## NOTES FROM THE SELECTMEN

Town Meeting March 7, 1972 concluded after a split session ending Saturday, March 11th; the purpose being to enable a majority of voters to consider a sewer bond issue of \$350,000.00. The article passed affirmatively. After engineering and planning design, installation commenced in August. Through the efforts of the Sewer Commissioners and other officials, New London was provided a State Water Supply and Pollution Control Board approval, further endorsed by the Governor and Council which assured that the bond issue would go to offering with a triple A rating; hence a considerable saving would be realized on the bonds. The Sewer Commissioners will present the status of the work to date and the anticipated financial needs to carry on with this project.

In 1972 thirty-eight (38) building permits were granted in addition to the second cluster of Hilltop, consisting of twenty-four units. Commercial development, primarily, was the new shopping center (eight store units) off the Newport Road at Cricenti's corner. Remodelling permits numbered fifty-three which included such as breezeways, garages and dwelling enlargements.

Property valuations (new) increased on April 1st, 1972, over the previous twelve month period by \$1,683,000.00, bringing the new valuation of New London as of that date to \$31,171,000.00. For comparatives, the valuation in 1962, as equalized, was \$20,325,000.00. With more than a 50% increase in ten years, it is understandable that New London is in the uppermost growth group statewide. Such patterns have an appreciable influence on three major town charges. Education is number one. However, county government shows rapidly accelerating costs. In 1962 New London's share in county costs was \$18,841.00. Rising steadily each year, our county charge for 1972 was \$77,000.00. We

now witness a 400% county tax increase to a 50% valuation growth over a ten year period. Thirdly, in 1962 the composite item of Protection of Persons and Property totalled \$15, 600.00. In 1972 this item reached well over \$72,000.00. These comparatives by your Board of Selectmen are not intended to be critical as they concern the school and protection of persons and property items. However, we do join officials from other towns questioning the cost increases at the county level. In 1973 New London will be asked to participate in Regional Planning. For better or worse, as a town, we may have little choice. It behooves us to interest ourselves in grass root tax dollars. As conscientiously as your town officials and department heads attempt to embrace that old adage, "patch it up, wear it out, make do and do without", the rushing herds of governmental needs and demands advance across plains of reason to consume us, should we remain as spectators. At the 1972 Town Meeting, Article #20 provided the go ahead for a tax map of all properties in New London. The consulting firm of Whitman & Howard Engineers, Boston, Massachusetts, were contracted to do the work. The town voted \$36,000.00 for the total project to be raised over a two year period. The final contract was let for \$26,000.00. Your Board of Selectmen has witnessed the work in progress which, at Report time, is half completed. We are pleased to report on the quality, accuracy and schedule to date. The completion date is set for August, 1973.

During the fall of 1972, the New London Volunteer Fire Department moved into their new quarters on Main Street. Compliments are due the architect, D. W. Goubert, and the general contractor, Lull & Prescott, for a job well done at a considerable saving to the town. Earlier bids were discouraging inasmuch as these ran nearly three times the final contract price. We would be remiss if we did not call attention to the fact that the firemen in team effort, contributing of their time, added in no small way to the project.

The auxillary storage building for the Highway Depart-

ment is nearing completion. At this rate, occupancy is hoped for by the end of February. The building is 50'x60', and, most assuredly, will be well received by the Department, eliminating the need for outside storage of its rolling stock.

In conclusion, there are two areas of disappointment. One, the repair to the dam in Elkins has not been accomplished. At this writing we are with our fourth contractor to do this \$2,000.00 repair. We have been assured that the plugging of the dam will be done by March. Secondly, the solving of the location for a new sanitary land-fill site has not been accomplished. The N. H. Water Resources Board will not approve the seventy acre site off lower plain. They are now of the opinion that leaching will occur in the shed of the Black Water River. Economics appear to require upwards of 50,000 people using a sanitary land-fill area. At this writing, we are listening to various groups, including the Regional Planners, and can only hope by 1975 (when the law prohibits burning) to have reached a sound economical and practical solution. While the above has been disappointing, we have been informed by the New London Sewer Commission, that the seventy acres may become a suitable area for final treatment or polishing stages of effluent discharge. This conclusion must wait the engineers design and plans as they evolve a new sewage treatment plant.

Lastly, your Board of Selectmen wish to thank the many individuals, committees and departments who throughout this past year have contributed to their community in the common cause of sound government.

## TRACY MEMORIAL LIBRARY

In keeping with the trend of the past several years, 1972 has been a year of progress and change for the Tracy Memorial Library. The Library has been fortunate in the employment of Mr. Vincent Lee, a man of many abilities, as the new custodian, due to the resignation of Mr. Weston Ray on January 1. Also, the assistant to the Librarian, Mrs. Dorothy Kimball, resigned as of August 1 and, again, the Library has been most fortunate to secure the services of Miss Janet Noonan.

Physical changes have included the renovation of the second floor store room, now known as the New Hampshire Room, a new wall bookcase and carpet in the new stack room (formerly the auditorium), outside book drop, installation of a fire door and fire escape in the Children's Room, floor cushions and light-proof curtains in the Children's Room, minor repairs to the tool house, and a new door and bulkhead for the basement. A new lawn mower and a new vacuum cleaner were purchased, and a lawn sweeper was donated.

The special gift of furnishings for the New Hampshire Room, in memory of Herbert Swift, given by Mrs. Maude Swift, was especially appreciated. The room was renovated and furnished for the celebration of the Library's Golden Jubilee in July at which time Dr. J. Duane Squires presided at the dedication. For this occasion, a history of the Library was prepared by Mr. Walter Rhodes, a former Trustee, and was published through the generosity of four businesses and individuals in the Town. The event was hosted by the Friends of the Tracy Memorial Library and the flower arrangements were furnished by the New London Garden Club, for which the Trustees were most grateful.

The Friends also gave generously of their time and effort when the books were placed in the temporary storage



stacks in the old auditorium, after the carpet was laid. Our gratitude goes to these dedicated people.

The summer of 1972 saw increased use made of the lovely garden which the New London Garden Club has helped to restore. The children in the summer reading program, under the leadership of Miss Ellen Johnson, have been the chief beneficiaries of the renewal, but the Trustees hope that all townspeople will take advantage of the garden's tranquility in 1973.

Gifts of bound magazines have been made to the Fernald Library at Colby to complete the collection there, and material of historical interest was given to the New London Historical Society. Weekly meetings of the Senior Citizens continue to be held with coffee, doughnuts and conversation enjoyed by many.

Since the growth of the Town is evident to all who will look, it seemed appropriate for the Trustees to try to forecast the needs of the Tracy Memorial Library for the next twenty years. In doing this, it became apparent that there were many services that the Library could perform for the public if facilities were available. Thus, it was decided to update the present five-year plan for renovation and to anticipate use for programs for an enlarged population. Therefore, an architect was hired to make a plan upon which a request for Federal Funds could be based, and such a request was duly submitted to the State Library. There are no Federal Funds available, but there is still a plan.

The Chairman of the Board of Trustees participated in a three man team in five of six State Trustee Association-sponsored Orientation Programs for new trustees in the spring, and attended both the mid-winter and annual Conferences of the American Library Trustee Association as a member of its Board. Also, the Board was represented by attendance at the annual meetings of the New Hampshire

Library Council, the New England Library Trustee Association and the annual and Fall meetings of the New Hampshire Library Trustee Association. As Chairman of a sub-committee of the Ad Hoc Committee to study the services of the State Library, the Chairman met monthly with one of the other of these committees, and has recently been appointed as the only New England Trustee to serve on the American Library Trustee Association Committee for a White House Conference for Better Libraries.

## REPORT OF THE DISTRICT COURT

The case load of the New London District Court fell off slightly from the previous year. For the year 1971 the Court disposed of 845 cases. The Court disposed of 768 cases in the year 1972. This reduction was accountable in part by a substantial number of radar traffic cases the latter part of December 1972 which are being tried or otherwise disposed of in 1973. The breakdown comparison follows:

The civil jurisdiction of all District Courts was increased by the Legislature (RSA 502-A:14 I) effective July 1, 1972. The effect of such legislation was to grant the District Courts exclusive and original jurisdiction of civil cases in which the damages claimed do not exceed five hundred dollars. The Court still has concurrent jurisdiction with the Superior Court over civil cases in which the damages do not exceed fifteen hundred dollars. This legislative action indicates a general trend toward relieving the case load congestion in the Superior Court and placing a greater case load on District Courts where matters may be handled more expeditiously. This trend in transfer of jurisdiction will become more evident with each legislative session.

The court in its last report called the attention of the public to an urgent need for more appropriate judicial facilities, with emphasis on a new Courtroom. Action by the

voters at the March 1973 Town Meeting to fund such an undertaking will be most appropriate and will result in maintaining a high level of decorum and good standards for the handling of cases in our District Court.

## POLICE DEPARTMENT

In 1972 your Police Department purchased a new radio system with the aid of the Governor's Commission on Crime and Delinquence. Crime Commission paid 60%, Town paid 40%. Your Police Department also purchased a new radar with the aid of New Hampshire Highway Safety Agency. The Highway Saffety Agency paid 50%, Town 50%. Also your Police Department received a brethalyzer from New Hampshire Highway Safety Agency to be shared with the surrounding towns and State Police.

Your Police Department has three officers who attended 5 days each of schooling on the operation of the breathalyzer and are certified operators. Also the officers of this department have attended one day seminars on drugs, DWI's, juveniles and etc. There will be more seminars in 1973 that the officers will attend.

Any organization or individual wishing to see this new equipment is welcome to come to the Police Department anytime and if you wish to see it operate, a demonstration will be given.

The officers of your Police Department would once again like to thank the people of New London for their cooperation and support in 1972 and hope that it will continue through 1973. In 1972 the cooperation of the people of New London helped your Police Department solve 7 burglaries. This proves that if you see something that does not look right and you call the police at that time it will help the police to solve the problems that are occuring.

The biggest event of the year had to be the moving of the Department into the new Firehouse on Main Street. We have waited a long time for this, but it was worth the extra time to get what we really needed. This will serve the residents of New London for many, many years to come. An Open House was held in November and many townspeople took advantage of the opportunity to inspect our building and trucks.

During the year we purchased 900 feet of quick-drying plastic hose which is now in use on the Chevrolet. We also purchased two more self-contained breathing units. We now have six in all, along with various other smaller pieces of equipment, including four new Firemen's outfits (coats, hats, boots and gloves).

Again, two Fire Training Schools were held, in June and September, and it is gratifying indeed to see so many of the men turn out to both of these all-day schools. We also held our own special instruction practices last Spring using an old farmhouse donated to the Company by George Cricenti.

Our tank truck, with its 3000 gallons of water, is now substantially complete. The final coats of paint were applied in the late Fall and all that remains to be done is the lettering.

During 1972 the Fire Department increased its membership to 30 Firemen and responded to a total of 35 fires.

## REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

In New Hampshire, forest fire control is a cooperative State-Town program. The Town Forest Fire Warden, appointed by the Director, Division of Resources Development upon recommendation of the Selectmen and the State's District Forest Fire Chief, is responsible for fire suppression and other related duties. The State shares equally with the town in the cost of most forest fires, except illegal and careless fires, which are charged to the responsible party. The State further provides fire detection services, prevention programs, fire training for town wardens and crews, and back up equipment for fire suppression.

By authority of the State, the Town Forest Fire Warden controls all outside burning in his town except backyard cooking fires. Any person wishing to kindle a fire when the ground is not covered with snow must obtain a fire permit, free of cost, from the Town Forest Fire Warden. No permits will be issued for fires between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. unless it is raining, except for commercial purposes.

Please be careful when using fire. Remember it can be a extremely useful tool when under control but once allowed to run wild it can become a disastrous and devastating force. Only YOU can prevent a forest fire.

## REPORT OF THE TOWN HEALTH OFFICER

For the benefit of the New London Community, the following is a brief annual report of the town Health Officer.

With the aid of the Town Selectmen, an attempt toward improving conditions of the town dump has been initiated. The dumping area previously used has been sealed off, and chemically treated against vermin, and filled. The adjacent area, presently used for dumping, is treated monthly for rodents. During this year the Selectmen, along with State Health Officials and myself, have been pursuing the possibility of a new location for the town dump. No definite decision has been reached, though the Selectmen are continuing their investigation.

During the year, a new Sewage dumping pit has been constructed near the previous site by the New London Highway Department. The surrounding area also has been carefully fenced off and gated to prevent vandalism or accidents.

I have continued to investigate the condition of lakes, ponds, streams and beaches in our town. My reports of the survey have been submitted to the proper officials.

Inspection of individual septic systems continues to be a time consuming burden. In this regard, the homeowner would be well advised to obtain proper direction from myself before actual construction is undertaken. It is essential that these systems meet town and state standards.

The New London Lions Club has assumed organization of the Rabies Clinic. This Club has contributed significantly to our town, and we all are grateful for this initiative.

The municipal water supply has been inspected monthly for its quality, and acceptable standards have been maintained.

I wish to express my appreciation to the New London town officials who have assisted me in my duties.

As this report is written, there is warning of a measles epidemic in the State of New Hampshire, and we have not escaped it. However, the level of immunization locally has been of a high order and by large we are seeing only a few cases, chiefly in those who fail to go to their physicians or held this week. Unfortunately, vaccines, like man, are im- offered every year or more often. An extra clinic is being the free clinics supported by the State, which have been perfect, and some of the measles immunizations given years ago failed to take so a few cases arise in people who had their shots. Fortunately, this is uncommon and certainly does not mean the program is unsuccessful. This epidemic only serves to emphasize that each new child coming along needs the whole series of immunizations. If we let down our guard, the next epidemic might be polio, so please be sure your records are up to date. Young adults who haven't completed their immunizations should not feel that adulthood confers immunity; childhood diseases can be disastrous in adults. Fortunately, in the past year the state law has been changed so all children entering into first grade are required to have DPT, polio, measles, and German measles (rubella) immunizations; mumps is optional but desirable; and as predicted, smallpox vaccinations are no longer recommended anywhere in the United States except when traveling to underdeveloped parts of the world.

Because of increased numbers and mobility of the population, along with a much larger older population, the delivery of health care has become a massive political issue which governmental agencies are trying to cope with. Un-

fortunately, since public health has been a low profile until recently, many would-be experts in the field criticize the current availability of health care and its cost and inadequacies, without regard for its successes. The idea of a new broom to sweep the whole field clean and start with new people organizing and running the field seems attractive to some, but if physicians are not at the center in dealing with health problems, the quality of medical care will suffer severely. The answer is not in simply substituting new for the old, but sticking to the best things in the old system and adding the best in the new, counting on the cooperation and sincere interest of physicians, other health professionals, and administrators in doing all they can for people.

Locally, these problems are seen in a more rapid turnover of the population, so that each person may not have one doctor. However, it is still desirable for continuity of records, that each person try to have one primary physician, recognizing that some days he may have to see a different doctor. We physicians in New London try to maintain a close working relationship. The idea of competition for patients belongs to another era. Our current system of delivery of medical care through the hospital outpatient department is not ideal and never can be when people fail to recognize that a doctor's time needs to be scheduled. I urge that people call their physician first, and then call and arrange through the hospital outpatient when their physician can't be reached, rather than simply dropping in to the outpatient because it is convenient. It always costs more to go to the outpatient than to your doctor's office, and this will get worse. Of course, emergency problems should be brought promptly to the hospital or the hospital called when an ambulance might be needed.

## REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

During 1972 the New London Conservation Commission has been negotiating for the procurement of part of the Anthony Philbrick Bog, a unique acid wetland, which is located in a hollow west of Newport Road just beyond the entrance to Hilltop Place. Through the cooperation and generosity of Mrs. Ralph Child, ten acres of this area have been made available to the Town by future gift and purchase. This bog, with its tamaracks and pitcher plants growing on a mat of sphagnum moss, was once part of the farm belonging to Anthony Philbrick, grandfather of Mrs. Child. In past summers, through the courtesy of Mrs. Child and the Cricenti family, the Commission has conducted some of its Wednesday Walks over the bog mat to acquaint townspeople with the ecology of the area. To assist with the preservation of this wetland the Ford Foundation has granted \$750 for survey and legal expenses.

The trails in town, cut for public access to Conservation areas, are being used increasingly for cross country snowshoeing and skiing during the winter as well as walking in the warmer seasons. A map of such trails was inserted in your 1971 Town Report and is also available at the Town Clerk's office.

## REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board personnel changed considerably during 1972. Lewis A. Vincent replaced Mrs. Little, Herbert O. Williams replaced Robert Kozikowski and Robert G. Mac Michael replaced Mrs. Muller as Selectmens Representative. Verne E. Barrett was elected chairman. Howard Moody continued as secretary.

Nineteen preliminary plans for subdivisions, some of which were completed, were presented for Board consideration. Fourteen subdivision proposals were considered and eleven acted upon. Ten site plan reviews of non-residential property uses were considered. Ten annexations or transfers not requiring subdivision approval were processed.

In addition, the Board proposed certain minor revisions to the Zoning Ordinance in 1972, all but one of which were accepted, and the Board plans to present certain other minor revisions to the Town Meeting on March 6, 1973.

The Board was successful in creating an Advisory Group of representative citizens, drawn from most of the Town's civic and social groups, to assist in identifying and making recommendations for the solution of problems relating to the development of the community. The 1969 rezoning of the Town in accordance with our Master Plan has made unnecessary any immediate revision of the basic plan. However, the Board continues to study developments in the Town and changes in planning practices in the state and elsewhere to ensure to the best of its ability the orderly growth and development of our Town.

## ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

During 1972, the Zoning Board held open hearings on the following appeals.

February 1, 1972 ..... Dr. Edward Gillie and Francis O. Ramsey requested a variance to Article 4, Section A, of the New London Zoning Ordinance. They wished to build garages on land which is separated from their house sites. The request was denied.

Mr. and Mrs. Dana Davis requested an exception to Article 12, Section D. They wished to have a craft and antique shop in a residential area. At that time they withdrew their request, but returned to the Board at a later date. The request was denied.

February 15, 1972 — G. Robert White and Urban Busch asked for a special exception to Article 12, Section B, and a



variance to the terms of Article 4, Section B, 4. The Board allowed the exception to allow the New London Manor to have five apartments, but denied the variance asking for more apartments than the density requirements allow.

March — 7, 1972 — The New London Properties Co., c/o Glenn F. Powell, requested and appeal from an administrative order in relation to Article 6, Section A, 3. They wished the Board to revoke the temporary special permit granted to Andico in 1968, in order to make it a permit with no conditions. The request was denied.

April 4, 1972 — Robert Seigfried requested and was granted a special exception to Article 12, Section A. He wished to build a paddle tennis court on his property on Old Main Street.

Henry Pogue and Weeks-Concord Dairy, requested an exception to Article 12, Section D. Mr. Pogue wished to build a home for himself and use the building formerly used by Weeks-Concord Dairy off Rte. 11 as a craft shop. This was granted. His previous appeal, on February 15, 1972 for a variance to allow light industry in the same building, had been denied.

April 18, 1972 — Joseph Messer asked for a variance to allow him to make King Hill Annex into two dwelling units. This was allowed.

The Outing Club requested a special exception to Article 12, Section A. They wished to build four tennis courts on property off Lakeside Road, near The Outing Club's Memorial Playing Field. This was granted.

Edwin Keith and Steenbeke and Son, Inc. requested a variance to Article 6, Section A. They wished to make the former Pinecraft Shop on Rte. 11 into a retail store for building materials. They intended to build open buildings to house lumber. The Board voted that the request was not necessary.

June 12, 1972 — David Heald requested and was granted a special exception to Article 12, Section A. He wished to construct a tennis court.

August 22, 1972 — Mary and Richard Emerson requested a variance to Article 5, Section B, 1. The Emersons needed to record an undersized lot, to be used for a driveway to their home in Sutton. This was granted.

Christian Bottinger, Camp Wallula, Inc., came before the board with a plan for a Planned Unit Development, under Article 9. He was permitted seven dwelling units in the residential zone and one dwelling unit in the conservation zone of his property on Little Sunapee Road.

October 24, 1972 — Colby Junior College asked for a special exception to Article 12, Section A. They wished to use the former Episcopal Rectory on Seamans Road for a lodging facility for guests of the college. This was granted.

Novemeber 26, 1972 — The Edgewood Inn, Main Street, was granted a special exception to Article 12, Section A. They wish to erect a paddle tennis court.

## CEMETERY COMMISSION

During the year 1972, there were 30 interments in New London Cemeteries; 11 in Old Main st.; 11 in Elkins; 5 in West Part and 3 in the Catholic. In the past two years there has been a noticeable increase of interest in the West Part Cemetery on County Road, possibly due to its quaintness and rustic setting. It is hoped that additional land may be acquired in the future for possible expansion of this cemetery.

Negotiations were completed for the acquisition of approximately 2½ acres from the former John Dayton Estate adjacent to the south-western boundary of Old Main St. Cemetery, in return for about 1¼ acres owned by the Town fronting on Bog Road. The above addition will be developed and prepared for lot sales when the need arises in the future. The necessary surveying in connection with this land interchange was completed.

Revised and more complete specifications for cemetery maintenance and improvement were prepared and submitted for bids. As a result, a new contract has been awarded for the calendar year of 1973, including care of the Catholic Cemetery in Elkins which heretofore had not been under the jurisdiction of the Commission.

## SEWER COMMISSIONERS REPORT

At the 1972 Town Meeting it was voted to raise \$350,000 from the sale of a Bond for the work on the sewer.

Contracts were awarded to Penetryn Co., Inc. of Nashua, N. H. to seal sewer lines for the sum of \$36,461. Relocating and replacing the line work was awarded to Ted Taylor & Sons, Ashland, N. H. and Paul Hutchenson of Milford, N. H. They had as a combined total for the work \$194,655. The lines have all been sealed and the rest of the work will be completed this summer.

Anderson-Nichols Co., Inc, of Concord has handled all the construction administration and engineering. The Commission has good relations with this firm and express our gratitude to them for the work going along so well.

Victor Carl is doing a good job at the Plant. The operation this year has been fair and with the new work being completed should be better in the future.

New connections will now be on a one by one basis. Multi-connections will have to be State approved to insure the Plant capacity.

We now have on hand \$76,000 which with Federal and State funds will be used to complete the project and the addition of an interceptor from the New London Hospital to the plant.

The Commission would at this time like to thank all the people in town for their understanding and help with the construction which has been going on this past year.

NEW LONDON  
WATER SYSTEM PRECINCT  
SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

The New London Water System Precinct added fourteen residential house services in 1972. In addition twenty-seven domestic services were added at Hilltop Cluster II. Two six inch mains were installed during the past year, the first in the new shopping center, the second at the Twin Lake Villa development site. Two hydrants were installed, one in Springfield, the second in New London. The total number of hydrants now served by the precinct in the two town area is one hundred and fourteen.

Twelve hundred feet of service line to the water department building was installed. This line also will serve the N. H. State Highway Building. Nine hundred feet of six inch main was extended in Springfield with twelve house service for future use.

On several occasions during the past year shut downs were necessitated, interrupting some neighborhood areas. The installations of power lines and sewer mains presents certain unavoidable risks to our underground systems. There are well over one hundred residential service and main transmission lines within the proximities of the sewer mains. We shall endeavor to work with the sewer contractors to minimize such interruptions.

Heavy and prolonged rains in the Spring and early Summer held down our consumption of water during the past year. It should be noticed that while a year such as the past can be high in total rainfall, the other extreme can occur necessitating restrictions on the unlimited use of water. Such periods of concern would be in the late Summer and early Fall.

Weekly monitoring of the water shed area has been car-

ried out each week, from Spring to late Fall. Again in 1972, beaver migration occurred, and four were removed from the area in October. One of which, an adult female weighed sixty-two pounds.

Concluding we fully expect 1973 to be no less active in construction starts than last year. This coupled with our own dam construction for the second reservoir, preventative maintenance, and updating of the service area finds your department hoping abundantly for an early Spring and late Fall.

## NEW LONDON WATER SYSTEM PRECINCT

During 1972 the Water Precinct experienced a general improvement in our cash flow as a result of increased income from water rent, taxes, meter service, etc. Consequently, we were able to balance the budget for 1972 and show a small surplus in our cash accounts. In order to maintain a near breakeven operation it is necessary that the Water Precinct retain the precinct tax and rate structure established last year. Therefore, there is no proposed change in the rates. Rate Policy listed below for your convenience.

Precinct Tax: \$1.60 per \$1,000 real estate assessment.

Domestic:	\$40.00 Flat Residential
	\$ 3.00 Washer
	\$ 1.50 Dishwasher
	\$ 1.00 Disposal

Domestic Summer:	\$25.00 (Applicable only when water department is notified to discontinue service for the winter. Service charge for shut offs \$6.00. Otherwise regular domestic rates will apply.)

Commercial: Unmetered	\$36.00 Flat

Last year's rate increases were necessitated to provide sufficient funds for retirement of Precinct Bonded indebtedness, offset operating cost increases created by the general inflationary bias built into our economy, and continuation of our preventative maintenance program.

Your board of water commissioners in close co-operation with the water superintendent is constantly reviewing problem areas in our system and establishing priorities for the many projects that will be necessary to ensure an adequate water supply for many generations to come.

The completion of a second reservoir with a capacity for 2,000,000 gallons of water remains number one on the priorities list. Some work has been done on this project but because of the demand for new residential water service, and general line maintenance requirements, our department employees were limited as to the amount of time devoted to the reservoir project. We have funds available for this project and hopefully 1973 will bring about considerable progress on the new reservoir.

Another area of concern is the potential "State Requirement" that all ground Water Supply Systems be required to install highly sophisticated (and we might add, costly) water filtration systems.

Our annual meetings are only attended by a handful of precinct voters. We encourage all precinct voters to attend the annual meeting in March to gain a better understanding of the water system, and get your opinions and ideas relating to the water supply.

## KEARSARGE VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION

This is the second full year that the Kearsarge Visiting Nurse Association has provided nursing care services and physical therapy to residents of Bradford, Danbury, New London, Springfield, Sutton, Warner, and Wilmot. Andover joined in April, 1972.

Statistics for 1972 are:

total visits, 1,043;

total mileage, 11,800.

There were 653 visits for a conference with a family or individual for education and guidance. This service includes assistance in the obtaining and use of auxiliary equipment, pre-natal and newborn care, disease prevention to the well adult, and follow-up of the handicapped and mentally retarded. Communication and referrals are constantly made with welfare agencies, nursing homes, mental health clinics, hospitals, physicians, social workers, selectmen, schools, police, and the alcohol and drug abuse program. There is no charge for these visits.

There were 390 visits for skilled nursing care, which includes care of catheters, colostomies, dressings, heart and lung exams, blood pressure checks, injections, medication supervision, foot and nail care, etc. Physical therapy was also provided in the home, mainly to stroke patients. These visits are ordered by the physician and there is a fee.

Regardless of ability to pay, service is provided. The agency is sometimes reimbursed by Medicare, Medicaid, American Cancer Society, and other insurances.

Referrals and cases are received from various sources such as: patient himself, family, neighbor, friend, hospital,

physician, welfare agency, police, churches, other VNA's and organizations.

The association has conducted 10 immunization clinics in New London and Warner with no charge to the individual. A total of 616 immunizations were given to 392 children.

The agency is able to exist and provide these services through the allocations provided by the eight member towns on a per capita basis and by contributions received in our May membership drive.

Donations of clothes, medical equipment and other items have been greatly appreciated and have enabled us to operate a loan closet for our patients.

We look forward to increasing our services next year, so that we may provide health care to a greater number of area residents.

Your town of New London received a total of 216 visits.

Representatives to the KVNA board from New London are Dr. John L. Norris, president, and Elizabeth B. Ballin, publicity chairman.

## THE TOWN HISTORY COMMITTEE

*"Looking Ahead to New London's 200th Birthday in 1979"*

As New London approaches its Bicentennial, the town History Committee in each year's Town Report plans to do two things. It will indicate what was occurring in the Town just two hundred years ago; and it will report on its activities during the year past.

1773

In 1773 what is now New London, together with portions of certain adjacent towns, was called "Alexandria Addition, alias Heidleburg." On July 7, 1773, except for certain limitations, the area now comprising New London came into the possession of Jonas Minot and his associates. Within sixty days of this grant, "Alexandria Addition" was surveyed and divided into 137 lots of 150 acres each. On September 7, 1773, the ownership of each of these lots was determined by drawing. All land titles in New London today go back to the results of this drawing two hundred years ago this year.

Based on Myra B. Lord, *A History of the Town of New London, Merrimack County, N.H.*, 1779-1899; Rev. Ed., 1972, pp. 6-7, 11-12.

During the year just past the Town History Committee has continued its program of erecting annually an historical marker. In 1972 it commemorated the "steamboat days" on Lake Sunapee. The Committee has also continued its project of xeroxing important town records of the early days, thus providing duplicates for otherwise irreplaceable documents.

## NEW LONDON GARDEN CLUB

The New London Garden Club undertakes many civic projects of which many of our residents are not aware.

It is through patience and hard work that we are able to give our town some of the things and finishing touches we all like to see, live with and benefit from.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Kearsarge Middle School Auditorium in said New London on Tuesday, the sixth day of March, next at 12:00 o'clock noon to act upon the following subjects:

Art. 1 A. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

B. Ballot on N. L. Zoning Amendments.

*Note* — By law, the meeting must open before voting starts. Therefore, the Meeting and Polls will open at 12:00 noon for the consideration of Article #1, Parts A and B. At 12:30 P.M. the meeting will recess but the polls will remain open and close at 8:00 P.M. The Town Meeting will reconvene at 7:00 P.M. Article #2 will be the first article of the 7:00 P.M. meeting.

Art. 2. To see if the Town will vote by ballot, with the use of the check list, to adopt the following resolution, or take any other action relating thereto:

Resolved: that the sum of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) is appropriated for the construction of a new interceptor sewer from the vicinity of the New London Hospital and acquisition of such land, easements

and rights of way as may be required; that to raise this appropriation, the Selectmen are authorized to borrow said sum under the Municipal Finance Act.

Art. 3 To see if the Town will vote by ballot, with the use of the checklist, to adopt the following resolution, or to take any other action relating thereto:

(By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to have the nine members-at-large of the Budget Committee elected by the Town Meeting, the same to be effective for the Annual Town Meeting to be held in March 1974, with no change in the terms of the present members-at-large but with one-third of said members to be elected for a term of three years at each Annual Town Meeting beginning at the meeting in March 1974.
