Annual Report.

TO THE CITIZENS OF HENNIKER :

The selectmen in submitting to you the financial condition of the town, desire to call your attention to the cause of the increase of its indebtedness. It will be remembered that last year under more favorable circumstances we were enabled to reduce the debt of the town to the amount of \$1,248 44, while this year were unavoidably called upon to pay \$1,384 48 in excess of last year for breaking roads. Still further to increase our expenses, the heavy spring rains made many of our roads absolutely impassable, calling for nearly or quite as much money to replace them to their average condition at this season of the year, as has been expended in ordinary years for the usual repairs.

It was thought advisable to purchase another road machine in order that the work might be more economically performed, at the cost of \$225.00. While these facts in themselves considered may be depressing we should remember we are very highly favored. Notice we have flowing into our treasury yearly from the savings banks, and railroads a tax, not a dollar of which has to be assessed upon the town, to the amount of \$3,845.50. Furthermore, while towns and cities, all over our country are devising ways and means whereby to support their poor, we are relieved save in the case of one.

In the matter of uncollected taxes, could the collector have had until the first of March, as had been the custom, undoubtedly he would have cancelled nearly, or all of his list.

Our town treasurer, faithful to his trusts, has met the collector of taxes the first Saturday of each month to adjust his account, as required by law, a practice which we hope will be strictly adhered to in the future. Never has there been a more thorough investigation of the business transactions of the town, than by the present board of auditors.

Report of School Board

All the division schools in town have had twenty-nine weeks of schooling during the past year. save those of divisions two and three, where there were a spring and fall term in each. During the spring and fall terms of school, the pupils throughout the town were very generally in attendance.

During the winter term many of the youngest pupils could not attend and illness prevented others from attendance a portion of the time, but as a whole there has been an average attendance, and the pupils made good progress in their studies and the schools have been quiet and harmonious, the teachers all evincing their earnest efforts for the good of the pupils committed to their charge.

The high school has, for the entire year, been again under the charge of Prof. F. L. Pugsley, assisted by Mrs. L. A. Brown, and both have been untiring in their efforts to make the school prosperous and to call forth the energies of their pupils, who have made rapid and thorough progress in their studies.

At the close of the spring term, Herbert Rice and Grace E. Andrews graduated from the school, and were awarded suitable diplomas by the school board.

At the close of the present opening term several others will graduate and will be alike awarded. With the annual appropriation, and the tuitions, the high school has been nearly sustained, a few dollars only of the town's school money being used in accordance with a vote of the school meeting of last March.

Several pupils from the neighboring towns are availing themselves of the instruction in our high school, which has a reputation for good work which but few schools acquire, and we hope our people will continue to give it their active and generous support.

As the years pass by the tendency is, that the schools nearest the center of the town increase in membership, while the other divisions continue to have fewer pupils. Under the present system all divisions are served alike so far as it is possible to do so.

Sooner or later the question of grouping these divisions together will become a matter for consideration, as to how this can best be done for the greatest benefit to all the pupils, and because of this fact, there should be no lack of interest in any outlying district in the excellent advantages now enjoyed for educational purposes.

The question of fuel, and how our large school rooms can best be heated, will soon become another serious question which we leave with our people to think about.

Again we call particular attention to the roll of honor, which is indeed a most excellent one, as it illustrates the earnestness and fine deportment of so many of our pupils in their studies and in their schools. We have been greatly pleased to see so many of the parents and friends of the pupils, in both the high and division schools attending the different examinations of their schools, and feel grateful for their interest in all matters relative to the education of the young people of this town, and we hope that the same liberal and generous support that has been given our schools in the past may be continued to the end, that this town may continue to enjoy the enviable reputation it has been accorded through a long series of years, a town, whose population is one of the most intelligent in this state.

In accordance with the request of many patrons and friends of the high school, we append herewith a full course of study as now used in this school, prepared by Prof. F. L. Pugsley, to which we wish to call attention. All of which is respectfully submitted,

REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF HENNIKER FREE PUBLIC
LIBRARY,

The trustees have made their annual examination of the books, and find them in good order. There are upon the shelves 1574 volumes of bound books, and a large number of books in paper covers, and magazines. About thirty of the books need rebinding. At the time of the fire last June four books were burned. They have been replaced by the trustees, the person to whom the books were charged paying half the cost of the new books.

A large collection of books and magazines have been presented by Hon. P. B. Cogswell of Concord, several books by Master Willis Wylie Howe of St Louis, Mr. T. Frank Davis of Sacramento, Cal., Hon. J. H. Gallinger, and state papers by the State of New Hampshire, and books and magazines from three citizens of the town, and the usual reduction in rent has been given by Mr. Emerson,

Six thousand, three hundred and fifty volumes of bound books have been taken from the library during the year by 175 different families, while the magazines and books in paper covers have been in constant circulation. Though it would be very gratifying to know that the books reached every family in town, yet we have no doubt that an elevating influence is felt by all, and that the time will come when all will receive its benefits.
