





# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPT. OF SCHOOLS

To the Bennington School Board:

The final survey of last June showed the schools in the usual strong scholastic position. Miss Mabel Metze, holding the degrees of Bachelor of Arts from Bethany, W. Va. College, and Master of Arts from Boston University, with three years of previous experience, took over the work in the high school following the resignation of Miss Hazel Beard.

The increasing emphasis on nature study and elementary science for the purpose of motivating pupil thought, rather than training pupil memory, which has been

spreading rapidly in the elementary schools abroad and to a considerable extent in this country, is being recognized in Bennington annually to a greater degree.

The Board could consider re-organization of the school work to include greater percentage of pupil time devoted to observation and handling of material. This would result in lessened costs for formal education of the older type. The interest of the pupils in their environment is greatly stimulated, and the scholastic standing is as good as, if not much higher than the old type education can give.

An extension of the use of visual education material, and the presence of a radio in the school would enable still greater appreciation and understanding of the social sciences, and make available the rapidly increasing amount of educational and appreciative material offered by radio council in education and the Walter Damrosch music appreciation hours.

Educational emphasis on making full use of the talents of the individual pupils for the purpose of greater pupil interest in the continuation of education beyond the years in which school attendance is legally required, assists in decreasing the large number of children unable to secure work, who have entirely too much spare time at their disposal.

The condition of the building is, as always, excellent. The cooperation of the teachers is more than satisfactory. Definite lowered costs are entirely possible without in any way retarding the education of the children, or reducing the efficiency of the organization; and should the Board desire, detailed suggestions will be made.
