THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L. s.]

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Deerfield in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Deerfield on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid Maintenance and raise and appropriate \$1,750 for the same.

4. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for town construction of highways and raise and appropriate money for the same.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars for the control of white pine blister rust.

6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

7. To see if the Town will vote to further contest the suit of the Town against Edith A. Harvey, and if so, raise and appropriate money for the same.

8. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Cemetery Trust Fund presented by E. B. Merrill.

9. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the highway leading from the Deerfield-Epsom road to the old Coning's place so-called.

10. To see if the Town will vote to install a chemical toilet at the Town Hall and raise and appropriate money for the same.

11. To see if the Town will vote to give a discount on taxes paid before certain dates and fix said dates and discounts if so voted.

12. To see if the Town will vote to take any action regarding the price paid for labor on town work.

13. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

14. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Deerfield:

In this his third annual report the Superintendent wishes to consider organization, cost of high school instruction, health supervision, and other activities.

ORGANIZATION

The four one-room schools maintained last year are being continued this year.

The combination another year of the West school, now enrolling nine pupils, with that of the Center is worthy of consideration to effect some economy. However, transportation from the West part of the town during the winter term seems impracticable. A partial solution of the problem might be the combination of the two schools during the fall and spring terms, and the opening of the West school in charge of a cadet teacher during the winter term. Considering the increased cost of transportation, it is estimated that approximately two hundred and fifty dollars might be saved by such a combination.

After two years of successful service in your Parade school Mrs. Beatrice S. Clark resigned in June to accept a similar school in her home town. Miss Lydia F. Bellows, who was last year a substitute teacher in the Deerfield schools, was elected to fill the vacancy.

COST OF HIGH SCHOOL TUITIONS

The average high school tuition cost per pupil in the state has decreased from \$106.98 in 1929 to \$98.93 in 1931. At the same time the number of graduates of your Eighth Grade who are attending a public high school or academy has con-

stantly increased. This year Deerfield has twenty-nine pupils enrolled in five such high schools or academies. While seven of this number are expected to graduate next June, their places will undoubtedly be more than filled by the eleven members of the present Eighth Grade in the Deerfield schools.

Some economy might be effected if the school board were authorized by the district to contract with one or more high schools and academies for tuition at a reduced cost determined by the number of Deerfield pupils in attendance.

HEALTH SUPERVISION

The dental clinic, conducted last June and supported by your community organizations in cooperation with the entertainment given by the schools, afforded dental treatment to forty-two school children. In numerous cases the cost of individual treatment was paid by the parents.

This year the timely and thorough inspections made by your School Nurse during the appearance of scarlet fever were appreciated by parents and teachers.

Through the extension of her services in other school districts there has been a reduction of twenty-five dollars in the share of the Nurse's salary paid by Deerfield.

OTHER ACTIVITIES

While last year the gain in percent of attendance for the town was slight, the gain in percent of promotions was excellent. The valued interest of citizens and others is reflected by an increase of over 50 percent in the number of school visits.

In line with the program of the Sons of the American Revolution and similar organizations these ten citizenship habits—cleanliness, cooperation, courtesy, dependableness, honesty, obedience, politeness, promptness, quietness, truthfulness—are coming to be considered of equal or even greater importance than scholastic marks in the rating of elementary school pupils. Whenever report cards indicate a citizenship habit satisfactory or a failure in scholastic work parents are urged to confer with the teacher and thus cooperate in securing improvement. It is to every child's advantage that the school and home have a mutual understanding of his needs.

IN CONCLUSION

I wish to commend the services rendered by your staff of teachers. For in the final analysis wisdom, tact and patience in those who lead are most essential. I have observed these as I have gone in and out among your schools.
