



STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Seabrook qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:—

1.—To choose a Town Clerk, three Selectmen and Assessors, Town Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, three Constables, three Highway Agents, three members of the Overseers of the Poor, and all other necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

2.—To see what sum or sums of money the town will vote to raise for the repairs of highways, for the repairing and building of bridges, for the payment of the town debt and interest on the same, for the support of the town's poor, and all other necessary expenditures for the year ensuing.

3.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the suppression and extermination of the Gypsy and Brown Tail Moths.

4.—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of seventy-five dollars (\$75.00) the amount to be used in defraying the expenses of Memorial Day, to be paid to the Quartermaster of John A. Logan Post, No. 21, Dept. N. H. G. A. R.

5.—To see how the town will dispose of the income of Common Island, Dow Marsh and Bell Marsh for the ensuing year.

6.—To see what action the town will take in regard to the discount and interest of taxes on petition of Lemuel S. Beckman and others.

7.—To see what action the town will take in regard to the digging, selling and shipping of clams on request of Jeremiah Chase.

8.—To see what action the town will take in the matter of repairing the road from Charles R. Miller's to Charles E. Goves' on petition of Fred L. Weare and others.

9.—To see what action the town will take in regard to the purchase of fire chemicals on request of Emery N. Eaton.

10.—To transact all other business that may come legally before said meeting.

REPORT

There has not been much change in the organization of the schools this year. We have run the schools thirtyfive (35) weeks, and leave quite a balance in the treasury. Have received from trustees of the Dearborn Academy fund two hundred and fifty (250) dollars. They also furnish fuel, janitor and use of building free. At the present time none of the schools are overcrowded or very small, the largest having an enrollment of 42 pupils, the smallest 32 pupils. Schools have been well provided for with supplies and in most cases with books. A number of books are needed at the present time, and with the same appropriation as last year all can be provided for.

As a large percentage of the pupils reside in the south part of the town, it requires more money for transportation. When compared with the cost of maintaining another school, we find a balance of more than one hundred and fifty (150) dollars in the district treasury. Three school houses have been painted, a new flag staff put up at the Farm school house at a cost less than the amount appropriated for the same. New steps are needed at several of the school houses and if made of concrete, which would not cost very high, the school buildings could be kept in good repair for a number of years without any special appropriation.

The per cent. of attendance for the past year is .883, the previous year .835. Although higher this year, the per cent. is much too low. We have painstaking teachers and a better attendance of the pupils would add much to our schools.

From the school laws we find that "no child under 16 years of age can receive an employment certificate unless such child shall have completed the course of study prescribed for the elementary schools."
