ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

Chief and Clerk of Fire Department.

NEWMARKET, N. H., Feb. 15, 1915.

TO THE TOWN OF NEWMARKET:

In compliance with the law, requiring the Chief Engineer of the Fire Department to make an annual report to the town, the following report is respectfully submitted.

FORCE OF THE DEPARTMENT.

The regular force of the department consists of a chief and three assistant chief engineers, two hose companies of 16 men each, one hook and ladder company of 12 men, and a driver for hose wagon No. 3. Each company is allowed to have five substitute members, who, when acting as such, are paid for their services by their principals when acting as substitutes, making a total force of 49 officers and men available for fire duty, all of whom are subject to monthly out-door drill except in winter. The companies are well officered, are under good discipline, and the service done by them at fires during the past year would be creditable to any fire department.

FIRE APPARATUS.

One hose wagon, capacity 1000 feet hose; three play pipes; two axes; two three-gallon chemical extinguishers; wagon is arranged to lay one or two lines of hose at once, as may be desired; one double runner hose pung of same capacity as hose wagon; two Gleason & Bailey hose carts, chain winding reels, each with a capacity of 700 feet of hose; 2500 feet 2½ inch rubber-lined hose; 1000 feet 2-inch rubber-lined hose; nine flexible play pipes; four solid play pipes; six Callahan shut-off nozzles; two single hydrant gates; two two-to-one Siamese connections; one one-to-two Siamese connection; 32 spanners; seven hydrant wrenches; ten lanterns; four torches; two crowbars; 12 shovels; five hoes; four fire axes; eight coats; 18 fire hats.

The Gleason & Bailey steel frame truck, No. 2, carries one 45-foot East Somerville extension ladder; one 26-foot, one 25-foot, one 24-foot and one 18-foot single ladders on truck; also one pull-down hook and chain and rope; four hand hooks and poles; two crotch poles; two fire axes; two crowbars; two pick-head sledges; 12 rubber buckets; four firemen's lanterns; four pairs of boots; one signal lamp; one 13-inch gong.

FIRE ALARM.

One 12-inch steam chime whistle; one 2000 lb. bell and striker; two 18-inch gongs; two 6-inch gongs; twelve fire alarm boxes; seven miles of wire, and the proper amount of battery to sustain the same.

The line was inspected in the fall and put in as good condition as possible for the winter. The fact that the system of alarm has always been found in working order when needed is a great source of satisfaction to the Board of Engineers, the superintendent of battery, the firemen, and citizens in general.

DIRECTIONS FOR RINGING IN AN ALARM.

When a fire breaks out the person discovering it should immediately run to the box *nearest the fire*, break the glass in the front of the small key box which is on the side of the fire alarm box, take out the key, which is attached to a chain, unlock the fire alarm box, open the door and pull down the hook *as far as it will go*, then let go the hook. Stand by box to direct the firemen. Don't pull in an alarm for a fire seen at a distance or out of reach of the hydrant system, but notify some member of the department, who will give the proper alarm.

2 blows after fire alarm indicates fire all out.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT.

NEWMARKET, N. H., FEB. 15, 1915.

TO THE HONORABLE SCHOOL BOARD OF NEWMARKET :

Gentlemen : I have the honor to submit herewith my first annual report as superintendent of your schools

The schools opened in September with a membership of eighty more than the average enrollment for last year. This unexpected increase made it necessary to open another school in the South Side building and a new distribution of the grades in the other buildings. At present your grades are distributed as follows : at Durham Side, a grade I ; at the South Side a grade I, a grade II, a grade III and a grade VI ; at the stone building a grade IV and a grade V ; in the High School building, grades VII and VIII in one room. This arrangement seems to be entirely satisfactory, with the exception of the one room in the High School building. This school, containing the two upper grades and a membership of forty-three, is, because of the nature of the work required of these grades and because of the large attendance, a more difficult task than we ought to permanently impose upon one teacher.

This large influx at the beginning of the year, with the consequent shortage in the teaching force and equipment, made the administration of our schools a little difficult at the start, but I feel that the work was not long interrupted and is now progressing satisfactorily. Your village elementary schools now have an average membership of thirty-six pupils

and are, because of their size, as important as the average village or city schools throughout the state. These schools are entitled to be equipped in all respects as well as are the average village or city schools in this state, and we should expect equal results from them.

I do not wish to seem to speak disparagingly of the work of any of our teachers, for I feel that they are all doing conscientious, painstaking work and are getting good results, but I am strongly of the opinion that the time has passed when we can afford to pursue any other policy than of filling all future vacancies with tried and trained teachers. This policy would carry with it the necessity of paying such teachers a salary commensurate with their services. We can not expect to maintain the present efficiency with the salaries now paid.

I have found it necessary, because of the increase of the number of pupils and because of the general shortage in books and supplies, to make a greater outlay than will be necessary for a like period in the near future. I felt that it would be uneconomic and unjustifiable to cripple the work of the schools by the lack of books and supplies, which would cost but a small percent of the entire school outlay ; besides, the law requires the purchasing agent to procure suitable and sufficient books and supplies at the expense of the town.

Early this year I caused the Snellen's test for acuteness of vision to be given in the schools of this village ; the results indicated that of the two-hundred and eighty-two pupils subjected to this test two hundred and nine had eyes that were normal, thirty-six eyes slightly abnormal, and thirty-seven eyes with marked abnormalities. The parents of the pupils of this last class were notified of our findings and advised to consult a specialist. Although the results were not all that could be desired, I feel that we were in a measure rewarded for our efforts.

There are in our schools without doubt quite a large percent of our pupils whose work is to a greater or less extent retarded because of physical defects. The casual observer can not fail to notice evidences of adenoids, diseased tonsils, malnutrition, defective hearing and vision. Our teachers are instructed to be on the lookout for these defects. The admonition of the conscientious teacher who informs the parent of the child suffering from these physical defects is seldom heeded and less often followed. Doubtless if these warnings should come from a reputable physician, the parents would much more frequently follow the advice given and the children thereby would be much benefited. In consideration of these facts I wish to submit to you and the district for serious consideration the advisability of adopting the medical inspection act of 1913.

In closing I wish to express to the Board my appreciation of their confidence in giving me such a degree of authority in the administration of the school affairs, and my gratitude to the teachers for their hearty co-operation and loyalty.

PUBLIC LIBRARY.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES.

During this year 9,740 works of fiction have been borrowed from the Library by the reading public, 927 books of non-fiction. Of these many are used by the High School as works of reference, 79 being out at the present time. In addition to the regular work, the Librarian has compiled the Accession Book, in which is recorded the name, author, publisher, date of publication, when purchased, number of pages, size, price, style of binding, when rebound and any remarks that may pertain to the history of a book. As the number of volumes is now 6,900, this was no small task. We have been presented with 45 bound volumes of Harper's and Atlantic magazines by Mrs. Mary B. Morse of Haverhill, Mass., a native of Newmarket, and 20 volumes of Christian Science works, given under the conditions of the will of Mary Baker Eddy, also papers and pamphlets.

We are grateful to the Woman's Club for continuing their good work of subscribing for magazines for the reading room, and an equal amount of the money received from fines is devoted to the same cause.

Through the kindness of Mr. Gallant, a rack for the magazines will soon be placed in the reading room. A list of pedagogical works, requested by the Superintendent of Schools, has just been purchased and some French books ordered, and a part of the list has been received.
