THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Nottingham in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Nottingham on Tuesday, the 10th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see what sum the Town will appropriate to pay on account for Trunk Line Construction of highways already completed.
4. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,100 for State Aid Maintenance of highways, the State to contribute the sum of \$3,300.
5. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$700 for Trunk Line Maintenance of highways, the State to contribute the sum of \$4,200.
6. To see what sum the Town will raise and appropriate for State Aid Construction of highways, the State to contribute two dollars for each dollar voted by Town.
7. To see if the Town will vote the sum of \$400 for Pine Blister Rust eradication.
8. To see if the Town will vote to establish a sinking fund for the purpose of purchasing road-maintenance and snow-removal equipment, and to appropriate and set aside such sums as may be voted.

9. To see if the Town will vote to have the 1931 inventory printed and appropriate money for same.

10. To see what action the Town will take in regard to enlarging and improving the North Side Cemetery, and appropriate money for same.

11. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

TO THE CITIZENS OF NOTTINGHAM:

It is of general interest to record that during the past year Commissioner James N. Pringle became executive head of the State Department of Education, succeeding Commissioner Ernest W. Among Nottingham teachers, the only change was the resignation of Miss Knight to go to Massachusetts, and the election of Miss Glendle Bunnell of Northwood, Keene Normal, '27, to succeed her at the Center Grammar room. All our teachers have had considerable teaching experience, ranging from six to twenty-six years.

Miss Ruth B. Whitcomb continues as school nurse. At the dental clinic last year, Dr. Danforth performed 113 operations on teeth. There is a strong sentiment to continue these state clinics as a feature of our health work. The Parent-Teacher association has been active in holding meetings with outside speakers on educational topics, and in other practical ways. The Red Cross has also co-operated. That the interests of small communities are not forgotten by the educational leaders of the nation is seen by the themes of two great national gatherings to be held this year. The Department of Superintendence at Detroit will consider "Working Together for the Children of America," while the National Education Association at Los Angeles will devote its attention chiefly to "Rural Schools."
