TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Kingston, N. H., in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

[L. s.]

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said Kingston, on Tuesday, the 10th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to build a cement bridge in the place of the one at Great Pond and raise and appropriate money for the same; the State to pay their part.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700.00 for the tarring of the Newton Junction Road, so called.
5. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for road construction, the Town to raise \$1,137.00; the State to pay \$2,274.00.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,676.00; the State to pay \$5,028.00, for State Maintenance.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, for Trunk Line Maintenance, \$600.00, the State to pay \$2,400.00.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00, the State to pay \$4,000.00, for the permanent improvement of the main highway known as the Derry road leading from the Haverhill road to the Danville line; said amount to be proportional 2 to 1.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for repairs on the Hunt road on petition of Fred A. Heath and others.

10. On petition of Arthur R. Judkins and others: to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for repairs on Little River road, so called.

11. On petition of Edward B. Clark and others: to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00, to be expended for the continuation of a permanent tarvia road on the west side of Kingston Plains.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$500.00, for a pumper for the Cadillac car; the Fire Department to pay for one-third of the price of the same.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00, for the White Pine Blister Rust control, to be spent in co-operation with the State Forestry Department.

14. To see if the Town will vote to observe Old Home Day, and raise and appropriate any sum for such observance, as seems advisable.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$325.00, for a snow blade.

16. On petition of Ralph H. Bake and others: to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of

\$500.00 to be used for the purpose of rebuilding Bartlett St., work to start at the Main St. end of Bartlett St., where present construction terminates and continuing easterly as far as the money will permit.

17. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF TOWN MEETING

March 11, 1930

At a legal Town Meeting, duly warned and holden at the Kingston Town Hall, Kingston, N. H., County of Rockingham, on Tuesday, March 11, 1930, the checklist having been duly sworn to by the Supervisors, the Moderator, Perrin W. Nichols, called the meeting to order at 9:40 and read the warrant.

The following business was transacted:

ARTICLE I. Voted to lay Article I on the table and take up Article III.

ART. III. Voted that polls be left open until 3 P. M. for election of Delegates to Constitutional Convention.

Voted to return to Article I.

ARTICLE I. To choose all necessary Town Officers.

Voted that Moderator cast one ballot for Ralph H. Baker for Clerk.

Voted that Moderator cast one ballot for J. Edward Stevens for Selectman.

Voted that Clerk cast one ballot for Warren H. Tucker for Treasurer.

Voted that Clerk cast one ballot for Frank W. Foster for Tax Collector.

Voted that Clerk cast one ballot for Eugene C. Kimball for Road Agent.

Voted that Moderator cast one ballot for Warren H. Tucker for Trustee of Trust Funds.

Voted that Moderator cast one ballot for Walter E. Webster as Auditor.

Voted that Moderator cast one ballot for Z. Willis Kemp as Library Trustee.

Voted that committee of three be appointed by chair to bring in remaining Town Officers.

Following names were submitted :

Librarian—Effie P. Gibson.

Police Officers—Harry L. Carter, Irving Carlton, Eugene Nason.

Janitor of Town Hall—Ralph H. Rock.

Surveyors of Wood, Bark, Lumber—Roland Cheney, Walter S. Bartlett, Edward Kimball.

Fence Viewers—Freeman L. Nason, Warren Locke.

Fire Wards—George B. Stevens, Frederic S. Nichols, Walter Modlick.

Hog Reeves—Walter Modlick, Elmer Rock, James Chamberlain, Ralph Garland, William Goldthwaite.

George B. Stevens resigned.

Voted that Fire Department appoint Fire Ward to take place of George B. Stevens.

ART. 2. Voted to lay Article No. 2 on the table and take up Article No. 4.

ART. 4. Voted to pass over Article No. 4 for one year.

ART. 5. Voted that Town accept State Aid for road construction; the Town to raise \$1,135.50; the State to pay the same. Said money to be expended on Exeter Road.

ART. 6. Voted that Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 for State Aid Maintenance, the State to pay \$4,000 as their part.

ART. 7. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$600 for Trunk Line Maintenance, the State to pay \$2,400.

ART. 8. Voted that Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000, the State to pay the same, for the continuation of Kingston—3

the Plaistow Road; to begin where the work terminated last fall.

ART. 9. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500, the State to pay the same, to be expended on Exeter Road in addition to State Aid money.

ART. 10. Voted on petition of Arthur R. Judkins and others, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for repairs on Little Road, so called.

ART. 11. Voted that the Town will discontinue the driveway of approx. 96', in front of the residence of Howard C. Page, known as the John Kimball place at West Kingston, and that Howard C. Page will without any expense to the Town build a new driveway, parallel to the old, approx. 45'E., under the supervision of the Road Agent.

ART. 12. Voted that the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for control of the White Pine Blister Rust.

ART. 13. Voted that the Town will appropriate all accruing receipts from Greenwood Cemetery and that the same be invested and remain invested until the annual income thereof shall be sufficient to properly care for said cemetery.

ART. 2. Voted that the Town raise the sum of six thousand dollars (\$6,000) to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.

ART. 14. Voted that the Selectmen be instructed to print in Town Report, name of owner and location of property on which the taxes are unpaid.

Voted that Selectmen and Treasurer be authorized to borrow sum not to exceed \$10,000 in anticipation of taxes.

Voted to adjourn at 11:20 A. M.

NEW TOWN HALL

STATEMENT

When the Town books were closed, January 31, 1930, the final financing of the debt had not been completed. The Committee had erected the building on temporary loans.

On March 12, 1930, an arrangement was entered into with the Haverhill National Bank whereby they would loan the Town \$22,000, divided into eleven notes of \$2,000 each, payable on December 10th of each year, with interest at $4\frac{3}{4}\%$, payable semi-annually. This will increase our tax rate about 30 cents during the next ten years.

SCHOOL BOARD REPORT

PROGRESS AND EDUCATION

Yesterday we rode in the ox-cart and horse-drawn vehicle—today in the high speed motor car and the airplane. Yesterday we plowed with sticks and oxen—today with tractors and multiple plows. Yesterday the candle was our only means of illumination—today electricity “floods the earth.” Yesterday fifty miles of cross-country travel per day was unusual—today a few hundred is the usual. Yesterday the paved road was unheard of—today thousands of miles of hard-surfaced, “all-year” highways traverse the country. Yesterday we attended the community entertainment of questionable quality—today we sit in our homes and enjoy every type of entertainment over the radio. Yesterday we sent our communications by messenger—today we send them by air-mail or wireless. Yesterday we read news a week old—today is it broadcast as it is happening.

Education has brought our yesterdays into our todays. It has enabled us to think of “what was” in terms of “what is.”

These succeeding changes in the parade of progress have brought their concern—concern for their influence on the mode of living—the habits and opportunities of a hundred million people. It has meant a constant adjusting of the educational objectives in order to train youth and adult to the new life. Herein is the contribution the schools have made. It has been a process of mind development. The training has keyed the mental to control the physical. It has proved a governor, a safety valve, a regulator of human conduct, behavior and effort.

All classes have adjusted themselves to the new situation. The laborer has become mechanic; the tradesman, the supervisor, the superintendent or the executive. With the raising of the lower limits of living have come greater opportunities. The individual has educated himself to the new job.

These changes are in evidence also in increased wealth. Farm property has become more valuable. Residential, business and industrial holdings have done the same. Salaries, incomes on property, earning capacity of industrial and commercial organizations have increased. With the greater earning power and a larger number of invested dollars have come new desires and greater purchasing power necessary to take care of a greatly augmented production. Basic in all these is educational progress. In the words of President Hoover, "If we were to suppress our educational system for a single generation the quipment would decay, the most of our people would die of starvation, and intellectually and spiritually we would slip back four thousand years in human progress." We could recover the loss of any other big business in a few years—but not this one.

The school officials who promote policies tempered by local pressure, where these are not for the best interests of the young people, are taking short cuts. The executive who sacrifices the school's interests for the public favor is taking the short cut. The parent who condones antagonistic sentiment to school or teacher on the part of the pupil is encouraging that pupil to take the short cut. The community unwilling to finance adequately a deserving school program is taking the short cut. The parent who unloads on the school all responsibility for pupil attendance, progress and behavior is taking the short cut. Educational progress and short cuts do not go hand in hand.

Where there are criticisms of legitimate school costs they result from the inability to measure results or the failure to see the whole picture. We of Kingston must view the whole picture and determine whether we have made all the educational progress possible. Thinking people must measure the results and determine the future course of action in the onward movement of education. We have faith that the might of your citizenship will assert itself in the right direction—the best interests of the children.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Kingston:

I am herewith privileged to present my fourth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

YOUR SCHOOLS

The mass of your citizens want good schools. They want every child in your town to have an equal chance with every other child of New Hampshire and other states. Good schools and fair chance are inseparable. As parents you wish adequate schooling for your children, because of the fact that if you have been educated you appreciate its value, and if you have not, you are conscious of its loss. Your desire is that the children shall have sufficient training to meet future requirements.

But what of these requirements? It is difficult to foresee what they may be. Because of rapidly changing standards, people are confronted with situations they could not have foreseen a decade ago. In farming, in industry and in business, as well as in the profession of teaching, we find more exacting demands. It is reasonable to predict that requirements in all such lines will continue to be raised. Such is progress.

These changing situations have taxed and challenged the ingenuity of the schools. They have given an accounting. They have demonstrated the wisdom of the investment. If the schools were faced with the task of education for today alone it would be a sufficiently difficult undertaking. They have the added responsibility of educating for tomorrow.

It is gratifying to state that you have provided, and will continue to provide schools adequate to meet the demands. The youth are your greatest assets. You should weigh care-

fully each problem in the light of the changed situation and determine the really economic procedure to adopt. We hear many times in the course of the year, "Every advantage is none too good for the children."

THE NEW PROGRAM OF STUDIES

To meet the progress in education and life, considerable time has been expended by a large group of prominent educational leaders to revise the program for New Hampshire's schools. The product of their labors is now available and in use. In the main it is fundamentally much of the former program. The new has revised and expanded the old to provide more and better helps for teachers in carrying out their work. Furthermore, it has been framed to more adequately meet the needs of New Hampshire's children in the light of present-day conditions. The program itself is but a shell. The expansion of it in the teaching process is the essential item. Through its use we are of the earnest opinion that the children will be benefited and a nearer approach made to the millennium—perfect education. Never do we believe this goal can be reached, but our goal must be high lest we reach under too low a standard.

SCHOOL COSTS

Good schools involve costs. Some say we cannot afford them. Is this true?

We have in mind a man, the head of a family. He has annual bills of \$500 for automobile depreciation, operation and repairs, and \$220 for luxuries such as candy, ice cream, and tobacco. This man, you will agree, was pretty well off.

How much should he be willing to pay for the schooling of his children? If he expended \$90 a year for this purpose would he be giving education too high a place in his scale of values?

Answer these questions as you will. The man described above is really the State of New Hampshire. If you will take

the preceding figures and add five zeros to them you will have what New Hampshire pays for three items of expenditure:

Passenger automobile	\$50,000,000
Certain luxuries	22,000,000
Public education	9,000,000

It is true that many families are not as well off as the one described above. Not all families are able to spend \$500 for automobile, or \$220 for luxuries. But neither do most families pay as much as \$90 a year for the schooling of their children. Speaking in averages, if a family spends less for the first two items, it spends proportionately less for education. It is the proportion which counts, not the actual amounts spent.

Assume any kind of a family you wish. Take the figures given above and make your own divisions. You will find out that on the average, every time New Hampshire spends a dollar for schools, the people of the state spend \$5.55 for passenger automobiles and \$2.44 for a few of our luxuries. Does the cost of schools indicate that New Hampshire places education too high, in the scale of values? The same comparisons might be made with income and like results obtained.

Local costs in comparison with other districts offer valuable information. The following table shows the costs to the districts only of the elementary schools of three State-Aided and four non-aided districts chosen at random.

These costs all cover the same items and you must note Kingston has favorable position in the tabulations. The three first towns given have the same number of teachers and about the same valuation but the others are larger and more wealthy districts. This is given to show that Kingston is expending no more than others in accordance with its valuation and is offering like opportunities of education with larger places at a greatly reduced per pupil cost.

TABLES

Kindly examine the tables which follow. They will give you in statistical form much of the data collected during the last school year. In the attendance statistics, you will note desirable advances made in attendance and tardiness. We have never reached the state average in attendance. Last year this average was 95.5%. With your co-operation, could we not reach that figure this year?

I am very grateful for your loyal and warm support of the schools. Your continued interest and help is a good omen of future gains and progress in beneficial public schools.
