STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Chesterfield in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said Town on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To elect a town Clerk for the ensuing year.
2. To elect one Selectman for three years.
3. To elect all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charge for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, to be applied upon the Town over-draft or debt.
6. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Chapter 117, Law of 1917, on a section of the Cheshire Road, so-called, and appropriate, or set aside from the amount raised for highway work the sum of \$800.00 for this purpose.
7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairing of highways and bridges.
8. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for highways and appropriate sufficient money for same.

9. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for State highway maintenance.

10. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the support of the poor.

11. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the support of the Town Library in addition to what is required by law.

12. To determine the method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$400.00 to fight the pine blister.

14. To see if the Town will vote to observe Old Home Day and raise money and appoint a committee for same.

15. To see if the Town will vote to establish a new light on the cross road, leading from Main to High Street, in Spofford.

16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for street lighting, for the ensuing year.

17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow a sum not exceeding three thousand, five hundred dollars, (\$3,500.) on long term notes, said notes shall bear such rate of interest and be of such denomination and for such term, as the Selectmen may determine, to be used for two thirds of the cost of construction, building, repairing and grading of the new highway, laid out by the Selectmen on February 23, 1924. Morris Friedsam being bound to pay the other one third cost. Said road described as follows: Beginning at an iron pin driven in the ground on the north side of the "Old Lake Road," said pin is 525 feet N. W. of the S. W. corner of the stone house, standing near the "Four Corners" so-called thence in a northerly direction by various courses over the land of Morris Friedsam, to an iron pin driven in the

ground on the south side of the old road leading from Spofford Lake to the Pinnacle Spring's farm.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$150.00 to cut brush and gravel the road leading from the old Spofford Lake road, past the farm of Glenham Jones.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 to repair the hill below the Norman G. Colburn farm house.

20. To see if the Town will vote to accept from Melvin M. Smith, late of Chesterfield, deceased, a bequest and devise not exceeding fifty-five hundred dollars, (\$5,500.00) in value, the same to be held in trust by the Town and the income thereof to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association, to be expended by the Trustees of said Association as directed by the will of the said deceased.

21. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$500.00 in trust, to be known as the Annie A. Amidon Trust Fund, the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Otis Amidon, Loren Harvey and the Elvira Mead-Harvey burial lot in the Center Cemetery.

22. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust, to be known as the Esterbrooks-Hopkins Trust Fund, the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Esterbrooks-Hopkins burial lot in the Spofford Cemetery.

23. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust, to be known as the Anna Campbell Clark Trust Fund, the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Sidney S. Campbell burial lot in the Spofford Cemetery.

24. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 in trust, to be known as the Jonathan Cobleigh Trust Fund, the income to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery

Association, to be used for the care and improvement of the Jonathan Cobleigh burial lot in the Chesterfield West Cemetery.

25. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust, to be known as the Erving A. Hildreth Trust Fund, the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Erving A. Hildreth burial lot in the Spofford Cemetery.

26. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust to be known as the John H. Henry Trust Fund, the income to be used for the care and improvement of the John H. Henry burial lot in the Spofford Cemetery.

27. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100 00 in trust, to be known as the Fred W. Hopkins Trust Fund, the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Fred W. Hopkins burial lot in the Spofford Cemetery.

28. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust, to be known as the Abial Miles Post Trust Fund, the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Abial M. Post lot in the Spofford Cemetery.

29. To see is the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$150.00 in trust, to be known as the Mead Trust Fund, the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Converse-Mead Cemetery in Chesterfield.

30. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 in trust, to be known as the Wallace K. Ware Trust Fund, the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Wallace K. Ware burial lot in the Chesterfield Center Cemetery.

31. To bring in your votes for the election of Delegates-at-Large, Alternate Delegates-at-Large, District Delegates, Alternate District Delegates to the National Conventions of the Democratic and Republican parties, to be held for the

purpose of nominating party candidates for President and Vice-President of the United States.

32. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

TOWN MEETING, MARCH, 1923

Proceedings of the annual meeting of the voters of the Town of Chesterfield called at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, the 13th day of March, 1923.

The meeting was called to order by the moderator, Louis D. Herrick at 9 a. m. and the warrant read.

The articles in the warrant were disposed of as follows:

Art. 1. Town Clerk. Voted that the moderator be instructed to cast one ballot for Burton C. Thatcher for Town Clerk and he was declared elected by the moderator.

Art. 2. For Selectman for 3 years. Charles H. Anderson had 1 vote, Cless G. Davis had 53 votes, Roger C. Spaulding had 77 votes, and Roger C. Spaulding having a majority of the votes cast was declared elected by the moderator.

Art. 3. For Treasurer. Voted that the clerk be instructed to cast one ballot for Harold E. Foster for Treasurer and he was declared elected by the moderator.

For Auditors. Clifford W. Tuttle, George L. Brown and Cless G. Davis were elected auditors by a voice vote and it was so declared by the moderator.

For Road Agent (Center District). Cless G. Davis had 1 vote, Moses H. Chickering had 1 vote, Frank M. Colman had 111 votes and Frank M. Colman having a majority of the votes cast was declared elected by the moderator.

Road Agent (Spofford District). Walter J. Post had 1 vote, George F. Amidon had 2 votes, Nelson Barcome had 13 votes, Arthur C. Hewitt had 32 votes, Frank A. Pearson had 72 votes, and Frank A. Pearson having a majority of the votes cast was declared elected by the moderator.

Road Agent (West District). Ernest A. Carey had 21

votes, Moses H. Chickering had 47 votes, George F. Amidon had 59 votes and there was no choice.

2nd ballot. Ernest A. Carey had 18 votes, Moses H. Chickering had 52 votes, George F. Amidon had 68 votes and there was no choice.

3rd ballot. Ernest A. Carey had 2 votes, Moses H. Chickering had 66 votes, George F. Amidon had 71 votes and George F. Amidon having a majority of the votes cast was declared elected by the moderator.

For Constables. Ellery A. Harvey, William D. Pierce and Harold E. Randall were elected constables by a voice vote and it was so declared by the moderator.

For Surveyors. Harold E. Randall, Harold E. Foster and Frank M. Holman were elected surveyors of wood and lumber by a voice vote and it was so declared by the moderator.

For Fence Viewers. Fred O. C. Farr, Olin E. Butler and Lyle B. Chickering were elected Fence Viewers by a voice vote and it was so declared by the moderator.

For Sextons. John A. Joslin, Charles A. Tuttle, Burton C. Thatcher, George L. Brown, Fred E. Atherton and Charles J. Paro were elected Sextons and it was so declared by the moderator.

For Trustee of Public Library. Fred O. C. Farr was elected a Trustee of the Public Library for 3 years by a voice vote and it was so declared by the moderator.

For Trustee of the Trust Funds. George L. Brown was elected a Trustee of Trust Funds for 3 years by a voice vote and it was so declared by the moderator.

Art. 4. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 to defray town charges for the ensuing year.

Art. 5. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 of which \$4,000.00 to be paid on town debt and \$1,000.00 for interest.

Art. 6. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the repair of highways and bridges.

Art. 7. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,825.50 for the purpose of securing state aid for highways.

Art. 8. Voted to accept the provisions of Chapter 117 Laws of 1917 on a section of the Cheshire Highway so-called and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$930.00 for that purpose.

Art. 9. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700.00 for state highway maintenance.

Art. 10. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the support of the poor for the ensuing year.

Art. 11. Voted to raise and appropriate a sum of money in addition to what is required by law to make the whole amount \$150.00 for the support of the Town Library.

Art. 12. Voted to instruct the Selectmen to collect taxes in the same manner as last year and to appoint the same collector.

Art. 13. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for street lighting and to establish one or more lights near the residence of W. D. Pierce.

Art. 14. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to fight the pine blister.

Art. 15. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for observing Old Home Day and appointed as a committee Walter G. Barrett, Curtis H. Chickering and Cless G. Davis.

Art. 16. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 and to authorize the selectmen to use said sum of money for policing Spofford Lake and surrounding territory during the months of June, July and August.

Art. 17. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to be used for straightening the road near Camp Namaschaug.

Art. 18. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to widen the road near the farm house of Norman G. Colburn.

Art. 19. Voted to discontinue a certain highway known

as the Mulligan road, beginning at the fork of the Keene-Brattleboro road near the Pine Grove golf links and running past the former Mulligan property in a southerly direction to the cross road leading from the Keene-Brattleboro road past the residence of Wallace K. Ware, also a short piece of road starting at the fork of the Keene-Brattleboro road and the above named cross road in an easterly direction to the Mulligan road, said piece of road being a fork of the above named road.

Art. 20. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the purchase of a new heater for the Town Hall or to improve the present heating system.

Art. 21. Voted to discontinue a certain highway in the western part of Chesterfield beginning at a point on the Keene-Brattleboro road and running in a westerly direction past the barn of Cless G. Davis to the residence of Ashbel Stoddard estate.

Art. 22. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 in addition to what has been subscribed for the purpose of purchasing and erecting a soldiers' memorial.

Art. 23. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust to be known as the Richard T. Cobb Trust Fund, the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Richard T. Cobb burial lot in the Spofford Cemetery.

Art. 24. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust to be known as the Ellen M. Ball Trust Fund, the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Ellen M. Ball burial lot in the Spofford Cemetery.

Art. 25. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust to be known as the Elsie M. Albee-Fassett Trust Fund, the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Elsie M. Albee-Fassett burial lot in the Spofford Cemetery.

Art. 26. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust to be known as the Brown and Willard Gline Trust Fund, the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Brown and Willard Gline burial lot in the Spofford Cemetery.

Art. 27. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust to be known as the Dunton-Farr Trust Fund, the income to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association to be used for the care and improvement of the Dennie W. Farr burial lot in the Chesterfield West Cemetery.

Art. 28. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust to be known as the Laura Smith-Houghton Trust Fund, the income to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association to be used for the care and improvement of the Ora Smith and Lyman P. Farr burial lots in the Chesterfield West Cemetery.

Art. 29. Voted not to authorize the Trustees of Trust Funds to accept funds in the name of the Town.

Art. 30. The result of the vote upon the question as to whether the amendments proposed by convention to revise the constitution was, Yes 23, No 57.

Art. 31. To transact any other business. No business appearing it was voted to adjourn at 4.05 p. m.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Chesterfield:

I herewith submit my fourth annual report on the schools of Chesterfield.

The schools opened in September with three new teachers. Two of these are at Spofford and the other at Chesterfield. The enrollment at Spofford has fallen off some since the opening but I recommend that the two teachers be continued there for the reason that each child needs much individual attention due to having been subject to frequent changes of teachers in the past and the added fact that we have there every year many transfers who have lost in moving, many days in schooling.

There are no cases in Spofford now which need transportation. There are two teams transporting to Chesterfield and two to West Chesterfield this winter. One of these will be dropped as soon as the change can be made.

The needed changes in the West Chesterfield building could not be made this summer due to lack of labor necessary to do the job. This can be attended to this coming summer. The Spofford building needs shingling and some attention to the chimney. Chesterfield needs repair and improvement about the toilets.

The class room work is of a good grade. The teachers are interested in their work and apparently giving satisfaction. The standard tests show that the work is of required grade. The rural schools like Chesterfield's are improving everywhere throughout the state. Eighty per cent of the buildings have been improved in six years. In 1919 the rural schools were 40.75 per cent as efficient as the city schools.

Today they are 70.25 per cent as efficient. The figures are for the entire state. I think we can claim ours as being 90 per cent as efficient except for music and drawing. The health work is being carried on by the teachers as best they can. Every school has some form of noon luncheon.

In contradiction to the State Grange assertions it may be said that there are 722 rural school buildings in use as against 704 last year. This would seem to indicate that the tendency was away from consolidation throughout the state. The average visits to schools by schoolboard members is 2 per year. The average visits of the superintendent is twenty. Twenty-three per cent of the untrained teachers have been eliminated. The enrollment in the Normal schools has increased from 240 in 1918 to 617 in 1923. This indicates that we shall be able to have trained teachers in all schools by 1928. The chances of a trained teacher failing in her work are less than one in twenty-five. Those of the untrained are one in five. In 1919 924 schools had shortened school year. In 1923 only 12 had such a year. In 1919 the average school year of rural schools was 30 weeks. It is now 36 weeks. The increase of 6 weeks per year for 8 years of the child's school life adds a full year and one third to his educational chances.

There are in the state 12 per cent of the children unvaccinated who are attending school. These are being eliminated by peaceful means as soon as it can be done. The percentage in Chesterfield is higher than that. These children are in school illegally. I urge parents to place on file with the teacher a certificate of vaccination or a certificate from a physician that the child is unfit for vaccination. This latter will clear us from the law. Recent events have shown that rural places are as prone to have smallpox as are the more congested.

We have held one evening meeting in Spofford to demonstrate school work. This was highly successful and more will be attempted as soon as the weather permits. These seem to carry home to us all just what is being done and how.

I wish to express my appreciation of the helpful advice of the School Board and of the various parents who have talked with me and especially do I extend appreciation to the teachers and pupils for the very excellent responses.
