#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Chesterfield in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said Town on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To elect a town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 2. To elect one Selectman for three years.
- 3. To elect all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charge for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
- 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, to be applied upon the Town over-draft or debt.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Chapter 117, Laws of 1917, on a section of the Cheshire Road, so-called, and appropriate, or set aside from the amount raised for highway work the sum of \$750.00 for this purpose.
- 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairing of highways and bridges.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for highways and appropriate sufficient money for same.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Bridge Aid and appropriate sufficient money for same.

- 10. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for State highway maintenance.
- 11. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the support of the poor.
- 12. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the support of the Town Library in addition to what is required by law.
- 13. To determine the method of collecting of taxes for the ensuing year.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$400.00 to fight the pine blister rust.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to observe Old Home Day and raise money and appropriate money for same.
- 16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for street lighting, for the ensuing year.
- 17. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$500.00, to be used for widening and repairing the so-called River Road in the west part of the town.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to cut brush and repair the road leading from the Hampshire House past the old Prospect house site and thence to the Cheshire Highway, a distance of approximately 60 rods.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to keep the State road from the Suspension Bridge to the Keene line open to automobile traffic in winter and spring and instruct the treasurer to withhold \$900.00, from the amount raised for highway maintenance until such time as in the judgment of the selectmen, snow storms require the scraping of roads and spring thaws make certain sections of the State road hazardous to traffic.
  - 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00

to gravel the road leading from the old Spofford Lake Road, past the farm of Glenham Jones.

- 21. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a new road scraper for the center of the Town and raise money for same.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to sell the old wooden scrapers.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the old highway leading to the Pinnacle Spring Farm from the highway leading to Westmoreland from Chesterfield.
- 24. To see what action, if any, the Town will take toward raising and appropriating a sum of money to be used in securing a Resident Physician.
- 25. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase or construction of some suitable Fire Proof Vault or Safe for the storing of all Town Records, or act theeron.
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to accept from Mrs. Myra I. Farr, the sum of \$200.00 in trust, to be known as the Olin R. Farr trust fund, the income therefrom to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the perpetual care and maintenance of the Ransom Farr and Olin R. Farr burial lot, in the said Associations Cemetery.
- 27. To see if the Town will vote to accept from Mrs. Martha E. Peltier, the sum of \$100.00, in trust, to be known as the Onesime Peltier trust fund, the same to be kept at interest during the remainder of the life of the said Mrs. Peltier, and after her decease (unless sooner requested by her), the income arising from said sum increased by the accumulated interest, to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the perpetual care and maintenance of the Onesime Peltier burial lot in said Associations Cemetery.
- 28. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust, to be known as the Sem D. Stowell Trust

Fund; the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Sem D. Stowell burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

- 29. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust, to be known as the Henry Puffer Trust Fund, the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Henry Puffer burial lot in Spofford Cemetery.
- 30. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 in trust, to be known as the John A. Joslin Trust fund, the income to be used for the care and maintenance of the John A. Joslin and the John E. Joslin burial lots in Spofford Cemetery.
- 31. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust, the income to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association, for the care and improvement of the Henry Chickering burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery.
- 32. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust, to be known as the Bevis-Richardson Trust Fund, the income to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association, for the care and improvement of the Bevis-Richardson burial lot in the Chesterfield West Cemetery.
- 33. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

### TOWN MEETING, MARCH, 1924

Proceedings at the annual Town Meeting of the voters of the Town of Chesterfield called at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, March 11th, 1924.

The Meeting was called to order by the Moderator Louis D. Herrick at 9 A. M. and the warrant read.

The articles in the Warrant were disposed of as follows:

Article 1. Town Clerk. Whole number of votes cast was 160, necessary for choice 81. Cless G. Davis, 1; Roger C. Spaulding, 1; Moses H. Chickering, 1; Merle W. Cobleigh, 15; Imogene Chickering, 54; Charles A. Post, 61. No choice; second ballot, whole number of votes cast, 141 necessary for choice, 72; Harold E. Randall, 1; Merle W. Cobleigh, 2; Imogene Chickering, 65; Charles A. Post, 73 and Charles A. Post having the majority of votes cast was declared by the moderator elected and took the oath of office.

Art. 2. Selectmen for three years. Whole number of votes cast was 148, necessary for choice 75. Harold E. Randall, 47; Alba Λ. Farr, 2; Louis M. Seeney, 1; Cless G. Davis, 98. Cless G. Davis having the majority of votes cast was declared elected by the moderator, and took the oath of office.

Art. 3. Town Treasurer. Voted that the clerk be instructed to cast one ballot for Harold E. Foster, and he was declared elected by the moderator and took the oath of office.

Art. 4. Town Auditors. Clifford W. Tuttle, George L. Brown and Merle W. Cobleigh were elected as town auditors for the ensuing year by a voice vote and took the oath of office.

Road Agents. Spofford District. Whole number of votes cast was 118, necessary for choice 60, Frank A. Pearson had 51, Walter J. Post 67. Walter J. Post having the majority of

votes cast was declared by the moderator elected, and took the oath of office.

Center District. Whole number of votes cast was 128, necessary for choice 65. George F. Amidon, 1; Dennis Jeffts, 12; Frank M. Holman, 115. Frank M. Holman having the majority of votes cast was declared elected by the moderator and took the oath of office.

West District. Voted that the clerk be instructed to cast one ballot for George F. Amidon for road agent and he was declared elected by the moderator and took the oath of office.

Assessors. It was voted that the Selectmen act as assessors for the ensuing year by a voice vote.

Constables. Charles H. Spaulding, William D. Pierce and Harry E. Winn were elected as constables by a voice vote and severally took the oath of office.

Surveyors of Wood and Lumber. Harold E. Foster, Walter J. Dunbar and Frank M. Holman were elected as surveyors of wood and lumber by voice vote for the ensuing year and took the oath of office.

Sextons. John A. Joslin, Frank Guyette, Harold P. Post, George L. Brown, Fred E. Atherton and Charles J. Pare were elected as sextons for the ensuing year by a voice vote and declared elected by the moderator, and severally took the oath of office.

Fence Viewers. Fred O. C. Farr, Olin E. Butler, and Lyle B. Chickering were elected by voice vote and declared elected by the moderator and took the oath of office.

Trustee of Public Library 3 Years. Harry E. Winn was elected by voice vote and declared elected by the moderator, and took the oath of office.

Trustee of Trust Funds. John A. Joslin for three years, Merle W. Cobleigh for one year in place of Burton C. Thatcher, resigned were elected by voice vote and so declared elected by the moderator and severally took the oath of office.

Article 4. Voted to raise the sum of \$2,500.00 to defray town charges for the ensuing year.

Article 5. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to be paid on the town overdraft or debt.

Article 6. Voted to accept the provisions of chapter 117, laws of 1917 on a section of the Cheshire road so called and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for the same.

Article 7. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the repairs of Highways and Bridges for the ensuing year.

Article 8. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,047.50 for the purpose of securing state aid for highways.

Article 9. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,125.00 for state highway maintenance. (State contribute \$6,375.00 as per letter).

Article 10. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the support of the poor for the ensuing year.

Article 11. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 in addition to what is required by law for the support of the town library.

Article 12. Voted that Alba A. Farr serve as tax collector for the ensuing year and that the town furnish bond for same.

Article 13. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to fight the Pine Blister Rust for the ensuing year.

Article 14. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the purpose of observing Old Home Day, and the following committee was appointed by the moderator, Charles H. Spalding, Curtis Chickering, and Walter Dunbar.

Article 15. Voted to raise and appropriate a suitable sum to establish a new light on the cross road leading from Main Street to High Street in Spofford Village.

Article 16. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for street lighting for the ensuing year.

Article 17. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500.00 for the purpose of building, construction and repairing, and grading a new road leading to Pinnacle Springs Farm now owned by one Morris Friedsam, as laid out by the selectmen on February 6th, 1924. The said Morris Friedsam being

bound to pay one third of the cost of construction, not exceeding the sum of \$6,000.00 as per petition recorded on page 327 town records.

Article 18. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the purpose of graveling the road and cutting brush thereon on road leading past the farm of one Glenham Jones.

Article 19. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to repair the Hill below the Norman Colburn farm house.

Article 20. Voted to accept from Melvin M. Smith late of Chesterfield deceased a bequest and devise a sum not exceeding \$5,500.00 in value to be held in trust by the town and the income thereof to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association, to be expended by the trustees as directed by the will of the deceased.

Article 21. Voted to accept the sum of \$500.00 to be known as the Annie A. Amidon trust fund, the income to be used for the care of and improvement of the Otis Amidon, Loren Harvey, and the Elvira Meade-Harvey burial lot in the Center Cemetery.

Article 22. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust to be known as the Esterbrook-Hopkins Trust Fund, the income to be used for the improvement and care of the Esterbrook-Hopkins burial lot in Spofford Cemetery.

Article 23. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust, to be known as the Anna Campbell Clark trust fund, the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Sidney S. Campbell burial lot in Spofford Cemetery.

Art. 24. Voted to accept the sum of \$200.00 in trust to be known as the Jonathan Cobleigh trust fund, the income to be used in the care and improvement of the Jonathan Cobleigh lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery, said income to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association.

Article 25. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust to be known as the Erving A. Hildreth trust fund, the income to

be used in the care of Erving A. Hildreth burial lot in Spofford Cemetery.

Article 26. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust to be known as the John H. Henry trust fund, the income to be used for the care and improvement of the John H. Henry lot in Spofford Cemetery.

Article 27. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust to be known as the Fred W. Hopkins trust fund the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Fred W. Hopkins burial lot in Spofford Cemetery.

Article 28. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust to be known as the Abial Miles Post trust fund, the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Abial Miles Post burial lot in Spofford cemetery.

Article 29. Voted to accept the sum of \$150.00 in trust, to be known as the Mead Trust fund, the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Converse-Mead Cemetery in Chesterfield.

Article 30. Voted to accept the sum of \$200.00 in trust to be known as the Wallace K. Ware Trust fund, the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Wallace K. Ware burial lot in Chesterfield Center cemetery.

Article 31. Whole number of votes cast for delegate at large, alternate delegate at large, district delegates, alternate district delegates, to the National Conventions of the Republican and Democratic party.

Whole number of votes cast: Republican, 32, Democratic 6.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Chesterfield:

I have the honor to submit herewith my fifth annual report on the schools.

#### TEACHERS AND PUPILS

It is pleasing to be able to report that all teachers who were in Chesterfield last year returned this fall and bid fair to remain with us during the year. More frequently we have had changes during the year than have we been able to keep the entire staff for two successive years. This is a decided step forward. I wish to testify here to the interest that teachers have in their work and the good results which they are obtaining.

Standard tests have been given in all the fundamental studies in grades four to eight inclusive. Either the teachers or I will be glad to show anyone the results and go over individual records with parents. The results are on graph cards made out last year and the advance is easily seen.

For the most part there has been a good record of attendance. Children and parents seem interested in the work and schools. The two rooms at Chesterfield have the best record of attendance for the year for the first fifteen weeks. It is planned to further stimulate the interest in school affairs by a spelling contest toward the end of the year. New spellers have been in use during the year in grades four to eight. These are a decided advantage. The material for reading in some schools is low. This needs to be brought up to standard for with the great advance in reading ability more material is necessary.

#### HEALTH TEACHING

The teachers are doing all possible to bring to the minds of children the importance of good health by the use of exercises, songs, charts, etc. They can and are doing much. It is planned to have a nurse examine the children instead of a physician as heretofore. I understand that a nurse cannot give a final diagnosis but where there is indication of trouble she can by a personal call give much more information to parents and much more emphasis to the case than can a report from a physician. A nurse for two weeks in the district will cost about the same as an examination by a doctor who spends a day or two.

#### BUILDINGS

The buildings are in need of the following repairs. Spofford needs attention about the roof. Chesterfield has had installed chemical toilets which make that building nearly complete in every detail necessary for sanitation. The old toilets were abominable and very dangerous. I think we have here just avoided a reprimand from the State Board of Health. West Chesterfield needs many minor and some major repairs. Money to the extent of \$175 was raised for this two years ago and is still available. It has not been used owing to inability to get workmen during vacation time and other indifferences. The detail for these repairs has been gone over often with the members of the board. The general appearance despite good janitor service is disreputable. This ought not to be neglected longer.

I take this opportunity to express my gratitude to the people of Chesterfield for their support of the schools in a way that looks to the future of the town. I am grateful to the teachers, pupils and school board for many things.
