THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the town of Rumney in the county of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said Rumney on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.
3. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for highways in addition to the amount required by law.
4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of the library.
5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day and choose a committee to expend the same.
6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lights.
7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of Common.
8. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of cemetaries.
9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,500 to secure \$4,500 from the state for trunk line construction.
10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$300 to secure \$600 from the state for state aid maintenance.
11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2800 to secure \$5600 from the state for trunk line maintenance.
12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to buy snow fence.
13. To see if the town will vote to allow a 2 per cent discount on all taxes paid before July first.
14. To see if the town will vote to have the inventory blanks distributed at the time of taking appraisal of property.
15. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money in anticipation of uncollected taxes.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Rumney Band.

17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000 to secure \$1,000 from the state for permanent road from Rumney village to Stinson Lake.

18. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for oiling the streets of Rumney Village already once oiled.

19. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for oiling the so called permanent road to Stinson Lake.

20. To see what action the town will take in regard to a tool house and raise and appropriate money for the same.

21. To see what action the town will take in regard to discontinuing the following highways:

That section of the Doetown Hill road so called from the intersection of the road from the Charles Moses place to the Brook Lodge so called.

Also the road from the Doetown Hill road so called to the Doe and Watts places so called.

Also the road from the Ray or Bacon place so called to its intersection with the road on the east side of Stinson Lake near Camp Raleigh so called.

Also to discontinue as an open highway and make subject to gates and bars, the road from the C. C. Reed place on the trunk line to the Groton town line near the Will Colburn place so called.

22. To see what action the town will take in regard to the White Pine Blister Rust and raise and appropriate money for the same.

23. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SOME STATEMENTS ABOUT THE CURRENT SCHOOL YEAR 1927-1928

Schools opened September 6 with an enrollment as follows, Quincy 19, Lake 13, Village Grammar 15, Village Primary 21, Depot Grammar 19, Depot Primary 32, Montview 26, making a total of 149. The school census, September 30, showed 91 boys and 78 girls between the ages of five and sixteen years, of these 13 had not yet entered school and two were in high school. Twenty-two young people have enrolled in Plymouth high school this year. The 8th Grade enrollment this year is twenty.

For repairs and improvements this year the Village building has been repainted on the inside and the furniture refinished. At the Depot building the walls have been repaired and walls and ceiling of the Primary room repainted. The flood necessitated some temporary repairs at the Lake school. Safety locks have been put in the outside doors of the Village and Depot buildings so that in case of fire the doors may always be opened from the inside. Arrangements have been made to provide an adequate water supply at the Quincy school through the kindness of Mr Ransom Smith.

The school year will be 37 weeks in length, this will enable the pupils to have nearer the 360 half days of actual school that the law provides for them. This has been done without additional expense to the school district except transportation costs and janitors' fees for the extra week.

A Parent-Teachers Association has been formed by the parents and citizens of the Village community. This is a movement to help promote a better understanding between teachers and parents and to work cooperatively for the welfare of the pupils. Opportunities for membership and attendance at its meetings are open to all teachers and citizens of the school district. Mrs Charles Hamlin is president, Mrs Hollis Schaffner is vice president, Mrs Clifton Watts is secretary, and Mrs Frank Ford is Treasurer.

RECOMENDATIONS FOR NEXT YEAR 1928-1929

The Lake School

Last year the school board suggested that steps be taken to do something about placing the Lake School house on a better location so that the pupils may have a place to play where there are less opportunities for accidents. Since that time a flood has even threatened to carry the building from its present site. The school board was instructed in March, 1927 at the annual school district meeting to investigate and report. In August 1927, Mr. H. A. Seveigne very kindly offered to deed a lot of land directly across from the present site of the building for a school lot as long as the district wished to use it for school purposes. The board was very appreciative toward Mr. Seveigne for his offer and for a time entertained the idea of recommending its acceptance, but after investigating the action of the flood has decided to place article No. 16 in the warrant. At the time of the annual meeting, March 1928, the matter may be fully discussed and the board will try to be ready to answer questions and offer suggestions.

Repairs and Improvements

In addition to the needed change at the Lake School the board suggests that the walls of the Grammar room and the halls at the Depot School be repainted, that the covering over the entrance to the basement be repaired. Other things that the board feels should receive attention as soon as advisable from a financial point of view are to place new fences around the yards of the Montview, Quincy and Depot schools; to make changes necessary to prevent cross lighting at the Montview and Quincy Schools; and to provide more adequate water supply in the school buildings.

A School Nurse

The school board feels that although our medical inspection has been efficient, the follow up work pertaining to the health of our pupils has been very nearly none. Medical inspection is only the initial step in health work and a school nurse would increase the efficiency of the

work greatly. Therefore the board feels that a big step in progress may be taken by employing a registered nurse such time as is advisable during the school year 1928 - 1929. Rumney being a State aided school district will receive aid on the project, so the plan is really taking advantage of an opportunity without added burden to the taxpayers. Some of the school work is to plan for local clinics for particular defects, to consult parents and give advice in such cases as underweight children, those suffering from nervousness &c.: to cooperate with teachers and superintendent in carrying on a more effective health program and environment in the schools.

SCHOOL BANKING AND THRIFT

At this time of the high cost of living and of the temptation to spend all available cash for the present needs all will agree that thrift needs to be taught. The board feels that the project of Thrift Clubs and banking should receive some attention. This may be done with very little added expense to the school district. To gist of the plan is for pupils to receive instruction in thrift from their teachers and to be given an opportunity to deposit with the teacher their pennies, nickles and dimes, and when the amount of a dollar has been saved it will be transferred to a bank and made a savings deposit for the pupils to which more may be added. After the deposit is in the bank the money is in the control of the pupil and his parent.

High School



In the 1926-1927 report the board drew attention to the cost of high school education and to the advisability of considering plans for Rumney to support a high school of its own. At the last annual meeting of the school district a committee consisting of J. A. Rogers, L. N. Bryar and G. F. Williams were appointed to investigate the matter and make a report. Below is the report of that committee.

To the voters of Rumney School District:-

Having been appointed by you to investigate the advisability of beginning high school work in Rumney we submit the following report. We have investigated figures of school districts in the state that have a valuation comparable to that of Rumney and where high schools are maintained. We have visited one such place and held a personal interview with the superintendent there. We have sought advice from the office of the State Board of Education and have had the personal services of Mr. Walter May, Deputy Commissioner of Education on the home field. We have also worked in conjunction with the school board because we felt that we did not wish to make any recommendations that would not meet the approval of that body. We have also taken into consideration the question of economy in taxation.

We find that there will be, probably, eighteen pupils to continue their studies in Plymouth High School in Grades X, XI and XII next year. Their work there should not be disturbed. We find also that there are twenty young people in town who hope to be promoted from Grade Eight next June. All of those are entitled to high school privileges. Some of them probably will not be able to attend high school outside of the district.

Therefore; we recommend that plans be made for those who are promoted from Grade 8 to continue their studies in town, that a school be maintained in what is now called the Village Grammar room for 9th grade pupils from all the district and for 8th grade pupils from the Village and Depot communities. That the teacher for grades 8 and 9 be one trained for high school work and one of experience. That the 9th grade curriculum consist of English, Bookkeeping General Science and History of Civilization and the so called Band C Subjects in the State Program of Studies, which consist of such work as physical developement, public expression, music, drill on fundamentals, and character education. That a school be maintained in the Depot Grammar room for grades 5-6-7 of the village and Depot communities, that transportation be provided for any pupils in those grades whose homes are such distances from the school room to which they may be assigned as to come within the transportation laws of the state.

We recommend that the above plan be tried for the year 1928-1929. We believe that this plan will enable the school district to try our local high school work with no added expense and no change as to buildings, fuel, janitors' fees &c. And we further believe that by carefull planning and supervision such local high school work can be made so successfull that public sentiment will demand its continuation.

We also believe that a grade of scholarship may be maintained that will enable our boys and girls, in case that at the end of the year the plan does not seem wise, to go on with their education elsewhere, if they wish to do so, with credit to themselves and to Rumney School District.

We believe that some of the advantages in maintaining a local high school are,- An opportunity will be open to all promoted from the 8th grade to continue their school work. That commuting by train may be done away, thus freeing parents of that expense and freeing pupils from environment

that at times is not uplifting. That by attending high school at home our pupils will get more social school life and will cultivate more community home spirit.

May we say here that the above plan has the hearty approval of the State Commissioner of Education and his deputies.

We realize that after reading the above parents and citizens will have this question in mind, How would a local high school be developed further as to housing, expense of maintenance, curriculum and teaching force?

We have given these matters considerable attention.

First, as to housing,- We find that the Depot school building is so constructed that with small expense the second floor may be made into a house for a local high school and that the school grounds there have adequate space for playground facilities. Some citizen may have a better suggestion when the time comes.

As to expense of maintenance,- We find upon investigation of the costs of small local high schools that the per pupil cost of maintenance does not exceed the average per pupil cost of tuition in schools outside the districts. We find this also true that there is a tendency for tuition pupils to come in from the nearby districts.

As to curriculum and teaching force,- We find that in starting high schools one teacher handles the work to the end of two years and for the third and fourth years a second teacher is added. That the curriculum is broadened, that a foreign language is added the second year and another the third year. That a curriculum might be developed something like this;

Or the curriculum might be made to tend more toward Commercial Work.

Finally a word about finances for 1928-1929. A budget has been worked out for the plan presented above and we are convinced that 9th Grade may be handled for \$1,500.00, this sum would provide a teacher and equipment to carry on the years work successfully. That portion of the teacher's time devoted to the 8th Grade would be paid for out of the elementary school appropriations.

In case the 9th grade should go to Plymouth next year it would not be safe to ask the school district to appropriate less than \$1,800.00 for their tuition.

It has been a pleasure to investigate this matter and we hope that the district will adopt our suggestions.
