TRACY MEMORIAL LIBRARY

New Hampshire Library laws require that "Any city or town having a public library shall annually raise and appropriate a sum of money sufficient to provide and maintain adequate lbrary service therein or to supplement funds otherwise provided." While no definition of "adequate library service" is provided, the law makes clear that a public library is a valuable supplement to the formal system of education. Therefore, adequacy of public library service must be measured by the quality of educational as well as recreational services rendered.

Maintenance of adequate library service requires the constant addition of newly published books and magazines in all major fields of interest, both recreational and educational. The Tracy Memorial Library has met this requirement over the years, partly by budget appropriation and partly through the generosity of friends and patrons of the library. As new books are obtained, some of the older books can be discarded. Many, however, have a timelessness which merits their indefinite retention. The result is a constantly increasing number of books, which eventually requires additional stack space.

This is the current situation facing the Tracy Memorial Library, but not for the first time. Several years ago a large proportion of the older non-fiction books were transferred to stacks in the basement. This is a low ceilinged room, inadequately lighted, and reached by a steep stairway with low headroom. As a result the area was shunned by all but the most persistent individual looking for a specific item of referece. Otherwise a considerable amount of valuable reference material lay idle and unused.

In an effort to make this material more accessible, an experiment was undertaken in 1971 in which these books were placed in temporary stacks in the little used auditorium. Snce that time the number of references to these books has increased noticeably.

The Library Trustees share with New London's residents a love for the attractiveness, charm, and quiet dignity of the Tracy Memorial Building. To maintain these features, and yet provide the quality of services required of public libraries, it is proposed to transform the seldom used auditorium to a combined stack and reading room for reference and research purposes. The estimated costs for this arrangement are outlined in the proposed budget for 1972, submitted for Town approval.

This change does not seem to be in conflict with the intentions of Mrs. Tracy, donor of the library building. That some changes would be inevitable from time to time was clearly envisioned by the Trustees of Mrs. Tracy's estate, since the Trust Agreement setting up the Jane A. Tracy Fund states that it "shall be used solely and exclusively for the support, maintenance, operation, and improvement of said Tracy Memorial Building and Library, as and for a public library."

Maintenance of adequate library service also requires a building kept in good repair and with proper safeguards in case of fire. The Board of Trustees have been informed that a fire escape, conforming to State standards, must be built from the second floor of the building, and that all exits from the building be equipped with approved safety doors. The fire escape, when installed, will be in the rear of the building, not visible from either Main or South Pleasant Streets.

In addition, the basement bulkhead started to collapse, and is being replaced. The estimated costs for the fire escape and bulkhead replacement are included in the proposed budget for 1972.

The problems confronting the Tracy Memorial Library, as reflected in the proposed budget, stem from two sources; population growth and the age of the building. The structure is almost 150 years old, with major alterations and conversion to a public library 46 years ago. Like all old buildings, it needs replacement maintenance from time to time.

In 1926, when the Library was opened, New London's population was about 750. Since then it has trebled, educational standards increased many fold, and literary interests broadened beyond measure. To meet today's demand for reading and reference, and in light of the negligible use of the auditorium, the Trustees believe it necessary to transform that available space into a combined stack and reading room.

The above does not include the Library's reference material used by an increasing number of high school and college students, and adults. Easier access to this reference material will increase this usage.

There were 636 new books added to the Library's total in 1971, of which 51 were gifts. New patrons, to the total of 207, were registered during the year.

REPORT OF THE DISTRICT COURT

As anticipated, the work load of the New London District Court has substantially increased. The full impact of the expanded court district to four towns is now felt. The Court has disposed of 845 cases in the calendar year 1971 as against 396 in the year 1970. A breakdown of the types of cases and comparison follows:

The 1971 Legislature (RSA 490:5-a [Supp.]) established a New Hampshire Court Accreditation Commission and the Supreme Court implemented the legislation September 14, 1971, by appointing to the Commission two judges, one legislator, a lawyer and a layman. The Commission will "prescribe minimum standards for all courts with respect to size, adequacy of facility, decor and design, judicial chambers, conference rooms, stenographic . . . assistance . . . record keeping, decorum, parking facilities, respect for rights of the public, law enforcement personnel, and for the accused, as the Supreme Court shall direct. An annual visitation and inspection of all courts is directed.

To maintain a good standard for facilities and decorum the Justice of this court recommends and urges the removal of the courtroom to the spacious and unused town hall room and the construction of office space in the rear. This will eliminate several problems. First, the already overcrowded, unventilated basement courtroom. Second, the very bad present approach to the courtroom by the public. Third, the interruptions resulting from traffic by those having business with the Selectmen and the police, and last but not least the improper entrance to the Bench by the Judge from the corridor used in common with the prosecution. The new courtroom could be utilized for other Town functions when the Court is not in session.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

In 1971 your Police Department's activities have again increased. The trend of unlawful activities seems to be still increasing each year, as proven by the increase of the following duties of this department in 1971.

Motor vehicles and persons stopped for checkups, summons, arrests and warnings for 1971 was 1,245 compared to 769 in 1970. Door checks were down from 1970, this being caused by the increase in activities. In 1971 there were 24,466 compared to 27,007 in 1970. Doors found open in 1971 were 409 compared to 378 in 1970. This department covered 58 accidents in 1971 compared to 32 in 1970, an increase of 26. The department gave aid to 692 persons and other police departments in 1971, an increase of 287 over 1970. The officers of this department worked 639 hours overtime plus 270 hours in court on their own time for a total of 909 hours overtime without pay.

The officers of the New London Police Department wish to thank the people of New London for their cooperation and support in 1971 and we hope that it will continue through 1972.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

LEST WE FORGET — IT CAN HAPPEN HERE

Disastrous forest and brush fires that destroy hundreds of homes are more prevalent on the West Coast with their dry seasons and strong dry hot winds, but 25 years ago this Fall is the anniversary of a disaster that devastated large areas of northern New England, leaving villages in ashes with rows of cellar holes and chimneys in a number of summer vacation home locations. Many lives were lost on that destructive day of October 23, 1947, as nothing could stop the wind-driven flames.

It is true that such conditions are unusual for New Hampshire, but they happened once, and they can happen again. The fuel for fires is all around us. All it takes is a firebrand. Only by cultivating a habit of carefulness with fire at all times can we meet the challenge of protection when dry conditions prevail. Please let these reminders be your guide:

- 1. Never, either when walking, riding or driving, discard a firebrand a lighted match or a glowing cigarette.
- 2. Always obtain a permit for any outside burning. The burning of household rubbish is not permitted if your town has rubbish collection. Burning of grass or garden litter can be dangerous. See your warden first.
- 3. If you camp or picnic, be sure open fires are allowed and if they are, put them *dead out* when leaving.
- 4. MOST IMPORTANT Instruct your children in the danger of the lighted match. A lighted match and dry grass or forest litter is a dangerous combination which leads to destructive loss and can lead to tragedy.

The past year - 1971 - was a favorable year for the control of fires. There were too many fire starts in some towns. We thank those who remembered and ask others to heed Smokey's message.

NEW LONDON CIVIL DEFENSE

REPORT OF THE TOWN HEALTH OFFICER

In accordance with my duty as Health Officer to report annually to the New London community, I have formulated a brief summary of present conditions.

During the past year, I have continued to investigate the water quality of the lakes, streams and beaches within our town. Several problems have arisen in certain locations which required immediate attention. With the help of the State Water Pollution Commission, these conditions were remedied. Scattered difficulties still exist, but, in general, the water quality has met high standards. The reports of my surveys have been submitted to the proper officials.

In addition, New London's Selectmen have relocated a dumping area adjacent to the previous one which has been phased out. This action has been a considerable improvement, though the change is a temporary one. At the time of this report, I have been in contact with State Officials in an attempt to plan a safer, more efficient system of disposal for the very near future. The new sewage dumping pit is functioning well, and seems to be in good condition.

I have also been involved with routine inspections of individual septic systems new and old, all of which have met the requirements of the New Hampshire Water Pollution Commission. I hope that a manual will be soon published in order to inform the townspeople of the necessary criteria involved in septic systems and land subdivisions.

The district representative of the State Health Department has worked with me on other aspects of Health Officer duties, and many meetings with various groups allow me to keep our interested citizens informed about my official functions.

I wish, in conclusion, to express my appreciation to the

town officials of New London who have assisted me in my tasks.

There have been no serious health problems in 1971. Because of the increasing mobility of man in general, small outbreaks of problems occur from time to time but none of these have grown into an epidemic. Perhaps infectious hepatitis is the most serious of these conditions, yet identification of a new case with isolation of the individual and gamma globulin immunization of the contacts has controlled spread in most instances. Adequate personal hygiene and sewage disposal represents the greatest protection from spread to a community.

The second problem seen across the nation in increasing numbers is that of venereal infection, particularly with gonorrhea. Fortunately, this has not been a major problem in this community but one cannot be lulled into lack of concern. Those in a position of exposure need to take seriously the recommendation that unexplained sores and discharges need to be evaluated by a physician since these diseases are totally treatable now. Untreated infection may result in serious permanent damage to other parts of the body, to say nothing of sterility.

Another vexing problem has been the control of pediculosis, otherwise known as nits or head lice. Once exposed, as in school, these sucking pinhead-sized creatures multiply on the scalp and create itching, lay their eggs in little coccoons (called nits) on the hairs. Proper home cleanliness, linen changes, clothing changes and bathing regularly will usually suffice to keep such problems from spreading but when there is a thoroughly established infection within a family, the use of a prescription shampoo on all members of the family and possibly repeated in a week should completely eliminate the infection. Many parents have been alarmed because of the possible contact with cases that have been in school and for centuries this has been a nuisance. However, with adequate help from school nurses, visiting nurses and back-up in financial aid from town finances when necessary to supply medicine, this disease should be easily controlled. The problem is to secure cooperation of families where individuals are identified and not to allow loss of time in school for the children unfortunate enough to be involved. Fortunately, the more serious kind of lice known as body lice have not been seen in this area. These are the vectors of different more serious diseases. These do not inhabit scalp hair and tend to infest clothing but are destroyed rapidly by any prolonged separation from a warm body and so cannot continue where clothes are laundered. Crab lice or pubic lice have been seen a little more frequently in the mobile younger generation but aside from intense itching are not dangerous and are easily eliminated, when identified, by the same sort of shampoo recommended for head lice.

I would like to bring you up to date on some new changes in the immunization field. Probably in the near future live measles, mumps and German measles vaccine will be given routinely at one year of age if parents bring their children to the physician and this combination affords a permanent immunization against these three diseases and cuts down on the number of necessary visits. Measles is by far the most serious of the children's common diseases with death or permanent brain damage in about three cases in a thousand. There is an upswing in measles across the country this year because in many areas people have not followed through with measles immunization of young children since there has been

less play in the newspapers. It is strongly recomended that all children have this immunization and probably all three together before they are adults, but it can be done at any age and certainly people going off to college who have never had measles should have a measles immunization. Within the next few months, the U.S. Public Health Service will come to grips with whether or not to completely abandon the smallpox vaccination program which has been required for years on entrance to school. It has been found that the risk of smallpox in the civilized world has diminished to such an extent that the only people now who will be required to have smallpox vaccination will be those going into known endemic areas as in some parts of Africa and Asia. While serious reactions to vaccinations are infrequent, some of them have been fatal and this is the reason for discontinuation of the program. Further, there now is a treatment for smallpox if a case arises so the need for vaccination is not as serious as it was in the past. We must not let up in our vigil against polio and all children should have the oral polio series. People who have had injected polio vaccine known as Salk vaccine are no longer protected and should have oral polio to complete their program. Children should still have protective diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus immunizations during early years and it is recommended now that adults have booster diphtheria-tetanus toxoid immunization every 10 years, with a booster tetanus toxoid immunization any time there is a deep puncture wound if such immunization had not been given within a year.

Weekly reports were sent to the New Hampshire State Department of Resources and Economic Development listing visitors from 33 states, four Canadian provinces and one foreign country.


The number of cars amounted to 1,064, an increase of 12%, with 2,702 people, an increase of 14% in comparison to 1970.

Many people admired the ivy and flowers in the window boxes. They were a gift from the New London Garden Club and brought from the nursery by Mr. Frank Butler.



REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board has once again experienced a busy year. The Board met twice a month and held several special meetings to handle all requests. I would like to thank all the members of the Board for devoting so much of their time, especially Howard Moody, our Secretary, to making this a successful year.

During the year public hearings were held on seventeen proposed property subdivisions. Fifteen subdivisions were approved, one of them being a Planned Unit development, and two were denied. One denial was based on the impropriety of adding together two non-contiguous parcels to meet the zoning lot size requirement; the other was ruled a 'Premature Development' by the Selectmen, in that it would require town services to go out of town to reach the area. A number of site plan reviews were processed, as well as numerous matters relating to zoning, some of which were referred to the Zoning Board for a formal decision. A number of annexations of property were also processed.

This year the Board has started to up-date, correct, and make additions to the Zoning Ordinance. You, as a voter, will be asked to act upon several amendments at the Town Meeting, hopefully in the affirmative. Next year the Board hopes to present some major changes which we are looking into. It is only by meeting the needs of our times that we can grow and develop in an orderly fashion.

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

The Zoning Board held open hearings on the following appeals:

- May 5, 1971 Arnold and Marion Stetson requested a special exception to Article 12, Section D, of the Zoning Ordinance. They wished to use their garage for an antique and second-hand shop. This land is in the agricultural zone. The appeal was granted.
- June 9, 1971 Norris Weig requested a variance to Article 4, Section A. He wanted to add a garage to his house. The addition would have been two feet from a right of way. The request was denied.
- June 9, 1971 Henry Holcomb, Rocky Point, Elkins, was granted a special exception to Article 4, Section A. He was allowed to relocate his tackle shop by constructing a small building to be used solely for tackle and storage of his outboard motors.
- June 9, 1971 Camp KearSarge was granted a special exception to enlarge their crafts building.
- June 9, 1971 Daniel Connell was denied a special exception to Article 4, Section A. His land is in the residential area. He did not have the required land area for more apartments in his building.
- June 23, 1971 Colby Junior College was denied a variance to Article 4, Section A. They wished to use land at the corner of Burpee Lane and Main Street for a parking lot.
- June 23, 1971 Camp Sunapee was granted a variance to Article 4, Section A. They wished to enlarge the dining room and build a new bathhouse. The sewerage provisions must be approved by the Planning Board and the N. H. Water Pollution Board.

July 28, 1971 — Thomas Hanson, Tracy Farm, was granted a special exception. He wanted to remodel a building on his property to become a dwelling The lot size fulfilled the requirements in the agricultural zone.

July 28, 1971 — O. H Lewis, Inc., owners of the Texaco Station, Main Street, were denied a special exception to Article 12, Section G. They wished to expand their filling station by constructing a section to be used as a repair garage.

August 25, 1971 — Arthur Little, Kearsarge Telephone Co., requested a variance to Article 4, Section A. They wished to use a section of land behind their building for a parking lot. Part of the land is residential, the majority is in the commercial zone. The appeal was granted.

August 25, 1971 — Norris Weig requested a variance to Article 4, Section A. He had changed the dimensions of the garage from those of his previous appeal, but the distance was not great enough and the request was denied.

September 14, 1971 — Marshall Garside, Knights Hill Rd., in the residential and agricultural zones, requested and was granted permission to build a storage barn.

September 28, 1971 — A request from Camp Wallula for a special exception to Article 12, Section 3, was denied. They wished to build a cottage in an acre that appeared to the Board to be a part of a subdivision. They were refered to the Planning Board.

September 28, 1971 — Lynne N. Powell requested a special exception to Article 12, Section B. She wished to build an apartment house with 14 dwelling units, on land off Everett Park Extension. This request was denied, because the Board felt it would be out of harmony with and detrimental to the surrounding area.

November 4, 1971 — Ralph Spofford requested a variance to Article 4, Section C. He wanted to build a house closer to the front lot line than the ordinance allows. The request was granted provided that no portion of the dwelling be any closer to the front lot than the foundation of the abutter with the greatest setback, and that the garage be no closer than 25 feet to the front lot line. This land, in the residential zone, is on Main Street.

November 4, 1971 — Ann Brown requested a variance to Article 5, Section C. She wished to build a garage closer to her front lot line than the Ordinance allows. After discussion of the problem, Mrs. Brown withdrew her request.

December 29, 1971 — Henry Pogue, Jr., and Weeks-Concord, Inc., requested a special exception to Article 12, Section C. There was a protest because the date was changed from December 28th to December 29th without proper notification, so the hearing was invalid.

At the 1971 Town Meeting funds were appropriated for Sewer purposes as follows:

For television inspection and survey of portions of existing sewers, \$14,500.

For study and design of new and replacement sewers for the area of the town presently sewered, \$34,000.

For study and design of new sewers for the Birch Acres-Job Seaman's Acres areas, \$18,000.

For a preliminary study and report on a proposed new treatment plant located south of Elkins village, \$31,500.

Following the Town Meeting, contract documents for the engineering study and design work were developed by Anderson-Nichols & Co., Inc., and approved by the New London Sewer Commission and the New Hampshire Water Supply & Pollution Control Commission. The contracts were executed in July and the engineering design work was started immediately. Bids were requested for the television inspection and survey and the contract was awarded to the Penetrin System, Inc. The television inspection of 11,400 feet of sewers and a smoke test of all sewers in the system was completed in the late fall and the results were submitted to Anderson-Nichols & Co. for analysis.

The design of new and replacement sewers and the analysis of the television inspection have now been completed by Anderson-Nichols & Co. Their estimate of the cost of constructing new and replacement sewers and of sealing portions of the existing sewers is the basis for Articles which are in the Warrant for the 1972 Town Meeting.

The preliminary study and report on the proposed new treatment plant is expected to be completed by July, 1972.

During 1971 several improvements have been made to the treatment plant and sewers. The road to the nutrient removal plant has been made passable in wet weather and parts have been purchased to replace the mercury seal on the distributor of the trickling filter. Work has been started to rehabilitate two of the old sand filter beds for emergency use.

Victor Carl, our treatment plant operator, has completed both the basic and advanced courses in treatment plant operation. These courses were held at New England College under the auspices of the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission, the Department of Labor and the Department of Education.

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NEW LONDON WATER SYSTEM PRECINCT

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

We summarize for the reader a few of the activities of the New London Water System Precinct for the past year — 1971.

In the process of thawing out a frozen house service in February we encountered fifty-four inches of frost, somewhat of a record for recent times.

Ground was broken the 15th of April for the new Water

Department building, a forty by sixty wood frame structure consisting of office, repair workshop, parts and equipment storage. We moved into the new quarters Sept. 27, 1971.

Seventeen hundred feet of six inch replacement main was installed along the Colby Jr. College Highway below Crockett's Corner to the Sutton town line. A new two hundred thirty-seven foot extension was made from the Pressey Court main.

In addition three new six inch mains were put into service. The first of these was the Dr. William P. Clough Extended Care Center at the New London Hospital. Two six inch lines were put into operation at Hilltop Place, phase one and two respectively. Three new hydrants were added to the above extensions.

In all, forty-four new residential services were tied to the water system, twenty-four of these being at Hilltop Place, phase one.

Beaver migrations occurred once during the year in the month of August. This problem was eliminated three days later.

We anticipate the coming year to be no less active than 1971.

NEW LONDON WATER SYSTEM PRECINCT

This report by the Water Commissioners is perhaps long overdue. We are attempting to explain the situation the Water Precinct finds itself in at the beginning of the 1972 fiscal year.

Approximately 10 or 12 years ago the Precinct borrowed \$150,000.00 through a bond issue. The proper funding for the retirement of this debt was not incorporated at the time of the bond issue. Not all of the money borrowed was spent for the specific purposes it was dedicated to because it was being used to pay back principal and interest of the money owed.

There is only one major project left and that is completion of a second Reservoir with a capacity of over 2,000,000 gallons of water to ensure adequate water supply for some time to come. Some work has been done on this project but it should be completed in the near future.

The Water System produces over 56 million gallons of water at an annual average cost of \$34,000 per year, or to further break it down, it's about 60 cents per 1,000 gallons. The income produced at present rates for the sale of water alone is approximately \$24,000 and the tax on property within the Precinct adds an additional \$11,000. This is only enough to cover the annual cost of operation.

Debt retirement of \$27,000 must be funded for. Therefore the rate structure must be increased to insure proper maintenance of the system and continued service to its patrons.

Everyone is aware of the increased costs of living expenses. Pipe fittings, etc., have increased 33 1-3%. Wages have gone up by at least the same percent or more. In view of this, we propose to double the tax levied on Precinct property and

increase the water rates across the board to produce sufficient income to meet the needs of the water system. Our community continues to grow and the water system must keep pace to insure an adequate supply of water.

Our Annual Meetings are attended by only 8 to 10 voters. We would like to see many more attend the Annual Meeting in March to gain a better understanding of the Water System and help the Commissioners get a first-hand opinion of your thoughts relating to our water supply.

Hope to see you on March 21, 1972.

Sincere thanks are to be extended to the Summer Residents' Committee, Mrs. Bradley Dewey, Chairman, for their continuous hard work for the benefit of the Hospital and their gift of \$5,700 to cover:

- 1. Fracture table
- 2. Portable defibrillator to be carried in the ambulance
- 3. Replacement of surgical instruments (first time instruments have been purchased in 13 years)

and their gift of \$1,000 in memory of Evelyn Holton to be used in the Intensive Coronary Care unit when it is developed.

Once again, Hospital Day was tremendously successful under the able chairmanship of Mrs. Sydney Badmington and her co-chairman, Mr. George Morse, the Hospital Aid, town chairmen, committee members, civic organizations, fraternal orders, ladies auxiliaries and countless numbers of people who donated food, space and services. Over \$25,000 was realized for the Hospital.

On August 21, 1971, the William P. Clough Extended Care Center of the New London Hospital was dedicated. The three patient wings in the Center were named for three able doctors who with Dr. Clough, Sr., developed the Hospital fifty years ago — Dr. Nathan Leroy Griffin, Dr. Charles Allen Lamson, and Dr. Anna M. Littlefield. The thanks of the Board are again extended to the chairman, Mrs. Bradley Dewey, and her able committee. Over 500 interested people attended the ceremony.

During the year, two sizeable legacies were left to the Hospital in the wills of Stephen Phillips and Ralph A. Wyman.

The principal from the legacy of Mr. Phillips was restricted and the income to be used for general purposes. One-third of the legacy from Mr. Wyman was to be used for the waiting room in the Extended Care Center, \$10,000 to landscape the Ralph A. The New London Hospital Aid Association has had a successful year due to the help and cooperation of its members. From October 7, 1970, to June 2, 1971, nine meetings were held of which eight took place at the First Baptist Church in New London and the June meeting was the Annual Luncheon at the Lake Sunapee Country Club.

- Art. 1. A. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
 - B. Ballot on N. L. Zoning Amendments.
- Note By law, the meeting must open before voting starts. Therefore, the Meeting and Polls will open at 12:00 noon for the consideration of Article #1, Parts A and B. At 12:30 P.M. the meeting will recess but the polls will remain open and close at 8:00 P.M. The Town Meeting will reconvene at 10:00 A.M. on Saturday, March 11th at the Kearsarge Middle School Auditorium in New London.

Article #2 will be the first article of the Saturday meeting.

Art. 2. To see if the Town will vote by ballot with the use of the checklist to adopt the following resolution or take any other action relating thereto:

Resolved: that the sum of Six Hundred Ninety Thousand Dollars (\$690,000.00) is appropriated for the replacement, reconstruction and resealing of existing sewers where needed and the construction of a new interceptor sewer leading to the treatment plant, including necessary related facilities and acquisition of such land, easements and rights of way as may be required; that to raise this

appropriation the Selectmen are authorized to borrow said sum under the Municipal Finance Act; that, in addition, the Selectmen are authorized to apply for, contract for, accept and expend any state, federal or other available funds toward the project according to the terms under which they are received; that any interest received may likewise be applied to the project; and that the Selectmen are authorized to take all action necessary to carry out the project; provided, however, that the Selectmen shall not proceed with the issuance of bonds under the Municipal Finance Act until they receive reasonable assurance that federal and/or state aid in an aggregate amount sufficient to fund not less than 45% of the cost of the project is available, and their decision as to the sufficiency of such assurance shall be final and binding on the Town.

Art. 3. To see if the Town will vote by ballot with the use of the checklist to adopt the following resolution or take any other action relating thereto:

Resolved: that the sum of Four Hundred Forty Thousand Dollars (\$440,000.00) is appropriated for the construction of new sewers, pumping stations and force mains in the Birch Acres-Seaman's Acres area of New London and including necessary related facilities and acquisition of such land, easements and rights of way as may be required; that to raise this appropriation, the Selectmen are authorized to borrow said sum under the Municipal Finance Act; in addition, the Selectmen are authorized to apply for, contract for, accept and expend any state, federal or other available funds toward the project according to the terms under which they are received; that any interest received may likewise be applied to the project: and that the Selectmen are authorized to take all action necessary to carry out the project; provided, however, that the Selectmen shall not proceed with the issuance of bonds under the Municipal Finance Act until they receive reasonable assurance that federal and/or state aid in an aggregate amount sufficient to fund not less than 45% of the cost of the project is

available, and their decision as to the sufficiency of such assurance shall be final and binding on the Town.


