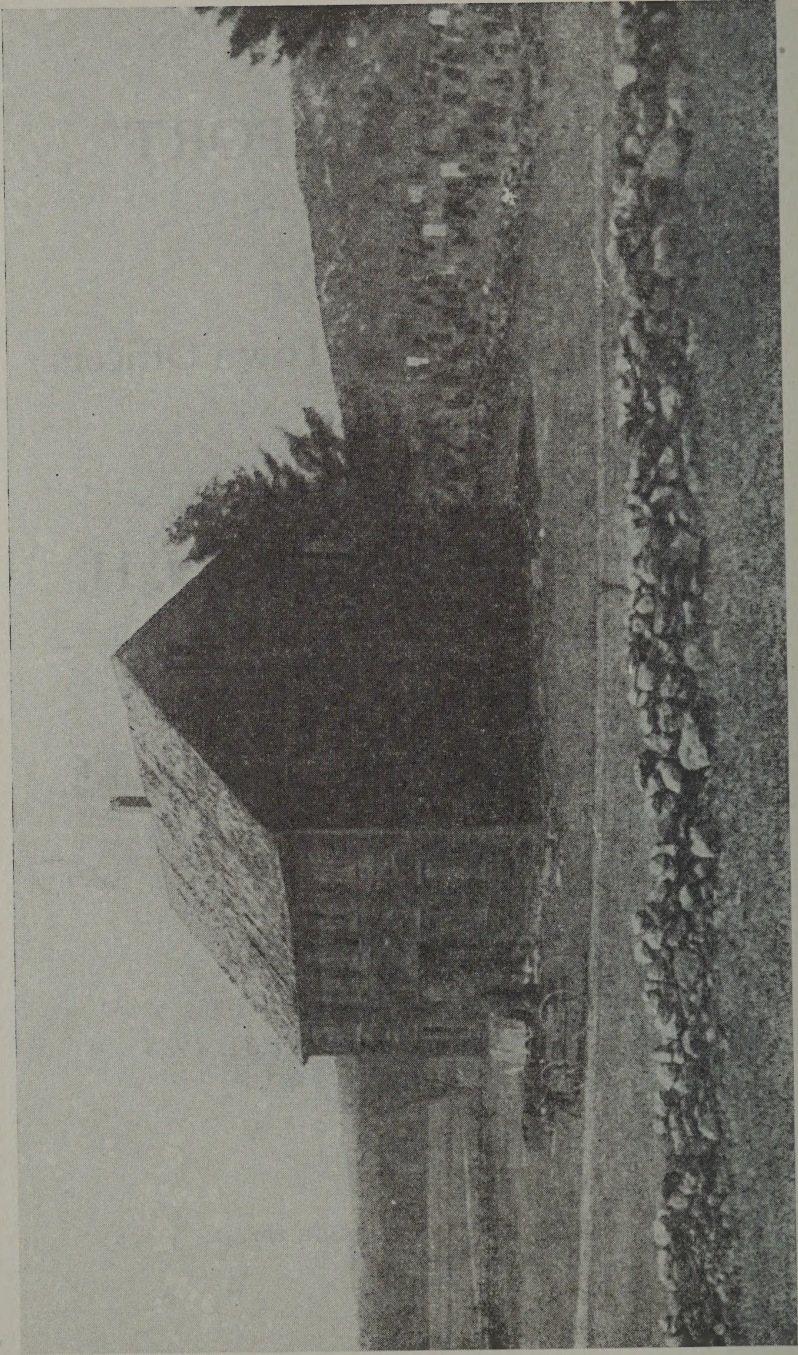

TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Merrimack in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Merrimack on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for town officers' salaries.
4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for town officers' expenses.
5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the police department.
6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the fire department.
7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for fighting forest fires.
8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the health department.
9. To see if the town will vote to receive state aid for construction of Class II or Class V road.

If State Aid Construction is desired, it must be expended on the Baboosic Lake road, and the State will contribute \$2,089.00 provided the town raises \$2,089.50.

If Class V assistance is desired, the town must raise \$816.87 and the state will contribute \$3,267.50.

10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs of highways and bridges.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the removal of snow.

12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money for electric street lights in the village of Reed's Ferry, or take any action relating thereto.

13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care and supplies of town hall or take any action relating thereto.

14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the public library.

16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of parks and playgrounds.

17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries.

18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money necessary to pay the interest on town notes and trust funds used by the town.

19. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount for early payment of taxes and make appropriation for same, or take any action relating thereto.

20. To see if the town will vote to observe Old Home Day, and raise and appropriate money for same.

21. To see if the town will vote to allow the selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes, or take any action relating thereto.

22. To see if the town will vote to purchase oil to be used on the highway, and raise and appropriate money for same.

23. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$100.00 to properly finish the survey of the town line between Amherst and Merrimack and place new markers where necessary.

24. To see if the town will vote to repair the old sheds back of church for storage purposes and raise and appropriate money for same.

25. To hear the reports of the town officers, and transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting, raise and appropriate money for same.

REPORT OF HEADMASTER OF MAGAW NORMAL INSTITUTE

In June 1935 six pupils were graduated from McGaw, three of whom are now in colleges and one is at Keene Normal School. The entering class this year numbered eleven but two of these have left school to go to work. There are twelve in the Sophomore class and twelve in the Junior class. Two of the latter are new pupils who transferred from other schools, one each from Manchester and Nashua. Four pupils left school last year before the end of the year who did not resume their attendance this year. Three pupils who finished out the year but were not graduated did not return this fall but two of them transferred to other schools. There are seven in our Senior Class. Our present enrollment, therefore, is forty.

This year, as usual, early in the fall term a play was given to raise funds to defray the expenses of the prize speaking groups but this year the play was given also for the benefit of the Ladies' Aid Society at their annual fair. On January 17th the boys held their prize speaking contest in the Town Hall and on March 13th will be held the one for the girls. It is expected that two boys will be sent to Colby and one girl to the University of New Hampshire early in May.

During the summer some repairs were made to the building, chief of which was a relocation of the furnace to improve the heating of the main room. Since school opened the room formerly used as a living room in the northern tenement has been remodeled to use as a classroom and the room formerly used as the English room has been remodeled as a girls' dressing room and toilet. All of the work for this change except the installation of the plumbing and electricity was done by the Headmaster and members of the Home Arts classes.
