Polls will be open from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. on Tuesday, March 8th at the Village School to act on Articles 1 thru 8. The remaining Articles will be considered at 7:30 p.m. at the Village School.

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF MONT VERNON, in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Village School in said Mont Vernon, on Tuesday, the 8th day of March, next at 8:00 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1.

To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Article 2. Computer Generated format for Zoning Books

To see if the Town is in favor of the adoption of a computer-generated format for the Mont Vernon Zoning Ordinance, Wetland Zoning Regulations, Subdivision Regulations, Non-residential Site Plan Review Regulations, and Excavation Regulations, and their respective contents, indices and glossary. The document will be published as one book, as has been done in the past. Certain typographical errors, non-substantive housekeeping changes and renumbering of sections I-306 through I-316 will be made to the book if this article passes. These changes are shown highlighted in gray in the proposed formatted copy which is available for public inspection at the Town Hall, Town Clerk's office and Daland Library. Passage of this article does not negate nor guarantee passage of any other articles on the ballot. (Planning Board recommends 6-0)

Article 3. II-302.2 Wetlands

To see if the Town is in favor of the adoption of the following amendment to the existing Town Zoning Ordinance and proposed by the Planning Board. (Planning Board recommends 6-1)

Current Regulation:

II-302.2 Wetland areas, excluding bodies of water, may be used to fulfill up to 25% of the minimum lot size as required by Town ordinances and subdivision regulations provided that the minimum non wetland area is contiguous and sufficient in size and configuration to adequately accommodate all required utilities such as sewage disposal and water supply for on-site septic tank and leach fields including both a primary and a secondary leach field location.

Proposed Regulation:

II-302-2 Each lot must contain a contiguous non-wetland area sufficient in size and configuration to support all existing and proposed structures and utilities such as wells and septic systems, including a primary and secondary leach field location.

Article 4. I-307.3 Payment of Impact Fees.

To see if the Town is in favor of the adoption of the following amendment to the existing Town Zoning Ordinances as proposed by the Planning Board. In the event that Article 2 passes, this paragraph will be re-numbered as I-307.7. (Planning Board recommends 7-0)

Current Regulation:

I-309.3 Payment of Fees. The application shall pay the impact fees required of this Ordinance to the Town of Mont Vernon when a building permit is issued.

Proposed Regulation:

I-309.3 Payment of Fees. Impact fees shall, in accordance with RSA 674:21, (V)(d), be assessed at the time a building permit is issued but the applicant shall pay the impact fees required of the Ordinance to the Town of Mont Vernon at the Town Hall when a certificate of occupancy is issued, unless as provided in the foregoing stature, the planning board has advanced the time of such payment or the planning board and the applicant have come to some other arrangement as provided in said statute RSA 674:21, (V)(d).

Article 5. I-306 Wireless Service Facility Regulations.

To see if the Town is in favor of the adoption of the following amendment to the existing Town Zoning Ordinance a proposed by the Planning Board. Current regulation “I-306 Telecommunications Facilities Site Requirements” is proposed to be completely replaced by “I-306 Wireless Service Facilities Regulations” in order to keep up with new terms and issues of the industry. The proposed regulation includes some of, and expands upon, the existing regulation. The full text is available for public inspection at the Town Hall, Town Clerk’s office and Daland Library. (Planning Board recommends 6-0)

Article 6. I-406 Non-Residential Zoning.

To see if the Town is in favor of the adoption of the following amendment to the existing Town Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board. A new regulation “I-308 In-law Apartments” in proposed. The purpose of this ordinance is to enable extended families to live together by allowing in-law apartments without a special exception. It defines the terms for approval of existing and future in-law apartments. The full text is available for public inspection at the Town Hall, Town Clerk’s office and Daland Library. In the event that Article 2 does not pass, this regulation will be numbered I-317. Planning Board recommends 6-1)

Article 7. I-406 Non-residential Zoning

To see if the Town is in favor of the adoption of the following amendment to the existing Town Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board. Current regulation “I-406 home Business” is proposed to be replaced by “I-406 Non-residential Zoning.” The purpose of this ordinance is to provide the Planning Board the standards and thresholds for determining the eligibility of a non-residential site use for a non-residential site plan review. The proposed regulation includes and expands upon the existing regulation. The full text is available for public inspection at the Town Hall, Town Clerk’s office and Daland Library. (Planning Board recommends 7-0)

Article 8. I-309 Phasing

To see if the Town is in favor of the adoption of the following amendment to the existing Town Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board. In the event that Article 2 does not pass, this regulation will be numbered I-318. (Planning Board recommends 4-0)

Proposed Regulation:

I-309 Phasing

I-309.1 Purpose

It is a demonstrated fact that rapid and uncontrolled proliferation of the subdivision process places a burden on the municipality to provide and pay for municipal services that are required when a subdivision is approved. The Planning Board is authorized in circumstances where the record demonstrates that such services will be impacted by a particular proposal, in lieu of denial, to require that the subdivision be phased so that the impact will be phased over a certain period of time. The Planning Board is directed to promulgate such regulations as are necessary to effectuate the purpose of this section as part of their subdivision regulations.

Article 9. Bond issue for Highway Garage.....Ballot vote required.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Sixty One Thousand Three Hundred Eighty Five Dollars (\$661,385) for the construction of a new highway garage building on land owned by the Town; for equipping and furnishing of said building, for site development, architectural and other service fees; and for any other items incidental thereto and necessary for said construction. Said appropriation to be raised in part by the issuance of and sale of bonds or notes on the credit of the Town, in accordance with the provisions of RSA Chapter 33, in an amount not to exceed Six Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$600,000). To authorize the Selectmen to determine the time and place or payment of principal and interest, fixing the bonds, and all other matters in connection therewith; and to further authorize the Selectmen to withdraw the sum of Sixty One Thousand Three Hundred Eighty Five Dollars (\$61,385) from the highway garage capital reserve fund for the above purposes; Pursuant to RSA 33:8 a 2/3 supermajority is required to adopt this article. Selectmen recommend 3-0)

Article 10. Bond issue to purchase Open Space.....Ballot vote required.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Seven Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars and 00/100 (750,000) (Gross Budget) for the purchase by municipality of land or other property interest therein, for the protection of the natural heritage and rural character in the best interest of the Town, including any buildings or structures incidental to such land; and to authorize the issuance of not more than Seven Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars and 00/100 (\$750,000) of bonds and notes, in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act, (RSA 33:1 et seq., as amended), and, further, to authorize the Selectmen to issue, negotiate, sell and deliver said bonds and notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon as well as the maturity and other terms thereof, and to take any other action they deem appropriate to effectuate the sale and/or issuance of said bonds or notes, subject, however, to the following limitations:

No such bonds shall be issued earlier than July 1, 2005; and, any of such bonds shall have appropriate terms and maturities such that no principal or interest payment shall become due and payable prior to January 1, 2006; and no such bonds or notes shall be issued with a term of maturity of less than fifteen (15) years.

Provided, further that the Selectmen shall not issue such bonds or notes until such time as they have presented to either an annual or special town meeting, a warrant article asking the meeting to ratify, by a simple majority vote, the particular parcel and the parcel ownership interest chosen by the Selectmen for purchase and said meeting has approved such warrant article.

Pursuant to RSA 33:8 a 2/3 supermajority is required to adopt this.

(Selectmen unanimously oppose).

Article 11.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000) to be added to the Highway Garage Capital Reserve Fund previously established under the provisions of RSA 35:1, for the purpose of constructing a Highway Garage. (Selectmen recommend 3-0)

Article 12. Fire Truck Capital Reserve previously established.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000) to be added to the Fire Truck Capital Reserve previously established under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of purchasing or replacing Fire Trucks. (Selectmen recommend 3-0).

Article 13. Purchasing protective gear.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Seven Thousand Nine Hundred Sixty Eight Dollars (\$27,968) for the purpose of purchasing protective gear and related equipment; Two Thousand and Seven Hundred Ninety Six Dollars (\$2,796) to be raised by the Town of Mont Vernon; the remaining Twenty Five Thousand One Hundred Seventy Two Dollars (\$25,172) to be provided by a Federal Grant. (Note: This grant has already been received by the Town and the Department) (Selectmen recommend 3-0).

Article 14. Appropriation for engineering architecture of Fire House

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000) for the engineering, architecture, and estimating services necessary to prepare a site plan, including septic and drainage designs, and a schematic building design for a new Fire Station. The funding requested by this article will provide the information necessary to present a warrant article in 2006 to demolish the existing building and to construct a new Fire Station on the current lot. (Selectmen recommend 3-0).

Article 15. For the disposal of 1961 International Pumper Fire Truck.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of the 1961 International Pumper Fire Truck by sealed bids with the proceeds to be returned to the Town General Fund. (Selectmen recommend 3-0).

Article 16. For the disposal of 1972 International Tanker Fire Truck.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of the 1972 International Tanker Fire Truck by sealed bids with the proceeds to be returned to the Town General Fund. (Selectmen recommend 3-0).

Article 17. For the disposal of 1997 Ford Pick-up Truck

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of the 1997 Ford Pick-up Truck by sealed bids with the proceeds to be returned to the Town General Fund. (Selectmen recommend 3-0).

Article 18. Modification of Optional Veteran's Tax Credit.

To see if the Town will vote, pursuant to RSA 72:28 to increase the veteran's tax credit from One Hundred Dollars (\$100) to Five Hundred Dollars (\$500). To qualify, the person or persons surviving spouse must satisfy all the conditions of RSA 72:28-34 that pertain to eligibility for this credit, as well as those contained in any other applicable status. (Selectmen recommend 3-0).

Article 19. Modification of Service-Connected Disability Veteran's Tax Credit.

To see if the Town will vote, pursuant to RSA 72:35, to increase the service connected disability veteran's tax credit from One Thousand Four Hundred Dollars (\$1,400) to Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000). To qualify, the person or person's surviving spouse must satisfy all the conditions of RSA 72:35, that pertain to eligibility for this credit, as well as those contained in any other applicable statute. Further, said credit for service connected total disability shall replace the standard veteran's tax credit in its entirety and shall not be in addition thereto. (Selectmen recommend 3-0).

Article 20.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to borrow in anticipation of taxes.

Article 21. SPECIAL PURPOSE 5 YEAR NON-LAPSING ARTICLE.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Seventy Six Thousand Nine Hundred Seventeen Dollars (\$76,917) for the reconstruction of Town roads. This article will be a five-year, non-lapsing article under the provisions of RSA 32:7VI. (Selectmen recommend 3-0)

Article 22.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Two Thousand Dollars (\$22,000) for painting the Town Hall. (Selectmen recommend 3-0).

Article 23.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000) for the purpose of reconstructing the McCollom building fire escape. (Selectmen recommend 3-0).

Article 24.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Million Two Hundred Seventy Nine Thousand Twenty Four Dollars (\$1,279,024) for the 2005 operating and maintenance budget, exclusive of warrant articles. (Selectmen recommend 3-0)

Article 25.

To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to accept Wallace Lane as shown on a subdivision plat approved by the Planning Board, provided that such street has been constructed to applicable Town specifications as determined by the Board of Selectmen or their agent.

Article 26.

To see if the Town will vote to rename the Road, running from the intersection of Weston Hill Road and Brook Road to the intersection of Tater Street and Kendall Hill Road, currently known as Tater Street Extension, to Gregory Street. Such change to be effective July 1, 2005.

Article 27.

To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept Dutton Circle as shown on a subdivision plat approved by the Planning Board, provided that such street has been constructed to applicable Town specifications as determined by the Board of Selectmen or their agents.

Article 28.

To act on reports of all Town Officers, Agents, Auditors, Committees, etc. and raise and appropriate any money relative thereto.



SELECTMEN'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR 2004

The year 2004 saw continued housing growth in the town of Mont Vernon and along with this growth came the challenge of how best to manage and control the burden it places on the town's infrastructure and subsequent tax rate. As the number of dwellings in the town increases, and thus the population, an additional burden is placed on existing town and school district services. This increased demand, on the various services provided by the town, directly affects the cost of providing these services and the taxes we must collect from its citizens to provide them.

The town's tax rate is set based upon monies appropriated during the annual town and school district meetings. If you want a say in what spending gets approved for the town and school budgets, it is important that you attend these meetings. It is interesting that more people attend the town meeting than attend the school district meeting considering that the majority of the taxes collected are spent to support the town's schools.

During the year selectmen John Koch resigned from the board of selectmen and Jim Whipple was appointed in his place. I would like to take this opportunity to thank John for all of his contributions, hard work, and years of service he has provided to the town.

One of the significant events that took place in the town this year was the scheduled re-assessment of all real estate properties. The state of New Hampshire requires all towns be re-assessed from time to time and the town retained the services of Earls, Nieder, and Perkins for the re-valuation work. While this activity was a huge undertaking for the town the work proceed with relatively few problems. The end of year tax bill for each and every property reflected the new valuation.

The town was fortunate to receive a federal government grant for the purchase of a new fire truck. This grant relieved our local tax rate as the town only needed to provide 10% for the overall funding for the vehicle as specified by the grant. In March Aquiline (Bucky) Grugnale took over as the director of Public Works replacing Chris Carter. Bucky, along with the highway department crew are responsible for all road maintenance and snow removal, the running of the town's trash disposal/transfer station, and maintenance of all town building. If you have not had a chance to meet Bucky, feel free to stop by the highway garage and introduce yourself.

After many years of service to the town police chief Mark Schultz has decided to retire effective April 1st, 2005. I want to thank Mark for his dedication to the town and all the hard work and effort he provided in building one of the best police departments in the area. If you have a chance please take the time to thank Mark and wish him well in all of his future endeavors.

As stated in last years town report, a small town like Mont Vernon requires volunteer help with the various town activities is crucial to the town's ability to function. Many residents volunteer their time to serve on the various boards (planning, conservation, zoning, etc.) and committees (open space, budget, etc.) and without these volunteer folks our town would cease to function. There are many activities that folks can volunteer to participate in and I would like to take this opportunity to encourage everyone to participate in one way or another. Mont Vernon is a wonderful community and a great place to live, but will only remain so if people who live in town get involved and participate. Daland Memorial Library 2004

Your town library has been a vibrant, busy place this year. At the end of 2004, over 14,000 items were borrowed from the Daland, an increase of 5.6% from the previous year. Visits to the library totaled to 9955, an increase in traffic of 10.2%! The number of library cards issued increased 26.6%. We currently have over 14,700 items in our collection for your use. We hosted many activities here for children and adults, everything from storytime and laptime to flower arranging and book discussions. We welcomed one new staff member, Allain Schnable, who replaced Lynn Balk as senior library assistant in October.

Our summer reading program for children newborn through sixth grade, sponsored by both the Friends of the Daland Memorial Library and the library trustees, enrolled 129 Mont Vernon children. These kids read 1493 books over a six week period and were invited to join in weekly activities, raffles, writing book reviews and creating book art. All programs were well attended and we had over 150 patrons on hand for our annual ice cream social. On national voting day, we held a mock election for children at the Daland so that they could choose their favorite author.

We currently provide books for three book groups – the adult group that meets at the Daland monthly, a 5th grade reading club at MVVS and a mother-daughter book group in town. We were able to borrow their book group selections through the statewide interlibrary loan system. In addition, we borrowed more than 400 other titles through interlibrary loan for our patrons. The Daland was able to provide more than 200 titles to other New Hampshire libraries in 2004.

The Friends of the Daland Library released *Persistence and Progress: a history of the Daland Memorial Library 1892-1992* in the fall. The book is accompanied by a wonderful CD with over 400 images from Mont Vernon. Copies are available at the library for \$15.00.

The Library Trustees held a series of focus group meetings in the spring to gather information regarding the townspeople's views on the library building proposal. The Library Trustees and the Daland Trustees hosted a town wide meeting in September to review and answer questions. A committee was formed to continue work on the library plan which will go to the voters in March 2006. We are committed to helping the town build a library that will function as an information and community center that is accessible to all our residents.

Please come see what your library has to offer.

To report a fire or other emergency, dial 911. For non-emergency request dial 673-1414. For all other purposes, dial 673-1383 and a Fire Department official will return your call.

State law requires a written permit for any outside burning when there is no snow cover. Burning without a permit is a violation in which you can be held responsible for the cost of extinguishing the fire. To obtain a permit, leave a message, in advance at 673-1383, or contact Chief Kevin E. Pomeroy at 673-9130. Illegal fires can have disastrous results, large woods fires to building fires have resulted from unattended fires and non-permitted fires. Always burn safely, have water on hand and use precautions to protect the wood line. The Department responded to several non-permit [illegal fires] this year.

Fire Prevention: The Department continued its efforts to insure the safety of the citizens of Mont Vernon. During Fire Prevention Month, the Members spent the week discussing and demonstrating fire safety techniques. Readiness to third grade was instructed in how to react in a fire, call for help, and help others. Department equipment was demonstrated and films on fire safety were watched. Your home and its belongings can be replaced, you and your family cannot be. We cannot emphasize enough the importance of having working smoke detectors in your home, a proven device that saves lives and property.


Your Home Address: This is an important part of receiving fast help when you need it. Some of our residents have street and road numbers that are incorrect. The Town and the Department are fixing errors when we come across them. The number you receive from the town is not just a number, it tells emergency responders where a road starts, nearest intersections, which side of the road you are on, how far down a road you are. An example of this would be 30 North Main Street. This indicates that you are on the left hand side of the road, heading north and you are 3000 feet from the start of the road. All even numbers should be on the left and odd numbers on the right from the start of the road. Your address number should be displayed and is large enough so it is visible to approaching emergency personnel from any direction.

The Department also responded to 38 requests for inspections, safety programs, and site plan reviews for developments, and tests of proposed water supply sites.

The Fire Department, with the assistance of Tony and Annette Immorlica, put in for federal grants to improve the effectiveness of the Department ability to respond to emergencies. These grants have allowed the Department to purchase a thermal imaging camera. This equipment is used in search and rescue operations, and to look for hidden fires. Last year we were able to purchase the new tanker that was delivered in January. The grants are through the Federal Assistance Fire Grant Program.

One of the best things about a small town is the many opportunities a person has to participate and be part of the community. The Department would like to take this time to say thank you to Howard Welch. Howard served from Firefighter to Chief. A couple of years ago, Howard stepped down from the Board of Fire Wards. After 40 years of service with the Fire Department, Howard has retired as a honorary member. While he will still be around, his participation will be missed. Howard has served our town well, not only as a member of the Fire Department, but also as member of the Highway Committee and the Lamson Farm.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT REPORT 2004

My tenure with the Highway Department began as a part timer during difficult circumstances and transitions. Much gratitude is owed to Jim Whipple for his interim served as Highway Department Head. Since that time I have become the full time Foreman of the Department and feel I have the strong support of a great crew committed to serving this community.

There could be no records located to account for the actual number of inches of snow fall during the 2003-2004 winter season. We can however report that at least 260 tons of salt and 1,354 yards of sand were used throughout the town during the season. Many thanks to members of the fire department who came to help plow snow while the department was down in man power.

During the early spring, raking and seeding from plow damage was taken care of followed by road repairs due to wash out conditions from heavy rains. Several roads were closed while these repairs were in process and substantial grading was done on various dirt roads. The largest section of road needing repairs was Beech Hill Road where 2 culverts required complete replacement. Other roads which received culvert placement during the year were Hutchinson Road, Brook Road and Weston Hill Road. Assistance with preparations for the annual Spring Gala also took place as well as cleaning the cemetery and planting for Memorial Day weekend. Thanks to Jim Whipple and his family for their generous contribution of geraniums and time spent planting!

In early summer the crew concluded a previous project on the Frankestown Turnpike near Hazen Road where stone walls were rebuilt followed by loam and seeding. A new project began at the Upton Road and Wilton Road intersection which required tree clearing and blasting of large rocks to make way for the new entrance of Upton Road. This work is projected to conclude this coming year and will enhance visibility as well as eliminate a potentially dangerous intersection.

There were 18 stop sign and lines painted in town at various intersections and yellow line striping done on Beech Hill Road, Frankestown Turnpike, Purgatory Road, Wilton Road, Kendall Hill Road, Brook Road and Tater Street. Replacement of metal stop signs, a couple street signs, as well as installation of 6 signs for newly named roads.

During the fall months a section of the cemetery consisting of approximately 1 acre was expanded which required stump removal, loam and seeding. This project was followed by the annual leave raking and removal from the cemetery.

A noticeable transition has taken place at the Transfer Station this past year when it became necessary to implement a new fee schedule for trash disposal. The fee schedule was derived at by comparing fees charged at surrounding towns and became necessary due to the increasing rise in costs of removal for the Town. Bill LaPorte continues to strive to keep maintaining the site with great organization and appreciates the cooperation given.

During 2004 the Historic District Commission voted to approve 1 proposal for construction in the Historic District.

1. A proposal by Mr. Howard Brown to construct a sun room and renovate the kitchen at 2 Blood Road, Mont Vernon. Approved October 27, 2004
2. Several requests were made of the Commission which were determined to be in kind repairs not requiring Commission Approval. Major of this was a request by Mr. Allen Smith to rehabilitate the shed between the house at 19 North Main Street and the barn. Original intent was to simply repair the shed but upon inspection the structure was in such poor repair the decision was made to rebuild the shed as close as possible to the original construction. After considerable discussion Mr. Smith agreed to the in kind repair.

A request for approval by Mr. Carl Bierley to renovate the residence at 4 Francistown Turnpike. Mr. Bierley agreed to maintain the residence without changing the footprint of the property and repair where necessary without compromising the historical architecture of the property.

Several minor requests were asked of the Historic District Commission but were deemed to be in kind repair. The residents of the Historic District are to be commended for maintaining the historical character of the district.

Historic District Approval is required when a building permit is issued within the Historic district. In kind repairs not requiring building permits are allowed.

As in the past The Historic District Commission will strive to maintain the architectural integrity of the Mont Vernon Historic District while observing the rights of residents within the Historic District.

Lamson Farm Commission 2004 Annual Report

A significant accomplishment this past year was the completion of a full restoration of the barn. The final item being the re-roofing of the barn and the silo with a durable and handsome looking steel roof. The building is now useable and should be stable for many years to come.

The house now has a brand new, state of the art, heating system which is proving to be much more reliable and efficient than the previous steam boiler. Two items of immediate concern this coming year will be repair and replacement of several windows which have begun to fail and the re-painting the house exterior. I'm hopeful that an interior restoration of the house might begin in 2005.

The blacksmith shop was stained and continues to be used fairly frequently by a group of smiths from around the area. On several occasions members of the group included young people learning the trade. We are appreciative of the contributions this group has made to the Lamson shop in both labor and material.

Russ Stacy and Gerry Griffin have approached the commission about building a maple sugaring house which will be located beyond the view of the house and other buildings. We hope to resume selective timber harvests this coming year and some of that income will cover the cost of this project.

We lost one of our former members this year when Joanne Griffin passed away. Joanne had been a member of the Lamson Farm Commission since 1987. She served as our treasurer for several years and one of the many contributions Joanne made to Lamson Farm Day each year was to make sure fresh flowers were on each of the picnic tables and around the farmhouse. With the help of The Mont Vernon Gardeners in its creation, we have dedicated a perennial garden in her memory.

This year was the 25th Lamson Farm Day and it was one of our best yet. The weather certainly cooperated and thanks to all those who continually contribute so much, it was a complete success. Next years' Lamson Farm Day will be Saturday, September 24 and we sure hope to see you there.

Dear Mont Vernon Resident,

At the March 2003 town meeting, the town voted to form an Open Space Committee to “study the appropriation of funding and designation of open spaces to protect the natural resources of the town of Mont Vernon”.

The Mont Vernon Open Space Committee is proposing a bond for the purchase of open space in town. The vote on the bond will happen during the March 2005 town meeting. The amount will be \$750,000.

This bond is authorized for one year and will require a majority two thirds of the voters at the March town meeting in order to pass.

When a parcel of land becomes available for purchase it will have to be approved by a majority of voters in a special town meeting. The warrant article will authorize special town meetings, therefore the town will not have to get approval from the NH Superior Court.

Some Criteria for purchasing property:

- The property must meet one or more goals identified in the Mont Vernon Master Plan.
- The landowner must be a willing seller and wants to collaborate with the town for the purpose of preserving open space.
- The property has an important wildlife habitat.
- The property could provide recreational opportunities to the town.
- The property has historical or aesthetic values.
- The land protects a drinking water supply.

The Mont Vernon Conservation Commission funded A Cost of Community Services Study for the town of Mont Vernon, which analyzed revenues and expenditures based on existing land uses in the tax year 2002. This study revealed that for every \$10,000 in property taxes and other revenues from residential land use we

spend \$10,300 to provide services such as schools, roads, and municipal services (fire, police). In contrast, Mont Vernon spends eight cents to provide services for every \$1.00 it receives in revenue from open space.

MONT VERNON PLANNING BOARD

The planning board received very few new applications in 2004. However, this year marked the end of a long approval process for two major subdivisions. In total, 36* new residential lots were created. 23 building permits were granted for new dwelling units. Certificates of occupancy were granted for 23 new houses and 4 mobile homes. The board foresees a busy year in 2005, and has appointed a growth study committee, headed by Joe Conrad, to advise the board on possible courses of action.

The first impact fee schedule, for a new fire station, was approved by the Selectmen in June. As of 1/10/04, \$7,973 has been assessed toward that project. The board expects to review fee schedules for public works garage, library, and school in 2005, and asks for the support of the school board and the townspeople in our request for \$1,000 to fund a consultant to prepare the school impact fee schedule.

Our open space ordinance continues to serve the town by providing a development alternative that preserves land. 69.58 acres were designated open space this year.

David E. Hall supported the board in relocating a pedestrian trail through open space as part of his development. The board thanks Boy Scout Jon Shepard of Amherst, planning board representative Jim Bird, and the many trail builders who volunteered with loppers and clippers. The trail begins on Rte. 13 near the junction of Blood Rd.

We request your support of the following zoning amendments this March:

- adoption of a computer-generated format for the zoning book;
- an amendment to remove the 25% maximum allowance for wetlands in a lot (please note, wetlands will remain designated unbuildable);
- a revised wireless service facilities regulation, initiated by Sally Benjamin;
- a new regulation to allow in-law apartments without a special exception, proposed by Building Inspector Eddie Gilbert;
- language which designates that impact fees shall be paid when a certificate of occupancy is issued rather than at time of building permit;
- a new non-residential zoning ordinance originated by Mark Murdock, that provides standards and thresholds for determining the eligibility of a non-residential site use for site plan review; and
- a new phasing ordinance giving the board authority to require phased development, recommended by the growth study committee.

The board thanks Eileen Naber for providing stability by filling in during the periods of vacancy in our administrative assistant position this year, and we thank Angela Wilson for a great job, especially for proofreading the digital zoning book.

TAX COLLECTOR'S REPORT
TOWN OF MONT VERNON, NEW HAMPSHIRE

The big event for the Tax Collector's Office this year was the arrival of upgraded AVITAR Tax Collecting software, which is much appreciated. Unfortunately, it did not arrive until mid-March, at which time all the payments and other work done since January 1, 2004, had to be re-entered. At the same time, the office computers were networked and a computer security system was added. Because of the need to re-enter the data more than once, clerical errors were made, resulting in two properties being deeded in error. The owners of the properties had kept their receipts and were able to substantiate the error. The deedings were reversed, at the direction of the Selectmen.

The elected Tax Collector, Bethany Knight, worked diligently while she was in office, but, for personal reasons, had to resign in June. She entered and re-entered, because of a system glitch, all the January to mid-March transactions.

As of December 31, 2004, 94.2% of the 2004 property taxes had been collected.

Timber Yield Taxes committed to the Tax Collector in 2004 were \$29,756.55 and 100% have been collected.

If you are studying the 2004 MS-61, which follows, and doing the math, property taxes committed to the Tax Collector for collection in 2004 were \$4,378,448.00 plus \$1197 to reverse deeding error, for a total of \$4,379,645.00.

To correct a computer MS-61 reporting error, the actual 2004 remittances to the Treasurer for 2003 Property taxes were \$237,951.65 and for 2003 Land Use Change taxes were \$10,872.34.

Of the \$206,948.30 in Land Use Change Tax, \$86,000 was added by clerical error, leaving \$120,948.30 in actual Land Use Change Tax levied in 2004. Of these, 92.5% have been collected.

Also to correct the reported Property Taxes Converted to Liens, unpaid 2003 Property Taxes were \$52,925.47 plus unpaid 2003

Current Use Change Taxes of \$5,831.40. These liens were recorded at the Hillsborough County Registry of Deeds.

Unredeemed 2003 Liens include one supplemental warrant amount of \$130.62 to correct deeding error.

All amounts deeded in error were - of 2003 liens, \$130.62; of 2002 liens, \$2360.84; and of 2001 liens \$539.60.

A single parcel in town which has been labeled a Brown Field accounts for a large part of the uncollected property tax and liened amounts beginning in 1988.

Interest on delinquent property taxes is set by law at 12%. Interest on overdue Current Use Tax and Timber Tax is set at 18%. Tax payers are encouraged to send in small payments on a regular basis to save on accumulating interest.

Susan Mason-Brown has been appointed by the Selectmen to complete the unexpired term of the elected Tax Collector.

Having served as Tax Collector from March of 1999 to March of 2004 and as Deputy Tax Collector since March 2004, I leave the office in Susan's capable hands.



Report of the School Board Chairman 2004 Mont Vernon School District

2004 was a year of change and transition for the Mont Vernon School District.

The Village School community welcomed Meredith Sumner as their new principal. Meredith fills the school with her endless enthusiasm and energy. She wears many hats while providing leadership and guidance to advance the quality of our school.

Mr. Howard Colter was selected to lead the Mont Vernon, Amherst, and Souhegan School Districts. Mr. Colter has had a remarkable career, with a legacy of building great school systems in Maine, Massachusetts, and California. The school district is fortunate to have this dedicated individual who focuses on the long-term goals while managing daily operations.

Michael Galan retired in July after serving as the SAU 39 Assistant Superintendent for 12 years. Prior to that, Michael watched over Mont Vernon when it was part of the Milford District. Always sensitive to the needs of Mont Vernon, Michael did his best to ensure that our small district was treated fairly. His departure left a tough void to fill. Susan Ward stepped up from Director of Technology to Business Manager. Susan works tirelessly in her quest to implement procedures that will streamline the SAU's business practices.

The Village School underwent major renovations during the summer break. Although the building looks great with a new roof, much of the work addressed unseen deficiencies. Improvements were made to the site drainage, heating system, building ventilation, insulation, vapor barrier, firewalls, and disability access. Substantial positive impacts can be observed in air quality, fuel savings, and building maintenance.

2004 was a year with unanticipated transitions on the school board. Carol Fortin announced her resignation only months after being sworn into office and Sue Swartz announced her resignation this fall. Carol and Sue worked tirelessly for the children. Pam Coughlin, a three-term school board veteran and Tim Hageman, an involved parent and community member stepped forward and were welcomed to fill these vacant positions.

The future brings many challenges to the Mont Vernon School District. Due to capacity and space issues in Amherst, they will no longer be able to prepare and provide Mont Vernon's lunches. We are looking into several alternatives to meet the children's needs. Based upon growth in our own community, we

must renew our efforts to identify properties that will be suitable for a future school building. We must continue to work as a community to aggressively identify ways to provide a high quality education while controlling costs.

I thank those who gave countless hours to the school and the Town in 2004. Volunteerism has been, and will always be a key to the school's and the Town's future.

Superintendent's Annual Report for the Mont Vernon School District

In my brief time with School Administrative Unit 39, it is clear to me that Mont Vernon has much to crow about regarding the quality of its schools and the dedication and talents of its fine administration, faculty, and staff.

I am also very impressed by the involvement of parents at the Village School. During my visits to the school, I regularly observe parents and other community volunteers in classrooms working in support of the children and teachers. Community involvement is part of what makes Mont Vernon Village School unique.

The building and grounds are in good shape at this time, thanks largely to voter support of a major renovation project that was completed this past fall. An area that remains in need of attention is the cafeteria, a task that we intend to address beginning this next fiscal year. We thank the community for supporting this latest building project. It has made such a difference.

Meredith Sumner has proved to be a terrific addition to the Village School. As principal, Ms. Sumner is focused on student learning, and goes about her work with creativity and optimism.

The children attending the Village School continue to show academic progress, as measured by local and state assessments. Our state assessment results for the 3rd and 6th grade NHEIAP tests continue to show that students at the Mont Vernon Village School perform well above all state averages. While these tests change in the next year to accommodate testing at every grade level in 3rd through 8th, we will continue to develop and analyze other local assessments to help complete the full picture of student performance.

SAU 39 completed a State review of its Special Education program this past December. The district as a whole, and Mont Vernon specifically, received high praise from a team of educators and administrators from across the State of New Hampshire. This study validated for all of us that Mont Vernon is meeting the needs of exceptional children in a responsible and appropriate manner.

We also are working hard to improve coordination and communication between the Village School and the other four schools that make up SAU 39. Our shared goal is to strengthen student performance through

increased dialogue and planning among teachers at all levels. A related effort is to improve the transition from one school to the next, as students progress from kindergarten through Grade 12. The Village School can be proud of its strong core academic program. I am pleased to find in place an ongoing commitment to the arts, world languages, and technology.

In conclusion, let me say that I feel most welcomed by the Mont Vernon community, and I look forward to working with you for years to come. This is a very promising time for public education and for our schools.

Principal's Annual Report for the Mont Vernon Village School
2004-2005

Although I have only been at the Village School since late July, it is clear to me that it is a school with high standards for student and faculty performance. I have been impressed by the commitment to and enthusiasm for learning shown by members of the school community.

The most visible changes at MVVS are the result of the completed building project. The facility is, at long last, dry, safe, and warm, and the morale of staff and students has improved tremendously as a result. We thank the building committee, community, parents, school and SAU staff, and the school board for their support of this project and for providing the children of Mont Vernon with an appropriate facility in which to learn.

Several staff changes have also occurred this year. Welcome to Barbara Belak, school counselor, Sarah Griffin, Special Education teacher for preschool to grade 3, and instructional assistants Debi Bowden, Maryanne Kauffman and Pat Leonard. We are happy to have them as members of the Village School team. Congratulations go to Village School teachers Paloma Ahgren, Sarah Griffin, Christine MacKelvey, and Amy Steckel on the completion of their Master's Degree programs. A couple of enthusiastic interns/student teachers from Franklin Pierce College and Rivier joined us for portions of this school year, and we wish them well in their future educational endeavors.

Our strong teaching staff works collaboratively to strengthen and further develop both the curriculum and their teaching in order to improve student learning. Staff members meet monthly in Collaborative Study Groups and at Professional Learning Community meetings to examine student work and to discuss issues related to their educational practice. The school continues to work on curriculum mapping with this year's focus on the math curriculum. As the year progresses, staff members will work together to examine these maps and identify any gaps or redundancies to ensure that students are being exposed to the full range of the curriculum, consistent with state, New England, and national standards. Other professional development for staff has focused on writing and on differentiating instruction to meet the needs of students with varied skill levels and learning styles.

The Village School is working with other schools in the SAU to improve communication and ensure continuity of the curriculum and seamless transitions from one school building to another. SAU curriculum committees

completed work on the language arts curriculum last year and are working on the science and health curricula this year. As a result of the language arts

curriculum work, the Village School has introduced the Rebecca Sitton Spelling Program this year and has begun utilizing the elements of the 6-Traits writing program. Additional preparation for students' transitions to the middle school includes teacher visits between the two schools and the coordination of curricular activities for students.

Beyond providing students with a strong foundation in the core academic subjects, the Village School staff is concerned about developing the whole child. Instruction in art, music, physical education, library, computer technology, and foreign language is provided to students in first through sixth grade. Students' social, emotional, and physical development are also a part of the elementary school curriculum, and the school counselor and school nurse supplement instruction in these areas. This year they have coordinated programming on topics including fitness and nutrition, problem solving and conflict resolution skills, first aid, and internet safety. Our focus on transitions takes social development into account as well; this year, for the first time, sixth grade students have been invited to attend dances at Amherst Middle School.

The development of the whole child is evidenced through service projects our students do for the community. Our students have completed a number of service projects this year including visits to the Mont Vernon Village Inn, collecting money to support the survivors of the tsunami in Asia, donating non-perishable items to the SHARE program, and raising money to support the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society. Students also learned about the service others do for our community at an assembly to honor American veterans and through an American service woman, Jessica Higgins, who spoke to fifth grade students.

The New England Common Assessment Program (NECAP), developed by the states of New Hampshire, Vermont, and Rhode Island, was implemented this year. The NECAP replaces the New Hampshire Educational Improvement and Assessment Program (NHEIAP) which had been given over the previous several years. NECAP assessments were given this year to students in grades three through six in reading, math, or writing. This year's assessments were considered to be a pilot and no results from this assessment will be available to individuals, schools, or districts. Results of last year's NHEIAP's indicated that Village School students, overall, were continuing to meet or exceed the standards set by the state in grades three and six.

Related to assessment, a progress reporting committee is working to develop new report cards for the Village School. These new reporting forms will be based on parent and staff input and will provide more information about district/school expectations for appropriate academic and social growth at

each grade level. We hope to implement these new report cards next year and that they will prove to be a more efficient and helpful way of communicating students' growth and needs.

We deeply appreciate all the parent and community volunteers who help support teaching and learning at the Village School. A very active PTA organizes a myriad of activities that support students, teachers, and enrichment activities. For instance, this year the PTA has sponsored programs on Native Americans, the ocean, and birds of prey and brought in both a meteorologist and local author to name just a few of the activities. MVVS has again been recognized with a Blue Ribbon Achievement

Award for its outstanding volunteer program, and we welcome new volunteers who enjoy working with children.

The next several years will bring many changes to the community of Mont Vernon. Enrollment projections put the Village School population at over 300 for the 2008-2009 school year, an increase of over 25%. As a school community we are also focused on preparing for the anticipated growth and on retaining a quality staff.

MINUTES OF THE MONT VERNON SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

March 12, 2004

Approximately 165 people gathered in the multipurpose room of the Mont Vernon Village School on March 12, 2004 at 7:30 p.m. for the annual School District Meeting.

Moderator Peter Hayden called the meeting to order at 7:30 pm and led the voters in the Pledge of Allegiance. Alan Smith then gave the Invocation. Mr. Hayden read the warrant and then read aloud his rules for proceedings, which were also available for everyone present in handout form. Only registered Mont Vernon voters are entitled to vote, when speaking to state your name, keep comments to three minutes and that all comments should be directed through the moderator. He did point out that motions to reconsider would only be accepted immediately after a vote is announced and before addressing other business and there would be no amendments to amendments. He stated that anyone might challenge his rules now or during the meeting.

Mr. Hayden said some people had voiced concern that the current honor system might not be prudent with the current town size. Mr. Hayden asked the voters if we should proceed this way tonight (usually the honor system is allowed for registered voters to vote). It was asked if the honor system was not acceptable should we use an alternate plan where we would register with the Supervisors of the Check list, sign in and then carry a blue voter card and use show of hands with said card to vote, this would be a more precise, but more time consuming way, the voters were asked to vote for check list or honor system

Voters chose honor system

Mr. Hayden then introduced the Mont Vernon School Board: Chairperson Pamela Coughlin, Vice Chairperson Peter King, Board Secretary Sue Swartz , William O'Brien, and Robert Mead; SAU 39 Superintendent Dr. Michael Ananis, Assistant Superintendent Michael Galan, Village School Principle Robert St. Cyr, SAU 39 Special Education director Kathy Skoglund, and the Village School Budget Committee: Chairperson Carol Fortin, Al Ryder, Kim Roberge, Kevin Gendron, School Board representative Robert Mead and Selectman representative Michael Fimbel.

ARTICLE 2

To see if the school district will vote to raise and appropriate \$600,000 (gross budget) for the replacement of the roof of the Village School site, to correct the drainage problems around the Village School site, and to correct other building deficiencies, and

to authorize the issuance of not more than \$600,000 of Bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA, Chapter 33) and to authorize the School Board to issue and negotiate such Bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon. Furthermore, to raise and appropriate the estimated first year interest payment of \$14,250. **The School Board recommends this appropriation. 2/3 ballot vote required to pass.**

Pam Coughlin moved article as read, Peter King seconded

Peter King gave a slide show presentation which included reviewing the 2003 School District Meeting slide show concerning the drainage, moisture, mold, heating, electrical, plumbing and air quality issues already affecting the school. This presentation included pictures of the damage and repair. King then went over the roof damage from the December 2003 snow storms, and subsequent short term tarp repair. He went over lighting improvements and the recommendations of the engineering study that was approved at the 2003 school district meeting. King then went over the Architects' recommendations and estimates, the contracting estimates, and cost of previous work done. He noted the importance for a Clerk of the Works, discussed metal verses asphalt shingles, cost of replacing roof and cost of fixing drainage, moisture, heating and ventilation issues along with ADA compliance. King finished by going over the preconstruction process, which will include retaining an architect, inviting contractors to bid, and bid evaluation. He mentioned that fixing the roof without addressing the other building needs would not help, as all current problems are related to each other and must be addressed at the same time.

Assistant Superintendent Michael Galan made a slide show presentation on the total estimated cost of project and bond options. He went over a 5-year bond and a 10-year bond. State Building Aid will be 30%. Galan stated that with the 5-year bond we would be debt free sooner and save \$94,000 in interest.

John Benjamin stated that the \$600,000 would be well spent if it (roof replacement) solves all of problems; he asked if methodical problem solving was used, and were the root problems identified.

Peter King said that the process in the identifying the problems was through the work of townspeople in the building trade, architects, and contractors searching the building high and low. They found many issues, some were poor design, and some problems that were not too complex but were happening all at once. A key issue is preventative maintenance. King pointed out that we have a better maintenance staff with a well-established plan for general up keep. The school is much better off in this area than five years ago.

Lucien Soucy said that he wished this process could be longer so we would be sure work is done correctly and then asked who will be putting out bids. Peter King stated that School Board will put out bids. Lucien then asked who was bidding. King answered that it was up for discussion.

Sue Granfors asked about the duct work in attic not being much more than cardboard with aluminum, she understood it would be \$10,000 to clean it, and asked how much to replace it with something more substantial. Peter King indicated that the option of replacing the ductwork had been discussed with the architect; however, it was determined to be prohibitively expensive. The architect indicated that the existing duct can be cleaned but needs to be maintained well and if not trampled on should last.

Peter Savage mentioned that at last year's meeting there was discussion about not using past vendors. Savage asked that we not use the same unreliable vendors and sought the Board members' reassurance that the prior contracts will not be rehired. He also asked if there is recourse from new contractor be written in contract?

Moderator polled School Board

Bill O'Brien said he would use qualified contractors and will look into their past experience and will take financial matters into consideration. Pam Coughlin said although she won't be on the School Board after this evening she would recommend not to use past contractors that we are not satisfied with. Sue Swartz also stated she would not want to use past contractors that we are not satisfied with. Bob Mead agreed with and then stated that ultimate recourse would be to not rehire contractors who do not produce quality work.

Dave Bellamy asked if we have architect and contractor estimates and who is the contractor that provided the estimates? Peter King said Hutter Construction provided a cost estimate to verify the architect's estimate.

Janine Sisk said that she runs a company where they do work to spec. When the client comes to them saying they want to build "x", by the time they actually have the spec prepared and are ready to start the work, "x" has turned into "y". She said she didn't have a problem with fixing the building, but does have a problem with appropriating money before the preconstruction steps have been completed.

Kim Roberge pointed out that the prior contractor, Hutter Construction, isn't responsible for all the building's problems. Some of the building's problems came from poor maintenance and repair jobs that were done by unqualified

volunteers to save money and we should not be surprised that we are here today asking for a \$600,000 bond for repairs. She also asked why there are no capital reserves.

Jay Wilson asked if School Board prepared a thorough estimate and if this school is going to be able to handle growth over next 10 years? He asked if we can call a special meeting with firm bids if this article doesn't pass tonight.

Peter King noted

that at this point we cannot call for special meeting as the rules for calling a special meeting require an emergency. Special meetings cannot automatically be done because of cost factors and time constraints. We need to fix school during the summer and the process is tight.

Krista Lauer brought up fire and safety, and asked why we did not have a sprinkler system. She asked if the building is in violation of the fire code, and what would the cost be to install it now? Peter King answered that the building does not need to be retrofitted with a sprinkler system to meet the current code. He believed that the sprinkler system should have been installed during the original school construction. King said he was told that it would have cost \$30,000 during construction, but would cost \$250,000 now.

Carl Hedberg said that the Conservation Commission is questioned often about school sites when purchasing land. He then asked if the Future School Site Committee is still looking at sites and is a new school needed in 5 or 10 years. Peter King said building is still worth keeping. The School Board has been side tracked with repairs and could not focus on potential sites after some were established by the school site committee. The School Board made the decision that it needed to work on saving what we have before focusing on new school.

Mark Murdock stated faulty work has led us here and what specific provisions are in place to protect \$600,000 investment? Peter King spoke of utilizing townspeople in the trade business and architects for advice. He also mentioned that School Board will retain a Clerk of the Works to oversee work done and that school maintenance staff has a more thorough maintenance plan and adheres to it. Mark Murdock then asked Peter King and Bill O'Brien if they will hire past contractors. Bill O'Brien stated that he would not categorically exclude any company including Hutter, which he understands to be one of the largest school construction contractors in the state; he further said that he couldn't say at this point that Hutter is root of all problems. Peter King agreed, but added that Hutter would have to meet a standard ten times higher. Mr. King stated that he has listened to taxpayer concerns; he would not say no but would prefer to look at other contractors first.

Tim Allen thanked the Board for providing payment options. He asked for the opportunity to obtain a show of hands in voter's preference for a 5-year or 10 year bond. Before the vote was taken Bill O'Brien talked about the 5 or 10-year payment program and reminded voters that the contract for Amherst Middle School tuition agreement will be up in 2011, with Amherst having to give notice of non-renewal by 2009. He stated that there likely will be a "less favorable" tuition agreement and if bonding is paid off in 2009 the districts would have greater flexibility in deciding with to continue the tuition arrangement with Amherst or choosing an alternative. *Moderator asked for informal show of hands and 5 year bond won preference.*

Peter Savage asked why do we need to fund with a Bond, were other options looked at? Michael Galan explained that if we went with the 5-year bond we would get our state funding aid sooner.

Carol Fortin speaking for the Budget Committee said that they discussed amongst themselves, the School Board and the architects all costs of this warrant and support it unanimously.

*Kim Roberge moved the question
Seconded by Eileen Naber*

Peter Hayden went over instructions for secret ballot voting. He opened polls at 9:13 and they remained open for one hour.

Article 2 passed by secret ballot vote. 124 yes 40 no

ARTICLE 3

TO HEAR THE REPORTS OF OFFICERS, AGENTS AND AUDITORS,
AND TO TAKE ACTION WITH REFERENCE.

Pam Coughlin moved article as read, Peter King seconded

The voters passed Article 3 by show of hands

ARTICLE 4

To see if the school district, pursuant to RSA 189:28-a II, will raise \$10,000 to offset an unanticipated general fund deficit in the fiscal year ending June 30, 2004, said deficit caused by the unanticipated increase in the number of educationally disabled students requiring program placement and other related services, and emergency repairs to the Village School. **The School Board supports. Majority vote required to pass.**

Pam Coughlin moved article as read, seconded by Peter King

Michael Galan presented a slide show with budget overview. He noted that rapid growth has flattened and they are projecting flat enrollment. The costs per pupil, transportation, employees, and Wide Area Network have increased in costs. Overall the Special Education deficit has gone down due to aggressive management.

Gerry Griffin asked if deficit appropriations are for last year's budget and what specifically caused the deficit, and was the RSA checked to be sure this appropriation is correct. Michael Galan explained that it is costing more for special education transportation, but less to educate special education students. Galan stated that initially the deficit was \$30,000, but the School Board took action when the possibility of deficit was realized and they reduced unnecessary purchases and did not use the school land purchase budget to reduce the projected deficit. The current year-end projection is for a \$10,000 deficit.

The voters passed Article 4, by show of hands.

ARTICLE 5

To see if the school district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,262,741 for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials, and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of said district; and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state and federal government, together with other income, the School Board to certify to the Town Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation to be raised by taxation.

The School Board supports this article. Majority vote required to pass.

Pam Coughlin moved article as read. Peter King seconded

Bill O'Brien gave a slide show presentation on salaries. He commended Kathy Skoglund on her hard work keeping Special Education costs low. He noted that Amherst Middle School tuition per pupil was up, but we have fewer students attending, so the overall tuition will be lower. He then went over the requested appropriation for teachers' salaries and mentioned the overall increase was 4.09%. He went over the contract negotiations and pointed out that although fiscally frugal it is in keeping with surrounding areas. He explained the pay tier. He also noted that health insurance rates were up 19.25% and since New Hampshire doesn't have much competition, these are costs we have no control over.

Line 10.1100.112.10 Teachers Salaries

Shawn Bertrand asked the reason for combining next years 2nd grade. Bill O'Brien said that School Board didn't feel it was responsible to have two small classes of 11 to 12 2nd graders when the upcoming 6th grade will be large (46) and have two classes of 23 students each. Bertrand then asked if the extra teacher will teach kindergarten or be an aide, and asked if School Board was working with projections only. O'Brien stated that they were working with projections. Shawn then stated that this teacher change wasn't stated officially and would have been helpful to let parents know ahead of time because it will affect the children's education. O'Brien said that the School Board is presenting the best choice they can, while satisfying a number of goals, such as retaining the professional staff as a unit.

Peter Savage asked if the plan was to move one second grade teacher to Kindergarten, how many have registered and how many are anticipated. Sheila Smith from audience noted that 18 students have registered so far. Bill O'Brien said 36 Kindergarteners are anticipated but if only 18 show up there would be a change of plans. Savage asked when a final decision be made, O'Brien said when numbers are clear. Savage then asked if School Board would be willing to tell one teacher he is unemployed in September if the projections are wrong. O'Brien said he couldn't speak for whole Board but while he certainly would regret telling anyone that her job was being eliminated, he would take taxpayers' side and reduce staff if needed.

Charlotte Jameson asked if the School Board is taking a teacher and making them an aide at current teacher salary. Dr. Ananis said that the district doesn't anticipate Title 1 funding next year (\$50,000). He explained the Title 1 tutors are for high-risk learners, but that federal funding is based on income level of towns. To help those children, we need to consider reassigning a second grade teacher. Sue Swartz also clarified the School Board wanted to leave the faculty placement up to administration and at this time there is no final decision. However they wanted to save as many teaching positions as possible.

Kim Roberge said it would be nice if we had a way to guarantee projections, because in the last 10 years the projections only went down twice. She commended the Board for leaving current teaching positions in, and suggested using the extra teacher for a third 6th grade class. Zoe Fimbel asked to clarify that salaries are for 13 teachers and would one teacher be in Kindergarten and 1 teacher float? She then asked about the line item for instructional aide.

Bill O'Brien stated that final decision on staffing hasn't been made; but that the salaries line is for 13 teachers and that the next line item for instructional aides was for title one tutors which we will have to fund due to loss of federal funds.

At 10:13 moderator closed secret ballot on Article 2

Patty Smith spoke about confusing staff issues, asked about effective use of teaching space and student teacher ratios. Also stated a concern over disruption and loss of structure for 2nd grade students and teachers if mid year the projections don't pan out as planned and a lot of shuffling needs to be done. She suggested we should maintain budget now and consider savings later when we have more accurate numbers.

Kathleen Ryder said we may not be able to maintain the core group of seasoned teachers if we were only offering them a 2% raise. Current teachers' budget does not promote good moral, she hopes the teachers will elect to stay.

Moderator asked if there is a motion to change this line item

Eileen Naber pointed out that if teachers do sign the contract and in the fall there are not enough projected students to warrant 13 teachers, the School Board will not be able to void a signed contract. Bill O'Brien said that School Board could always reduce staff.

Al Ryder asked if enrollment stays at projected levels will School Board assure voters that they will not replace unneeded personnel. Bill O'Brien said that at this point the School Board doesn't recognize that there are unneeded positions based on Kindergarten projections and Title 1 needs.

Line 10.1100.120.10 Substitute Salaries

Zoe Fimbel asked for reason for 40% increase in Substitute salaries. Bill O'Brien said that initially he also thought this was high; however when School Board looked at the 5 year average they found this line was consistently under funded. Fimbel then asked if absences were legitimate. Bill O'Brien said the absences were legitimate; teachers are exposed to many illnesses from children. The amount of absent days was in keeping with surrounding schools. Sue Swartz added that the 5-year average was \$16,000 and they would work their way up to that number in the future. Peter King said substitutes were also used when teachers had to attend professional development and mandatory special education meetings, some of which are off site.

Line 10.1100.330.10 504 Expenses

Carol Fortin spoke for school budget committee concerning 504 expenses. She noted that this is for children with disabilities that have minor restrictions or modifications needing less costly accommodations. The committee feels that this item should be thought of as "504 expense/ADA". This account is separate from ADA compliance items referred to in Roof Warrant article.

*Carol Fortin made motion to change line item 10.1100.330.10 from \$0 to \$500.
Al Ryder seconded*

Bill O'Brien explained that last year money were first proposed for the account by the administration but removed by the School Board then because there was no justification given for the funds. Thereafter on motion at the 2003 School District meeting \$500 was appropriated. At present this money has not been spent and there are no plans to spend it. Yet again this year the administration requested \$500 but no one explained where the money was spent, so it was not included. He asked voters not to approve the motion.

Motion failed by show of hands

Moderator gave results of Article 2 secret ballot tall. 124 yes, 40 no

*Peter King made a motion to restrict reconsideration of Article 2
Sue Swartz seconded*

Moderator called for show of hands to restrict reconsideration of Article 2.

Motion passed by show of hands

Line 10.1100.562.10 Capitol Costs for AMS

*Tim Allen made motion to amend line item 10.1100.562.10 from \$19,592 to \$0.
Seconded by Peter Savage*

Tim Allen then explained his reason for the motion; he said our tuition agreement with Amherst states that if any capitol improvements are made that they need to contact us before going ahead with them. Last year we made a good faith payment of \$16,000. This year during the SAU meeting when it was Mont Vernon's turn to chair the SAU Board, Amherst voted to take chairmanship away. We should vote for this amendment to send Amherst a message.

Peter Savage said we should not have to pay for Amherst's capital improvements since it is not in our tuition agreement.

Bill O'Brien said that although it was his candidacy for the SAU Board chairmanship that was taken away, we have made an agreement to pay for what we do use and it is a fair and reasonable amount to pay. He also felt this is not the time to break faith with Amherst or an appropriate way to show irritation over the actions of their school board members. Kim Roberge said that even if Amherst had informed us we would still have to pay a portion of the capital improvements. It was an oversight on Amherst's part but one reason the improvements were needed is that our students attend the school. Allen then stated that he would agree to pay next year but this year we needed to send a message to Amherst. Sue Swartz explained that she was at the meeting when the chairmanship was taken away and was annoyed and didn't go to meetings until recently to send a message, but that she found Jeannie Ludt (the elected chairperson of the SAU Board) to be very accommodating and willing to go out of her way to make Mont Vernon feel included.

Gerry Griffin said if this motion fails it should be placed in Article 8 to let Amherst know some people are unhappy with them.

Motion fails by show of hands

Line 10.2210.112.10 Salaries- Curriculum development

Zoe Fimbel asked about the increase in line item

Sue Swartz explained it was for two stipend positions. Under this appropriation two teachers go to Amherst to work on curriculum. Initially it was funded by a grant. The School Board would like it to continue this work so the increase is a result of the fact that we now must fully fund it.

Line 10.2310.115.10 School Board Secretary

Eileen Naber noted that this line item was \$500 this year but next year there was nothing in budget. Michael Galan said it was a mistake, failed to include it.

Eileen Naber made motion to increase line item 10.2310.115.10 from zero to \$500.

Sue Swartz seconded

Motion passed by show of hands

Line 10.2320.310.10 SAU MGMT. SERVICE

Peter Savage asked why this line item has doubled.

Michael Galan and Bill O'Brien presented slide show explaining hiring practice. They explained how SAU management services for all three districts. Tim Allen said this line is involved in Article 7. This line is the one line that can't be changed at school district meetings. He would explain more when we go to article 7.

Repairs and Maintenance Line

Al Ryder made motion to amend article 5

Al Ryder spoke about his concerns regarding the roof. He referred to a hand out he put together stating these concerns. Al Ryder made motion to amend the operating budget article 5 to take out final period and insert these words: to direct the School Board to have regular inspections, namely to 1. Prepare a checklist of places, objects and conditions to be examined by an inspector. The inspections must cover the structures, the heating system, the ventilation system(s), safety issues, and especially in detail, the attic. 2. Budget next year and thereafter for at least two inspections, one of which will be between Thanksgiving and Christmas. These inspections shall be performed by a qualified person who is not a current employee of the school system. The inspector shall provide a thorough report including recommendations for remedial actions. 3. Publicize a summary of the report in the local newspapers, and publish the entire report on the web. Place a paper copy in town library."

Bill O'Brien asked for ruling from moderator that motion was out of order. It is a violation of RSA 189-15, which says the School Board is to prescribe regulations for the management of the schools, and this motion attempts to remove that statutorily delegated authority and vest it in the school district meeting. O'Brien also said that it is also a violation of RSA 32-6, which says the amendment to an article, can only go to the appropriations under the article. Finally, O'Brien stated this motion goes beyond the authority of this school district meeting by impermissibly seeking to direct future school district meetings and future School Boards as to the amount of their appropriations.

Peter Hayden agreed that it is up to the School Board to ultimately determine how funds are spent under provisions, but said the entire process we are going through tonight with this detailed budget is, if nothing else, providing guidance and recommendations from this body on how funds should be spent or appropriated. He also said this is directive to the School Board and will accept the motion.

Bill O'Brien said if ruling from moderator is this is a directory motion only, then he will withdraw objection Hayden repeated that he agreed it is up to School Board to ultimately designate and determine how money is spent, but thinks it is advisable for School Board to take recommendations of this body to heart and follow them diligently.

Mr. O'Brien withdrew his objection

Al Ryder moves, Eileen Naber seconded

Al Ryder then expressed his concern that the problems with the roof will happen again and again. He wants to make sure that on completion of the roof and school repairs that the existing School Board and administration and future School Boards and administrations would be made aware of any existing and new problems so we can be assured that someone will be held accountable.

Bob Mead said the School Board agreed with the idea for inspections and had talked at length about during the year. They want policies in place so these costly repairs do not arise again. Then speaking for himself he said he would make sure something got implemented.

Gerry Griffin said if we didn't want to jeopardize the whole school budget that we should vote the proposed amendment down and Al Ryder should consider putting it in Article 8.

Marilyn Savage agreed we should not approve this amendment and since the amendment doesn't involve money it should be in Article 8.

Mr. Hayden then asked Al Ryder if he wanted vote on amendment now or put it in Article 8.

Al Ryder said to vote now

Motion fails by show of hands

Line item 10.2840.532.10 Wide Area Network

Peter Savage asked why this is so high when communication costs are going down Bob Mead explained that these are part of SAU costs. Savage then encouraged the School Board to reduce this. Bill O'Brien stated that this is 10% of over all cost and we don't have control over it. Savage then said that we should not be tethered to Amherst, he assured School Board that there is something cheaper out there.

Line Item 10.2900.211.10 Health Insurance

Carl Nivens stated that health insurance rates were high, but are we checking prices? Sue Swartz explained that some of the increases one of which is that health insurance premiums are up 18% over all. Peter Savage asked what plans had the School Board looked at and does School Care charge less? Michael Galan explained some price plans that they were looking at and that they had not received all of the quotes. School Care is more expensive than what we have now. Savage then asked when a decision would be made and is this price the cheapest available. Galan said that this price is worst-case scenario; the decision will be made in May.

Line item 10.4100.7100.00 Site Acquisition

Eileen Naber noticed that there was a line through this for next year's budget. She asked if the \$10,000 going to be put into the line.

Peter King explained that last year we voted to retain a civil engineer look at potential sites. When talking to engineer about what needed to be done. School

Board was told that 10K wasn't enough money. Eventually School Board got side tracked with the many repair issues. They don't plan to spend the money next year. This is not part of trust earmarked for engineering. Peter Savage mentioned that the \$50,000 trust fund was not to be touched unless voted on, he asked if any money been removed. Eileen Naber explained that original article said that School Board would act as agents to spend the money, this was negated by the DRA and that money can only be spent by vote at school district meeting.

Account 4300

Al Ryder made motion to **add a line** for building inspections for \$1 as a placeholder for next years meeting.

Kathy Dobbs seconded

It was explained that this would be a placeholder for next year's budget for building inspections.

Motion passed.by show of hands

Moderator asks voters to vote on Article 5 with revised budget of \$3,263,242 (Added \$501 through line item amendments)

Article 5 passes by show of hands

ARTICLE 6

To see if the school district will appropriate special revenue funds for the support of Federal Projects as follows: \$80,000. Such funds to be self-supporting through local state or federal revenue sources. **The School Board supports this article. Majority vote needed to pass**

Pam Coughlin moved as read, Peter King seconded

Article 6 passes by show of hands

ARTICLE 7

Shall the voters of the Mont Vernon school district within school administrative unit number 39 adopt the provisions of RSA 194-C: 9-b to allow for insertion of the school administrative unit budget as a separate warrant article at annual school district meetings? **The School Board does not support this article. Majority vote needed to pass.**

Peter King moved the article as read. Bill O'Brien seconded

Mr. Hayden recognized the petitioner of article Tim Allen

Tim Allen explained the current SAU management fees and how they are budgeted, yet at yearly school district meetings the SAU Management line is not allowed to be changed by voters. He explained since the law that was past last summer was incorrectly worded, this article was moot, but we should vote for this amendment anyway to send a message that we do want to vote on SAU budgets.

Article 7 fails by standing vote.

28 favor 32 oppose

Al Ryder asked for show of hands from voters to determine interest in previous motion.

Peter Hayden then read motion for AI

Bruce Tower requested that future School Board handouts be available at town meeting so voters would have time to go over information.

Peter Savage made motion to change school district meeting to Thursday night.

Bill O'Brien seconded

Savage said that a lot of money is spent at school district meeting and we my have better voter turn out if done on Thursday nights.

Peter King stated that the Board was requested at the 2002 district meeting to prepare a survey of voters on the preference for meeting days. A survey was mailed to every home in Town and the results were presented last year. The response for Friday night meetings was greater than for Thursday evening and Saturday combined.

Motion failed by standing vote. 32 oppose 17 in favor

Patty Smith asked Board if we were in violation of classroom capacity, and then went over NH guidelines on what an appropriate number for children in classroom, other districts in New Hampshire tended to comply and we should too. Peter King said the numbers refer to our building construction guidance not state law.

Eileen Naber moved to adjourn
Kim Roberge seconded.

Moderator accepted motion but asked voters to stay for commendations

Pam Coughlin thanked voters for coming tonight, she then recognized Superintendent Dr. Ananis and Assistant Superintendent Michael Galan for their service to SAU 39. Dr. Ananis is moving to another post and Michael Galan is retiring. A plaque was presented to Bob and Sue Swartz for their generous donation of new playground equipment

Peter King presented Pam Coughlin with a plaque for 9 years of dedicated service as a School Board member.

Carol Fortin speaking on behalf of PTA recognized Dr. Ananis, Michael Galan and Pamela Coughlin.

Nancy Sandahl speaking on behalf of the teachers presented a plaque to Pam Coughlin for her School Board service. She gave a tribute to Michael Galan on his 16 years of service to Village School.

Peter Hayden adjourned meeting at 11:45
