

# Warrant for Town Meeting

#### (L. S.) STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the town of Danbury, N. H., in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:


You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Danbury on Tuesday, the 13th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for same.
- 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of highways.
- 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.
- 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Trunk Line Construction.
- 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Trunk Line Maintenance.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to give a discount on taxes paid before July 1, 1928.
- 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purpose of plowing the Mascoma Valley and Lake Sunapee roads, so called, for the winter of 1928 and 1929.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to paint the Town Hall, by contract, and raise money for same.
- 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purpose of street lighting.

- 11. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purpose of planting the George F. Collins land with pine.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to transfer the high-way from Grafton town line, near the Ben. Hale place, to junction of roads on Waldron meadow from Class 5 road to Class 6.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to transfer the highway from Dean road, so called, to Scott Ford's buildings, from Class 5 road to Class 6.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to transfer the high-way from Howard Drake's buildings to junction of roads at Charles Littlefield's corner, from Class 5 road to Class 6.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to transfer the highway from Dean road, so called, near Grafton town line to Scott Ford's saw mill, from Class 5 road to Class 6.
- 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purpose of painting five iron bridges.

# Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board of Danbury:

I present herewith my third annual report as Superintendent of schools in Danbury. It deals with survey of statistics, honor roll of attendance, buildings and equipment, organization and instruction, and health supervision.

The percent of attendance in each of the four schools is much improved. The average percent for the town is a credit to pupils, parents, teachers and the attendance officer. It is significant in the above table that the higher percent of promotion follows the higher percent of attendance.

As a whole the average number of tardinesses per pupil is slightly reduced. The Center school has a satisfactory record, and the South school an excellent record in the reduction of tardinesses.

All of the five pupils graduated from the eighth grade in June entered high school. Four of these are now in attendance. The graduating class included, George Fay, Geraldine Hamilton, Arlene Littlefield, Doris Mason, Edna Tucker. Danbury has at present a total of sixteen pupils attending an approved high school or academy and entitled to tuition paid by the town.

# BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT

In addition to the usual minor repair and cleaning of school buildings the outside of the North Road schoolhouse has been repainted. The choice of body and finish colors adds much to the attractiveness of the building. Before another year the interior woodwork of this building should be repainted and the walls and ceiling of the schoolroom put into standard condition.

The Elmwood schoolroom has been equipped with "Dratex" adjustable window shades. New and adjustable shades are seriously needed in both the Center and North Road schoolrooms.

Since at the Center extensive repair of the toilet vaults must be made, I would recommend that the present out-house be removed and that two single unit chemical toilets be installed in the present passageways, thus to provide sanitary toilet rooms opening directly from the schoolroom.

Similar toilet equipment should eventually be installed in the South school building. However, a more immediate need of this school is an adequate supply of pure water either on the grounds or brought into the schoolhouse. This would necessitate either boring a well and attaching pump, or securing water privilege and piping from a spring.

### ORGANIZATION AND INSTRUCTION

During last summer three vacancies were caused in the staff of teachers by the withdrawal of Mrs. Harriett G. Morrison from the North Road school, the transfer of Elizabeth R. MacNutt from the Center to a position as teacher and music supervisor in Andover, and the resignation of Harriett D. Bergeron of the Elmwood school to accept a graded school position in Greenfield, Mass.

Miss Luda R. Barber of Sheffield, Vermont, a successful teacher in the schools of Wilmot and Grafton, accepted on account of health the smaller North Road school. Miss Esther A. Lang of Lisbon, a 1925 graduate of Keene, was elected teacher of the Center school. Previous to her election in Danbury, Miss Lang taught in Bath.

By contract with the Keene Normal School, the school at Elmwood is this year taught by four rural cadet teachers. Each serves for a period of nine weeks. The cost of instruction is in this way sufficiently reduced to permit the continuance of the school and to meet the increased expense for transportation of pupils. These cadet teachers have had at least a year, and in the majority of cases more than a year of resident work in normal school before coming to Danbury.

The South school is fortunate in the retention of Miss Elizabeth J. Hounsell, whose efficiency in both school work and community activities is appreciated. Both Miss Hounsell and Miss Lang hold elementary teacher's certificates from the state.

The employment during the past two years of normal graduate teachers, and particularly of normal graduates holding the state certificate, has aided in increasing Danbury's share of state aid money as the following receipts indicate.

 This year in addition to instruction in grammar and composition the foundation is being laid for a definite course in literature, both prose and poetry, that is designed to reach and appeal to the best interests and ideals of seventh and eighth grade girls and boys. Rightly presented by the teachers, this course encourages oral reading for expression, develops knowledge of and love for good literature, and gives the pupil going into senior high school from our rural schools a better opportunity to compete with the pupil of junior high school training,

The course in civics has been made of more immediate application by introducing in alternate years, in place of the study of more intricate constitutional forms of government, a simple study and comparison of small town and community activities and problems of personally economic and civic interest. "Our Neighborhood-Good Citizenship In Rural Communities" is being used as a basal text.

### HEALTH SUPERVISION

In completion of a three-months contract as school nurse, Miss Della V. Carr returned last spring to her duties in the four towns of this Union. Her activities in Danbury, during the four weeks beginning May 15th, included nine health instruction periods in schools, 15 visits to homes of pupils, and two dental treatments secured. Immediately after the close of schools in June Miss Carr accepted private duty and is no longer available for school nursing and health instruction.

Commencing the middle of October, Miss A. D. Mac-Donald was employed for two and one-half months in three towns of the Union including Danbury. Miss MacDonald is a graduate of the Margaret Pillsbury Hospital in Concord and, previous to her school nursing, had been connected with the New London hospital. Her report of activities as school nurse in Danbury follows.

Indicative of the results of systematic and professional health surervision is the fact that, with 13 per cent less pupils examined, the number of corrective treatments was nearly four times that of last year. The increasing cases of defective teeth make the need of dental clinic service painfully apparent.

## CONCLUSION

I use the words of J. Elmer Morgan, editor of "The Journal" of the National Education Association.

"Let us set the child in our midst as our great-

est wealth and our most challenging responsibility. Let us exalt him above industry, above business, above politics, above all the petty and selfish things that weaken and destroy a people. Let us knowthat the race moves forward through its children and, by the grace of Almighty God, setting our faces toward the morning, dedicate ourselves anew to the service and welfare of childhood."
