11 To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Temple:

I herewith submit my first annual report as superintendent of your schools.

In taking charge of your schools I was impressed at the outset with the exceptional educational advantages which the children of Temple enjoy. Your splendid building, with its modern equipment, makes it possible through the consolidation of the rural schools to serve the very best educational interests of the boys and girls.

I consider also that you have been extremely fortunate in the choice of our teachers this year. In Miss Helen Melendy, the principal, you have a teacher who is thoroughly competent, well-trained, and who is able to teach the Junior High School subjects. Miss Alice Wheeler, likewise, although untrained, through conscientious effort and natural aptitude has made a success of her work in the primary grades.

I trust we shall be able to retain the services of both of these young women for the coming year.

Just now the shortage of teachers and the need for higher salaries is a most vital one. Many of our best teachers have left the profession during the past year to take up more lucrative work. Also because of the low salaries paid teachers in comparison with the wages received by girls in other occupations, fewer and fewer of the better type of girls are being attracted to our normal schools. We should have women of superior ability to teach our children. Therefore, let us support cheerfully the movement for higher salaries.

Following is a tabular statement of the enrollment by grades for the present year.

Miss Melendy's school has made a very good showing this year in attendance, the average percent being about 96. I feel that the citizens of Temple appreciate fully the value of regular and prompt attendance at school.

Changes in the program this year have been made with the view of preparing the children of the 7th and 8th grades so that they may enter, in full standing, the 9th grade of a high school organized on the six year plan. With a little more equipment being provided for the cooking and sewing work of the girls and some simple apparatus for the work in elementary science there is no reason why the work in the Junior High subjects should not meet the requirements set up by the State Department. Tools have been purchased this year for the carpenter work of the boys and at present they are planning, through the assistance of a carpenter to make their own work bench. I feel very strongly that the boys should have the assistance of a man with practical experience as a carpenter. The proper handling of tools, how to care for them, and how to sharpen them are lessons well worth learning by any boy. In some of the other towns in the district a carpenter is coming in once each week to work with the boys.

I see no reason why our school next year should not receive the approval of the State Board of Education for one year and possibly two of Junior High School work. This will mean a saving to the town in high school tuitions and the work should receive the support of all citizens.

For financial reasons it was considered necessary this year to dispense with the services of a music teacher.

I feel that this has been a distinct loss to the school and that next year graded work in music should be resumed. This will occasion no additional expense to the town because of the state aid received.

May I take this opportunity to discuss very briefly the new educational bill particularly in relation to its effect on the amount of money which it is necessary to raise in the support of schools. The law provides that any town which raises in support of its elementary schools a \$5.00 tax on every \$1000 of the ratable estate is entitled to state aid and that any deficiencies above this sum will be made up from the state fund. A glance at the budget in the School Board Report shows that the estimated amount required in support of the elementary schools is \$3,205. The estimate of a \$5.00 tax on the 1920 inventory is \$1600. Accordingly the amount of state aid will be approximately \$1600. It will be noted also that the expense of administration, the \$2.00 per capita tax for state wide supervision, and any other statutory requirements must be raised in addition to the \$5.00 tax. The expense for Medical Inspection, which is compulsory under the new law, comes out of the money raised by the \$5.00 tax.

All school children, unless objection is raised by individual parents, will be given a thorough physical examination, during the spring term. Notices of any defects will be sent the parents. Cooperation on the part of parents to make this work worth while and effective is earnestly desired.

In conclusion, I wish to express my appreciation of the friendly spirit of cooperation shown by the School Board, teachers, and citizens.
