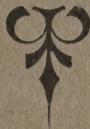

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L. S.]

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Deerfield in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Deerfield on Tuesday, the Fourteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see if the town will vote to except State Aid maintenance and raise and appropriate money for the same.
4. To see if the town will vote to except State Aid for town construction of highways and raise and appropriate money for the same.
5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars for the control of the White Pine Blister Rust.
6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to pay on the Amoskeag Nat'l Bank notes owed by the town.
7. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to hire money on anticipation of taxes.

8. To see what action the town will vote to take regarding the price paid for labor on town work.

9. To see if the town will vote to give a discount on taxes paid before certain dates and fix said dates and discounts if so voted.

10. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the highway leading from the corner near the Joseph H. Thompson place, so called, to the road leading to the W. D. Adams Est.

11. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the highway leading from the Perkins place, so called, to the four corners on the Northwood road.

12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to shingle the town hall.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Memorial Day.

14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to pay the note and amount owed on the hose for the Deerfield Voluntary Fire Department.

15. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax collectors deeds.

16. To see if the town will rescind its former action taken at the town meeting in March, 1932, when it was voted to take no further action in the matter of its Bill in Equity brought against Edith A. Harvey, of Deerfield, and to pass any vote in relation thereto.

17. To see if the town will authorize its Selectmen to engage counsel and take such action as they, the Selectmen, may deem necessary in the prosecution of its Bill in Equity brought to permanently restrain Edith A. Harvey, of Deerfield, from interfering with the flow of the surface water from the culverts on Rand Hill into and upon her pasture, and to pass any vote in relation thereto.

18. To see if the town will vote to except the Cemetery Trust Fund presented by the Mary H. Batchelder Estate.

19. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Deerfield:

Herein is submitted my fourth annual report. Attention is called to present school organization, suggested reorganization, per pupil costs, and reduced high school tuition.

PRESENT ORGANIZATION

In three of your four schools teacher changes occurred in September.

At the close of the school year in June, 1932, Miss Bellows and Miss Gatti, teachers in the Parade and Pond schools respectively, withdrew to accept teaching positions in Auburn.

Serious consideration was given to closing the West School in which Mrs. McKinley had given long and faithful services. At a public hearing, conducted later in the summer both parents and School Board agreed that no worthwhile economy would be gained by consolidation, particularly in the winter months. Hence it was voted by the Board to continue the West School another year. Miss Hattie E. Merrill, a resident of Deerfield and a teacher of extensive and successful experience, was elected teacher.

Mrs. Nancy T. Stevens was elected to the Parade School. Mrs. Stevens brings to her work in Deerfield special training and successful experience in the schools of New Hampshire and Massachusetts.

The vacancy in the Pond School was filled by the election of Miss Kathryn T. Reynolds of Manchester. Miss Reynolds was graduated from Plymouth Normal School in 1929 and has been a successful teacher in the Pittsfield schools since the completion of her training.

You are fortunate in the retention of Mrs. Robinson as teacher at the Center which continues to be the largest school in town.

SUGGESTED REORGANIZATION

When a one-room school of all eight grades exceeds an enrollment of thirty pupils its efficiency is hampered by numbers. The Center School has reached or exceeded this enrollment for the last two years; while the Parade School is approaching this number.

If, as seems possible, by diverting and combining certain transportation routes, the present cost of conveying pupils can be maintained without increase, several advantages of a two-room graded school may be provided Deerfield children by assigning the four primary grades either to the Center or to the Parade School, while the two intermediate and two grammar grades would be assigned to the other school. For a number of years in the town of Chester such an organization has been maintained to advantage in separate buildings.

PER PUPIL COSTS

For the school year closing last June the per pupil cost in Deerfield schools was reduced below that of the previous year by more than five dollars, and was slightly lower than the medium cost per pupil for all public elementary schools of the state.

Following are the elementary school enrollments, numbers transported, and costs per pupil for the last three years.

Of the pupils regularly transported more than one-third live within the legal walking distance of school. Through

the generosity of the transportation drivers these children are conveyed without additional expense to the district. At the same time the number legally entitled to transportation is large when compared with the membership of the schools. The scattered location of transported pupils has also necessitated a large number of routes. Hence, while the prices paid on the individual routes are not high, the total cost of transportation has been the chief factor in raising Deerfield's average cost per pupil above the median cost in the state.

REDUCED HIGH SCHOOL TUITION

The number of Deerfield pupils attending high schools and academies has slightly decreased, also the cost of tuition is much below that of last year. This accounts in large part for the budget statement of an estimated balance in the treasury of \$500. next June.

Following are the per pupil costs of high school and academy tuition for the past five years. While these figures represent the maximum of district liability, such schools as Pembroke and Coe's Academy voluntarily made a lower charge for tuition.

In one high school Deerfield is now paying a tuition less than \$89.79.

IN CONCLUSION

I wish you to know that the steadfast purpose of the School Board and other citizens to maintain unimpaired the standards of Deerfield's schools has been an inspiration to your Superintendent and teachers.

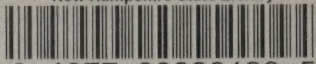
