

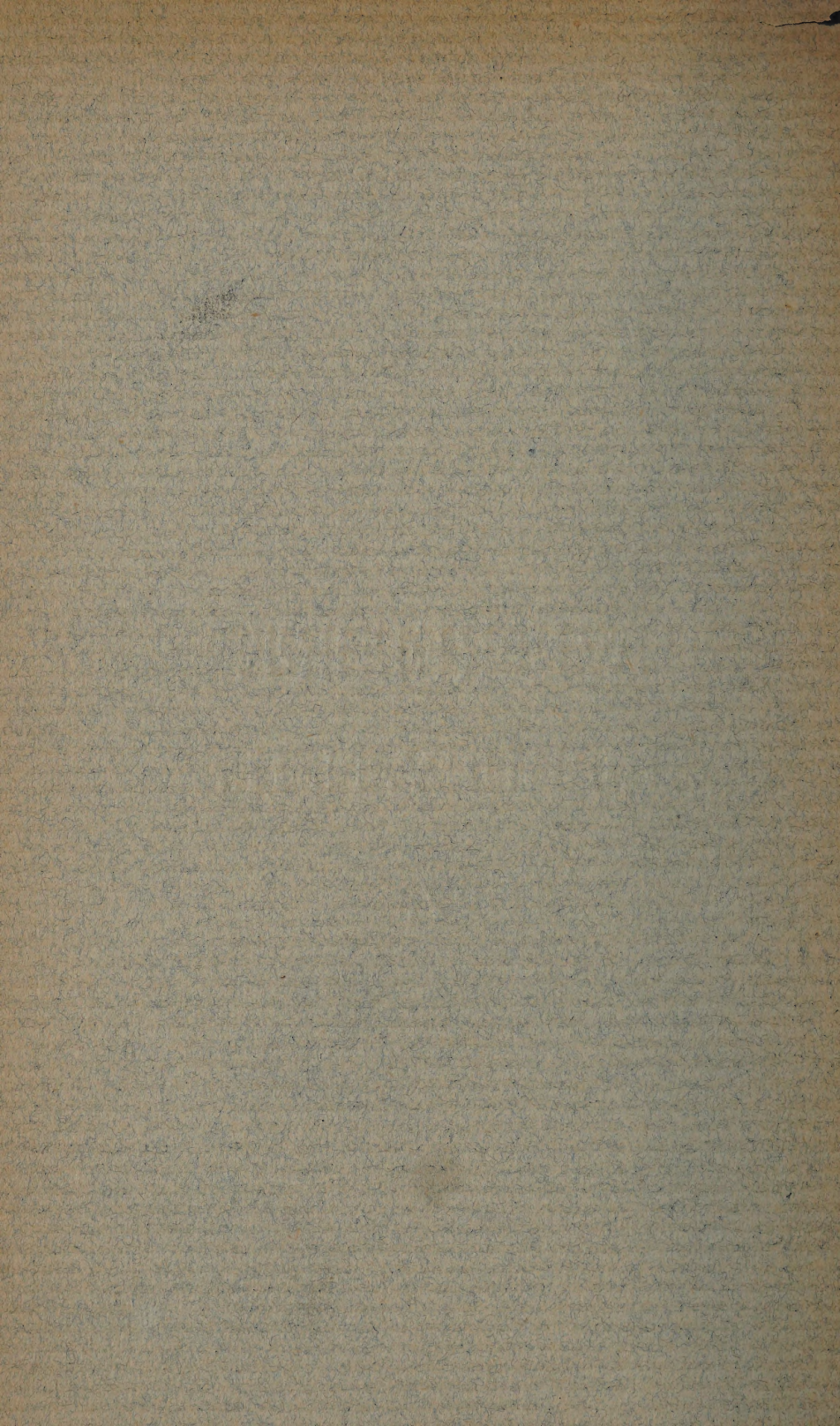

Report of the School Board.

TO THE CITIZENS OF SALISBURY:

The duty and privilege of making the annual report of the School Board returns again and it is with much pleasure we make the following statement and figures. We consider the schools have been well cared for, the teachers competent and conscientious in the discharge of their duties, and so far as can be observed there has been much good attained during the year.

The Board last year felt impelled to speak of the lack of sympathy existing between parents and teachers, also, need of more interest in the schools by parents and guardians. We are glad to notice that in both cases these detriments to success have been obliterated and the numbers of visitors have been very large during the past year. While a few of our citizens have desired to have a school established in the Greeley district, the majority of the board have not conceded to their wishes. The few scholars in that district have been carried to other schools where they have received the benefit of excellent teachers while the general tuition of the pupils in town have not suffered in consequence of the useless expense of supporting an extra school.

The attendance during the school year closing August 1896 shows the high per centage of 95.09 of attendance at all the schools. This is a remarkable figure in a town where many of the children live at quite a distance from the schools, and reflects great credit upon both pupils and parents.

We believe our schools will compare very favorably with those of other towns where the cost of instruction is much larger per capita and where no better opportunity is offered for laying the foundation of a good education.
