BOGOTA, Colombia (NYT) — to combat the spread of Communist guerrilla movements, President Alfonso Lopez Micheli-sen says his government will continue to promote agrarian reform through land distribution and the formation of peasant co-operators. He also says that land distribution by itself is not panacea for the needy peasants. "The idea that the happiness of the peasant is obtained by distribution of the land is quite un-founded all over the world," Lopez said in an interview in ad-vance of a visit to Washington and New York.



RECREATION DEPARTMENT

The Parks and Recreation Department reports a busy and productive 1974.

Ski conditions improved since '73 and again with the aid of the volunteer ski patrol. Garrison Hill operations ran smoothly. Ski lessons were provided for numerous Dover children free of charge.

Baseball leagues for all ages played at the Rec. Center with a total of six leagues playing in the winter months. Cord volleyball, plus free play basketball, and exercise programs were also regular activities throughout the year.

The department added a number of leagues in different ways. Those organizations were North-side Little League, Southside Little League, Dover Babe Ruth, Senior Football, and the Garrison City Soccer Club, as well as the Dover Rugby Club.

Spring was the time for the annual maintenance and reconditioning work for the Park Crew. This involves painting park benches, picnic tables and resurfacing playground equipment. The playgrounds opened the last week of June with seven supervised playgrounds at Henry Law Park, Mt. Pleasant Park, Mountaineer Playground, Woodman Park, Mineral Park, Horse St. Playground, and Hancock Park. These playgrounds are supervised Monday thru Friday from 9:00 a.m. to noon and from 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. by directors who organize games and field trips for students. Each park receives arts and crafts instruction once a week. Various other programs include Softball Leagues, Talent Shows, Arts and Crafts Contests, Olympic Events and other activities.
