#### NOTES FROM THE SELECTMEN

While 1974 was not necessarily a year of great accomplishments by the Selectmen and the other town boards and committees, it was a year of longer agendas, longer meetings and significant happenings which seem to indicate that we are at, and maybe past, the small town crossroads.

At the time of writing this report, the future of solid waste disposal, better known as dump operations, in the town is not entirely worked out, but we know that it must be more complex and more expensive than it has been. Maybe some of the friendly social gatherings at this particular meeting place are to be a thing of the past.

There is nothing particularly quaint about a liquor store, but, for better or for worse, we now have one; and, certainly it is a convenience.

Zoning and Planning Board meetings are not becoming simpler. In fact, we all regret the difficulties of a case this past year which may be in the courts for some time to come.

Sewer problems will be covered in another report, but the town is faced with expensive litigation with twenty-eight Sutton people suing New London for \$50,000 each under identical suits. Summonses have been more frequent than previously; in fact, a deputy sheriff inquired at one selectman's house this year for directions to another selectman's house in order that he might "serve papers on a selectman."

Last year you voted to change the method of choosing the town Road Agent, and this year we will embark upon a new course in this connection with a somewhat different concept, perhaps, of the duties and responsibilities of the position. Our utmost appreciation goes to Willis Prescott for his efforts in behalf of the town, and it will be difficult to maintain the standards he set.

An interesting milestone was passed this year in connection with Colby. Where the town seemed to lean on the school for financial aid on occasions, such as building King Ridge, the sewer or the water systems, or hospital facilities, often to the point of the town borrowing money from Colby against taxes, the circumstances have changed to somewhat reverse the picture. As everyone knows, some to their sorrow, the revaluation of all taxable property in the town has been completed by the Division of Appraisal of the N.H. Department of Revenue Adminstration. The total taxable property value went from 33,421,320 to 74,738,670 as of April 1, 1974, and the tax rate for the year went from 2.50/C of taxable value to 1,36/C of taxable value. At the hearings on revaluations, which took place in December, 111 taxpayers appeared to discuss the results, and some others wrote letters in connection with them. Taxpayers have been informed of appeal procedure to be followed if they are not satisfied with answers received from the state appraisers.

The "dam" subject has received considerable attention with repairs completed on the so called Hayes Dam and the voters being presented with a petition in connection with the Pleasant Lake Dam.

A rather pleasant duty of selectmen, according to state law, is to perambulate the boundries of the town lines once each seven years. It makes for some interesting hikes, and it can be reported that the Springfield, Sunapee and Sutton lines were perambulated in 1974 with all town line markers located, many of them having dates chiseled in them every seven years since the 1840's. Interestingly, each of these town lines has one or more stone markers with "N.L." on one side and "S" on the other side.

In connection with the National Bicentennial Celebration for 1975 - 1979, a local Bicentennial Committee was appointed in 1974. This committee has made plans which have resulted in designation of New London as the 9th Bicentennial Town in New Hampshire, and a Bicentennial Flag was presented to the town at a ceremony at the Middle School November 25, 1974.

Much has been said elsewhere about the direction our national, state and local economies are taking, and there are no magic solutions, but New London must face up to its obligations and responsibilities. We feel it has done so in the past and will continue to do so in the future.

#### **TRACY MEMORIAL LIBRARY**

The Library's 1971 Annual Report to the town stated, "Adequacy of public library service must be measured by the quality of service rendered," and itemized the library's needs in order that it could provide the quality of service that New London deserves. Thanks to the foresight of New London's taxpayers, the town has responded willingly to the library's requests.

While statistics alone cannot demonstrate the degree to which the Tracy Memorial Library has justified the taxpayers' response, they do indicate that the use of the library's services has increased substantially in the past three years. Adult book circulation has increased 50% since 1971 and 21% for children's books. Only periodical circulation has remained at about the same level since 1971.

Practically all the contemplated improvements to the Tracy Memorial Building, its internal arrangments and equipment, have been completed. Today its major problem is the effects of inflation on both uncontrollable costs as well as others necessary to the maintenance of adequate services; new book purchases have had to be substantially reduced in recent years. While the Board of Trustees has made an intensive review of every item of expense, a small increase in its appropriation request was inevitable for 1975.

Ms. Jan Noonan, our Assistant Librarian, resigned in 1974 to study at Georgetown University and to work in its library. Her effective work with Tracy Memorial Library, both as Assistant Librarian and with the children's programs, will long be remembered. However, we were very fortunate to secure the services of Mrs. Sue Filkins as a replacement. Not only will Mrs. Filkins achieve her Master's degree in Library Science in 1975, but she also has had considerable experience in library work with children. The redecoration of the reading room was completed in 1974, and the generous gift of draperies and comfortable lounge chairs by the Friends of Tracy Memorial Library has enhanced the room's attractiveness. The increased number of patrons who use the reading room attests to the success of this project.

The Wednesday morning coffee hour held by the Country Squires (formerly Senoir Citizens) has continued with average attendance of about 20. In appreciation the group presented the library with a new American Flag.

Mr. Lamont Moore gave an illustration lecture at Colby on the restoration of famous paintings after World War II, an activity in which he participated. The lecture was well attended and the proceeds given to the library.

It became advisable to fill the small pool in the library garden with earth. Not only was it an "attractive nuisance" legally, which placed full responsibility on the town for any accident to a child falling into it, but it also was impractical to maintain satisfactorily. The Garden Club will provide plants to improve its attractiveness. One of the garden trellises had to be removed and will be replaced early this Spring by Dr. John Norris.

An audio-visual movie projector has been purchased for use with children's programs. It will also be available for local organizations for use within the library building.

During the summer Miss Denise Ledger, a student at Kearsarge Regional High School, was employed by the library under the auspices of the Youth (job) Corps, her salary being paid by the Federal government. This was a useful and worthwhile project.

The Tracy Memorial Library is a community organization, whose success in providing adequate services depends on the citizens of New London, friends and patrons who provide gifts and services, and especially its staff whose loyalty, devotion, and effective work deserve special commendation. To all, the Board of Trustees wish to express its appreciation and gratitude.

### REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN DISTRICT CHIEF

All open burning when the ground is not covered with snow is controlled by the Town Forest Fire Warden in cooperation with the New Hampshire Forest Fire Service. Anyone wishing to kindle a fire out-of-doors when the ground is not covered with snow must have a written permit signed by the Town Forest Fire Warden. If the fire is to be kindled on land not owned by the person kindling the fire then he must have the permission of the landowner. No outdoor fires can be kindled between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. unless it is raining, without the additional approval of the District Forest Fire Chief.

The 1974 forest fire season was one of the worst in the past two decades. Woodlands in central and southern New Hampshire became so dry in mid August that the Governor and Council, upon the recommendation of the State Forester, enacted a partial woodlands closure in Sullivan, Cheshire, Hillsborough, Merrimack and Belknap Counties and a complete woodlands closure in Strafford and Rockingham Counties plus the Towns of Barnstead, Gilmanton and Alton in Belknap County. Through the excellent cooperation of the citizens of our State, no major forest fire occured at any time during the year.

#### **CIVIL DEFENSE REPORT**

New London Civil Defense again participated in the disaster drill under the direction of the New London Hospital. Some ten Civilian Defense drivers showed up at the hospital just minutes after being alerted, with their station wagons ready to evacuate ambulatory patients to other sites.

The Selectmen directed the Civil Defense Director to check on all town owned buildings in regards to fire extinguishers. It was found that the sewer plant buildings did not have any at all, and those at the old firehouse were inoperable. Eight new extinguishers were purchased and placed in the various town owned buildings.

The long awaited CD vehicle has now been allocated and equipment will be added to it as we go along.

This report would not be complete without noting the passing of Watson B. Johnston during 1974. He had been Civil Defense Director for many years and was devoted and loyal to his duties for New London Town. Even though he had been ill for the past few years, he still kept up an active interest in the towns CD activities. His sincere concern for the town and his responsibility was unequalled.

### **REPORT OF THE TOWN HEALTH OFFICER**

The Health officer is appointed by the Director of the Division of Public Health upon recommendation of the Board of Selectmen. He is secretary of, and, along with the selectmen, constitutes the local board of health. The appointment is for three years until reappointment or removal. The duties of a health officer are to "enforce the public health laws and regulations, and (shall) make such sanitary investigations as may be directed by the local board of health, or as may be required by the Division of Public Health Services."RSA 128:5

In this connection, activities have occurred during 1974 in the following areas:

1. Municipal water supply, well, and spring water.

At least three bacteriological tests per month have been conducted to monitor the quality of our water supply. Total chemistry has also been conducted, and in both cases the water is of excellent quality. Many individual supplies were tested, but none were found to be toxic.

2. All *clinical problems* are to be reported to the consultant of the health department, Dr. Donald W. Clark.

3. Store, school, and kindergarten inspections have been made.

*Restaurants, campgrounds, and camps* have been inspected by Mr. Frank Stone of the Consumer Protection Services, a division of the State Health Department.

4. One area of much activity involves health department approval of septic systems.

A few new buildings requiring individual systems have been approved, but three times as many old systems were refurbished. The cooperation of all concerned is greatly appreciated in overcoming some difficult problems. All work follows the State Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission regulations. 5. A second major area of activity which involves the health department is the *inspection of our lakes and ponds*.

Microbiology of the waters of Bucklin Beach, Elkins Beach and Otter Pond were done in May, July and August. Expected seasonal fluctuations were found in the counts, but none were high enough to cause alarm.

With the assistance of Mr. Henry Kidder III, a survey of microbiology and water turbidity in Little Lake Sunapee was completed in July. In addition, with the cooperation of Mr. Walter Ensign, Mr. Arnold Nichols, and Mr Loren Sjostrom Little Lake Sunapee Protective Association members, the perimeter of the lake was inspected. Reports on both of these events have been presented to the association.

Mr. George MacDonald kindly assisted in Secchi turbidity tests and water sample collection in Pleasant Lake during August. A report of these findings has been forwarded to the Pleasant Lake Protective Association.

A visual survey of the New London segment of Lake Sunapee took place in August and early September. A report of these findings have been sent to Lake Sunapee Protective Association.

The purpose of these inspections is to identify any surface water that may be carrying pollutants into the lakes or ponds. The principle source of the pollution problem is septic system failure.

Due to the extensive nature of our shorage, only one half of the lakes and ponds inspections can be completed per year.

Water purity is a mandate for not only do we enjoy waters for recreation, but a great number of lakeside residents use the lakes as their water supply.

Matters of public health are of first priority in the minds of our residents. Responsiveness, willingness and cooperation are words that describe the actions of most people that I have encountered during the year. Finally, I would like to thank Mr. Anthony Galluzzo for his helpful counsel in making the transition from one Health Officer to another. I also wish to thank the Selectmen and Planning Board members who have donated their time and offered advice.

If I can be of assistance to anyone concerning the Health Department, I am at your service.

### **REPORT OF ASSOCIATE HEALTH OFFICER**

The year 1974 has been one of great stress. The hospital in New London has felt this acutely because of the spiral of inflationary costs to management and even affected by a lowered census due to poor skiing this past winter. Needs for medical care have increased as there has been an increase in population in the general area. But, here, as in other parts of the country, there has been a gradual increase in demands placed on physicians and out-patient departments for ambulatory medical care, preventive medical care and perhaps a little less stress on hospitalization for treatment. This has made it difficult for doctors to make themselves available as readily as one would wish because of a heavily pre-scheduled case load, recognizing that he has obligations both to his pre-scheduled patients and those who wish to be seen acutely. As much as possible, it is in the best interests of people to try to establish contacts through a personal physician so as to schedule medical care and allow the doctor to deal with problems under a little less pressure. The place of the out-patient remains

focal and there has been some pressure to make out-patient departments of hospitals the primary source of medical care. In this area, such a move would require separate departments of function within the out-patient and salaried employed physicians who would be seeking to establish their own base of operations in competition with doctors in the offices. It should be recognized that costs of treatment of common medical problems such as sore throats, colds, skin rashes, digestive upsets, bladder infections etc. can be handled more privately and less than half as expensively in doctor's offices as in the out-patient department. Most current insurances do not cover treatment for these medical conditions and are geared to the treatment of injuries. For this reason, it is hoped that most people will use the emergency room as an emergency room for acute injuries and acute severe illnesses.

From the public health standpoint, we have had no major outbreaks of serious disease in the community this year, though, as usual, there are some cases of influenza and many viral digestive disorders. There has been no major outbreak of children's communicable diseases. This state now requires pre-school immunizations for diptheria, whooping cough, tetanus, polio, German measles, and recommends mumps. Compliance with this has been pretty good and we need to continue to emphasize this both through doctors' offices and through free clinics to maintain childhood immunizations. Reports from around the country indicate some real fear that there will be out breaks of polio and deaths from measles when we let down our guard as to these immunizations. It should also be emphasized that adults should have booster tetanus immunizations every ten years, something few people recall. The latest emphasis on ecology tends to warn us of the increasing problem with pollution of our water bodies and our sources of food. There have been outbreaks of many kinds of problems from contaminated shellfish and other ocean products and now increasing questions of what might get into our water supplies. Discoloration in the New London water supply has not meant contamination but vegetative coloring. Fortunately, I have not been involved in the fight over the effluent from our sewage disposal and this will continue to be a problem which bears upon medical conditions, but is primarily an engineering problem. The hospital now has new capabilities because of an upgrading in our anesthesia, physical medicare, inhalation therapy and laboratory

facilities, as well as increased expertise in the care of acute coronary and surgical emergencies. It is too bad that increasing our ability to serve the public has to have a higher price tag, but it is inevitable. Nonetheless, I believe that all the medical personnel in this area strive to hold down costs as much as possible, though it should be emphasized that the sky-rocketing costs are not doctors' bills but the cost of all the supplies, medications, new types of treatments and personnel to administer them and the ever increasing burden of paper work associated with insurers, the local and federal government.

### **REPORT OF THE NEW LONDON CONSERVATION COMMISSION**

During 1974 the Conservation Commission has optioned the remaining 15 acres of the Philbrick - Cricenti Bog for the town. The first 10 acres were acquired in 1973, - and hopefully, in 1976 this complete unique area will be protected permanently. An access trail has been constructed by volunteers and publicised guided tours were conducted into the bog several times during the summer. Biology classes from Colby and 8th grade science pupils from the middle school continue to use the bog as a learning experience.

Management of the land on County Road, donated by the Honorable James C. Cleveland to the town, has been turned over to the Conservation Commission,- and its proper usage is now under study.

The New London Trail System has been maintained, and color blazes are being changed gradually from red to blue to avoid confusion with surveyors' marking of property boundaries.

Esther Currier is the Commission Representative on the Town Planning Board and provides necessary liasion.

Saturday morning bird walks throughout May and June were conducted under the auspices of the Commission.

A new trail map has been printed showing the Andrews Trail, the newest addition to the Town Trail System. Copies of the map are available at Kidder's Garage and, in summer, from the information booth.

### **REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD**

The Planning Board gained two new members this year, Mrs. Esther Currier representing the Conservation Commission and Mr. Floyd P. Bailey replacing a member who resigned. The Board considered 21 subdivision proposals involving 61 lots. Eighteen proposals creating 52 lots were approved, two proposals were denied and one was withdrawn. At the close of the year three proposals involving thirty-five lots were in the preliminary layout stage. The Board also considered six site plans for nonresidential development, and numerous other land use proposals such as annexations between existing property owners, establishment of property line boundaries, et cetera.

Members of the Board have cooperated in field inspections with the Health Officer on soils and percolation tests for subdivisions and with the Road Agent on new road construction in subdivisions requiring such work.

The Board recommended certain changes in the Zoning Ordinance, all of which were adopted at the 1974 Town Meeting. One change proposed by petition of which the Board did not approve, was defeated.

### SEWER COMMISSIONERS' REPORT

In compliance with Federal regulations, we have applied to the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) for a permit to discharge the effluent from the present treatment plant into Lion Brook. The permit, in draft form, was presented and discussed at a hearing held in New London on November 23, 1974. The permit, as proposed by EPA, contains several special conditions including a rather strict timetable for completion of the various steps involved in constructing a new treatment plant. We feel that the conditions of the permit can be met and expect a permit to be issued early in 1975.

We have also submitted applications to EPA for grants to defray the cost of the study and report phase of the new treatment plant and the cost of constructing an Interceptor sewer from the junction of Newport Road and County Road to the existing treatment plant. Grants for 75% of the cost of both of these projects have been approved. Articles to raise and appropriate the remaining funds for these projects appear in the Warrant for the 1975 Town Meeting.

#### **NEW LONDON WATER SYSTEM PRECINCT**

The New London Water System Precinct added fifteen (15) residential services in 1974. In addition fourteen (14) house lots were provided with services in new development.

Twenty-three hundred feet of eight inch water main was added to the system which also included the installation of three (3) new hydrants.

In the reservoir area in Springfield, twenty-four hundred feet of new twelve inch main was put into operation in the fall. This replaced a similar length of the original wooded main. The Precinct encountered no breaks in any of our major mains or branch lines during the year. Several rusted service lines were replaced due to age and general condition.

While building starts were limited in 1974, the growth and improvement of water mains continued.

In conclusion, we extend our thanks to the New London Fire Department for equipment, individuals; Harry Cook, Harry Barrett, and William Taylor, Richard and Henry Kidder from Springfield, Richard Mann along with two men from Willis Prescott's department, Charles and Norman Evans, for their assistance in the fall when the Water Department cut over nearly  $\frac{1}{2}$  mile of new 12 inch main from the Reservoir area.

# NEW LONDON HOSPITAL ASSOCIATION, INC. ANNUAL REPORT

As of January 1, 1974 Mr. George Morse became Adminstrator of the New London Hospital naving been voted unanimously at the December meeting.

In February the Board of Directors voted to enter into an agreement with The Saga Food Service which subsequently took over the kitchen at the Hospital.

The Board also voted to purchase the Automatic clinical Analyzer which was installed in the Hospital after the new Laboratory had been completed.

Dr. Robert Friedlander and Dr. Donald Catino were appointed as active staff members and Dr. Robert Merriam was appointed an associate member of the New London Hospital Medical Staff.

In July the Hospital received a two year accreditation by The Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals.

Under the able chairmenship of Mr. and Mrs. F. Graham McSwiney a most successful Hospital Day was held showing a net of \$38,319.03. Of this amount, 5% is assigned to an endowment fund.

The Summer Residents Association gave \$ 8,370.00 to the Hospital for equipment and The Hospital is again most appreciative of their continued support.

Late in the summer The Board voted a 25% increase in room rates which became effective September 1.

Late in November the Board also authorized the purchase of a 1975 Dodge Medicruiser for \$ 16,500.00.

In December an open house was held for the public to see the new laboratory and to display the Automatic Clinical Analyzer. The following served on the Hospital Board of Directors during 1974.

The New London Hospital Aid Association held eight regular monthly work meetings at the Cleveland Room of the First Baptist Church from October, 1973 through May, 1974. The annual luncheon meeting was held in June at the Lake Sunapee Country Club. Monthly work projects consisted of the production of hospital garments, cancer dressings, and handmade articles for Hospital Day. Program speakers at these meetings were head personnel from the various departments within the hospital. Average attendance was 71 members. Membership totalled 342.

Eight board meetings were held. Representatives were sent to two New Hampshire Hospital Auxiliary meetings, the New England Hospital Assembly Inc. conference in Durham, N.H., and the NEHA annual meeting in Boston, Mass.

Volunteer service was rendered daily throughout the hospital. A Volunteer Coordinator's office was set up in the William P. Clough Extended Care Unit to direct the following volunteer programs maintained by the Aid Association: beverage and water jug service, bookcart and library maintenance, flower care and arrangements, hostesses and guides, recreational activities and Occupational Therapy aides, TV rentals, and a visitor control desk. A free beverage bar was set up and maintained in the main lobby of the hospital.

The \$600 Scholarship Award recipient was Jayson R. Colby, a graduate of the Sunapee High School, an employee at the New London Hospital, and at present, attending Colby College-New Hampshire.

Three high school students were hired to maintain inservice volunteer programs during the summer months with funds raised from a Christmas card sale. Two other money raising projects which enabled the Aid Association to make contributions of service and funds to the New London Hospital were the annual rental of pillows at the New London Barn Players and the rummage sale. \$5,088 was realized and dispersed from these two projects.

The New London Hospital Aid Association is sincerely grateful to its members, and to the citizens of New London and the surrounding towns, for their generous support and cooperation.

#### NURSE'S REPORT December 31, 1974

Since inception in July, 1970, the agency has seen a steady increase in the use of its services. We provide nursing care (which includes education, prevention, and rehabilitation), physical therapy and occupational therapy. No one is denied service due to financial difficulties. An individual can be referred to us by *anyone* and all information is confidential. In Community Health Nursing, family involvement is of utmost importance. The family needs support and guidance so they can continue to care between our visits. Teaching is a vital component that is incorporated with whatever procedures are ordered by the physician.

In the past year we have increased the hours of our part time nurse and now are considering employing another nurse. Physical therapy visits have doubled. Statistics: Total visits 1071 (includes 59 not home) Total mileage 13,350 miles.

320 visits for prevention, education, and guidance

593 visits for nursing care (dressings, catheters, colostomies, medication supervision, diet supervision)

99 visits for physical therapy

364 visits to your town

Our agency recognizes the importance of staff education and has provided us with the opportunity to attend workshops to enhance our skills in the nursing profession.

Future plans:

- 1. Increase nursing staff.
- 2. Set up immunization clinics in other towns according to priority
- 3. Contact with mental health center to provide follow-up care.
- 4. Contract for homemaker-health aide service.

We appreciate the continued town support and as in the past we have not requested any increase in your per capita assessment. The total town appropriations provide approximately 55% of our budget, while the agency brings in other monies through annual fund drive, insurances, welfare, and direct fees.

We thank you for your support through appropriation, contributions, donations of food, clothing and medical equipment. Only with community involvement can we continue to provide the highest quality health care to meet your needs.

Your town has a resident population June 30, 1974 of 2247.

Your assessment for 1975, based on \$1.25 per capita, is \$2,808.75.

Your town representatives are Dr. John Norris and Mrs. John Ballin.

The service applied for, and was granted, Federal funds to share in the purchase of a new ambulance vehicle. A study of a variety of vehicles was made, and one selected. The 1975 Dodge Medicruiser vehicle was ordered in November for delivery in January.

During the latter part of the year, an 80 hour Emergency Medical Technician-Ambulance (EMT-A) course was conducted at the hospital. On January 14, 1975, four New London citizens received certificates and licenses as qualified EMT's-A. During 1975, these citizens will be integrated into the service so as to improve its efficiency and create a back up staff of experienced, qualified attendants.

#### **REPORT OF ROAD AGENT**

1974 has been a busy one for the Highway Department. During the winter months there was below average snow fall but lots of ice and freezing rain. Because of this fact, the cost for labor, salt, and repairs was high. We were fortunate in having all the gasoline we needed.

The T.R.A. work was completed by placing asphalt mix on Hominy Pot Road and gravel and asphalt mix on the end of Shaker Road from Currier's Corner to the Sutton town line.

The special Road money was spent on the following roads: Balsam Acres, Carter Road, Old County Road, Stoney Brook Road, and Whitney Brook Road. Carter Road and the last half of Balsam Acres were hard surfaced.

The street sign project is still under way. Additional signs were ordered in July but arrived late in December, too late to set because of the frost in the ground.

The side walk money was spent resurfacing the walk from the New London Trust Company to the New London Inn driveway. A short piece was rebuilt opposite the Barn Players. Next year a side walk in Elkins needs replacing.

During 1974 Mr. Lewis Vincent, of the planning board, and I made over twenty-five inspections of roads in new developments. Probably the following roads; Pelfor, Halley, and Barton-Prescott, will be taken over by the town during 1975.

I wish to thank all the town officials, past and present, for their co-operation during the past eight years.

Many thanks to the highway crew for always responding when needed.

#### SOLID WASTE COMMITTEE

In compliance with a federally mandated state law, all towns must close their open burning dumps this July 1. The Solid Waste Committee was formed last fall to investigate the alternatives and to prepare an article for the vote of the Town Meeting.

Three options were explored: local landfill; transporting to another town for disposal; and incineration.

Local landfill--two sites on Mountain Road were investigatedthe Shepard property, which was bought several years ago for a landfill and the "stump dump." The Shepard property did not meet state specifications because of the height of the water table. The stump dump on the Wilmot line did receive eleventh hour approval; however it was not considered in the budget request as the cost of site development, which is expected to be high, had not been estimated.

The existing dump site, by far the best in location and the relative ease of conversion to a landfill, can be used for two to three years with maximum volume reduction through recycling and careful engineering. The committee is recommending that enough money be appropriated to develop this area as a stop-gap remedy in the expectation that other means of disposal will be available in the future.

The Town of Newport and a private contractor in Danbury have offered the use of their sites for a contract fee-in both cases about \$20,000. The distance from the center of town to either site is about 13 miles which would necessitate establishing a transfer station and arranging for hauling. The estimated hauling cost for uncompacted trash would be about \$10,000 a year.

Incineration, which appears to be the best long range solution, was shelved temporarily because of technical difficulties caused by fluctuations in trash volume and the high cost of the fuel required to fire available models- which also must meet EPA smoke emission standards. New developments in the field and the possibility of recovering some of the energy to generate electricity may make the whole concept much more attractive in the future.

It will be suggested that the possibility of installing an incinerator in the regional high school to help defray the heating costs be explored.

The recycling experiment has been successful with a revenue of \$2,837.93. About two thousand tons of paper and thirty tons of glass were removed from the bulk that is rapidly filling up the site. Had we been running a landfill dump, the paper alone would have filled a trench nine feet deep, sixteen feet wide and 160' long-Space we cannot afford to waste. On the other hand, hauling the paper to another site would have required an additional expenditure of \$875.- figured at \$35 per 30 yard load.

The decision on the final solution may be postponed until later this spring; but we must all be aware that, whatever option is chosen, we will be spending more to get rid of our trash than we ever have before.

#### **INFORMATION BOOTH**

Mrs. Katherine H. Morse and Miss Lynne Knapton were in charge of the New London Information Booth during July and August. In 1973, there were 2,551 persons who asked for information compared to 2,283 this past summer.

The attendants of the booth answered mostly routine questions about places to eat or stay and the best routes to various points, but they injected in their report that one question could not be answered — "Where in New London could one buy white mice for breeding?"

They received many compliments about the pink geraniums in the booth window boxes arranged and donated by the New London Garden Club.

#### THE TOWN HISTORY COMMITTEE

#### "Looking Ahead to New London's 200th Birthday in 1979"

As New London approaches its Bicentennial year, the Town History Committee in each year's Town Report Plans to do two things. It will indicate what was occurring in our Town two centuries ago; and it will report on its own activities during the year just past.

#### 1775

In the spring of 1775 Moses Trussell, the man who had planted the first crop in New London in 1774, went down to Bunker Hill as a private in Col. John Stark's N.H. Regiment. At that never-to-be-forgotten battle on 17 June 1775, Trussell lost his left arm. He was assisted from the scene of the conflict by John Wadleigh, related to the noted Wadleigh family of Sutton. Moses' musket that he carried in this encounter still is a prized possession of the Town of New London. While he was away, the population of New London increased to four: James Lamb; Nathaniel Merrill; Eliphalet Lyon; and Ebenezer Hunting. All these men built their cabins along the present King Hill Road.

During the year just past the Town History Committee installed the 12th historical marker planned in the series to be ready in 1979. This marker is located near the historic site known as "Hominy Pot," on the King Hill Road; it was dedicated with inpressive ceremonies on the last Sunday in August, 1974. The Committee also continued its program of xeroxing important Town Records of the earliest years; locating old roads; and identifying Revolutionary War graves. It is participating in the endeavors of the New London American Revolution Bicentennial Committee, appointed by the Selectmen in 1973, to coordinate local planning for the national observance with the efforts of the state and national authorities.

#### TREE WARDEN'S REPORT

In the past year we again carried on our annual insect and feeding spray program in the late spring. This spray and feeding is principally concentrated on the elms and maples on the main streets of Elkins and New London.

This past year there occurred a serious epidemic of the tent caterpiller nests taking as their usual host the wild cherry trees. They seemed to locate most heavily along the brook going out of Pleasant Lake in Elkins. I was able to cut out and destroy a large number of these nests and so hope they will not reoccur in July of 1975.

I am also pleased to report that with the help of John Woodward and his crew, we were able to get twenty new trees planted along Main Street this fall. These will help replace some of the dead elms and maples we have had to remove each year.

In the year ahead, to better regulate and control the tapping of maple trees along our outlining streets, a new requirement will be in effect. Anyone wishing to tap maple trees along these outlying streets will be required to obtain permission and a written permit from the tree warden. This decision was reached after much deliberation with and agreement of the Board of Selectmen. In this same regard, as tree warden trying to preserve and protect the shade trees of the town, I would like to request that no tapping of maple trees be done on Main Street from the James Cleveland property north to Homan's Corner. These trees are ornamental shade trees and are a vital and beautiful asset to the town.

This past year I have had to call in one of the state entomologists to help with serious insect problems.

#### **UPPER VALLEY-LAKE SUNAPEE COUNCIL**

The Council has been undergoing a period of rapid growth in this, its second year of full work in the Lake Sunapee Region. It originated as a six member economic development association in the Upper Valley.but with its growth and the development of the Lake Sunapee Region two years ago, it is now a comprehensive regional planning agency serving the needs of 22 member communities in a region of 1,000 square miles, from offices in Lebanon and Newport.

The Council operates on an annual budget of more than \$100,000-\$109,000 for the current 1974-75 fiscal year. It is under the direction of a 45 member board of directors composed of two directors from each of its 22 member communities (plus one director-at-large). Since these directors are appointed by the member communities, the Selectmen or City Councilors, and set the overall policies and programs to be administered by the professional staff, there is complete local control of the Council's activities.

The membership dues from local communities (New London's share for the coming year, figured on a per capita basis, will be \$1,544.00) account for less than 30 per cent of the Council's total revenue. The remainder, more than 70 per cent, comes from various state and federal sources; sources available to the Council because of its status as a comprehensive regional planning agency recognized by the federal government and the states of New Hampshire and Vermont. In other words, these added sources of revenue have increased the Council's income and thus its ability to serve its members at a better than two-to-one ratio of service to local dollars spent.

Many programs have been undertaken with that money. There are large-scale regional studies which benefit all member towns. Within the present year, there has been the completion of a comprehensive solid waste management study, which has helped all member towns head in the right direction as they approach the state-mandated deadline for closing their open burning dumps; and which revealed new options and technical areas for exploration by those towns which already have a landfill established. There are smaller-scale studies which benefit smaller groups of

communities in the region. Presently, for example, more than 20 towns are involved in the Council's tax mapping program, designed to help all New Hampshire communities meet the state deadline. Others have benefited from Council aid in local and multi-town problems in areas such as public transportation and recreation.

Direct staff assistance is made available to most communities via a technical services program with help given in such diverse areas as subdivision regulations, land use maps, downtown improvement studies, new zoning ordinances, planning for new municipal facilities and the many technical and graphic needs inherent in these programs.

These are a few of the types of services which the Council has provided in the past year. These types of services will be continued in its new fiscal year, which will begin July 1, 1975. The exact components remain to be identified and they will depend largely on what the town-appointed directors see as pressing needs this spring, since the Council is not a sort of regional government. It is a membership group, established to serve its members.

While each town or city has its own pressing problems, it does not exist in a vacuum. Many of its neighbors face some of these same problems. Or a neighbor's solutions may cause it problems.

This is where a regional planning program can help, working with and for local communities to seek solutions to these common problems. That is the continuing mission of the Upper Valley -Lake Sunapee Council.

#### **NEW LONDON GARDEN CLUB**

Nineteen hundred seventy-four was a busy year. As in the past the Club has cared for four corners of Town Property: Crockett Corner, Norris Corner, Williams' Triangle, and Old Main Street Triangle. Also the Club has cared for the grounds at the Town Hall, Tracy Memorial Library, and the Fire House. Care of the properties include pruning, weeding, fertilizing, and replacement of plantings when needed.

Routine community service-type activities include the care of Patients' flowers in the New London Hospital and William P. Clough Extended Care Center, operating a flower and plant booth on Hospital Day for the benefit of the Hospital, providing scholarships for teachers and students to attend Summer Conservation Camps, filling and maintaining the window boxes and care of shrubs at the Information Booth, care of planter at the New London Post Office, and the making of Christmas decorations for the public buildings in Town.

Sixteen white pine trees purchased with equal Town and Garden Club funds and a gift of two Swiss Stone Pine trees were planted at Bucklin Beach to provide privacy for bathers. The appearance of Bucklin Beach has been much improved.

Elkins Beach is also of great interest to the Club. Here the Club has planted trees and supplied plants for the bath house planters as well as continued care.

It is through understanding and hard work that the Club is able to give to the Town the added special touch to create a charm of its own and to help preserve our New England rural atmosphere.

Art. 27. (By Petition). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$842.00 for the Kearsarge Valley Center of the Community Action Program. (Not recommended by the Budget Committee. Town Council advises not legal appropriation.)

Art. 28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to increase the tax exemption for Colby beyond the present statutory requirement, RSA 72:23.

Art. 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$24,036.86, for the purpose of preparing plans and specifications on sewerage and sewage treatment facilities which are requirements contained in the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. ¶1251 et seq., 6 Stat. ¶16 et seq.) and will qualify the Town for Federal funds, such sum to

be raised by the issuance of Serial Bonds or Notes not to exceed \$24,036.86 under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act(N.H.R.S.A. 33.1 et seq., as amended) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds ar notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town of New London, and to allow the Selectmen to expend such monies as become available from the Federal Government under the Financial Assistance Program of the Construction Grants section of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. ¶1251 et seq., 6 Stat. ¶16 et seq.) and pass any vote relating thereto.

Art. 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$78,000.00 for the construction of a new interceptor line from the junction of Newport Road and County Road to the existing treatment plant.

Art. 31. (By Petition.) To see if the Town will vote to discontinue Lamson Road lying between Hillcrest Road and Elkins Road (Old Route 11). Such land within said road limit to revert to abutting property owners.

Art. 32. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a gift from the Elkins Fish & Game Club, Inc., the Pleasant Lake Dam and associated parcel of land, together with \$1,700.00 encumbered funds, for the sole use of repairs to the dam from the Elkins Fish & Game Club and the Pleasant Lake Protective Association.

Art. 33. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to spend the Highway Subsidy Funds in the amount of \$17,414.59 for the improvement of class IV and V highways (RSA 241:14).

Art. 34. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to enact disposition of municipal records in accordance with the provisions of RSA 33-A. Art. 35. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes if deemed necessary by the Selectmen.
