

ARTICLE 13 PASSED UNANIMOUSLY WITH VOICE VOTE

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250 for the Sullivan County Hospice.
The Selectmen recommend this article.

ARTICLE 14 PASSED UNANIMOUSLY WITH VOICE VOTE

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to authorize the creation of a Veteran's Memorial Park on the common in the center of town, at no cost to the town. (By Petition)
The Selectmen recommend this article.

Discussion: Linda Campbell presented a sketch of the proposed park developed in cooperation with various local veterans' organizations, and encouraged participation and donations.

ARTICLE 15 PASSED UNANIMOUSLY WITH VOICE VOTE

Article 17. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

*Attention was drawn to the Stokes Report. \$79,000 was distributed in scholarships to twenty five Langdon students. This year the distribution will be reduced because of the slower stock market.

*Langdon Democratic Party Caucus will be held March 19th at 7PM at the Town Hall.

*Motion was made to reconsider Article #10. PASSED

*Motion was made to amend Article #10 to read "...\$20,000 for the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund previously established." PASSED WITH VOICE VOTE

Article 18. To allow accounts.

ARTICLE 18 PASSED WITH VOICE VOTE

AUDITOR'S REPORT

We have reviewed the financial and tax records of the Town of Langdon including the Selectmen, Town Clerk, Tax Collector, Treasurer, and Trustees of the Trust Funds. SELECTMEN'S REPORT
2002

We have several items to share with you as we prepare for the 2003 town meeting. As most of you know, the town took a tax deed to the Baker commercial building on Rt 12A this year. The former owner and the mortgage holder have the right to repurchase the property until May, 2005. We have made several necessary repairs to the property and rented parts of the building to two tenants. At the present time, the property is generating \$14,000/year in income. After May of 2005, the town will have to decide whether we want to sell it or keep it. If we decide to keep it, the present Selectboard would like to propose renovating the building to accommodate town offices, a meeting room with kitchen, a police facility, and a fire facility. We believe that we could do this all on the accessible first level and continue to rent office space on the second floor. You will note that the town's net worth in terms of back taxes due is lower than last year because the tax on this property is no longer due to the town.

During the fall, the Board of Selectmen made major changes in the operation of the transfer station. Much of the recycling program was put on hold for two reasons. The material being transported to Walpole was being towed in a heavily loaded trailer behind a light, privately owned pickup. We felt this put the town in a situation of increased liability and was dangerous to the town employees driving the truck. It was also not cost effective to recycle. Because of the small amounts of material we generate, we are not able to have anything picked up in town. Everything was transported to Walpole which took the material at no cost. The labor cost to transport the material was greater than the cost of sending the material to Claremont to be incinerated. Because we know that there is a lot of interest in recycling within the town, we have proposed a new recycling program in this year's warrant. It will not be cost effective, but it will use commercial haulers to transport the recyclables to Keene. Please note the list of charges for certain items discarded at the transfer station. This reflects the cost of disposing of these items which are not part of usual weekly household trash.

As most of you know, the town of Langdon, along with Alstead and Acworth, is petitioning the court for a Declaratory Judgement over the new school cost formula. We believe that the formula is not in the best interest of the town and that it is not legal under state statutes. This petition will be expensive and we may not prevail in the end. The Board believes that it is in the town's best interest to pursue this, and we have had the support of the residents who have attended our hearings on the issue.

You will notice an increase in town expenses this year. The Board works hard to control cost and tax increases, but we must spend enough to provide good basic services. We would like to thank all town officers, employees, and volunteers for their service to the town. Part of living in a small town is being part of the community. Langdon is fortunate to have people willing to serve our community. We'd also like to thank Mary Knott for her services as town administrator. The quality of Mary's work makes it possible for us to pay attention to issues in a way that would not be possible without her.

Road Agent's Report 2002

The major project for 2002 was Cheshire Turnpike from the junction of Lower Cemetery Road to the junction of 12A. Shoulders were rebuilt, width was added to accommodate school bus traffic, and it was paved. A center line will be added in the spring. The rebuilding, gravelling, and drainage work planned on the Comstock Road was begun and will be completed in 2003. The east end of Cold River Road in the area of Gary Mack was improved with drainage and corner work.

3/4"Crushed gravel was put on Cold River Road, Tory Hill Road, Mellish Road, Jewett Road, and Hemlock Road.

Brush was cut on Cold River Road, Holden Hill Road, Greene Road, Currier Road, and Ball Hill Road. More brush will be cut this year, especially on roads that are scheduled for work this year or next year. Roadside mowing is planned for this year also.

About a week was used in cleaning up after the wind storm in the summer. Trees all over town had to be removed to clear roadways. The highway crew would like to thank everyone that helped with any tree work throughout the year.

The main project for this summer will be the repair and repaving of Old Drewsville Road. The Comstock road approach will be paved at the same time. We plan to seal Holden Hill Road and Hemlock Road, and add 3/4" or 1.5" gravel to Currier Road, the upper portion of Holden Hill Road, Winch Hill Road, Tory Hill Road, Ball Hill Road, and Old Stage Road.

The Selectmen will ask the town to purchase a new backhoe this year that we anticipate using for snow clearing of town property and road junctions as well as moving sand and salt.

The Highway Department's plan for compliance to the EPA Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plan includes extending the back eve line on the town garage to house sanders and chloride, and covering a portion of the sand pile with a one-pitch roof that will protect the limited amount of mixed salt and sand. The timeline for these projects are dependant on town funds.

**Town of Langdon
Road Plan Update
2002**

Progress continues on the road-rebuilding plan that we started almost four years ago. As you all know we have completed several major projects. We have spent over \$250,000 on these projects- over 45% of the highway budget. It is a tribute to our highway crew that we have been able to plan and complete such projects at a relatively modest cost. We are fortunate they have their ability and experience.

We continue to carry out all of the usual activities necessary to keep all roads in good condition – grading, potholing, brushing, culverts, gravelling, etc. Unfortunately, increased and speedier traffic makes it increasingly difficult to keep our roads in good condition. We won't know until spring what damage has been done to the roads over this very severe winter. It could be costly.

As mentioned in the Road Agent's report. The major projects for this year, 2003, are the paving of Old Drewsville and Comstock roads and sealing on Hemlock and Holden Hill.

We plan in 2004 to pave the approaches on Tory Hill Road at 12A, Tory Hill Road at Route 123, and Mellish Road at Cheshire Turnpike. This work is long overdue from a safety standpoint. Also, to accommodate increased traffic and correct a long-standing problem, we plan to rebuild and gravel Hemlock Road at Meany Road. Finally, in both 2003 and 2004, we hope to complete some of the following lesser projects:

- Rebuild and gravel Tory Hill from Mellish to Porter's.
- Repair and pave Walker Hill Road including the intersection with Egerton.
- Rebuild and gravel Egerton from Walker Hill to town line.
- Seal Crane Brook Road, Cheshire Turnpike, and Ball Hill.
- Rebuild Hemlock Road from Meany Road to town line.

As a part of the regular road maintenance activity, the following work will be addressed as time and money permit: culvert work on Tory Hill Road, Hemlock Road, Ball Hill Road, Russell Road, Meany Road, and Currier Road; rebuilding and gravelling of the lower end of Winch Hill Road, Currier Road, Mason Road, Greene Road, and Russell Road; crushed gravel and grading on all re-built roads.

Holden Hill Road deserves special attention because of the scope of the work involved to bring it into condition to accommodate the high volume of local, commercial and out of town traffic. Because most of the work involves paving, the cost of rehabilitating Holden Hill is very high, in excess of \$250,000. To do the whole road from the Town Hall to the town line, we have divided the work into the following sections to spread the cost over several years, spending \$50,000 to \$60,000 per year, depending on the volatility of oil prices. If we choose to increase the annual funding for road projects or borrow money, sections of work can be combined and the time frame shortened.

Holden Hill Road project by \$50,000 - \$60,000 section:

- Completely rebuild and pave the section at Menton's corner to Greene Road.
- Pave Greene Road to the former Baker property (now Kruger).
- Pave from the Kruger property to town line.
- Repair and pave from Stuller's to Menton's.
- Repair and pave from Town Hall to former Holbrook property (now Gourley).
- Repair and pave from Gourley's to Knott's.

Police Chief's Report 2002

Well, it's that time of year - year end report time, and we've had a full year of a full time resource officer at the school. In that year she has handled 242 incidents and has set up several programs to benefit the students at the school. Rosemary has done a fine job for the district and the town.

There seems to be some controversy in town as to who foots the bill after the grant runs out in three years. The fourth year, as part of the grant stipulations, has to be covered by the district as voted on by the school board before the grant was approved. After the fourth year it will be up to the school board whether they want to maintain the program at a cost to the entire district.

Speed seems to be a big problem in town. It seems almost every time one of us responds to a car accident, the driver says that it's the road's fault. That's not my estimation. Many accidents could be prevented by driving according to the road conditions at the time. Every one of us that lives here should know that the roads get slippery in the winter time, so please slow down. The life you save may be your own.

I would like to take this time to thank the entire volunteer fire department for the help they provided this past year. Without them, the police department could not effectively do their job at car accidents and other incidents where we need joint cooperation to do the job.

The Fire Department continued to participate in training sessions throughout the year. We had our weekly drills at our own station, as well as with other area departments. Two of our members became recertified as National First Responders. Several of our members became State certified in Hazmat Awareness and Hazmet Operations.

New purchases this year included a 5500 watt generator which will reside on 17R1. We also upgraded our hose to 1300' of 4" on 17M1. New tire chains for 17M1 were also purchased.

Maintenance continues to be performed by the department members on the fire trucks and equipment.

Our annual fundraisers proved successful once again. We would like to thank the members of the community for generously supporting us on the Mother's Day Breakfast, the Covered Bridge Festival, and Farm Bureau Lunch. Funds from these events help purchase equipment and other necessities for the department.

In 2002 we had one small, (3/4 acre) but scary woods fire. Scary because of the dryness. We had a terrific response and help from Alstead and Walpole. We were able to contain the area burnt. This fire started from ashes thought to be extinguished 2-3 days prior even with careful watching by the people checking the ashes. We all have to be aware that ashes will stay burning for a very long time.

We also had one permittee who needed help in putting out his fire after it stopped raining. (Poor judgement.)

There is a new law regarding "barrel" burning - no more for all practical purposes - only clean wood or wood products are allowed and you will need a written permit. Please read the Forest Fire Ranger's Report included.

Report of Forest Fire Warden and State Forest Ranger

Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands cooperate and coordinate to reduce the risk of wildland fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required before doing ALL outside burning. Fire permits are mandatory for all outside burning unless the ground where the burning is to be done (and surrounding areas) is completely covered with snow. Violations of RSA 227-L:17, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail, plus suppression cost.

A new law effective January 1, 2003 prohibits residential trash burning (RSA 125-N). Contact New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services at (800) 498-6868 or www.des.state.nh.us for more information

The new year for the Planning Board began in April with the election of officers: Pat Bresland, Chairman, Everett Adams, Vice-Chair, and Bob Polcari as Secretary. Other members include Byron Niles, new member Doug Whynott, William Lawrence, Ex Officio member Robert Cunniff and Marilyn Martin. We are glad to have Marilyn's expertise back. Estelle Adams is our recording secretary. We have no alternates at this point.

This past year has been a busy year for us again. We worked on and repaired the driveway regulations; did lot line adjustments for Tom Esslinger on Holden Hill Road and Robert Polcari on Cold River Road; completed a major subdivision for Bruce and Ginger Cheeney on Holden Hill Road; and merged two lots for the Robert and Joyce Young on Old Stage Road and Holden Hill Road. We crafted the warrant article for Accessory Buildings, and held a public hearing on it, held a meeting with Deb Hinman and state officials on land and property conservancy in the Town of Langdon, and have begun work on the Master Plan.

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT - 2002

The Zoning Board of Adjustment meets on the 2nd Tuesday of each month at 7:30 PM at the Town Hall, at the discretion of the Chairman. Meetings are open to the public and all interested parties are invited to attend.

The only formal action by the Board in 2002 was the annual application by Cold River Materials for renewal of its special exception and permit for sand and gravel excavation at its site off Cold River Road. A public hearing on the application was held on February 12, 2002 and the application was granted, subject to the same conditions as previously. These conditions are designed, in general, to minimize adverse environmental effects of the operations, prevent undue neighborhood disturbance, control traffic, and provide for public safety and for appropriate reclamation of excavated areas.

In December, members of the Board attended the Planning Board's public hearing on a proposed warrant article to amend the Town's Building Code relative to the use of accessory buildings, and offered comments.

The membership of the Board in 2002 was Carroll D. French (term expiring 2004), Russell LaCroix (term expiring 2003), Fred Roentsch, the ex-officio Selectmen representative, and Michael Kmiec, as alternate (term expiring 2005). The regular membership of the board is five, with up to five alternate members. During the year there was one regular member vacancy and no alternate members.

STOKES SCHOLARSHIP TRUST –2002

In 1987 Langdon resident, Samuel E. Stokes, Jr. set up The Stokes Scholarship Trust, and placed a sizable sum of money into that trust. The income from the investment of these funds was to be distributed at least annually "to a student or students who are residents of the Town of Langdon, NH, to assist them in their education above the secondary school level, including but not limited to a student or students who attend a school or program for nursing training." Further, "If in any year no student qualifies to receive a distribution of income hereunder, then the Trustee may distribute income to or for the benefit of one or more aged or indigent residents of the Town of Langdon, NH to assist such persons in paying medical bills or real estate taxes assessed against the homes in which they live." This Trust was activated in 1994 with the death of Samuel Stokes.

The Stokes Committee meets annually in May to process scholarship applications and make recommendations to Fleet Bank, the designated Trustee of the Stokes Scholarship Trust. The following individuals are on the committee: Jeffrey Holmes, Donald Malcolm, Kathie Beam, Fred Roentsch, John Thomas, and Bob Cunniff.

This year a total of \$59,000 was distributed in scholarships to the following students:

In addition, \$1,025.85 was used against real estate taxes for aged or indigent residents of Langdon.

Southwest Region Planning Commission 2002

The Planning Commission, with a service area covering 36 municipalities in Cheshire, Hillsborough and Sullivan Counties, is one of New Hampshire's nine regional planning agencies established by the State Legislature and the Region's towns. We continue to provide planning-related assistance to member communities and to represent the Southwest Region in state and federal programs. Our diverse work program covers activities including local planning assistance, natural resources planning, regional information systems and mapping, transportation planning, community and economic development, and hazard mitigation planning. We are funded through multiple sources including local membership dues. For each dollar in local dues, we've succeeded in leveraging six additional dollars to assist in meeting the needs of the Region and its municipal members. These resources provide the Commission the ability to assemble a professional staff which member municipalities have direct access to. Highlights to Commission activities for the past year include:

- published the document entitled "Guiding Change: The Southwest Region at the Beginning of the 21st Century," representing the updated regional plan for Southwest New Hampshire.
- expanded community development activities through several successful grant applications under the State's CDBG program,
- completion of the Rt. 202 Corridor Study: MA State Line to Rt. 9 in Hillsborough,
- continued involvement in several other transportation planning projects including improvements to the Connecticut River Bridges at Rts. 9 and 119, Rt. 12 bypass of Troy Village, Keene-Swanzey bypass expansion, and Rt. 202 widening north of Peterborough,
- sponsor of several workshops including economic development, transportation, and resource protection,
- assistance in updating Master Plans for several Southwest Region communities,
- assistance to the Region's towns with local hazard mitigation planning, and continued progress in building a state-of-the-art information system for Southwest New Hampshire.

We continue to be available to assist you in your planning related activities - please don't hesitate to contact us if you have a project you would like to discuss. Thank you for your continued support of the Commission. We look forward to working with you over the coming year.

Cold River Local Advisory Committee 2002

The Cold River Local Advisory Committee has had a busy year. We have:

- Implemented a water quality monitoring program along the river and have plans to expand that effort. Preliminary testing results for pH, temperature, conductivity, dissolved oxygen and turbidity appear to support our assumption that the Cold River generally has excellent water quality.
- Hired an AmeriCorps member, Travis Hussey, to work with the 3rd, 4th, and 6th grades in Acworth, Langdon, Goshen-Lempster, and Vilas Schools and one class at FMRHS. Travis is teaching students about macroinvertebrates as part of water quality studies and is helping them to keep a nature journal. All efforts will ultimately guide what will become the "River Journal Calendar" at the end of the school year.
- Made comment upon four major wetland permit requests that have come before us: the replacement of three state bridges by NH DOT and a trout habitat enhancement project proposed by the NH Coldwater Fisheries Coalition.
- Held the 2nd Annual Winter Workshop Series at the Alstead Shedd-Port Library. Three workshops, all well attended, were on: Wildflowers of the Cold River Watershed; Fish of the Cold River; and Bugs! Macroinvertebrates of the Cold River. Many thanks to the Alstead Shedd-Porter Library for letting us hold our workshops there.
- Worked with the Walpole Outdoor Education Committee and the Cheshire county Conservation District to bring David Carroll of Warner, NH to a wildly successful evening about TURTLES.
- Attended workshops and continued to educate ourselves on topics that pertain to rivers.
- Received several small grants to further projects in the Fall Mountain school district and beyond. We are grateful to the Fall Mountain Educational Endowment Association, the Vermont Institute of Natural Science, the Town of Alstead, and one anonymous grant source.
- Provided assistance to towns in the watershed as needed.
- Continued our work to develop a voluntary river management plan for the Cold River.

The Advisory Committee welcomes your participation in any or all of our projects. If you are interested in joining our committee, please speak with the Selectboard in your town. If there is an opening on the committee, they make nominations to the board. However, with or without official membership status, we welcome all volunteers!

We thank everyone who has worked with us during the past year. In particular, the students, teachers, parents, community members, and administrators working with our "River Journal Calendar" project in the Fall Mountain District and Goshen-Lempster schools have been wonderful. A special thank you goes to David Carroll, "the turtle guy", for his inspiration and enthusiasm, and to Marilou Blane of Alstead for her cheerful encouragement. Finally, we thank all the people of our beautiful watershed towns, for you are the ones who show your love for the land and waters around us in every way and for whom we put forth our endeavours.

Many thanks to previous CRLAC participants Gordon Gowen and Torrey Greene of Acworth; Max Warren of Lempster; Duncan Watson and Tina Tidd of Walpole; Almut Yakoleff of Alstead, and agency staff Tara Bamford of UVLSRPC and David Neils of NH DES.

Another milestone was passed in 2002 as we completed our 21st year of service to the region. We have grown to become a true regional ambulance service, providing Emergency Ambulance Services to nine communities in seven towns in Vermont and New Hampshire. Over the years we have been able to become a premier provider of Emergency Medical Services, dedicated to delivering professional, competent, and caring service to our residents and visitors. We are proud of this accomplishment, while recognizing the importance of the support of the towns in helping us to reach this landmark, and look forward to continuous partnership with the communities for years to come.

2002 proved to be another year of growth for LeFevre Ambulance Service. Not only in the volume of responses, but the professional growth of our staff as well. Our members continue to expand their levels of certification, resulting in a consistently higher level of care provided to those in need. We now have several of our paramedics certified at the critical care level, which allows them to function in the highest level of pre-hospital medicine possible in Vermont and New Hampshire. There is an ever increasing demand for these skills.

During 2002 we accepted delivery of a new Ford ambulance manufactured by Demers Ambulance Manufacturers in Canada. This is a great addition to our fleet.

LeFevre Ambulance Service has again been active in the area of education. Our staff has been instructing and coordinating EMS courses of all levels for the local EMS district, benefiting all towns and services within the area. We also hold monthly training sessions at our office in Bellows Falls. Any parties, especially Langdon EMS providers, are encouraged to attend. Please call one of our non-emergency numbers for a schedule of training.

For 2003, we request an appropriation of \$1,000 to be available to meet the home care needs of Langdon residents.
