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Town Warrant

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Charlestown, in the County of Sullivan, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 9th day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ART. 1. To choose all necessary officers for the ensuing year.

ART. 2. To raise such sums of money as may be deemed necessary for the support of schools, for the maintenance of the poor, for laying out and repairing highways, building and repairing bridges, and for necessary charges arising within the town.

ART. 3. To see if the Town will vote to make a five per cent. discount on all taxes paid on or before July 15th, 1909.

ART. 4. To see if the Town will vote the use of the Town Hall to the different societies in said Town for expenses.

ART. 5. To see if the Town will vote to let the Selectmen deliver the inventory blanks at the time of making the inventory.

ART. 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money necessary to secure State aid for the permanent-improvement of highways, under the law passed at the January session, 1905.

ART. 7. To see if the Town will vote to provide a suitable place for the Fire Department and their equipment, and appropriate money for the same.

ART. 8. To hear the report of the Selectmen in regard to sale of Stone Mill, and take any action in relation thereto.

ART. 9. To see if the Town will vote to license a junk dealer.

ART. 10. To see if the Town will vote to accept \$100 each in trust from Sylvester S. Crosby and the estate of Susan Ellenwood, and \$250 from the estate of Helen M. Robertson, for care of lots in Forest Hill Cemetery.

ART. 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell a piece of land formerly occupied by School House in District No. 5.

ART. 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for a Soldiers' Monument.

ART. 13. To see if the Town will vote to publish the invoice and tax list as a part of the town report, or take any action relating thereto.

ART. 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

By agreement between Town Officers the business of the day will be taken up at eleven o'clock A. M., and the polls will be closed at three o'clock P. M., if no objection is made.

The following report for the library year ending Feb. 1, 1909, is respectfully submitted:

Nine thousand two hundred and eighty-two books have been loaned, an average of 92 books per day for the 100 library days; 81 new cards have been issued, making 1527 the whole number.

The chief events that have come to our observation during the past year have been a severe epidemic of whooping cough, imported from Claremont unwittingly, and gaining an entrance into the South Charlestown school before anyone knew what was happening. And thus the entire school was exposed and soon the village school was in the same predicament, until it seemed as though all the children were whooping. Quarantine was out of the question, but a few instances of laxity on the part of parents in allowing their children to go through all the unsightly contortion of a full blown spasm of whooping on the public streets and in public places are memories that will remain with the villagers for a good while to come.

Moral—Keep these little children away from public places, even if not quarantined. One death in an infant five weeks old resulted from this epidemic.

SMALL POX

On the 16th of April, 1908, a beautiful case of this much dreaded disease appeared in the family of William S. Morrill, one mile north of the village. In some way, unknown, he contracted the disease while at his usual work as railway mail clerk.

And the situation is not exaggerated when your Secretary admits that the first few nights after a diagnosis was fully established, were sleepless ones for him. Vaccination, to those who had in any degree been exposed, was immediately performed. The strictest quarantine was enforced.

And fortune favored us. Only one case of varioloid, and that in the same family, resulted. When we think of the dreadful epidemic that recently occurred at Brattleboro, Vt., and the loss to the town in a business way, and the ridicule that was heaped upon some of its leading men, whether justly or otherwise, we feel very thankful that we escaped so easily; and, although the expense of this case was considerable, it was as nothing compared to that of Brattleboro, and small as compared to a case at Bellows Falls, Vt.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

The School Board of the School District of the Town of Charlestown,

Gentlemen: I hereby present to you my fourth annual report, being fifth in a series of such reports.

IN GENERAL

Progress is the watchword of the age. In every department of life men are seeking to make things better than their fathers knew them. In all the pursuits of business and the various occupations there is continual advance and every step upward is made a vantage ground that further advancement may be made.

The uplift is not only along material and intellectual lines but is felt as strongly in the moral life of the nation. The future will witness cleaner methods in politics, a greater degree of honesty in buisness and public life and a keener sense of honor in the discharge of a public trust.

This is no dream for we begin to see the beginning of the reality. A few of the signs of the times are the recent action for independence on the part of the Balkan states, the awakening of China, Russia, and Turkey, the rapid strides for a larger national life made by Japan, the New Idea in political life in our own country, the wave of temperance that is sweeping over America and stirring Great Britain, the most intemperate countries in the world.

Noting these events of current history and others too numerous to mention, one need not be an optimist to see that the world is moving onward. These considerations emphasizes the obligation ever resting on the schools to prepare the children of to-day to act well their part in the Republic as the citizens of to-morrow, to enter the activ-

ities of life in the altruistic spirit with an honest endeavor to make their generation better than the preceding.

In order that the schools may fulfill this high mission they, like other line of work must make continual advancement materially, intellectually and morally. It is always perilous to repose on the achievements and laurels or the conditions of the past, however satisfactory they may seem as we look back on them. It is not true that what was good enough for our fathers is good enough for us. This idea sometimes obtains in school matters, but nowhere else; if it should obtain everywhere all improvement would be out of the question.

When the schools opened at Charlestown in September we found to our surprise that in the primary room there was an attendance of forty-seven pupils. Thirty pupils in a primary room is considered the maximum number for effective work. The State Superintendent of Public Instruction, in a recent utterance, has made the emphatic statement, "No teacher in grades I and II

should ever be assigned more than thirty pupils. It may be possible to keep more than that number in order; it is doubtful if it is ever possible to TEACH more. In grades above the II it is far better to keep the number down to a maximum of thirty pupils per teacher."

In the above statement it is assumed that there is but one grade in a room. But when the situation is that of three grades and forty-seven pupils in one room it is clear that something must be done for relief. The matter was under consideration for some time, and the ground was gone over again and again to devise the best means possible with no extra room and no extra appropriation, for relieving the situation. It was certain that the school year would be a failure for all the pupils under present condi-The problem was to reduce the number that would be in the room at the same time. The following plan was finally settled on as the only one feasible under the circumstances: grades I and II be dismissed at the middle of each session, leaving only grade III in the room to receive the undivided attention of the teacher. things as nearly as could be for the other grades, grade III was required to come in not till the middle of the afternoon session. This arrangement seems to favor grade III, who are in school three of the full half sessions, having the whole time of the teacher during two of the half sessions and their full share during the early morning half session. Grade II loses more than any other for the reason that by the old arrangement this grade shared the periods after each recess with the third grade. But under the faithful work of their teacher they are not falling behind and the whole school is keeping up to grade. It is to be kept in mind that in the case of young pupils, it is not the number of hours they are in the school room that counts, but rather the amount of time they are actively at work, and children from six to nine years of age can do all the mental work they ought to do in a comparatively short time.

I have spent considerable space in the explanation of this matter because I think it has been misunderstood by some, and I think it is a rule that when people understand a matter and the reason for certain measures, they may generally be trusted to do the sensible thing.

TEACHERS

Charlestown is still fortunate in it's teachers. I do not refer only to those who have given the community a long term of service and in the principal village of the town, but also those in smaller and more remote schools. Charlestown has within its borders some teaching not excelled in the state.

Miss Bertha Holden's place was filled without delay, fortunately, by Mr. Harlan R. Goodwin. The vacancy caused by the resignation of Mrs. Child was filled by one who had already served an apprenticeship in town, so that the new teachers are Mr. Goodwin, Miss Barnard and Miss Lord.

A town is fortunate that can secure good teachers and retain their services year after year.

Parents of Charlestown, after yourselves, no one will influence your boy or your girl like their teacher. For this reason be sure to become acquainted with her, visit the school room often, try to get into sympathy with her, try to see things from her view point, especially the things that affect your child. Talk her UP, not DOWN in your home. She is human and will make mistakes and reveal faults of character and as teacher, but as you love your

child and desire his welfare in school and in life, dont criticise his teacher in his hearing. FOR THE SAKE OF YOUR CHILD stand by the teacher. But to adjust misunderstandings go privately to her in a frank and friendly spirit, and ten to one all troubles will disappear. If all would do this we would soon have ideal conditions in our schools.

CONCLUSION

In general the school work of the town has been very prosperous and successful during the year. The setbacks that come on account of sickness are unavoidable. The teachers are doing their utmost to prevent or counteract such tendencies as work against the high aim of the schools.

Charlestown is to be commended for the intelligence it shows in the support of its schools. Their reward will return to them in an intelligent and virtuous citizenship in the future.

The Superintendent has been aided in his work by an harmonious and cordial cooperation on the part of the teachers and supervisors as well as the strong support of the School Board and citizens. For this he wishes to put on record this word of appreciation.

Report of School Board

Good work has been done in all the schools the past year. The work as planned by the Superintendant has been well carried out by the efficient corps of teachers.

It is probable that never before were the schools as well graded as now, or the pupils in general as nearly on a par with pupils in near by larger towns in which the pupils are supposed to enjoy greater advantages. The advantage gained by expert supervision of schools was never more clearly shown than now.

The increased sum raised the past year for school purposes has been utilized by lengthening the school year.

The re-populating of farms in the eastern part of the town. which has been steadily going on, has resulted in a marked increase in the number of children to be transported to school, increasing the transportation account considerably. This matter has reached a point where it seems good economy to re-establish a school to accommodate the pupils in the Hemlock and South Hemlock districts.

It is probable that the money now spent in transportion from those districts would maintain a good school in the district.

The South Charlestown school building has been the object of special investigation the past year, with a view to improving its sanitary condition.

This is a problem that must be solved very soon.

The increased attendance at the village schools this year has overtaxed the accommodations, so that it has been necessary to make special hours of attendance for certain grades.

Should this continue the necessary thing to do will be to provide extra school rooms and extra teachers. The enlargement of the present school buildings therefore becomes plainly a problem for the near future.

SCHOOL BOARD.

Report of Supervisor of Music

To the Superintendent of Schools:

In our work we have made an especial effort to interest the little ones in music, to teach them to enjoy the singing, believing that much depends on the way they are started.

To this end personal work has been done with those who were found unable to sing a single tone on entering school. We have had, and have now, pupils in fourth and fifth grades who are very strong singers and who were during their first year of school, supposed to be hopelessly unmusical, and if great care and patience had not been exercised, would have been left outside the limits of song during their entire life.

In the higher grades of the primary room keys are studied from chart and numbers are written. In the intermediate grades books and sheet music are studied, thereby adding the new difficulty of keeping their place. In the grammar and high schools three and four part music is attempted. We believe that the influence of our subject is growing.

By the faithful cooperation of the teachers several instances of new interest has been manifested during the present year.

Let it be remembered that sight singing (music reading) is an exact science, not guesswork, which may be mastered by those who have the average amount of intellegence coupled with a willingness to work, provided they start early in life.

The State course of instruction in drawing has been followed during the past year more fully as we are getting more nearly up to grade in our work begun three years ago. No one doubts the invaluable possession through life of the ability to sketch truthfully and rapidly with pencil, and that is our most inportant aim in teaching drawing as a part of the regular school work. The use of colors is also being taught and its application in form and design is most important in the training of a child's good taste, both in his own work and in his appreciation of the work of others.

Courses of drawing as a part of our public school work are no longer experimental but are recognized all over the world as of vital importance in the development of every child. An evidence of this was the convention of several thousand art instructors in London during the past summer, where men and women came from all over the world to discuss their work, to compare and exhibit their results and to listen to the most prominent art educators of the present day. America was well represented and her exhibits greatly admired,

May the coming year show continuous improvement in our work and the same hearty cooperation of teachers and children.
