BUDGET OF THE TOWN OF MADISON FOR 1933

Continuing the policy of reduction as in 1932 we, the Budget Committee submit the following recommendations:

First. That the valuation of all property for tax purposes be reduced approximately 20%, so as to be more nearly at present actual values, and to equalize with other parts of the state.

Second. That the following wage scale be adopted;

Men	\$2.50 per day
Teams	5.00 per day
Trucks	7.00 per day

Third. That elementary school teachers' wages be reduced 20% from 1931, and that High School teachers' salaries be fixed as follows:

Repairs and Improvements

During this year, Nickerson School has been painted outside and the yard graded, making this a very attractive and well-conditioned building. The Mason schoolhouse was shingled on one side and the foundation walls repaired. Minor repairs were made at the High School and Madison Corner School. Cleaning and varnishing were done.

The special need for the coming year is outside painting.

Medical Inspection

Miss Ruth S. Langille is still acting as school nurse, making the inspections and constantly working on correction of defects. A dental clinic was held in town. Children were taken to an eye clinic in Rochester. Miss Langille spares no time nor travelling expense when working for the boys and girls. Health habits are still made a prominent part of school work. Inspection is often made each morning at the opening of school, records made, and the careless child instructed

and directed how to clean up.

For the year ending June 30, 1932, our schools had an average attendance of 133, an average membership of 139 and a percent of 95.9.

By request the following explanatory paragraph is added. The superintendent's salary was cut by the Joint Supervisory Board of the six towns he serves. The salary is now \$3400. Of this \$3400, the State pays \$2000. The remaining \$1400 is divided among the six towns in proportion to the number of pupils in the schools. Madison's part is 22% or \$308. Madison's part is larger than it was last year because, in the reapportioning last spring, it was found that Madison had a larger number of children in her schools.

REPORT OF SCHOOL HEALTH WORK FOR MADISON

To the Townspeople, School Board, and Superintendent of Schools:

The Town of Madison, like all the other towns in the land, is feeling the effects of the depression in many ways that can not be demonstrated by statistics. The general economic condition is rather obvious to all who will take the trouble to examine figures. But the subtle, far reaching—but none the less dangerous—effect of this economic crisis reacts directly upon the health of the children. Few realize this now. Many will never realize it.

With a realization of this truth a large part of the school health program has been concentrated upon this phase of the work. The foundation was laid last Winter and Spring, with food and clothing needs receiving first attention. Milk was furnished one family by the Woman's Club. The same service has been continued all this year by interested neighbors. Food budgets were made for families with very limited incomes and due to careful planning they are faring well. Free seeds furnished by the State Unemployment Relief Committee resulted in gardens that would take care of the vegetable needs in the diets of eight families. Five large boxes of clothing have been distributed to needy children, including layettes for two new babies. Red Cross flour has been available to those who needed it to supplement their own supply.

During the past year with very limited funds furnished by the Red Cross, the Woman's Club, the Mothers' Club and a few private pockets, thirteen of the worst cases of diseased tonsils have been operated upon, fifty-seven children have received partial or complete dental corrections, and five children were fitted

to glasses long needed. However, there remains a large group of children who normally would receive prompt attention by the parents but are unable to be done this year due to reduced finances. There are seventy-four children who need dental work, thirty-six who need tonsils out, and two with serious vision defects who are unable to afford glasses at present.

In spite of the many difficulties encountered there seems to be some progress in the health conditions in the schools. A brief summary of the past three years of work will demonstrate this:

The present school year is just half over. There remains a great deal of work to be done to keep up the standard of the school health work. If there is one recommendation to be made it is this: we need all the cooperation we can get to make it possible for every child to have the necessary corrective work done during this period of depression!

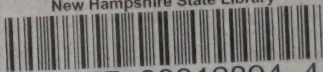
