## **Town Warrant**

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Charlestown, in the County of Sullivan, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 10th day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ART. 1. To choose all necessary officers for the ensuing year.

ART. 2. To raise such sums of money as may be deemed necessary for the support of schools, for the maintenance of the poor, for laying out and repairing highways, building and repairing bridges, and for necessary charges arising within the town.

ART. 3. To see if the Town will vote to make a five per cent, discount on all taxes paid on or before July 15th, 1908.

ART. 4. To see if the Town will vote the use of the Town Hall to the different societies in said Town for expenses.

ART. 5. To see if the Town will vote to let the Selectmen deliver the inventory blanks at the time of taking the inventory.

ART. 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money necessary to secure State aid for the permanent improvement of highways, under the law passed at the January session, 1905.

ART. 7. To see if the Town will vote to adopt "An act in relation to Political Caucus and Convention" as passed by the legislature of 1905.

ART. 8. To see what action the Town will take in regard to disposing of or repairing the Stone Mill.

ART. 9. To see if the Town will vote to install electric lights in the Town Hall and appropriate money for same.

ART, 10. To see if the town will vote to purchase surety bonds for the officers who are required to give bonds.

ART. 11. To see if the Town will vote to license a junk dealer.

ART. 12. To see if the Town will vote to accept \$100 each in trust from Miss Jane Labaree and Mrs. Emily O. Bradbury for care of lots in Forest Hill Cemetery.

ART. 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of the Fire Company.

ART. 14. To see what action the Town will take in regard to a reappraisal of the real estate in said town.

ART. 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

By agreement between Town Officers the business of the day will be taken up at eleven o'clock A. M., and the polls will be closed at three o'clock P. M., if no objection is made.

#### Report of the Board of Health

BOARD OF HEALTH

Wesley E. Hunt, Oscar C. Young, M. D., Sec., Horace M. Stearns.

The acquiring of the water system has been an innovation to the Secretary of this Board.

In seasons past complaints were numerous regarding the condition of old wells—and of course they required inspection, but unless absolutely unsanitary nothing could be done. Now it is all changed. When the old well got to giving vent to too much odor, the owner said he would connect with the public system and be relieved of all future annoyance, so far as the water supply was concerned.

It is the exception now to find a pump doing duty.

The abundance of water has washed out many impurities for soil and sunlight to disinfect.

#### CONTAGIOUS DISEASE

There have been only a few cases of communicable disease during the past year.

Whooping cough was manifest in a few families before the beginning of the school year in September, but by the co-operation of parents it was prevented from gaining a single victim in the schools. Two deaths, largely from neglect, were the result of this disease.

#### VACCINATION

A large number of school children were vaccinated just before the close of the summer term, all with good

results. It will be necessary to vaccinate again next summer all those children who have entered this year and who have not been successfully vaccinated.

It may be necessary to make some arrangement whereby the brook now feeding the upper reservoir shall be kept free from the entrance of horses where it runs through the Corliss pasture, so called, just above the residence of Bert Cross. This could be done by fencing off a small area of this pasture and providing the owner with troughs to be supplied from this same brook. However, this may not become necessary.

#### TUBERCULOSIS

Much is being done to enlighten people regarding this great White Plague, to impress upon the minds of those who have this disease of the lungs that to spit about anywhere, so that the sputum may dry and be blown about and then the germs inhaled by some other person, is almost as criminal through thoughtlessness as the person who by design secretes an infernal machine to destroy a human life.

The open air treatment, with large quantities of highly nutritious food, saves large numbers of these unfortunate cases.

Did you ever think that our central government at Washington has expended during the last ten years over forty-six millions of dollars in the interests of agriculture, but no wheel has been set in motion to make an appropriation for the alleviation or cure of this disease, or for diseases of the heart and kidneys?

"Health and the protection of life are more precious

to the people, and more necessary to their happiness than even the extension of our commerce, the fostering of our agricultural interests, the solving of our financial problems, the cheapness or efficiency of our postal service, the improvement of our rivers and harbors, or the enlargement of our navy."—From a resolution adopted by the Board of Trade of the City of New York.

## Report of School Board

The general condition of the schools is highly satisfactory. This is chiefly due to the efforts of the teachers in carrying forward the work as planned by the superintendent. The one great drawback to progress is found in the homes of a few pupils. Some parents in this town display a lack of interest in the education of their children that is little short of criminal; it kills the prospects in life of their own children and its evil effect extends to all in the school. The School Board has found it necessary the past year to discipline some of these refractory parents in the ways provided by the state school laws, and a beneficial effect has been noted.

The school houses throughout the town have been well cared for. The village school house should receive some attention soon. It is now eleven years since the interior has been dressed over, and a reasonable expenditure in this direction would seem desirable. At South Charlestown the sanitary condition continues deplorably bad. Reference was made to this in last year's report. Some way should be found of improving this as soon as possible.

The transportation of children to central schools from scattered districts is a constant problem, but good results are being obtained. If the idea could penetrate the public mind that this transportation is an innovation to secure efficiency and economy, and not to afford opportunities for small graft, the problem would work out more easily.

The school board is sensible of the excellent support the town gives its schools. Charlestown ranks as one of the banner towns of the state in regard to the effort made for schools. We believe that the schools, as now organized and conducted, amply repay this effort. Personal investigation by visits to schools is invited. Let your strongest interest centre in your schools—the training place of your successors, who will inevitably be what you permit them to become.

## Report of Superintendent

The School Committee of the School District of the Town of Charlestown,

Gentlemen:

In accordance with the rules and regulations made by you I herewith present to you my third annual report, the fourth since your superintendency district was formed.

My report need not be a long one this year, as there is nothing new to be explained or anything old that specially needs to be set aside. I am able to report a good year on the whole and surely a year of progress. The schools are bound to make progress when its corps of teachers, like those of our town, are constantly on the alert to improve themselves and the work they do for their children. Get good teachers and pay them well enough to keep them, is a sure way of improving the schools.

## TEACHERS

Although five of our nine schools have different teachers yet only two are new to the district—Miss Lester and Miss Thrasher. Miss Heath and Miss Putnam were moved in order to give them deserved promotions as well as to serve the best interests of the schools. Had it been possible some form of substantial appreciation would have been shown to other teachers of the town, who as a body

deserve high commendation for industry, ability and faithfulness.

The average attendance of the schools of the district for the year 1906-7 was 93 per cent., a gain of 2 per cent. over last year, which is a very substantial gain and a comparatively high standing. That of the state for the same year was 90 per cent., which is considered very good. The credit for the gain in Charlestown and for the generally high standing is due entirely to the efforts of the teachers. It should be borne in mind that the great majority of absences is not owing to sickness or unavoidable causes. but rather to a habit of absenteeism. A habit so strong in some families that no teacher, however vigilant and persuasive, can overcome, and nothing else except the judicious application of the remedies provided by law. Much might be said on this very important subject but as I reported to some length last year I will not occupy more space now.

The work of singing and drawing has been carried on with interest and efficiency. The report of the supervis-

ors of these subjects follow this, to which you are respectfully referred.

It is no perfunctory duty that I perform, but one of pleasure rather, to recognize the cordial cooperation of the teachers, the help and support of the School Board and the good will accorded me by the people of the town.

## Report of Instructor in Music

To the Superintendent:

In our schools an endeavor has been made to bring the greatest number of children possible into sympathy with, and teach to enjoy the best in, music.

We do not attempt to produce great musicians any more than the study of literature attempts to produce great writers or the study of poetry to produce poets.

We do attempt to teach the children enough of the language of music for them to understand and appreciate it.

To do this they should be able in first grades to recognize different pitches, should be drilled in using voice, (little vocal exercises) and become able in upper grades to sing all ordinary intervals and understand enough of the signs and technical terms to read and execute ordinary music at sight, or, if more difficult music, in a few readings.

At the beginning of the year; in the average first grade about fifty per cent are unable to produce a pitch you might give them, and are termed monotones, always singing one tone. In our schools in the first three grades, there is less than five per cent who cannot sing four tones.

With each of these we work, devoting perhaps one minute each day, and in most cases we succeed in awakening the pupil's musical instinct by the end of the first year so that he can enter into the general work of the class.

Much of the drill work must necessarily be left to the teacher, and corresponding amount of credit is due her for any success our subject may achieve. We wish to say, without the co-operation of the teacher anything like success is impossible; with her assistance and sustained effort much is possible.

And we feel confident, as our grades move up to the high school, it will be only a question of time before nearly every pupil will take part in the music because he enjoys it.

## Report of the Instructor in Drawing

A second complete school year of drawing finds us getting up to grade in our work throughout the entire district and making up for lost time—those years when our pencils and brushes were not specially trained and before we had a definite art course as a part of our regular school work.

The youngest children are being encouraged in free expression of their crude ideas, guided in the use of pencil, crayon and brush as a means of expression, and, finally, in the upper grade work, producing excellent results which show development of our three great aims—training our powers of observation, of expression and taste.

We are learning to express thoughts pictorially, as it is in words, through selection, arrangement and emphasis. Much has been accomplished this year with the paints, which were furnished in all the grades and which have aroused more enthusiasm than ever over drawing. The use of color is always a delight to children, and to upper grade pupils a means of fuller expression of their ideas. There is much hard work ahead of us, however, in training our color sense and appreciating to the fullest our best color teacher—Nature.

Much credit is due all regular teachers, to whom I wish to express my thanks for co-operation and faithful execution of all work planned.
