TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hinsdale qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall on Tuesday the 11th of March, 1969 at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To cast your ballots for all necessary Town Officers.

Article 2. To see if the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the revised laws relative to playing games of beano shall be adopted in this town.

Polls open on the above articles at 10 A.M. and shall not be closed earlier than 7:15 P.M.

Action to be taken on the following articles beginning at 7:30 P.M.

- Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept and adopt the report of the Selectmen, Auditors and other Town Officers.
- Article 4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the payment of ordinary town charges for the maintenance of the fire department, highways, and for all other necessary expenses arising with the Town. (See Budget.)
- Article 5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum or sums, in anticipation of collection of taxes for the current municipal year and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town negotiable notes therefor, said notes to be repaid during the current municipal year from taxes collected within the current municipal year.
- Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$620.14 to which the State will contribute \$4,134.25 to be expanded on Class IV and Class V road construction.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate an additional \$5,200.00 to be paid in 1969 to Bernard Sanderson, Collector of Garbage and Rubbish, or act in any manner thereon.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to remove the office of Road Agent from the non-partisan ballot now used at Town Meeting for the election of town officers and to authorize the Selectmen to hire a competent person under their supervision to be in charge of highway and sidewalk maintenance, snow removal and any other work that comes under the jurisdiction of the Selectmen, or act in any manner thereon.

Inserted by Petition

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the purchase of a Tone-Alert monitor system for the Fire Department, total cost of such a system to be approximately \$5,000.00 with the Fire Department "Hall" Fund contributing the balance of this cost, or act in any manner thereon.

Inserted by Petition

Article 10. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$650.00 (Six-hundred fifty dollars) to support the services of the Community Mental Health Clinic of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service, said services operating under the provisions of the Community Mental Health Services Act of New Hampshire, with State Grant-in-Aid. Local request for financial support is based on a .30 per capita formula, or act in any manner thereon.

Inserted by Petition

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,800.00 (Eighteen hundred dollars) to rebuild and black top .25 (¼) mile of Old Stage Road beginning at Prospect Street and continuing toward River Street, or act in any manner thereon.

Inserted by Petition

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Town Ordinance: That all dogs be restrained for the full year, instead of January to September and that the Selectmen through the Police Department see that this is enforced.

Inserted by Petition

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to deed the land known as the Hinsdale Playground to the Hinsdale School District with the understanding that the School District will maintain a supervised summer program, and if these terms are not fulfilled, the land will revert back to the Town, or act in any manner thereon.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to appoint a Committee to see that the present wading pool is repaired for 1969 use and said Committee to submit plans for a swimming pool for the Town of Hinsdale to be acted on at the next annual meeting and to raise and appropriate \$1,500.00 (Fifteen-hundred dollars) for the use of this Committee, or act in any manner thereon.

Inserted by Petition

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,500.00 (Fifteen-hundred dollars) for a new police cruiser, or act in any manner thereon.

Article 16. To see if the Town is interested in having the Selectmen appoint three men to act as a Board of Listers and Assessors and raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 (Twelve-hundred dollars) to pay for their services, or act in any manner thereon.

Article 17. To see if the Town will establish and maintain a sidewalk between Brattleboro Road and Prospect Street, along Playground Road and raise and appropriate \$2,200.00 (Twenty-two hundred dollars) to do this job, or act in any manner thereon. Inserted by petition.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to allow a 3% discount for the first 30 days after tax bill is mailed and a subsequent 2% discount for the next 30 days on payment of taxes, or act in any manner thereon.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to confirm and authorize the authority of the Selectmen to sell any property which the Town has acquired through tax sale and by tax collector's deed to the Town, or act in any manner thereon.

Article 20. To see if the Town will discharge the parking committee as requested in the letter as follows: The undersigned, having been appointed as a Parking Lot Committee, and having made as thorough an

investigation as possible of various parking areas in Town, and which was submitted by the Committee at the last Town Meeting, and voted down by the Town, feels that they have accomplished what was required of them, and by this Article wishes to be discharged.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to supplement Article 24 voted March 1968 in regard to the Trailer Ordinance with the following: Lots outside of trailer parks should be 10,000 square feet and the established fee for a permit to be \$10.00 and include a fine of \$10.00 for failure to obtain this permit, or act in any manner thereon.

Article 22. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to use the surplus of the bridge fund appropriation for TRA and to apply the money as it is received from the State in TRA funds, to pay off the bridge loan, or act in any manner thereon.

Article 23. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

The circulation for 1968 is the largest the library has ever had and this is a great satisfaction to the librarian as it means that the townspeople are really using their library and availing themselves of the fine facilities it has to offer. Each year more educational material is being used and by both adults and students. Sixty-two new readers have registered since September, 1968.

We are most grateful for the state grant of \$100.00 which we have received for the last three years. This money is used to purchase reference books that the library needs and also to buy new editions of obsolete reference material already owned. New books are purchased monthly and many children's books are bought and put into circulation during Library Week and Book Week.

A section of shelves has been allocated for the young adult readers. Library space is hard to find each evening as students spend hours doing research for their numerous assignments. They are, for the most part, very well behaved and the librarian has had few disciplinary problems. During the summer books were sent to the bindery, non-fiction shelves were put in order, the entire collection was weeded and many worn and soiled fiction and obsolete non-fiction books were discarded. Some of these books were put on sale and approximately \$10.00 was realized.

The library has purchased a new typewriter and has plans for a "return-a-book" slot to be put in for the convenience of our readers. This will help solve the problem for people who cannot get to the library during its open hours. We also hope to have railings installed for the safety of our patrons.

We have borrowed books from the Brooks Memorial Library in Brattleboro during the year and the State Library in Concord has been a valuable source of information and material.

The librarian wishes to thank the people who have so kindly given books, magazines and papers to the library. She also wishes to express her appreciation to her trustees for their cooperation and support during the past year.

As your librarian, I extend a cordial invitation to visit the library during 1969 and discover what it can offer you.

HINSDALE PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING ASSOCIATION

The following is the report of the activities of the Service from January 1, 1968 to December 31, 1968.

Home and Office visits—852 School children attended—721

The Nursing Association was separated from the Town on January 1, 1968 and is now functioning as a unit by itself.

Meetings have been held during the year in the Nurse's office at the Elementary School. Four times during the year, representatives of Medicare in Concord met with the Association members to discuss matters pertinent to Medicare and to recertify the Association as a participating member of the Medicare Program.

The new car purchased by the Town for the Association was delivered and put into service in May.

In February, a Medicare meeting in Concord was attended by three members and the nurse.

In October, the nurse attended the School Nurses meeting in Manchester.

During the year, physical examinations were done by Dr. John Houpis, school doctor, and the nurse. 308 examinations were done.

A total of 905 visions examinations were done during this year and hearing testing was done on 628 pupils.

In November, an immunizations clinic for preschool and grades one and two was held at the school. The following immunizations were done: Polio—86; diphtheria-tetanus—57; diphtheria-tetanus-whooping cough—14; small-pox—16. This was done through the N. H. State Public Health Department, with Dr. Houpis the attending physician.

In December, a Lazy Eye (Amblyopia) clinic was held for preschool children, conducted by the N. H. State Sight Conservation Program. At the clinic there were 72 children examined.

In March, a Tuberculosis skin testing program was offered to children in the first grade. This is called Operation First Grade and is done through the N. H. State Communicable Disease Program. There were 53 children tested and all showed negative results.

The nurse participated in the Head Start Program at the Elementary School during July and August. This consisted of daily visits to the Center, vision and hearing screening on the children, and assisting the doctor with physical examinations and immunizations.

I wish to thank the members of the Association and all others who have helped with clinics and activities during the year.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN & DISTRICT CHIEF

People cause fires. Our records show that the number of fires increase in an area as the population increases and our state is growing tremendously. This means that we all must be aware of fire causes and do our best to prevent their occurrence.

When we are very young the lighted matches is an adventure, burnt fingers and a dropped match is another fire. A little older we like to have a woodland cookout, or go out by ourselves for a smoke but fire and forests get together for another statistic. We adults like to clean up in the spring, burn the old debris and the dead grass, result - escaped fires and much personal expense.

With new homes and summer cottages located in woodlands and with abandoned fields and forests crowding the back yard of our villeges' streets, it is necessary that everyone be aware all through the fire season, which comes with the disappearance of the snow, of the need to be careful with outdoor fires and fire sources.

The following action will help:

- 1. To teach our children the danger of lighted matches.
- 2. To never discard lighted smoking material from a car or while walking through fields or woods.
- 3. To safely dispose of rubbish preferably at the town dump. If you must burn -
- a. You need a written permit from the town fire warden for all debris burning except when the ground is covered with snow. Cooking fires in outdoor fireplaces or in charcoal brasiers in your own back yard is permitted on notification of the warden.
- b. The warden is forbidden by regulation to allow burning of household rubbish on grass by householders between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M.

- c. Have equipment on hand to control the fire before you light the match.
- 4. Promptly report any fire out of control to your fire warden or fire department.

Help to keep out town out of the fire occurrence column and save your tax dollars for useful purposes.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS February 24, 1969

Board of Selectmen Hinsdale, New Hampshire

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Hinsdale for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1968, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

One of the enclosed audits must be given the Town Clerk as part of the permanent records.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Water and Sewer Departments, Library, Trustees of Trust Funds, Municipal Court, Cemetery Lot Fund and Hinsdale Playground Committee.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: December 31, 1967 and December 31, 1968: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets, as of December 31, 1967 and December 31, 1968, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated, therein, the Net Debt of the Town decreased by \$23,655.48, from \$170,827.95 to \$147,172.47, in 1968.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

GENERAL COMMENTS & RECOMMENDATIONS

Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) decreased by \$11,844.52, from \$34,672.05 to \$22,827.53 in 1968, as shown herewith:

Municipal Court:

Attention is again directed to the provisions of Chapter 331, Section 502-A:9 of the Laws of 1963, relative to the disposition of fines paid into the Municipal Court, which require as follows:

450

"502-A:9 Payments. Payments to cities and towns shall be made monthly on or before the fifth day of each month, and shall cover the net receipts as aforesaid of said court for the month preceding, with a detailed statement of the amount date, and from whom all money has been received"

It is again noted that the requirements of this statute were not compiled with.

Furthermore, the records of receipts maintained by the Court were incomplete, inasmuch as bail funds received during the year were neither entered in the Docket Book, nor identified when deposited into the Court's checking account. We are therefore unable to express our opinion as to the accuracy of bail receipts of the Court as stated in Exhibit H. Also, several complaints were missing, although the fines assessed were recorded and accounted for.

It is again recommended that all receipts and expenditures, except small claim funds, be recorded in the Docket Book and classified in the appropriate columns provided therein.

We also recommend that bank deposits of all receipts be made weekly.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 & A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1968 are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$16,354.72, less a revenue surplus of \$9,646.37, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$6,708.35.

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1968, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1968, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

Water Department: (Exhibit E-1, E-2 & E-3)

Statements showing the financial condition of the Water Department as of December 31, 1968, and the results of operations for the fiscal year then ended, are presented in Exhibits E-1, E-2 and E-3. As indicated in Exhibit E-3, the Water Department operations resulted in a net loss of \$4,415.14 for the year, exclusive of interest expense charges of \$4,661.25 which were paid by Town general funds.

Sewer Department: (Exhibit F)

A statement of the financial activity of the Sewer Department is contained in Exhibit F.

Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Exhibit L)

A statement of the outstanding long term indebtedness of the Town, as of December 31, 1968, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit L.

Water Department:

As indicated in Exhibit E-1, the Water Department records reflect an accumulated deficit of \$124,135.58, as of December 31, 1968. This deficit, resulting from losses on operations incurred over a number of years, does not include interest expense requirements on the long term debt of the Water Works, which are currently appropriated and paid through the Town general funds.

Total operating losses of \$39,884.35, exclusive of interest charges, have been incurred for the fiscal years ended December 31, 1960 through December 31, 1968, as detailed below:

The above statistics indicate quite conclusively that the revenues of the department are insufficient to meet operating expenses.

We also observed the following deficient accounting procedures and practices during the course of our examination of the Water Department records.

1) Collections of water rents are accepted by the several commissioners in the water department office, as well as at other outside locations. Determination of responsibility for errors in accounting for receipts under these condtions is made extremely difficult.

- 2) The signatures of different commissioners are affixed as "Treasurer" to the checks issued in payment of department obligation. This procedure is inconsistent with accepted business methods because it makes the assignment of responsibility for custody of departmental funds, which should be on deposit in the bank account, highly debatable.
- 3) Cash receipts journals and/or daily receipts registers were inaccurate since the toal receipts recorded therein did not agree with total bank deposits made during the year 1968.
- 4) Cash receipts are deposited at irregular intervals, usually once a month. As a result, a substantial amount of cash remains on hand at all times. This procedure is inconsistent with sould management practices since it unnecessarily exposes funds so retained to possible loss through theft, burglary or other casualties.
- 5) The use of columnar journals for recording and controlling accounts receivable detail accounts, a system which was adopted during the fiscal year 1967, is not adequate because these records do not indicate at all times the outstanding amounts owing from individual customers.

In addition, the system is not flexible and does not permit an orderly method for processing the many additions and removals which occur in the accounts.

Furthermore, because the detail accounts do not reflect balances due at any given date, it is virtually impossible to reconcile the subsidiary accounts receivable ledgers with the related accounts receivable control account maintained in the general ledger on a monthly basis, in accordance with the requirements of accepted accounting procedures. Errors occuring in the accounts may therefore remain undetected and serious losses of revenues are possible.

Because of the condition of the accounts receivable records, we are unable to express an opinion as to the stated amount of Accounts Receivable indicated in Exhibit E-1.

As a result of the above findings, we offer the following recommendations:

1-It is again suggested that the Water Commissioners undertake a review of the operations and revenue structure of the water department. Water rental rates for all users, including the Town and other municipal

users, should be adjusted, if necessary, so as to provide adequate funds needed to defray all costs of operations, including interest on the long term debt of the department.

2-Also, the commissioners should select a treasurer and assign the person chosen the duties usually delegated to that office.

3-In order that responsibility for the collection of water rents may be assigned to a single individual, it is further recommended that the position of Water Rents Collector be established and that henceforth, all payments of water rents be made to that person.

4-Collections of water rents and other receipts should be deposited to the credit of water department in the bank checking account on a regular weekly basis.

5-The adoption of individual accounts receivable records, billing procedures, and cash receipts journals normally associated with utility operations is strongly recommended. Detail accounts receivable ledgers should be reconciled with the general ledger control account every month. Discrepancies between the accounts, if any, should be traced and corrected promptly.

Hinsdale Playground Committee:

We recommend the use of columnar journals with appropriate headings for classification of receipts and expenditures be adopted to record the cash transactions of the Hinsdale Playground Committee.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184, of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Hinsdale for their assistance during the course of the audit.

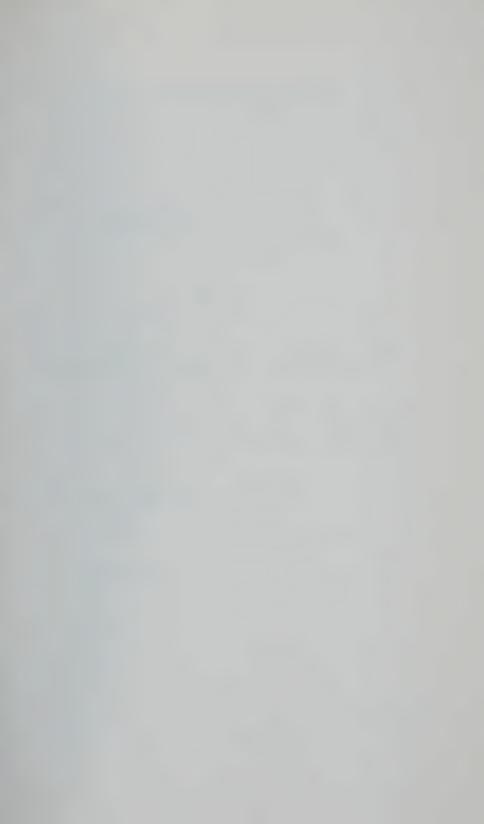

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Hinsdale qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Hinsdale High School in said district on the fourteenth day of March, 1969, at 8:00 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
- 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district.
- 9. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants or other funds for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire.

- 10. To see if the school district will vote to hereafter use a check list for the election of its officers, beginning with the 1970 annual school district meeting, and will adopt as its school check list the Town check list, as provided in RSA 197:12a, as inserted by Laws of 1957, Chapter 57.
- 11. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) for the purpose of authorizing the School Board to secure the services of an architect in order to provide preliminary plans and cost estimates for erecting additions to the present high school and elementary school buildings, and for reconstructing or altering the present school buildings, or take any action thereon.
- 12. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the purpose of erecting additions to the present high school and elementary school buildings, and for reconstructing or altering the present school buildings for the same purposes, and for the further purpose of furnishing the same with equipment of a lasting character; and in order to provide funds for such purposes, to authorize the School Board to issue and sell notes or bonds in the name of and on the credit of the district under and in accordance with the Municipal Finance Act and any amendments thereto; and to delegate to the School Board authority to fix the date, maturities, denominations, the interest rate, or discount rate in the case of notes. and to provide for the sale thereof, and to take such other action in respect thereto as may be necessary or advisable, all in accordance with the laws of the State of New Hampshire.
- 13. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to execute any and all contracts or agreements necessary or advisable in connection with the construction of additions to the present high school and elementary school buildings, and for reconstructing or altering the present school buildings and in connection with furnishing the same with equipment of a lasting character, or take any action thereon.

- 14. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the purpose of paying the principal and interest during the 1969-70 fiscal year of the district on notes or bonds issued for the purpose of providing funds to construct an addition to the present high school and elementary school buildings, and to reconstruct or alter such present school buildings, and to furnish the same with equipment of a lasting character, or take any action thereon.
- 15. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

The following is the annual report of the Hinsdale Elementary School.

ENROLLMENT

Opening day enrollment at the elementary school in September of this school year was 489, an increase of 44 children over the previous year's figure. It should be noted that on October 22, this enrollment had increased to 493 and as of the date of this report is at 479. Our net gain is represented by a figure between 34 and 48. Generally speaking, the additional enrollment is equivalent to slightly more than one full class load. This enrollment growth corresponds closely with the growth experienced last school year.

Kindergarten class size continues to far exceed the recommended 20 per session and class size in grades 4 and 6 are higher than suggested. Mention should be made of the fact that all available teaching space is now being utilized at the elementary school and it will not be possible to expand the teaching staff next fall thus undoubtedly resulting in large classes in either grades 4 and 6 or in grades 5 and 6 depending on the assignment of the existing staff.

PERSONNEL

Mrs. Ellen Brouillette, a graduate of Keene State College, joined our staff in 1968 as our special education teacher.

Mrs. Gretchen Judd, a 1968 graduate of Keene State College, who did her student teaching under Mrs. Hildreth last year, became a teacher in Grade 3 this fall.

Miss Carolyn Trotter, a graduate of Concordia Teacher's College, joined us as a teacher in Grade 5 at the start of the school year.

Mr. Wayne Miller who graduated from Nichols College and also attended Southern Connecticut State College became a 5th grade teacher filling the opening created by the beginning of a third section on that level.

CURRICULUM

In order to better utilize the results from our school-wide testing, all achievement and intelligence testing was completed at the beginning of the school year thus making it possible for teachers to use the information gained as to strengths or weaknesses in individuals or entire classes as they plan and direct class learning activities during the year.

In the area of reading we have added extensively to our basic reading program published by Scott Foresman. The Open Highways and Wide Horizon materials have extended the breadth of our offerings and have made it possible to adjust materials more closely to the needs of our children.

In Language Arts we began in Grade 3 the linguistic approach to the teaching of English. The Roberts English series will be added to an additional grade each year until all grade levels are involved.

Both of these changes have been made in conjunction with our high school in an effort to coordinate the curriculum of the two schools. Thus, programs started in the elementary school may be continued into the high school for added effectiveness.

I take this opportunity to express my sincere thanks to the entire staff for their cooperation and dedicated work in behalf of boys and girls. It continues to be a pleasure working with the staff, parents and townspeople in the cause of better educational opportunities for the children in the Hinsdale School District.

REPORT OF THE HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

To the Superintendent:

I am pleased to present to you this Annual Report of Hinsdale High School for the past Carendar Year.

GRADUATES

Our 1968 graduating class totaled thirty-six students. Specifically, the following people received their Diplomas.

We are proud to state that one member of this class, Miss Ilene Gormly, was a National Merit finalist, an achievement earned by very few of New Hampshires 1968 High School Graduates.

Statistically speaking, thirty-nine percent of this graduating class are now attending post-secondary educational institutions. Twenty-two percent are attending four year Colleges and seventeen percent are attending two year Schools.

At the Start of our present School year our enrollment was as follows:

The estimated enrollment for the Academic year 1969-70 is three hundred forty seven. The enrollment at the High School will continue to present space problems especially in the Cafeteria, Library, Science and Practical Arts areas.

CORRICULUM

We are presently in the process of up-grading our non-academic curriculum. In the English area we have introduced in grades seven through nine, a new linguistic series for the non-academic students. The English department and the Administration has found this linguistic approach very practical for the student whose education will possible be terminal at the twelfth grade. We have also correlated the Elementary and High School Language Arts programs. We feel this will make the transition from the grade school to the Jr. High School a smoother process for the Elementary School student.

In the Science area, we have now incorporated our Science Pilot program into the ninth grade. This now gives us a complete Science sequence in grades seven, eight, and nine. We are very enthusiastic about this program and the results it has achieved.

STAFF

Again this year our teacher turn-over was small. New staff members for the School Year 1968-69 totaled three.

Mrs. Maureen Korradi replaced our French teacher, Miss Jeanette St. Germain for the first half-year. Mrs. Korradi was in turn replaced by Miss Mary Beth, a graduate of MacMurray College in Jacksonville, Illinois.

Mr. Allan Rogers left our History department and was replaced by Miss Nancy Simons who is a University of New Hampshire graduate.

SUPERINTENDENTS' REPORT

No effort will be made here to recount everything that has happened during the past year. By attempting to provide a brief and general resume of some highlights of the previous year, it is hoped that this will be of general interest, but if not, at least the reader's patience may not be unduly strained.

In the time since the last annual report, the energies of many people were expended in an exhaustive study of the problems facing our schools. These problems, together with recommendations for solution, were reported in detail to our citizens. The proposal, which called for two communities to join together to provide for their mutual school needs, did not meet with approval in both communities. This much is history. However, the problems which gave rise to the study in the first place, are still with us and we have now run out of alternatives. Therefore, you will be asked to authorize the School Board to engage the services of an architect to prepare plans for expanding our school facilities. The needs were thoroughly documented and presented to our citizens during the past year. All that is required now is the support of the community.

School budgets continue to climb. Increasing enrollments, teachers' salaries, and the general demand for better school programs are factors responsible for high school costs. We realize that this has not been easy on the taxpayer. We can only repeat what has been said many times before. The State should not continue to escape its responsibility for supporting public schools. Until this situation is remedied, local residents will be asked to continue their effort or else buy inferior education.

Numerous projects, put into effect during the past year, deserve attention. However, rather than attempting to enumerate them here, this will be left for more detailed explanation in the principals' reports. As for the future, there are several undertakings which ought to be considered. Another special class for older youngsters kindergarten with transportation provided, psychological and speech services, elementary library services, and the development of a reading program at the secondary level. With present overcrowding, most of these programs must wait until additional space has been provided. Again, these programs call for further effort by our local citizens in order to do as well as we can for our young people.

Never before in the history of public education has the need for public understanding and support of the local school system been so neccessary. Tax levies are going up, enrollments are increasing, curriculums are expanding, and greater demands are being placed at the doorstep of the local school system almost daily. Nowadays, there is a lot of faultfinding, with our schools. Some of it is justified; much of it is uninformed. In any case, one constructive helper is worth a hundred critics, and it is help that the schools need; from parents and taxpayers, from board members, from teachers, and from the children themselves whom the schools are chiefly designed to serve.
