## SCHOOL REPORT.

---

We have had six schools of two terms each—summer terms, 10 weeks; fall terms, 12 weeks. The whole number of pupils attending school was 98. Boys, 57; girls, 41. Average attendance for the year, 71. Amount of money appropriated for the support of schools, \$658.00. Literary fund, \$93.75. Other sources, \$36.12.

*Bashan.*—Miss Mary L. Kilburn, teacher summer term. Wages a month, including board, \$24.00. Number of scholars, 17; average attendance, 15. Fall term, Miss Sarah E. Sawyer, teacher. Wages a month including board, \$26.00. Number of scholars, 22; average attendance, 15.

*Corser Hill.*—Miss Mary R. Webster, teacher summer term. Wages a month, \$24.00. Number of scholars, 16; average attendance, 14. Fall term, same teacher. Wages per month, \$24.00. Number of scholars, 19; average attendance, 15.

*Little Hill.*—Miss Ellen K. Abbott, teacher. Summer term, wages a month, \$25.00. Number of scholars, 5; average attendance, 4.95. Fall term, number of pupils, 8; average attendance, 7.85.

*Putney Hill.*—Miss Carrie A. Sanborn, teacher. Wages a month, summer term, \$24.00. Number of pupils, 16; average attendance, 12. Fall term, wages a month, \$22.00. Number of scholars, 15; average attendance, 13.

*Sweatt's Mills.*—Summer term, Miss Ida L. Sweatt, teacher. Wages a month, including board, \$24.00. Whole number scholars, 17; average attendance, 12. Fall term, Miss Cora M. Little, teacher. Wages per month, \$22.00. Number of pupils, 19; average attendance, 13.

*White Plain.*—Miss Lizzie M. Carpenter, teacher. Summer term, wages per month, \$18.00. Whole number of pupils, 9; average attendance, 7.09. Fall term, wages per month, \$20.00. Whole number scholars, 12; average attendance,  $8\frac{3}{4}$ .

Of the twelve terms of school, eight were taught by teachers who are well known in town as teachers. Suffice to say, they have given the usual satisfaction.

Of the remaining four terms: The fall term at Sweatt's Mills was taught by a graduate of the Concord High School. She entered the school with a determination to succeed, and we will say her efforts proved a success.

The teacher at Putney's believes in good order, which she maintains to our entire satisfaction.

The summer term at Bashan was not so successful as was hoped, although we do not blame the teacher altogether.

On the whole, we think the schools have been a success. Owing to a larger amount of literary fund and an increase from dog tax, we found a much larger sum left unexpended than was expected.

We are glad to announce that within the past year we have nearly completed a new school house at Sweatt's Mills. The location is good, the school room is very pleasant, and the school furniture of the best kind and very convenient.

We hope every pupil who attends this school will take pride in keeping every thing in and around this school house in as good condition as possible.

It seems that some of our good people were anxious that we should build a very nice house, so voted to appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for the same.

Your building committee have nearly completed a house, which they think will supply the wants of the people, and find quite a little sum left. We think it would be policy to use the remainder for repairing the other school houses.

With these few remarks, our report is respectfully submitted.
