

Library Report.

The total number of books acquired during the year is 170. Of these, 89 were purchased from the town appropriation. Eighty volumes, consisting of publications of the Smithsonian Institute, Bureau of Ethnology, Bureau of Animal Industry, etc., were donated by the government upon application by the trustees. One volume was donated by the local W. C. T. U.

While works of fiction, history, travel, etc., must of necessity make up by far the larger part of a public library, it has been the aim to include in our library a good proportion of books of especial value to a farming community and it now contains most of the latest and best authorities on plant growth, crop raising, fruit culture, gardening, floriculture, bee-keeping, road making, stock-breeding, poultry culture, tuberculosis, diseases of animals, spraying plants, use of insecticides, etc. These books have been well received.

The patronage of the library has been very gratifying. Borrower's cards have been issued to 235 individuals; 2400 books have been taken out since January 1, 1897, and an average of about 50 books are called for at present every day the library is open.

The library was continued in the store and under the care of Mr. A. C. Lane until October, 1897, when it became necessary to move elsewhere. It was placed temporarily in the basement of the town hall until January, 1898, when it was installed in the new room provided by the town. The new room admirably answers the needs of the library and contains space for additional shelving sufficient to meet all probable needs for many years to come. Since October Mr. F. A. Caverly, of the Trustees, has acted as Librarian and his systematic methods and his fidelity in caring for public property in his charge have met the warm approval of his associates. The Trustees would also acknowledge their obligations to the Selectmen for interest manifested and aid given in all matters pertaining to the library.

DIVISION NO I.

Miss Gorda Nana Bean, of the Weirs, taught the Spring term with reasonable success, but resigned during the summer vacation to accept a position in the graded schools of Laconia. She was succeeded by Miss Bertha May King, of Lancaster, who came highly recommended, having taken the State examinations and obtained the State teachers' certificate from New Hampshire and Vermont. She had also taught two years. Her quiet, dignified manner and amiable disposition soon won the esteem and respect of her pupils, and she has proven a refined, efficient teacher, destined to achieve marked success.

Unfortunately, the school work was somewhat retarded by the illness of Miss King and the consequent closing of the school for two weeks in the Fall term; but the Winter term has gone forward without a break, showing such progress as can only be attained by diligence and interest on the part of pupils and teacher. Special improvement was noticed in reading and rhetorical exercises.

DIVISION NO 2.

Miss Myra Hayes, of Limerick, Me., a graduate of Abbot Academy, has taught the entire year, and given abundant evidence of being not only well educated, but apt to teach principles of the common school branches and their practical application.

Her methods are approved and interesting, and her earnest, unremitting work for the school has not been in vain.

The children become duly impressed with the necessity of being honest and persevering in the performance of school duties, and it has been a year fruitful of good results.

We have never seen this school appear so studious, contented and happy as at our last visit in the new school building, which, after four months' use, shows neither scratch nor scar—this is very creditable to teacher and pupils, and they have our approbation.

DIVISION NO. 3.

Miss Ida May Slack throughout the year has continued to develope all the enthusiasm and good scholarship of those under her charge, and has elicited the same warm commendation from the School Board and visitors, as in previous years.

As additional tribute to her worth as a teacher, we would say she abounds in devices that serve to excite intellectual curiosity, and possesses the rare power of so marshalling facts as to arouse in her pupils an intelligent interest in all subjects taught. The order, progress and appearance of the school have been all that could be desired.

DIVISION NO. 4.

Reported under "General Remarks."

GENERAL REMARKS.

The close of the present fiscal year finds the town much better equipped as regards school buildings than ever before in its history, and as the people of Stratham are noted for their intelligence and culture, we feel sure they will in the future, as in the past, make every feasible effort to advance the prosperity and elevate the character of their schools, that the youth whom they send forth from year to year may be given the greatest possible impetus to become the best type of American citizen.

That there has been an evolution in education as in everything else, none can dispute.

We now have inviting school houses, attractive books, trained and scholarly teachers and everything along the highway of learning made pleasant and helpful; but in no one thing is this evolution more marked than in discipline.

Our fathers believed most firmly in the efficacy of corporal punishment, but a gratifying softening in the spirit and method of correction now pervades our schools.

Naturally the schools present from year to year some points to criticise and some to commend. The home instruction in these busy rushing days counts for so much less than formerly, that upon the teacher to-day rests a grave and increasing responsibility.

Too much attention cannot be given to the morals of pupils, and the teacher who neglects those important duties is not qualified for the position she occupies.

A new library, obtained through the efforts of the scholars, has this year been placed in Division 1, and it is pleasing to remark that neat cases with small but well selected libraries now afford highly appreciated supplementary reading in Divisions 1, 2, and 3.

Parents and citizens of Division 2 can truly say, "Patient waiters are no losers."

While we would not recommend the building of palaces for

school houses, still it is very desirable that they be not only comfortable but attractive, and in the completion of the new school building we would congratulate all interested that these two qualities have been attained.

Children as well as adults are affected by their surroundings indeed, Mrs. Livermore has said, "Environment will overcome heredity." If this is true we can hardly overestimate the benefit which must accrue to the children privileged to attend school in the pleasantly located, finely appointed school house in Division 2. This school was closed for five weeks during the Spring term on account of measles and scarlet fever.

In the Summer vacation the room in Division 3, with its steel ceiling, was newly painted in soft tints, desks re-varnished and floor oiled. These improvements with pictures added by teacher and pupils make an attractive, homelike room.

At the beginning of the year it was decided not to open the school house in Division 4, until a sufficient number of scholars should make such a step practicable; therefore, in the Spring term the pupils were conveyed to Division 1, as in the two preceding years.

One or two of the children being too small for the long ride in cold weather, it was deemed advisable to make other arrangements, which resulted in a Fall term of 15 weeks, taught by Mrs. Margie 'P. Wiggin at her home, with an attendance of 3, and a Winter term of 7 weeks, taught by Miss Florence M. Dining at her home, with an attendance of 5.

Painstaking, satisfactory work has been done by both ladies, and we are confident these arrangements have provided the children of Division 4 with school advantages equal to those of the other Divisions, at a saving to the tax payers of about \$175.00.

Vertical writing has been taught throughout the year in each school.

Under the new law our scholastic year now begins with the Fall term and ends in June.
