





#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

#### To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bennington in the County of Hillsboro in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the EIGHTH day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To chose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To bring in your votes for the election of Delegates-at-large, Alternate Delegates-at-large, District Delegates, Alternate District Delegates to the National Conventions of the Democrat and Republican parties, to be held for purpose of nominating party candidates for President and Vice President of the United States.

3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for highway and bridges.

5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for lighting the streets with electricity.

6. To see what action the Town will take with regard to State Aid construction, State Aid maintenance and Trunk Line maintenance.

7. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the Town hearse and snow roller.

8. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to make ordinances and by-laws for managing and ordering the prudential affairs of the Town.

9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums as may be necessary in anticipation of Taxes.

10. To see if the Town will observe Old Home Day and appropriate money therefor or take any action thereon.

11. To see if the Town will approve a Town ordinance relating to observance of the Lord's Day.

Section 1. It shall be lawful on the Lord's Day, after one o'clock in the afternoon, to conduct, participate in or attend the games of baseball, football, hockey, golf, tennis, track athletics, or other games or sports, whether or not admission fees are charged thereto; and, after six o'clock in the afternoon, to conduct, participate in or attend concerts, lectures, theatrical vaudeville or motion picture performances, whether or not admission fees are charged thereto.

Section 2. This Ordinance shall take effect upon its approval.

12. To hear reports of committees, and act thereon.

13. To see how much money the Town will raise for statutory requirements and to carry the above Articles and the Appropriations of the School Meeting into effect.

14. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.



# **REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS**

To the Bennington School Board:

The five year survey has placed in your hands such information, in detail, as is customarily made use of by Boards of Education for determining policies and measuring results.

There has been a change in the position of Bennington in point of expenditure for equalized valuation which has elevated it from the 27th to the 52nd school district. Costs of administration, including all supervisory costs, have decreased from 8.03% in 1920 to 6.65% in 1931 or 1.38%. Of this decrease, 1.31% is due to supervisory lessened percentages, from 5.59% to 4.28%. The figures include the per capita tax.

Payment of tuitions in high schools has again reached nearly to the average level of the years 1922 through 1927. Only part of this increase can be explained by increased per pupil tuition costs. The presence of a two year high school in the town has apparently acted as a stimulus for high school attendance, and the number of tuition pupils in the third and fourth years of high schools is only one less than the total in a four year attendance in 1920.

The Board has been most liberal with the requests of the teachers for books during the past two years, increasing the expenditure from \$110.35 in 1929 to \$463.55 in 1930, and \$353.05 in 1931. Supplies have increased in

total expenditure from \$73.58 in 1928 to \$168.00 in 1931. Again, the Board has shown marked liberality in treating teacher requests.

The superior building now housing the pupils has been treated with respect by the occupants, and superior janitor service is maintained. The playground adds health and zest to the school day as well as functioning as a safe and unusual play area at all times.

Bennington has frequently been referred to by competent authorities as maintaining a high grade city system in a small town. If the Board, after study of the survey, and observation of its schools, agrees with this comment, it can express appreciation to its teaching staff. The records of such teachers as have accepted offers from well known cities and towns, paying high salaries, is assurance that the Bennington system proves a valuable training ground. The faithful teachers, who for so long have worked in Bennington must not be forgotten. The foundation which has been laid in the lower grades is excellent.

It is conspicuous that the entire staff, for the last five years, not only eagerly took hold of an entirely new, but essential, diagnosis, remedial and measurement plan; but also continually strives to keep the plan efficiently alive.

The staff deserves, and has received, excellent support from the Board and the School District. In behalf of the teachers, supervision extends its thanks.

### Interpretation

In the year 1922-23, Bennington expended for elementary schools \$4.07 against \$.96 for high school and \$.39 for all other expenditures, making a total of \$5.42; out of each \$1,000.00 of equalized valuation.

That year there were 252 school districts and Bennington was 27th from the bottom of the list of school districts, arranged in ascending order of current costs per \$1,000.00 of equalized valuation. Bennington was therefore .107 up the scale, or approximately 89% of the school districts of the state exceeded it in expenditure in accordance with local wealth.

The introduction of the local high school increased the cost only slightly and in 1929-1930 Bennington was 40th from the bottom of the list of 244 school districts and its costs were exceeded by approximately 84% of the school districts of the state in ratio of expenditure to local equalized valuation.

Teacher requests, for a larger basal working list and supplementary material, were granted in 1930-1931.
