

ABSTRACT OF BUSINESS TRANSACTED AT THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING MARCH, 14, 1922.

Officers elected: Town Clerk, John G. Townsend; Selectman for three years, Edward C. Boynton; Town Treasurer, John G. Townsend; Highway Agents, Walter H. Clarke and Amedee M. Deschenes; Water Commissioner for three years, George J. Cournoyer; Overseer of Poor, Hubert F. O'Neil; Chief Engineer of Fire Department, Julius H. Parrott; Chief of Police, Hubert F. O'Neil; Tax Collector, Hubert F. O'Neil; Auditors, Edward L. Fay, Bowman F. Cann and Frank H. Baldwin; Commissioner of Humiston Park for three years, Lawrence W. Brown; Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, Will J. Mower.

Voted that the remaining officers be appointed by the Selectmen.

Voted that the reports as printed be laid in the table.

Voted to raise and appropriate the following sums of money:

Voted that the Selectmen be authorized to borrow in anticipation of taxes.

Voted that Firemen be paid same as last year.

Voted that the town purchase and install a standard Siren Fire Signal in a suitable location, raise and appropriate \$600.00 to pay for same, that the Board of Fire Engineers be a committee to purchase and install same.

Voted to raise and appropriate \$600.00 to aid in support of a District Nurse.

Voted to raise and appropriate \$500.00 for sprinkling streets.

Voted to raise and appropriate \$200.00 for band concerts, by East Jaffrey Band, two of same to be at Jaffrey Center in July and August.

Voted that the Selectmen be instructed to sell and convey the tract of land between the lot of Maxime Robichaud and Cretia Brook.

Voted that the town discontinue the highway that is wholly throught land of C. Hillsmith, known as the McCormack place.

Voted that the town accept as a public highway, the right-of-way known as K. K. Road, leading easterly from the tracks of the Boston & Maine Railroad in East Jaffrey Village, as laid out and shown on a plan filed with the Selectmen on Feb. 9, 1922 and recorded in plan in book 2, Page 163, of the Cheshire Registry, and that the highway be called the K. K. Road and properly marked.

Voted that the Selectmen are hereby instructed to take from the Road Agents districts the unimproved sections of the Contoocook Valley Road, so called from Concord to Rindge and to accept the provisions of Chapter 117, Laws of 1917, for the maintenance of said sections of road and the sum of \$300.00 is set aside from the money raised for highway work for this purpose.

Voted that the town raise and appropriate \$4,000.00 for trunk line maintenance.

Voted that the town raise and appropriate \$950.00 for State Aid Maintenance.

Voted that the town allow two and one half per cent discount on taxes if paid on or before July 15th of each year.

Voted that the town raise and appropriate \$100.00

for sidewalks at Jaffrey Center, under the direction of the Selectmen.

Voted that the chair appoint a committee of three to investigate and report as to a new side walk from the Post office to the railroad station and report at some future or an adjournment of this meeting. The chair appointed for said committee, George H. Duncan, Frank H. Baldwin and Louis Cournoyer.

Voted that the town raise and appropriate \$500.00 for the erection of a Grand Stand on Humiston Field, to be expended under the direction of the Commissioners of Humiston Field.

Voted that the Selectmen be authorized and instructed to renew for three years the Slade Road note of \$2500.00 from Nov. 1, 1922.

Voted that the town authorize the Selectmen to install ten more street lights.

Voted that the town raise and appropriate \$2000.00 toward payment of floating indebtedness.

Voted that the Road Agents be instructed to use the road scrapers, after snow storms, to keep the following named highways in a suitable condition for travel with an automobile, Highway from Shattuck's Inn to Squantum Village, and East Jaffrey Village to Peterboro and Rindge town lines.

Voted to pass over Article 24. (Bath house at Long Pond.)

Voted that a committee of three be appointed by the chair to act in conjunction with the Jaffrey Village Improvement Society, in securing architect's plans and estimates thereon for the repair and alteration of the Old Town House at Jaffrey Center; That the sum of Two Hun-

dred Dollars be raised and appropriated for the purpose, and that said committee report at an adjournment of this meeting. The chair appointed for said Committee, Albert Annett, Elwyn S. Mayo and Bowman F. Cann.

Voted to adjourn to the second Tuesday in June, 1922, in Union Hall at 7, 30 P. M.

ABSTRACT OF ADJOURNED TOWN MEETING JUNE 13, 1922, AT 7.30 P. M.

The committee appointed at the March meeting reported in reference to a new sidewalk from the east side of River Street to the railroad station. Voted to accept the report.

Voted to raise and appropriate \$2100.00 to build a cement side walk on the southerly side of Main St. in East Jaffrey Village from the eastrely side of River Street to the railroad station.

The Committee appointed reported on the proposed plans for changing and repairing the town house at Jaffrey Center.

Voted to accept the report.

Voted that the Village Improvement Society of Jaffrey, in co-operation with a committee of the town appointed at the annual town meeting in March, 1922, be authorized and empowered to repair the old town house at Jaffrey Center in accordance with a plan proposed by

architect Allen W. Jackson of Boston, provided that all cost above the sum of \$3000.00 shall be borne by the Village Improvement Society. Provided not to begin the work until satisfactory financial guarantees shall be given by the Village Improvement Society to the committee that it will bear all expense above \$3000.00 and will see that said work is completed according to the plans.

Voted that the Selectmen be authorized to borrow the sum of \$2250.00 for one year, provided the Jaffrey Village Improvement Society accept the conditions of the previous vote, and appropriate the income of the Conant Repair fund, available, the whole amount not to exceed \$3000.00 for the repair of the old Town House at Jaffrey Center, said sum to be expended under the direction of the Village Improvement Society and a committee of the town appointed at the Annual Town Meeting in March.

Geo. H. Duncan was granted permission to present the following resolution: Whereas, the increase in the number of users of the Jaffrey Town water system has necessarily resulted in a decrease of the water pressure at services at high points on the system, so that in some instances in the vicinity of Jaffrey Center there is insufficient pressure for household service, and little protection in case of fire; and

Whereas, it would be possible, by the installation of a storage tank and auxiliary electric pump or otherwise, at some high point, to supplement the present pressure; therefore, be it

Resolved, that the Moderator appoint a committee of three, one of whom shall be a member of the present board of Water Commissioners, to investigate feasibility and expense of installing such a supplementary system, that said committee be authorized to draw upon the Board of Water Commissioners for their reasonable expenses in making such investigation in an amount not to exceed

\$200.00, and report their findings to the next Annual Town Meeting.

Voted that the resolution be accepted. The Moderator appointed for said committee, George H. Duncan, Edward C. Boynton and Edward L. Fay.

Voted to adjourn.

ABSTRACT OF SPECIAL TOWN MEETING JAN. 20th, 1923, AT 2 P. M., IN UNION HALL

Voted that the town of Jaffrey exempt the New Hampshire Match Company from all municipal taxes for a period of ten years, commencing April 1st, 1923, upon the following property owned by it and located in the town of Jaffrey, viz: Stock of lumber and match making blocks up to \$1000.00 in value; all of its match making machinery and equipment; machinery and equipment contained in its machine shop and used for the purpose of manufacturing match making machinery; and all of its inventory of finished matches and supplies.

This not to exempt from State and County taxes. Voted to adjourn.

REPORT OF THE FIRE ENGINEERS FOR THE YEAR ENDING FEB. 1, 1923

During the past year the fire department has maintained its efficiency, as far as possible, by practice meetings on the part of the firemen, and by keeping the buildings and apparatus in good condition. Only one serious fire has occurred, on July 22, when the Cutter House at Jaffrey Centre was entirely destroyed. This fire disclosed a condition with regard to water pressure in that part of the town which had already been a source of worry to residents, and the cause of the appointment of a committee to investigate possibilities of increased pressure. A subsequent test by a representative of the insurance Underwriters showed a pressure near the Engine House at Jaffrey of twenty pounds, at the Town Hall of ten pounds, and at the Shattuck Inn of thirteen pounds. As a result of this test, in October all insurence rates at Jaffrey Center were increased 33 per cent. This condition should be remedied in some manner, probably in the way pointed out in the report of the Committee printed elsewhere in this report.

The engineers found that the Engine House at the Centre was in bad condition, the underpinning having fallen in to quite an extent, while the roof leaked badly. Both these repairs were made. This building still needs painting, and should be attended to during the coming year. The foundations of the engine house at East Jaffrey are also in bad shape, and should be looked after the coming year. Apparently, however, an appropriation of \$1,200.00 for the support of the department, the same as last year, will provide sufficient funds to make these repairs, as well as meet other expenses of the department.

At the last annual town meeting an appropriation of \$600.00 was made, and the engineers were instructed to install an electric siren fire alarm. Such a signal was installed on trial, but in the opinion of many citizens seemed to be inadequate. Under the circumstances, therefore, the engineers concluded that it was unwise to make this expenditure without further instructions from the voters. If it is decided that a signal similar to the one tried is satisfactory, the appropriation is still available, and is ample. If a more powerful signal is thought necessary, an additional appropriation of some \$2,000.00 will be required, as well as an increase in the regular appropriation sufficient to maintain it, as it is understood that the building where it is housed must be kept warm.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Jaffrey:

I herewith submit to you my fifth annual report, this being the fourteenth under district supervision.

The enrollment of the Conant High School is practically the same as last year, showing a total enrollment of 75, an average membership of 73.58, and an average attendance of 70.99 with only nine cases of tardiness during the first twelve weeks as against 38 during the same period of the previous year.

We were fortunate in retaining the services of Head Master E. B. Marriner and of Mr. James P. Carroll for a second year. Three changes occurred in the senior high school, Miss Gertrude E. Barry, a graduate of Radcliffe, succeeding Miss Williams in the English and History department, Miss Marjorie Simenoe, a Keene graduate, succeeding Mrs. Bassette, and Miss Ruth Peckham, a Bay Path graduate, succeeding Miss Sheldrick.

The work of the high school has been extremely gratifying, showing the advantage of a strong and able administration as well as most effective teaching. During the past two years a good proportion of the graduates of Conant High School have enrolled in higher institutions for advanced work, Keene Normal School alone having five graduates of the last two graduating classes.

In the grades comparatively few changes were made at the opening of the present year. Miss Laura A. Smith, who had taught different grades in the Conant building for four years retired and was succeeded by Miss Mae Jackson, a graduate of Keene Normal School. Miss Agnes M. Farrar has charge of the room containing grades V-

VII. Miss Farrar previously taught in Fitzwilliam and last year in Massachusetts, and has attended two summer sessions at Fitchburg Normal School.

In the primary building the only change was in grade II where Miss Mildred R. Bean, a Keene graduate, succeeded Miss O'Hara. In District No. 4, Miss Emily J. Gove succeeded Miss Alice E. Belcher who was transferred to a larger school in West Rindge. Miss Gove has had teaching experience in Maine and has attended the summer session at Farmington.

Miss Grimes of Peterboro is, for the fourth year, continuing her excellent work as supervisor of music.

Every teacher who contracted to teach in Jaffrey this year came as agreed and there have been no changes thus far during the school year.

The evening school has shown very nearly the same attendance as last year. The satisfactory work done during these sessions is attested by the fact that twelve pupils who were, under the law, required to attend have passed the examination in reading exempting them from further attendance. A number who are voluntary attendants have shown their interest by regular attendance. It is to be regretted that a much larger number of young people do not avail themselves of the advantages offered in the courses given in the evening school.

Miss Hiller has faithfully followed up her work as school nurse during the present year. On account of the great amount of sickness in the homes the demands upon her time have been so great that the physical examination of the pupils has not yet been completed.

A number of cases of Scarlet Fever have appeared in a light form. As several cases occurred early in the year in the second grade it was thought advisable to burn the books used in this room as well as the material used in busy work. The school board have been urged to destroy all books used in the schools, hoping thereby to eliminate the occasional outbreaks of this disease in the several rooms. Whenever a case appears all the books and supplies used by the pupil having the disease are immediately burned up and all possible precautions taken to avoid the contagion. Thus far the most careful inves-

tigation has failed to reveal any connection between the use of school books and the outbreak of Scarlet Fever, and under the circumstances I would hesitate to advocate a special appropriation of over \$5,000 for a single year to replace all the books now in use.

Although the matter of transportation is one that involves the largest single expense next to teachers' salaries, the parents interested have seemed to be well satisfied with the results obtained, and last year at the request of the parents of Dist. No. 4 all pupils above the sixth grade in that section were granted transportation. There now remain two small rural schools in Districts No. 4 and No. 9, one having eight pupils and the other ten. As the expense of transporting these eighteen pupils would be considerably less than the salaries of the two teachers required to keep these schools open, it may be worth serious consideration another school year as to whether these pupils should not be given the advantages of the village schools.

The State Aid granted for the present year is the same as last, slightly over \$4,500. If the present law remains unchanged and the rating for teachers for the next two years is made on the basis of those employed this year, the training and experience of the present force would warrant an allowance of considerably over \$5,000. As so many items enter into the granting of State Aid, however, it will be unsafe to estimate a larger allowance next year than this.

The budget for the present year submitted to the State Board of Education showed a proposed expenditure of approximately \$1,000 more than the available revenue to June 30th, therefore in order to comply with the requirements for State Aid it will be necessary to ask for an appropriation of this amount to cover the expected deficit for the present year.

The general expenses for another year should not differ materially from those of the present year. Salaries will have to be practically the same except for new teachers, and as \$900 seems to be the minimum at which new teachers from the normal schools will accept posi-

tions, practically the same amount in the aggregate will be required for salaries next year as for the present year. Text books and supplies cost practically the same this year as last. Fuel is so uncertain that it would be unsafe to estimate any lower appropriation for that item.

I believe that the citizens of Jaffrey should keenly appreciate the teaching force that is so faithfully working in their schools. From the primary grades to the last year of high school we find the same earnest, active, effective interest in the welfare of the pupils.

In closing I wish to thank the citizens, teachers, pupils and members of the school board for the continuance of their hearty support.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE TO INVESTIGATE IN-CREASED WATER PRESSURE AT JAFFREY CENTRE

Your Committee, appointed at the adjourned town meeting to investigate the necessity of increased water pressure at Jaffrey Centre, both for fire and domestic service, had impressed upon it the need by the experience at the fire on July 22, which destroyed the Cutter House, and by reports from various water-takers in that vicinity that for a considerable part of the time it is impossible to secure water for domestic purposes. The lack of fire protection has already resulted in an increase in insurance rates from 25c per \$100.00 per year to 33c per \$100.

The Committee secured the services of Mr. Harry W. Sawyer, of Manchester, an engineer who has previously had to do with our water system, and his report follows. It shows that if a tank of sufficient capacity is built in the ground at the top of the hill in the rear of the residence of Miss Lucia B. Cutter, adequate pressure can be obtained without the erection of a stand-pipe. This tank would be supplied from the present pipe line near the highway by means of a motor driven pump.

Mr. Sawyer's estimate does not include land damage. The matter is now under consideration by the owners of the land affected, and it is expected that figures will be available by the day of town meeting.

The only expense of the investigation was the bill of Mr. Sawyer, which was \$43.14.

To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to pay for the construction of a sewer on North Street, in East Jaffrey Village, beginning at the corner near the store of the Meyers Company, and running northerly to the intersection of the Old Peterboro Road, or act in any way relating thereto, as petitioned for by Joseph Lemire and others.

24th. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on taxes paid before any certain date, or act in any way relating thereto.

25th. To see if the Town will vote to place additional insurance on the Jaffrey Town House, the same to to be paid for by the Jaffrey Village Improvement Society,

and authorize the Selectmen to execute and deliver to said Society an agreement that in case of fire loss they and their successors in office will collect and pay over to said Society any insurance paid for by said Society, or act in any way relating thereto.

26th. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money for the improvement of the highway leading from Cheshire Village to the Catholic Cemetery.
