Important Warrant Article Information

American Red Cross- Article 4: This agency responds in times of emergency and supports families as they seek to restore peacefulness to their lives in cases of fire, flood, and winter storm. In the year 2014 the Red Cross responded to 173 disasters in New Hampshire, helping 570 people. They trained 301 students in medical careers. They gave 8,114 transportation services to residents. They held 1,479 blood drives. They connected 278 families with their loved ones through our Service to the Armed Forces.

Children Unlimited, Inc.- Article 5: This agency provides services for developmental evaluations, speech/language therapy, physical therapy, family support, and counseling.

White Mountain Community Health Center- none: This agency provides medical care for the underinsured and uninsured Chatham residence. They did not request any funds from us this year but wanted to thank us for the funding they received in the past.

Saco Valley Fire Department- Article 6: This agency provides fire protection services for the Town of Chatham.

Fryeburg Rescue- Article 7: This agency provides emergency coverage for the Town of Chatham.

Lovell Recreation Department- Article 8: This program provides children living in Chatham with the opportunity to participate in sport activities. They currently offer 35 programs. There were 38 participants.

Tri-County Community Action- Article 9: This agency provides fuel and electrical assistance to low-income, elderly and or disabled people. This year they provided assistance to 14 households, 9 for fuel assistance (\$8,850) and 5 for electrical assistance (\$7,173.51)

Eastern Slope Airport Authority- Article 10: The airport is located in Fryeburg Maine. The funds are used for operation and maintenance cost.

CASA- Article 11: Court Appointed Special Advocates for Children would like our support. They provide services for abused and neglected children in New Hampshire. CASA served 33 children living in Carroll County. This number includes children who live in our community.

Charlotte Hobbs Memorial Library of Lovell- Article 12: In 2013 there were 137 Chatham residents who held library cards.

Brownfield Food Pantry- Article 13: The food pantry has helped provide food for several families for Chatham. The Pantry distributes food on the 3rd Thursday of each month and emergency boxes as needed.

Starting Point- Article 14: Starting Point provided 3 Chatham residents with services including crisis intervention, hospital advocacy, police advocacy, in-person support and numerous referrals to a variety of social service providers.

Municipal Building Construction/repairs fund- Article 15:

Gibson Center for Senior Services- Article 16: The Gibson Center offers programs to senior citizens that provide them with nutritious meals and transportation. They also provide social/educational programs to enable seniors to stay actively involved in their communities.

Northern Human Services- Article 17- This organization did not request any funds last year. It has requested funds in the past. The organization helped one Chatham Resident.

Adoption of RSA 80:80- I have included the language for the RSA on the next page of this report. The Selectmen would like to sell a piece of property on Province Brook Road that was taken by tax deed years ago. They can not sell the property without the passage of this article.

Section 80:80 Transfer of Tax Lien.

TITLE V TAXATION

CHAPTER 80 COLLECTION OF TAXES

Real Estate Tax Liens

Section 80:80

80:80 Transfer of Tax Lien. -

I. No transfer of any tax lien upon real estate acquired by a town or city as a result of the execution of the real estate tax lien by the tax collector for nonpayment of taxes thereon shall be made to any person by the municipality during the 2-year period allowed for redemption, nor shall title to any real estate taken by a town or city in default of redemption be conveyed to any person. unless the town, by majority vote at the annual meeting, or city council by vote, shall authorize the selectmen or the mayor to transfer such lien or to convey such property by deed.

II. If the selectmen or mayor are so authorized to convey such property by deed, either a public auction shall be held, or the property may be sold by advertised sealed bids. The selectmen or mayor shall have the power to establish a minimum amount for which the property is to be sold and the terms and conditions of the sale.

II-a. If the selectmen or mayor are authorized to transfer such liens during the 2-year redemption period, either a public auction shall be held, or the liens may be sold by advertised sealed bids. The selectmen or mayor may establish minimum bids, and may set the terms and conditions of the sale. Such liens may be sold singly or in combination, but no fractional interest in any lien shall be sold. Such transfer shall not affect the right of the owner or others with a legal interest in the land to redeem the tax lien pursuant to RSA 80:69, or make partial payments in redemption pursuant to RSA 80:71, but the transferee shall become the lienholder for purposes of RSA 80:72 and 80:76.

III. The selectmen may, by a specific article in the town warrant, or the mayor, by ordinance, may be authorized to dispose of a lien or tax deeded property in a manner than otherwise provided in this section, as justice may require.

IV. Such authority to transfer or to sell shall continue in effect for one year from the date of the town meeting or action by the city or town council provided, however, that the authority to transfer tax liens, or to sell real estate acquired in default of redemption, or to vary the manner of such sale or transfer as justice may require, may be granted for an indefinite period, in which case the warrant article or vote granting such authority shall use the words "indefinitely, until rescinded" or similar language.

V. Towns and cities may retain and hold for public uses real property the title to which has been acquired by them by tax collector's deed, upon vote of the town meeting or city council approving the same.

VI. For purposes of this section, the authority to dispose of the property "as justice may require" shall include the power of the selectmen or mayor to convey the property to a former owner, or to a third party for benefit of a former owner, upon such reasonable terms as may be agreed to in writing, including the authority of the municipality to retain a mortgage interest in the property, or to reimpose its tax lien, contingent upon an agreed payment schedule, which need not necessarily reflect any prior redemption amount. Any such agreement shall be recorded in the registry of deeds. This paragraph shall not be construed to obligate any municipality to make any such conveyance or agreement.

Report of Forest Fire Warden and State Forest Ranger

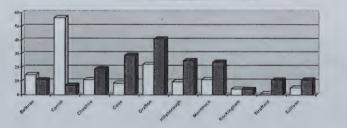
Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of Forests & Lands, work collaboratively to reduce the risk and frequency of wildland fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, please contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a permit is required before doing <u>ANY</u> outside burning. Under State law (RSA 227-L17) a fire permit is required for all outside burning, unless the ground is completely covered with snow. The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services also prohibits the open burning of household waste. Citizens are encouraged to contact the local fire department or DES at 603-271-1370 or www.nh.us, state.nh.us for more information. Safe open burning requires diligence and responsibility. Help us to protect New Hampshire's forest resources. For more information please contact the Division of Forests & Lands at (603) 271-2214, or online at www.nh.nlfl.org.

This past fire season started in early April with the first reported fire on April 7th. April, which is the traditional start to our spring fire season, began very dry with unseasonably dry conditions continuing through the entire month. This dry pattern continued through the first half of May. 80% of our reported fires this season occurred during this six week period. The largest fire was 24 acres, occurring in the town of Tamworth. From mid May through early September, above average rainfall kept our total acreage burned statewide at 72 acres. This is the smallest amount of acreage burned statewide in several years. Late August through late September though brought a dry trend to northern areas, resulting in several deep-burning remote fires. Our fire danger days correlated well with the days that there were fires actually reported. The statewide system of 16 fire lookout towers continues to operate on Class III or higher fire danger days. Our fire lookouts are credited with keeping most fires small and saving several structures due to their quick and accurate spotting capabilities. The towers fire spotting capability was supplemented by the NII Civil Air Patrol when the fire danger was especially high. Many homes in New Hampshire are located in the wildland urban interface, which is the area where homes and flammable wildland fuels intermix. Several of the fires during the 2014 season threatened structures, and a few structures were burned, a constant reminder that forest fires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildland fire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles, and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. Additional information and homeowner recommendations are available at www.firewise.org. Please help Smokey Bear, your local fire department, and the state's Forest Rangers by being fire wise and fire safe!

Eastern Slopes Regional Airport - Fryeburg, Maine

Eastern Slopes Regional Airport is operated by the Eastern Slopes Airport Authority (ESAA) under strict FAA guidelines and serves the surrounding towns (in alphabetical order) of Albany, Bartlett, Bridgeton, Brownfield, Chatham, Conway, Denmark, Eaton, Fryeburg, Jackson, Lovell, Madison, and Sweden. These 13 towns in Maine and New Hampshire acknowledge that the airport is a vital transportation infrastructure link to the area, especially for critical services such as life flights, search and rescue, forest fire control, and potentially even military (National Guard) operations in times of disaster.

The airport is an economic hub for the Valley, providing business clients and tourists access to the local Maine and New Hampshire businesses with the convenience of air travel. It also serves as a place for student pilots and private pilots to train and maintain current flight status. Scenic flights and other recreational aviation activities are enjoyed by locals and visitors alike. The airport is public, not private, and is open year-round for business and charter flights.

Propeller aircraft, helicopters, and jets safely make use of the airspace, runway, and facilities in the same manner we use highways, waterways, and railways for transportation. Recent modern technologies added include a GPS precision approach (WASS, LPV), and an invisible intelligence system which tracks airport traffic. Eastern Slopes Regional Airport does require funding from the surrounding towns to cover maintenance and operational costs just like all the other transportation resources.
