TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenville in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Community Hall in said Greenville on Tuesday, the 8th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Bring in Your Ballots for:

Town Clerk for one year, one Selectman for three years, Town Treasurer for one year, Tax Collector for one year, Highway Agent for one year, one Water Commissioner for three years, one Water Commissioner for two years, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, one Library Trustee for three years, two Auditors for one year and three Firewards for one year.

And at eight of the clock in the afternoon of Wednesday, March 9th at the Town Hall Auditorium to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1

To choose all necessary officers not chosen by Australian ballot.

Article 2

To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.

Article 3

To hear reports of agents, auditors, committees and officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 4

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, or take any action thereon.

Article 5

To see if the Town will vote to have a Town Budget Committee appointed by the Moderator or take any action thereon.

Article 6

To see if the Town will authorize the installation of a street light between the residences of Leon Caron and Raymond Rice and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$42.00 for same. (By Petition)

Article 7

To see if the Town will vote to change the wording of the vote taken on March 9th, 1954 under Article 6, to read: "for improvement of Highways, Sidewalks and Bridges in the Town of Greenville."

Article 8

To see if the Town will vote to paint the Iron Bridge on the Wilton Road and transfer a sum of money not to exceed \$2000.00 from the Post War construction fund so called, to pay for same.

Article 9

To see if the Town will vote to create a Planning Board, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 36, New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, as amended, said Planning Board to consist of Seven or Five members (the option of this meeting), to be appointed by the Selectmen, or take any action relating thereto. (By Petition)

Article 10

To authorize the Selectmen to appoint a committee of Five to designate names of all Town Streets and Roads within the Town of Greenville and to submit the same to 1967 Town Meeting for approval or take any other action thereon. (By Petition)

Article 11

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 to purchase a relay pump for the use of the Fire Department or take any action thereon.

Article 12

To see if the Town will vote to change the term of the Firewards from one year to three years to become effective at the Annual Town Election in March 1967. At which time the first Fireward will be elected to a term of three years, the second Fireward to a term of two years and the third Fireward to a term of one year.

We have met during the months of December, January, and February with the Town departments, have discussed their budgets for 1966. The amounts that are printed in the 1966 Budget expenditures for the year have been recommended and approved by the committee.

The Water Department presented an estimated budget for 1966, which is \$28,000.00. No increase in the water rates is foreseen for the coming year, as revenue will be sufficient to take care of the estimated budget for 1966. This was recommended and approved by the Budget Committee. Under the circumstances at the present the Budget Committee felt that the present water board had done a very good job and had a good report for 1965.

The School District Budget was presented and the estimated Budget printed in the School District report for 1966-1967 was recommended and approved by the committee.

The committee members express their thanks for the cooperation and the consideration given them by all the Town department heads.

SYNOPSIS OF 1965 ANNUAL TOWN MEETING March 9, 1965

Number of Ballots Cast - 410

The meeting was called to order at 10:00 A. M. by the moderator, Charles E. Sawyer, and after the reading of the Warrant through the election notice, the polls were opened for voting by Australian ballot. At 3:20 P. M. it was voted to close the polls at 6:00 P. M. At 5:45 P. M. it was voted to recess the meeting to March 10, 1965, at 8:00 P. M. to take up the articles in the Warrant.

On March 10, 1965, the meeting was called to order at 8:00 P. M. by the moderator, Charles E. Sawyer, and after the reading of the Warrant, the articles were disposed of as follows:

Article 1: For Town Officers chosen, see page 3 of this report.

Article 2: See Selectmen's report for appropriations made.

Article 3: Voted to accept reports as printed in the Town Report.

Article 4: Voted to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 5: Voted not to have a certified accounting firm audit the town books.

Article 6: Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$252.42 for the Monadnock Region Association.

Article 7: Voted to have the moderator appoint a sevenmember Town Budget Committee.

Article 8: Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 to install two toilets in separate cells in the town jail.

Article 9: Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$42.00 to install a street light on Temple Road between the residences of Yvon Leger and Armand Morneau.

Article 10: Voted to authorize the Selectmen and the three Fire Wards to advertise for bids to paint the exterior of the Fire House and to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$750.00 for this purpose.

Article 11: Voted to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a contract with Mutual of Omaha for insurance for volunteer firemen and to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$300.00 for the purpose.

Article 12: Voted to authorize the Selectmen and the three Fire Wards to purchase a front end pump for the forestry tanker and to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$750.00 for the purpose.

Article 13: Voted to authorize the Selectmen and the three Fire Wards to purchase a portable generator and to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$390.00 for the purpose.

Article 14: Regarding acceptance by the Town of a tract of land between Mill Street and the Mill Yard Fence, it was voted to pass over the article.

Article 15: Regarding appropriation of a sum not to exceed \$3,000.00 to build a salt and tool shed for the Highway Department, it was voted to pass over the article.

Article 16: Regarding the water supply and distribution system, it was voted to recess the meeting until May 26, 1965, at 8:00 P. M. and to act on the article at that time.

Voted to recess at 10:25 P. M.

Mr. J. Willard Buttrick, Jr., presented a "suggested vote" (regarding the town entering into a contract with the New Hampshire Water Resources Board) on Article 16 which had been prepared by a legal firm. This "suggested vote" was read in its entirety. After discussion, this "suggested vote" was voted on by ballot. Total ballots cast — 116. Result: Yes 64. No 52.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

Most of us who live in New Hampshire and the thousands of vacationists that visit us every year love the State for the variegated woodlands that encircle our clean lakes and clothe the hills and mountains. Most of us appreciate these values, but still there were enough careless people among us to cause over 880 grass and woodland fires to start in 1965. True this was a much drier than normal year, but this should have meant the use of extra care. Fortunately the fire fighting forces have held the line against such careless acts. It is up to each one of us to be ever mindful that a spark or flame is a potential fire.

We must all be careful:

1. To teach our children the danger in lighting matches.

2. To never discard lighted smoking material from a car or while walking through fields or woods.

3. To safely dispose of rubbish, preferably at the town dump. If you must burn rubbish or brush:

- a. Always get a permit to burn from the warden.
- b. Start your fire late in the day after 5:00 p.m.
- c. If burning a field or brush have equipment and adequate help on hand. The heat from your fire creates its own draft to spread the fire.

Our carelessness with fire is costing our State and Towns thousands of wasted dollars in suppression and hundreds of acres of destroyed woodlands. Yours never to enjoy.

REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN

To the Trustees of the Chamberlin Free Public Library For the Year Ending December 31, 1965

This has been a most rewarding year for the Greenville Public Library. The decision of the trustees to join the State Wide Library development program has brought us many advantages. First, in order to meet the standard required for minimum hours open, the Library hours are now Tuesday and Friday afternoons 1:30 to 5:00 and Monday and Wednesday evenings 7:00 to 9:30. All libraries joining the program were given \$125.00 worth of Reference books and our reference collection was made much more useful by this gift. Perhaps the biggest advantages are the co-operative book purchasing, which gives us a much better discount, and thus enables us to purchase more books and the co-operative cataloging, which permits a faster processing of the books for circulation.

Number of books purchased and the circulation shows a marked increase over the previous year. 11,627 patrons have visited the Library, 10,067 young people and 1,560 adults, 2,750 more than last year. Books and magazines circulated, 13,787, a gain of 2,585 volumes. 330 new adult and 211 new young people's books have brought our total of library volumes to 8,888.

Many books have been given to the Library during the year and we are grateful to all who aid the Library in this way. Miss Esther Kimball has continued to give us New Hampshire Profiles and the National Geographic Magazine, Look Magazine is contributed by Miss Elsie Wheeler, Nation's Business, U. S. News and World Report are received from J. W. Buttrick, Robert Taft contributes News Week, Science Digest is given by Russell Kimball, William LaPierre has given a subscription to Faith at Work Magazine and Albert Bourke gives the Catholic Digest. The Woman's Club gives us the Club Woman and the American Legion Auxiliary gives us the School Bulletin put out by National Geographic Magazine and the American Legion gives a subscription to the American Legion Magazine. We are also grateful to the Mason Village Savings Bank for a copy of the New Hampshire Register. The Scientific American has been added to the list of magazines to which the Library subscribes. As an aid to the Librarian the Wilson Bulletin and the Horn Book have been subscribed to this year.

Memorial books have been given by friends in memory of Mrs. Christine Garney and Mrs. Winifred Coffin.

During the five visits of the Bookmobile an average of 242 books have been left at the Library and 34 books, on various subjects, have been borrowed from the State Library in Concord for our patrons.

The assistant librarian, Mrs. Violet Buttrick, has been of much help during the year, taking over the librarian's duties when she was on vacation in July and also carrying on when the librarian was ill in September. She has also worked on Friday afternoons and some Tuesdays and has been of valuable help when the Bookmobile makes its visits.

The librarian and Mrs. Helene Greene, trustee, have attended several Library Meetings during the year. The New Hampshire Library trustees meeting in May at the New Hampton School for boys and the New Hampshire Library Association Meeting in Peterborough in October.

In connection with the State Library development program, book selection meetings are held frequently. The first one was held at the Wadleigh Memorial Library in Milford on April 20th. New books are on display, book reviews are given and interesting lectures are presented at each meeting. The second meeting was also held in Milford on June 16th. During July and August no meetings were held and September, due to illness, the librarian was unable to attend the meeting held in Amherst. Mrs. Greene and the librarian attended the October meeting held at the Gregg Free Library in Wilton. Topics discussed at these meetings have been, the co-operative cataloging procedure, reference aids, materials used for book selection, and tools for selecting children's books. Each of these meetings have been most informative and it is very helpful to be able to see new books before purchasing.

The big event of the Library year is National Library Week, which was celebrated April 25th to May 1st. The theme for this year was "Know what you are talking about — Read." The Library started the week off with a well attended Open House on Sunday, April 25th. A panel discussion on "My Reading Habits" by six high school students, with the Reverend Calvin Klumb as Moderator, was most interesting. Students from the public and Sacred Heart schools had made book jackets, which were on display, and prizes were awarded to the three best from each school. Refreshments were served, by the Friends of the Library, from a most attractive tea table. On Wednesday, April 28th, the librarian and Mrs. Greene attended the National Librarian Week luncheon at the New Hampshire Highway Hotel. We were delightfully entertained by a double quartet from the New Hampton School for boys. Donald M. Murray, professor at the University of New Hampshire and a well known author, gave an interesting talk on "Why Tell Tales." New Hampshire Authors were introduced and many of their books were on display. Friday, April 30th, the fourth annual Pops Concert was sponsored by the Friends of the Library. As usual it was a success and all enjoyed a delightful evening. The proceeds from this affair were used to purchase a 1966 twenty volume set of World Book Encvclopedia.

Story hours have been held during the summer months for the young children and 50 youngsters participated in a Summer Reading program. Parties were held for both groups at the end of the season. The school children, with their teachers, come by classes to the Library each Friday afternoon of the school year and story hours are held for the first and second graders the last Friday of each school month.

I wish to conclude my report with my sincere thanks to all who help the Library become a better tool of service to the community; to the "Friends of the Library," who help in many ways, not the least of which is the Pops Concert and the financial help it gives to the Library; and to my trustees who are always ready to help me, and the Library, in any way possible.

May I urge the townspeople to follow the theme for National Library Week, "Know what you are talking about — read!" Make regular visits to your Library a habit during 1966.

SCHOOL WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Greenville qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the fifth day of March 1966, at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

3a. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing one year.

4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$45,401 to enter into a one-year exclusive contract with Appleton Academy for the tuition of all high school children of Greenville in lieu of \$45,425 currently stated in the School Board's Budget for this purpose, or take any action relating thereto.

10. Shall the School District accept the provisions of RSA 195 as amended, providing for the establishment of a Cooperative School District together with the school districts of Wilton, Greenfield, Lyndeborough, Mason, New Ipswich, and Temple, in accordance with the provisions of the proposed Articles of Agreement filed with the School District Clerk.

11. To see if the School District will vote, by ballot, yes to accept or no to reject the following proposal:

Shall the School Board, or a committee of three appointed by the School Board, on behalf and in the best interests of the School District, negotiate a contract with the Trustees of New Ipswich Appleton Academy for the education of the School District students in grades 7 through 12 for a term of not less than fifteen years and present such contract for approval, by ballot vote, at the 1966 regular meeting of the School District called for that purpose. (By Petition)

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and citizens of Greenville, I respectfully submit my eighth annual report as your superintendent of schools.

Staff and Instruction

The Greenville Public School opened this fall with two changes in the staff. Mr. James P. Quinn, Jr. of Wilton, New Hampshire, replaced Mr. Richard Metivier as principal and teacher of grades seven and eight. Mr. Gerald Britton of Marlboro, New Hampshire, a recent graduate from Keene, replaced Mr. Frederick Marshall in the fifth and sixth grade room.

In spite of the fact that these two changes were made in the staff, progress has been good. Mr. Quinn has been teaching within the Supervisory Union for several years and, therefore, is familiar with the kinds of programs that have been emphasized within elementary schools. Mr. Britton is making a very satisfactory adjustment, considering his preparation as a secondary teacher, to working at the elementary level and is making good progress in Reading, Mathematics and his particular field of interest — Science.

The programs initiated during the last several years have been continued with increasing effort being placed upon both of these areas, Math and Reading, in order to bring children up to satisfactory grade levels.

Building and Grounds

Each year efforts are made to maintain and even improve the appearance of the building as a whole. This past year much needed work was done in the hallways to repair and paint the plastered walls so that their appearance would be improved. In the coming school year funds have been budgeted for finishing the wainscoting in the hallways, painting of the first grade room and making some repairs as requested by the office of Fire Marshal. It is also hoped that in one room it might be possible to sand and seal the floor in order to improve the appearance of the classroom, and also to make it easier to keep clean. This would be a natural next step in moving from oil treated floors which once existed, to synthetically treated floors. In addition, some new lighting is to be installed in the upper hallway and attic. It is planned to build shelving in the attic for storage purposes. In addition, railings will be installed on the attic stairs.

Finance

There is not much difference in the budget proposed for 1966-67 in comparison with the current budget. In the 210 series "Salaries," an increase of approximately \$2,000 is evident. However, \$3,000 of this increase is because of budgeting for Title I money. This is balanced by \$3,000 in the Receipt section of the budget, leaving the net assessment for the support of the schools in this respect, unchanged. An increase appears in the section on "Transportation," of about \$200 because the actual bid received was above that anticipated for the operation of buses this vear and for the next two years. In the 1477.1 series "Tuition", a reduction of about \$800 appears. This is because of the fact that the Board has reverted to budgeting on a per pupil basis. The budgeted figure for secondary education is \$45,425.00. This amount is arrived at by estimating an enrollment of 79 pupils at Appleton Academy at a per pupil cost of \$575. Citizens of Greenville will have to decide whether they want to accept this per pupil figure or accept an exclusive contract figure for 88 pupils at \$547 or \$48,136, which figure is found in the Article within the Warrant.

The net effect of the increases and decreases noted results in a total appropriation of about \$1200 above the current year's operating budget. Since, however, it appears that the income estimated for 1966-67 is about \$1700 more than appears for this current year, the net appropriation for the schools is decreased by \$500.

Special Articles

At this time two Special Articles will be found in the School District Warrant: one for the exclusive contract for one year with Appleton Academy, and the second giving the citizens of the town an opportunity to vote on the cooperative school arrangement. A third Article may possibly be offered, namely, that of requesting a long term fifteen to twenty year contract with Appleton Academy for the education of children in Greenville in grades seven through twelve or nine through twelve. As of this writing, it has not been definitely determined by the Board as to whether or not this article would appear.

Federal Aid

This is the first year that Federal Aid became available to schools under the Elementary - Secondary Education Act of 1965. During the present year it is contemplated using Title I funds through action taken at a special school district meeting to provide remedial reading services for all of the deprived children of the town, public and parochial. It is expected that a similar amount of money will be available in the coming school year and this is why \$3,000 has been budgeted in the 210 series. The exact use of this money for the coming year has not been determined but it is guite probable that the remedial reading program will be continued. In addition to Title I money, Title II money under the Act referred to above is available to the Supervisory Union. Its purpose is to provide library material for all youngsters within the Supervisory Union area. These library books would be circulated amongst the schools as requests and needs develop on the part of teachers. It is expected that during the coming vear a similar amount of money will be made available for the continuance of this kind of library project.

Cooperative School Study

A decision relative to participation in a cooperative school is being asked in the school warrants of all the towns involved in the study. Hearings have been held in all of the towns and other meetings have also been held in each of the communities to thoroughly familiarize all of the citizens with the advantages and disadvantages of a cooperative arrangement. Cooperation is not a one way street. The general feeling is that the advantages in being a part of a large cooperative district far outweigh the disadvantages which are part and parcel of such an arrangement. The undersigned's report relative to this matter is found in the Cooperative School brochure published to inform citizens regarding this matter. It would be redundant to say much more about the Cooperative Plan. A farsighted point of view should be taken by the citizens. The long range twenty, thirty, forty or fifty year educational advantages of such a cooperative arrangement are the things that should be very thoughtfully considered. Too often, citizens are concerned about immediate incidental considerations and lose sight of the long term advantages of a cooperation. This plan will make long term educational provisions for the children of the community and make Greenville a better place to live in.

Whatever action is taken by the citizens, it is hoped that a decision is arrived at by a careful unemotional evaluation of all facts.

Conclusion

In spite of changes which have taken place in the staff which will probably continue to be with us as long as a small multiple graded school is operated, progress in the Greenville School has been satisfactory. We have been very fortunate in hiring excellent people to work on our staff, and serve as principal. These teachers are doing an excellent job. The School Board has been extremely understanding of the problems of the teachers and has made every effort to provide materials that would make the teaching task more effective. The teachers, by working in a professional manner, with an understanding and appreciative School Board, help to make educational progress in Greenville a pleasurable reality.

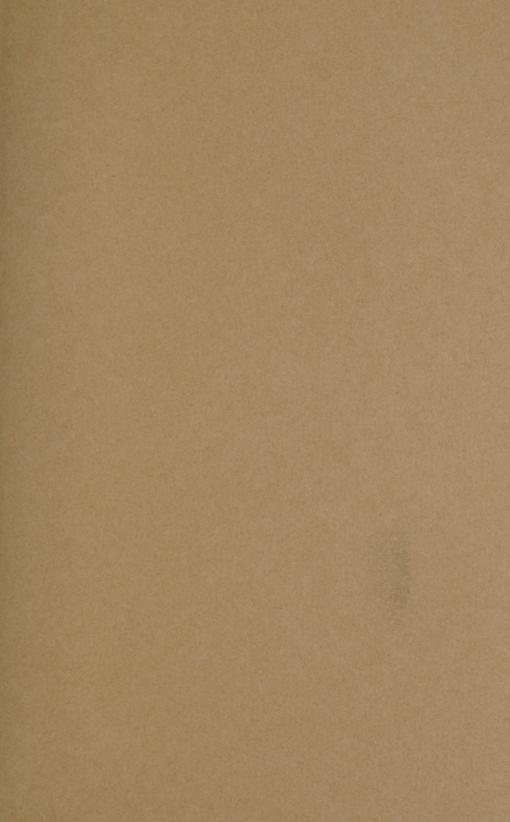
