TENTATIVE WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Madison qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Madison, on Tuesday the 13th day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To Choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for same.

As follows:

- Town officers' salaries.
- Town officers' expenses.
- Town Hall expenses.
- Town poor.
- Street Lights.
- Summer Highways and bridges.
- Winter Highways for 1934 and 1935.
- Town Library.
- Fire Department.
- Memorial Day.
- Police Department.
- Election Expense.
- Parks and Playgrounds.
- Town Debt.
- Interest and Discount.
- Legal Expense.

3. To see what action town will take in regards to discount on taxes.

4. To see if town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute inventory blanks at time of appraisal of property.

5. To see what action town wishes to take in regard to Fire Department.

6. To see what sum of money town will author-

ize Selectmen to hire, in anticipation of taxes.

7. To see whether beer or other lawful alcohol beverages shall be manufactured or sold locally as permitted under this act. (Chap. 99, Sec. 22).

8. To see what action town will take in regard to changing name of lake.

9. To see what action town will take in regard to buying snow equipment and make appropriation for same.

10. To see what action town will take in regards to housing road equipment, and make appropriation for same.

11. To see if town will take any action in regard to the Silver Lake Library.

12. To see if town will open Moore Crossing Road as a public highway.

13. To see what action town will take in regard to Branch Bridge and make appropriation for same.

14. To see if town will raise and appropriate a necessary amount of money to take care of expense of Fish screen at foot of Silver Lake.

15. To see if town will take any action in regard to road at foot of Silver Lake, so called, and raise and appropriate money for same.

16. To see what action town will take regarding Bathing Beach and raise and appropriate money for same.

17. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

After careful consideration, the Budget Committee recommends the following:

1. That the town vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum to take care of the existing town debt caused by various accumulations. That the Selectmen be authorized to borrow not to exceed \$4000. in anticipation of taxes for 1934.

2. That the town vote to grant the following discounts for the year 1934 on assessed taxes: 2½% 10 days after presentation of bill, 2% on July 10th. No discount after that date.

3. That the town instruct the Tax Collector to collect 10% after December 1st, also that all back taxes be collected before July 1st, 1934, or the prop-

erty be sold.

4. That the town vote to purchase two new complete Austin Western plowing units and one V-shaped plow to be mounted on the frame which the town already owns, at approximate cost of \$800.00, and that these plows be delivered to the Road Agents for snow removal. Various agents to furnish trucks to operate the same at a reasonable rate per hour, to be decided upon. In case of emergency the Selectmen to be authorized to hire extra equipment.

5. That the Fire Department be re-organized, and that regular meetings be held, or that the Selectmen be authorized to take charge.

6. That suitable housing facilities be arranged for to take care of Town Machinery, and that same be kept housed.

7. That the town vote to raise the salary of the Auditor to \$10.00 per year.

REPORT OF AUDITOR

To the Officers of the Town of Madison:

I have just completed a thorough audit of the books of the Town of Madison. In all cases I have found the total amounts well balanced and vouched, but the detailed reports showed several discrepancies. For simplifying future audits, I am making the following suggestions which I hope the officers will follow during the coming year.

TAX COLLECTOR

The practice which the Collector has of paying to the Treasurer more money than he has actually collected should be abolished, as collector's book does not check with Treasurer's books. Interest should be collected on all overdue taxes, especially in years when discount is allowed.

TOWN CLERK

More frequent payments should be made Treas-

urer and in all cases proper receipts passed at time of payment.

TREASURER

All checks should be passed through the bank thus simplifying the cash records. In case part of a payroll is paid to Tax Collector a proper receipt should accompany each check showing amount credited for taxes. I find that under the present system, the taxpayer finds it difficult to determine the amount of his taxes left unpaid.

TRUSTEES OF THE TRUST FUNDS

More care should be taken in keeping records and an itemized list of expenditures should accompany their report. I would suggest that some of the Trust Funds be used as a loan to the Town thus increasing the income of these funds.

SELECTMEN

All Trust Funds coming into the hands of the Board should immediately be turned over to the Trustees of the Trust Funds. All payments and receipts necessary to closing the books should be entered immediately after Jan. 31. A more careful check of the Collector's Warrant should be made before being turned over to the Collector.

In the above report, it is not intended to criticize any individual nor encroach upon the honesty or efficiency of any of the Officers. The above suggestions are made simply after noting present methods and conditions and with a belief that if followed, should help to simplify the balancing of all records.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Madison:

I herewith submit my thirteenth annual report as superintendent of schools, it being the twenty-first in the series of such reports.

In these times of stress and strain it is doubly important that we maintain excellent schools. The welfare of boys and girls is of first importance. Instruction in facts of knowledge should be accompanied by lessons in service for the public welfare. New situations are arising and boys and girls should know how to meet them.

It would be a great help if we could give more attention to manual and project work. For such work we should need more space and more equipment.

I should like to point out that our elementary school buildings are fast becoming out of date. We do not have the ventilating heaters and the lighting is inadequate. Only one building has electric lights. Only one has chemical toilets. The seats are not adjustable. Might we not make one special improvement each year? Could some method of combining schools be worked out?

The high school is a credit to the town. The work is going well. Improvements have been made here by putting in a new furnace, painting the basement and the main room, and relaying the water pipe below the frost. We very much need a larger building and a gymnasium to accommodate the large number of pupils. At present we cannot seat all the pupils at once. They come in two shifts. The recitation room and laboratory are too small. Outside painting is needed.

Jessie Gray, President of the National Education Association says, "The American common school is the expression of a mighty faith. It has grown up out of need and aspiration. It is the bulwark of those

democratic ideals and rights for which mankind has sacrificed and suffered thruout the ages. It is the home of light and of reason. It is the hope of a better tomorrow. The common school is the house of the people."

We need larger and better beautified school grounds. In this land called the playground of America it seems strange for our boys and girls to be cramped on a few feet of earth. Properly directed play becomes one of the most valuable agencies of education. It is known that there are certain faculties and abilities which, if not developed through exercise, will forever be dormant. Much is said about yard and roadside beautification. And yet we allow our schools to have limited space and unattractive grounds. May we not start on some improvement?

Visual Instruction

The motion picture has brought help and enjoyment to the boys and girls. Already there have been pictures of health, safety, flowers, kindness to animals, geography and history. The picture, "Daniel Boone," was given in the Town Hall and the public invited. This was a strong picture of early pioneer life in the Kentucky region. "Dixie" was a unique picture, showing scenes from the South in the time of the Civil War. It was especially appropriate at the time of Memorial Day. The entertaining picture, "Captain January," was favorably received everywhere. Since we learn more through the eye than through any other sense, the picture comes to have special value.

Health Work

Medical Inspection is still attending to the health conditions in the schools. Details of the work are found in the enclosed report by the school nurse, Miss Ruth S. Langille.

In this connection, parents are reminded that

children must be vaccinated before entering school. This should be done by August 20. It is not right to delay and then keep children out of school in September to have the vaccination done.

The fact that our High School has the largest enrollment in its history is evidence that Madison people realize the value of education and are interested in child welfare. The conditions of our country show that we need well-trained citizens, and the way to train is to begin in youth. Honest, loyal, efficient, helpful and law-abiding citizens are not made in haste. A squash can be grown in one season, but it takes years of slow, hard growth to make a sturdy, spreading oak. The twig can be bent. The tree cannot.

A Piece of Clay

"I took a piece of plastic clay
And idly fashioned it one day,
And, as my fingers pressed it still,
It moved and yielded to my will.

"I came again when days were passed—
The bit of clay was hard at last;
The form I gave it, it still bore,
But I could change that form no more.

"I took a piece of living clay
And gently formed it day by day,
And moulded with my power and art
A young child's soft and yielding heart.

"I came again when years were gone—
It was a man I looked upon;
He still that early impress wore,
And I could change him nevermore."

Teachers hold a vital place in the training of the youth of our land. They should be given consideration financially as well as the common laborer and in proportion to the importance of their work.

REPORT OF SCHOOL HEALTH WORK FOR MADISON

To the Townspeople, School Board, and Superintendent of Schools:

With the economic conditions still unfavorable for the maintenance of the best health of the children, all agencies are united in a supreme effort to prevent permanent damage to our children.

To this end the Federal and State Emergency Relief is being directed, as well as our own local efforts. Last year and most of this winter, milk has been served in half pint bottles to some twenty-three children in Madison schools every school day. Cod Liver Oil is now on route for any children who need a building tonic and there are many, both school and pre-school, who have had many colds or who need this builder for other reasons. Hot lunches are being served in most of the schools, and plans are being made to enable all schools to have this service.

Due to the generosity of the Madison Woman's Club, the Red Cross, the School Board and the parents who could pay, a dental clinic was held last Spring and forty-seven children received attention. This year about the same number of children will need this service for definite dental defects to put the teeth in perfect condition. The remaining one hundred child-

ren will need a check-up and at least a cleaning job to keep the teeth in the very good condition they now are.

There are still thirty-seven children in our schools with tonsils in unsatisfactory condition. This accounts for many of the colds and ear troubles which seem to keep the attendance records poor. We hope that a grand drive can be put on in the Spring to clear up these throats, if only for the protection of the well children.

We are very much gratified that only fifteen children can be found in our schools, with about one hundred and forty-seven children enrolled, who may be considered under weight. This is a real record and is a real tribute to our parents who are succeeding in spite of financial difficulties in keeping the family well! Moreover in this group of children enrolled there may be found sixty-six who are seemingly physically perfect and without defect! This is the largest number of perfect children ever noted in this town!

That progress is still being made in the health conditions of the Madison schools may be seen in the brief summary of the past four years' work:
