NH SENATE RACE – DEAD HEAT

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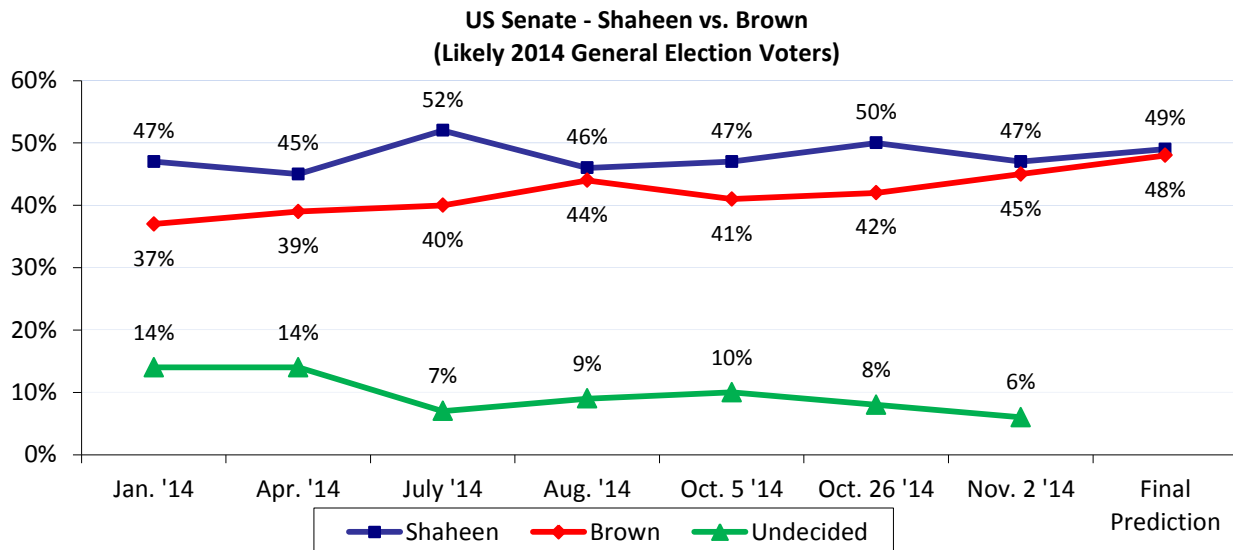
DURHAM, NH – The race between incumbent Senator Jeanne Shaheen and Republican challenger Scott Brown for U.S. Senate from New Hampshire is too close to call.

These findings are based on the latest **WMUR Granite State Poll**,* conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Seven hundred fifty-seven (757) randomly selected New Hampshire likely voters were interviewed by landline and cellular telephone between October 29 and November 2, 2014. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 3.6 percent.

2014 Senate Election

If the election were held today, 46% of likely voters say they would vote for Shaheen, 43% would vote for Brown, 2% say they will vote for some other candidate and 10% are undecided. When undecided voters are asked which candidate they lean toward, the race becomes even closer – 47% say they will vote for Shaheen, 45% for Brown, 3% for some other candidate, and 6% remain undecided. When undecided voters are allocated to the candidate they are most likely to support, the final UNH prediction for the NH Senate race is 49% for Shaheen and 48% for Brown.

Almost all likely voters (90%) are firm in their choice while 10% say they could change their minds. Among voters who are firm in their choice, 53% say they will vote for Shaheen and 46% say they will vote for Brown. Among voters who say they might change their minds, 56% say they plan to vote for Brown and 30% say they will vote for Shaheen.

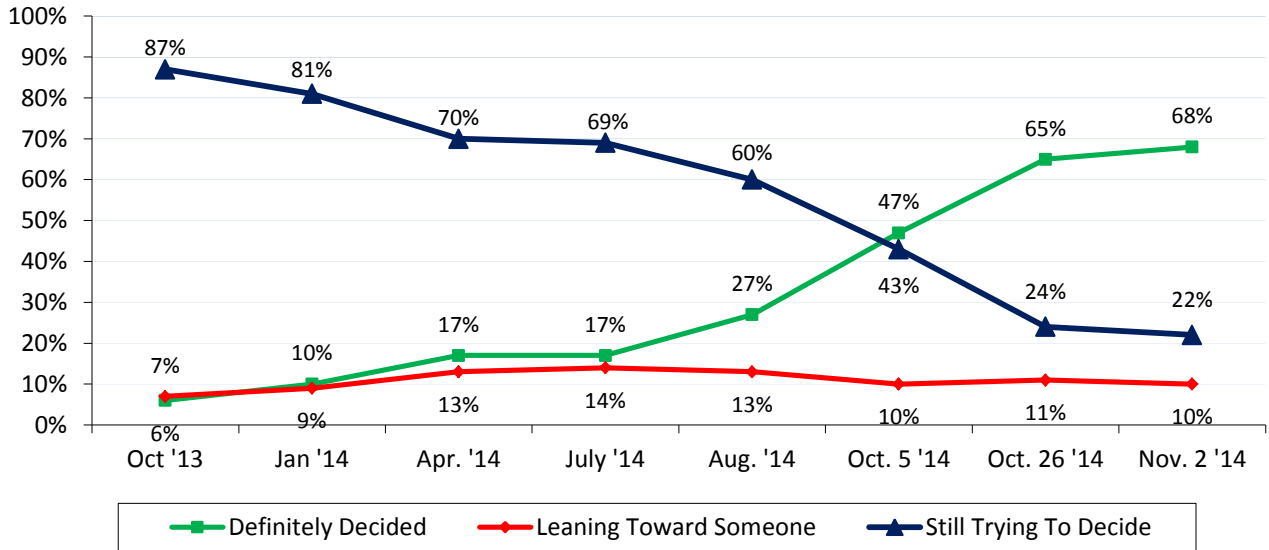

2014 U.S. Senate Election

Most New Hampshire likely voters (68%) now say they have definitely decided who they will vote for in the U.S. Senate election, 10% are leaning towards someone and 22% are still trying to decide. There is still room for movement in the last days of the campaign as the race is neck and neck.

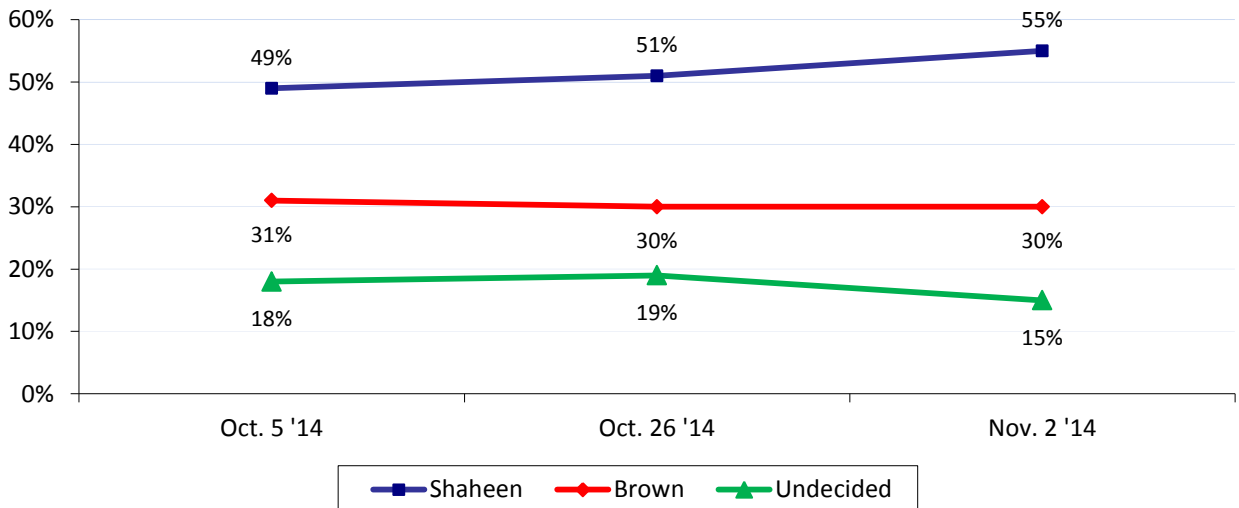
NH 2014 Senate Election-- Decided On Vote



Who Will Win 2014 Senate Election?

When asked which candidate they think will win the 2014 U.S. Senate election, 55% of likely voters think Shaheen will be re-elected, only 30% think Brown will win, and 15% are unsure. This measure of election races has been shown to be a more accurate predictor of the winner, but not the margin of victory.

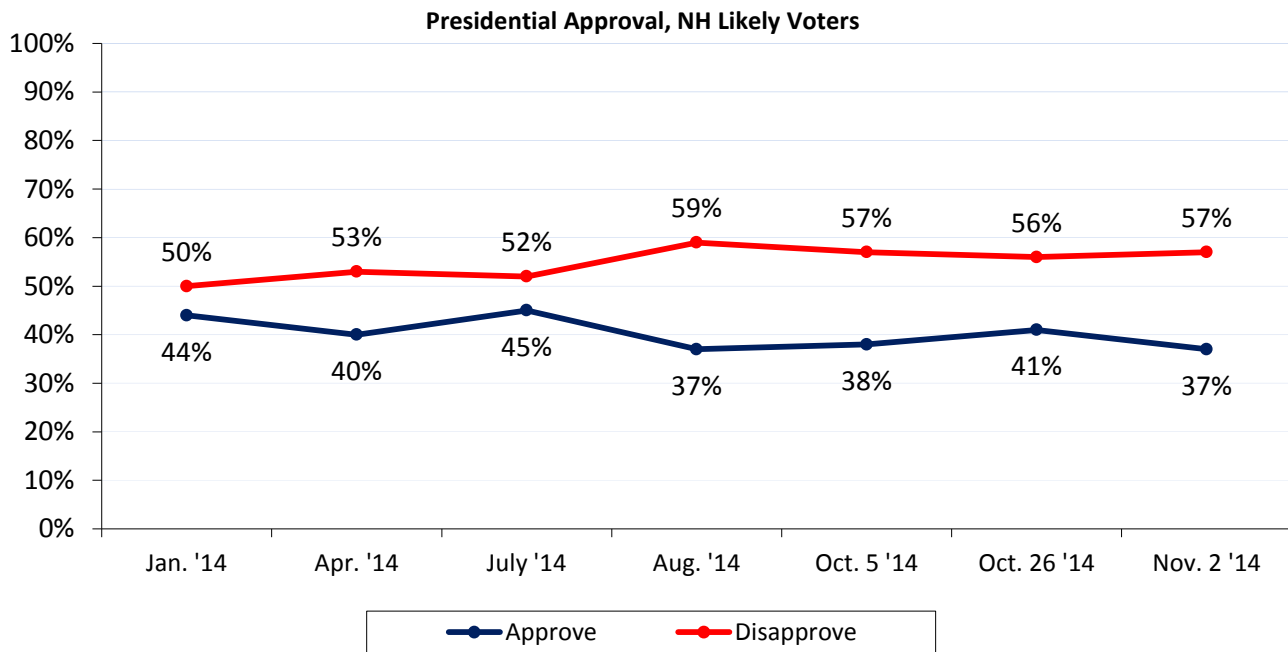
US Senate - Who Will Win?



Presidential Approval

President Barack Obama's low approval ratings in the state continue to be a drag on Democratic incumbents. Currently only 37% of New Hampshire likely voters approve of the job the President is doing and 57% disapprove.

Voters who approve of Obama's performance as President say they will vote for Shaheen over Brown by a 90% to 6% margin but those voters who disapprove of Obama favor Brown by 71% to 14%.



Granite State Poll Methodology

These findings are based on the latest WMUR Granite State Poll, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Seven hundred fifty-seven (757) randomly selected New Hampshire likely voters were interviewed by landline and cellular telephone between October 29 and November 2, 2014. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 3.6 percent.

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of adults and telephone lines within households, respondent sex, age, and region of the state. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response. Due to rounding, percentages may sum to just above or below 100%. Respondent numbers in each demographic may not equal the total respondent number due to respondents choosing not to answer some demographic questions.
