## REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES.

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The Trustees of the Public Library submit their report for the year ending the third Tuesday of February, 1894.

The reports of the Treasurer, Librarian, and Committee on Books, which are appended, sufficiently explain the transactions of these departments of the Board.

We desire to acknowledge the gift of 56 volumes from Marshal Sanders Post, Grand Army of the Republic. Also a gift of 45 volumes from Mrs. Mary J. Lowrie. These books make a valuable addition to the Library.

Want of shelving room has prevented any considerable addition of new books, such only as were regarded as indispensable having been purchased during the year.

The standing appropriation of \$500 annually for five years expires, by limitation, with the current year. The welfare of the Library requires that this sum should be continued. The items of rent, salary of Librarian, insurance, re-binding and fuel, absorb the larger part of it, leaving but a few dollars for books and periodicals.

During the year, Rev. Lucius Waterman removed from town, and the vacancy thus created was filled by the election of Hon. A. S. Batchellor by the Board. Miss Stella B. Farr was also elected to fill the vacancy created by the death of Mrs. Eliza J. Bingham.

These vacancies as well as those caused by the expiration of the terms of Hon. Edgar Aldrich, Mrs. Mandane A. Parker and Capt. George Farr are to be filled at the annual March meeting.

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## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BOOKS.

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The Public Library having become a valued institution in our town a few words in regard to its work may be of interest.

The Library was opened in 1890 with 3500 books on the shelves and has been steadily increasing in size, influence

and the number of readers. In one year about 13,000 volumes have been distributed, an average of over three and a half per cent. to each resident. The current magazines have gone into many households, keeping our people abreast of the times, and a valuable collection of reference books is already on the shelves. These have been recently placed near the entrance in order to be perfectly free of access to the public.

In one respect the Library has been of special value: namely, to the school. The good collection of works of history and travel, as well as magazine articles on the same subjects being in constant demand by the students of history and geography. It is hoped by those interested in the Library that in the future there may be still closer connection between it and the schools.

Our Library already stands high among the older and larger Libraries of the State; the public spirited citizens of the town will surely not allow it to fall behind for lack of interest or funds.

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## REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN.

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TO THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES :

During the year ending February 1, 1894, 196 cards have been issued, making in all, 1591.

Twelve thousand eight hundred and forty-two books have been loaned, an average of 240 per week. Of these 77 per cent. have been fiction; 5 per cent. history, 4 per cent. travels and the rest distributed among biography, religion and miscellaneous subjects.

There are now 4957 volumes in the Library, 255 having been added the past year, 55 by purchase and 200 by donation.

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TOWN HISTORY.

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The Committee on town history submit the following report: Considerable progress has been made in the work during the current year. The Town has been carefully canvassed by Mr. George C. Furber for the purpose of gathering material for the genealogical record. In his report to the Committee Mr. Furber says :

“The entire town, with the exception of a small portion of Littleton village, has been thoroughly canvassed and family and lineage blanks of every family have been filled out as completely as possible. I am now at work on the records of the first settlers. It is very difficult to obtain anything more than general information regarding these, as all who were contemporary with them are now dead. Considerable of value has been found in the Town Records, and this, supplemented with births, marriages and deaths, and obituaries found in files of old papers has enabled me to make out records more or less complete of those who settled and made Littleton the prosperous town it now is.

“I have also copied all inscriptions on the monuments and gravestones in the several cemeteries in town and put them in a permanent book carefully indexed, which is to be deposited in the Town Clerk’s office. This book has also proved very valuable in filling out record blanks of old residents, and will prove more and more valuable each year as many of the gravestones are becoming broken and illegible, and the number of these defaced monuments will increase from year to year.

“I have also copied in tabular form from the town records a list of all the principal town officers from the organization

of the town to the present time. This list will be useful in completing the biographies of our people and make an interesting table to be inserted in the History.

“The remaining portion of Littleton village will be canvassed within a short time and the incomplete records, (about 150 in number,) finished as soon as possible.”

Mr. Furber has been painstaking and thorough in this work. Many difficulties are in the way of an entirely successful completion of the record of families. In some instances no living representative of some of the early settlers can be found and the material concerning others is very scant. We confidently rely upon those of our citizens who may have knowledge either by tradition, or otherwise, to furnish Mr. Furber with such information as they may possess.

The work generally is well in hand and we expect to have it in the hands of the printer before the expiration of another year.

# ANNUAL MEETINGS OF 1893.

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## LITTLETON VILLAGE DISTRICT.

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### WARRANT.

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the inhabitants qualified to vote in the territory described in an Act to create the Littleton Village District by uniting the Littleton Highway Precinct and the Littleton Fire District.

You are hereby notified to meet in Union Hall in said town on the 25th day of March, A. D., 1893, at one o'clock p. m., to act upon the following subjects :

I. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting until a moderator shall be chosen and qualified to serve for one year or until his successor is duly chosen.

II. To choose a clerk to serve in like manner.

III. To see if the inhabitants aforesaid will vote to adopt said act and establish said district first above mentioned.

IV. To choose all necessary officers, agents or committees for said district.

V. To see if the district will assume the debts and liabilities of the Littleton Highway Precinct and of the Littleton Fire District in consideration of the assignment and transfer to the District of all the money, property, rights and contracts belonging to either of said municipal corporations, and to authorize the Commissioners of this District, in its name, to execute any instruments in writing that may be deemed proper to perfect any contract or arrangements made with said Fire District and Highway Precinct or either.

VI. To raise and appropriate money by taxation or other means for the purposes named or authorized in said act of incorporation of this Village District.

VII. To transact any other business that may properly come before said meeting.

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### RECORD.

Meeting called to order by Charles F. Eastman, at 1.15 p. m., and warrant read ; proceeded to vote for Moderator pro tem. Whole number of votes cast fourteen, of which B. H. Corning had fourteen and was declared elected moderator of this meeting and took the oath of office in open meeting. Then proceeded to vote for clerk pro tem ; moved that A. S. Batchellor cast one vote for A. J. Barrett, who took oath of office in open meeting for clerk pro tem. Then was offered a written resolution regarding article third of the warrant, marked paper A 1, as follows : "That the act of the Legislature passed at its present session to create the Littleton Village District by uniting the present Littleton Highway Precinct and Littleton Fire District, be and hereby is accepted and adopted and that said district be and hereby is established:" this was declared a vote.

Then proceeded to vote for a moderator for the ensuing year. Whole number of votes cast, four, of which B. H. Corning had four and was declared elected moderator for the ensuing year and took the oath of office in open meeting. Proceeded to vote for a clerk for the ensuing year; whole number of votes cast, eight, of which A. J. Barrett had eight votes and was declared elected clerk for the ensuing year, and took the oath in open meeting.

Proceeded to vote for three district Commissioners; whole number of votes cast, twenty-two, of which Charles F. Eastman, John T. Simpson and Benjamin H. Corning each had twenty-two, were declared elected and took the oath of office in open meeting; Charles F. Eastman to serve three years, John T. Simpson to serve two years and Benjamin H. Corning to serve for one year. O. G. Hale was appointed to serve as auditor for the year ensuing, under Article fifth of the warrant.

A. S. Batchellor offered a written resolution as follows: "Voted, that this District assume the debts and liabilities of the Littleton Highway District and of the Littleton Fire District in consideration of the assignment and transfer to the District of all the money, property, rights and contracts belonging to either of said municipal corporations and that the Commissioners of this District be and hereby are authorized in its name to execute any instruments in writing what they may deem necessary and proper to perfect any contract or arrangements made with said Fire District and Highway Precinct or either, in conformity to the authority herein granted :"

Moved that the meeting take a recess until 2.10 p. m., was declared a vote and took a recess as above.

Meeting called to order at 2.10 by the moderator.

Voted to have the Commissioners pay A. J. Cram what money may be due him as night watch up to the present time and to act their own judgment in employing a night watch from now until Spring.

Written resolution offered by D. C. Remich, as per paper A. A. as follows: "That the sum of two thousand dollars in addition to that voted by the town be raised for the construction and maintenance of highways within the district; one thousand dollars to be assessed and collected this year and the balance to be raised by the Commissioners upon the credit of the district :"

Written resolution offered by D. C. Remich as per paper marked A. B., as follows: "That the sum of thirty-five

hundred dollars be raised for the support of the Fire Department and to pay for hydrants, stand pipes and sprinkling streets and to apply on the debts of the district:" this was declared a vote.

Written resolution offered by D. C. Remich as per paper marked A. C., as follows: "That the Commissioners be instructed to extend the fire alarm system and put in new boxes to reasonably protect the whole district:" this was declared a vote.

Written resolution offered by D. C. Remich as per paper marked A. D., as follows: "That the sum of one hundred dollars be raised for band concerts during the coming summer;" this was declared a vote.

Written resolution offered by D. C. Remich as per paper marked A. E. as follows: "That the sum of seventy-five dollars be raised for the support of the present public reading room in said district:" this was declared a vote.

Written resolution offered by D. C. Remich as shown by paper marked A. F. as follows: "That One Hundred Dollars be raised to be expended for shade trees and settees;" this was declared a vote.

Written resolution offered by D. C. Remich as shown by paper marked A. G. as follows: "That the commissioners be instructed to purchase a suitable team, and procure land and erect thereon a suitable stable and store and tool-house for the use of the district, and borrow money on the credit of the district to pay for the same:" this was declared a vote.

Written resolutions offered by A. S. Batchellor as per paper marked A. H. as follows: "Voted that the same rules be and are hereby adopted by this district that were in force by votes of the Precinct and the District, or either of them, which were consolidated or discontinued upon the establishment of this district, as to the preparation, printing and publication of the annual reports; also that in the account of expenditures published there be a division and classification so as to show clearly the outlay in each department of the district business separately; also that for the continuous

numbering of papers for reports hereafter published, the papers in all the printed reports of both the former organizations (district and precinct) be added and from the last page numbered according to that term, the rules prescribed by law for continuous paging of County reports be followed; also that each printed report give the list of all district officers, agents, Committees, engineers, firemen and regular or permanent employes of any department, including such statements in connection with that list as will show distinctly when the term of office of each Commissioner expires; also that transcripts of the warrants for annual and special meetings and of the proceedings at such meetings be given, including in the report for 1893-4, the warrants and proceedings for the last meeting of the Fire District and the Highway Precinct; also that the recommendations made by the Commissioners as to raising money and other proposals for consideration at the annual meeting and such other matters as they may deem ample shall be included and printed in the report; also that the foregoing shall be considered required in addition to what is prescribed by law to be done or included in such reports; also that this vote shall apply to all future annual printed reports or to district affairs:" this was declared a vote.

Moved and seconded that the meeting adjourn.

## FIRE DEPARTMENT.

### DIRECTIONS.

The glass covered box on side of alarm boxes contains the key; get the key by breaking glass, and open alarm box; pull down the hook, letting go at once. For second alarm pull down the hook after first alarm has rung.

The alarm will indicate the station from which the signal was given. Thus, a signal at Station No. 42 will be sounded by four strokes of the bell, followed by two strokes. This will be repeated so that notice will be clearly given that a fire has broken out in the vicinity of Station 42, if that be the case, because the alarm sounds a four, by four strokes of the bell and a two, by two strokes of the bell. In this way Station Forty-two is indicated. The other stations will be indicated in a similar manner, the second number struck by the alarm bell corresponding to the number in unit's place, either 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, or 7, as the case may be.

## REMARKS.

There is connected with the Fire department six miles of fire alarm service, consisting of twelve alarm boxes located in convenient and accessible places throughout the entire district, two strikers to sound the alarm and three alarm tappers in engineers' and hosemen's dwellings. The present cost of this system as near as can be approximated, including the extension made during the year of \$400, is \$1421.32.

The water company have taken up the four inch pipe from the bridge on Cottage street to the road above B. W. Kilburn's shop and replaced it with a six inch pipe, and laid a four inch pipe from main line near Grange hall up Pine street, connecting with the pipe on Pleasant street, and have added six hydrants during the year, located in suitable places to protect a large share of the property in the district.

The commissioners have placed at Aphthorp, for the protection of property there, a hose reel with 300 feet hose with play pipes, spanners, hydrant, wrenches, etc., and have appointed two firemen to operate the same; a small shed should be erected at some convenient place for the storage of this property. Your commissioners deemed it necessary for the protection of property from fire to appoint an inspector of buildings and a night watchman, who have so far attended to their duties to the satisfaction of the commissioners and as we believe in the interest of the property holders.

Your fire department is well officered and manned and the apparatus in good working order; but there should be purchased for the use of the department not less than two thousand feet of suitable hose, to make the equipment efficient in that respect; otherwise the system will compare favorably with other departments of its size.

## STREET SPRINKLING.

The limits of street sprinkling are Main street from Glenwood cemetery to Bridge over Ammonoosuc river on

Cottage street, Union street to stand pipe near G. H. Bunker's, Pleasant street to Oak Hill avenue, Cottage street from bridge to railroad including passenger station grounds, and South street to C. R. Coburn's residence. Of this territory was added in the fall of 1892, South street, Pleasant street and from junction of Main and Meadow streets to Glenwood cemetery.

### SEWERS.

The 15-inch sewer that was commenced in 1892 has been extended from a point near Edward Buckley's on Saranac street up Saranac and Main streets to the junction of Main and Pleasant streets; the board of commissioners feel it to be their duty to recommend, from a sanitary stand point, that catch basins with traps should be put in and connections made with the sewers from Maple, School, Clay, Jackson and Pleasant streets, and other extensions to main sewer up Main, Pleasant and Union streets, made as soon as practicable.

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In accordance with the vote and instructions of the district, your commissioners have purchased a team which has practically been in service since June 15, the labor of which is classified as follows :

One hundred twenty-four days on highways, sanding walks, snowing bridge and carting snow.

Forty-two days sprinkling streets.

Twenty-three days cleaning streets for sewers, drawing pipe and brick.

Twenty-four days drawing stone.

They also were instructed to procure land and erect thereon a suitable stable and store and tool house for the use of the district, and in accordance with those instructions purchased 11,450 feet of land with stable thereon, with ample right of way for access to and around the land, upon which they erected a small shed, which together with the



barn have furnished necessary accommodations for storage and stable purposes.

Your commissioners have had offers for the purchase of this property in advance of its cost.
