SPECIAL ATTENTION.

The Auditors desire to call the attention of the people of the town to Chapter 39, sections 6, 7, and 8 of the General Laws, as follows :

SECT. 6. No person shall speak in any meeting without leave of the moderator, nor when any person is orderly speaking ; and all persons shall be silent at the desire of the moderator, on pain of forfeiting one dollar for each offense, for the use of the town.

SECT. 7. If any person shall conduct in a disorderly manner, and, after notice from the moderator, persist therein, or shall in any way disturb the meeting, or willfully violate any rule of proceeding, the moderator may command any constable or any legal voter of the town to remove such disorderly person from the meeting, and detain him until the business is finished.

SECT. 8. Every constable shall obey the orders and commands of the moderator for the preservation of order, and may command such assistance as is necessary ; and if any constable neglect to perform any of the duties imposed by this or the preceding chapter, he shall forfeit forty dollars, for the use of the town.

And recommend that such rules be adopted by the moderator, or by the town, as is authorized by Sec. 3 of the same Chapter for the government and regulation of town meetings.

TO THE TOWN OF HAVERHILL:

I respectfully submit my report in such form as has seemed to me best calculated to secure attention to the suggestions therein made. I have made 58 visits during the year, none of them for the purposes of discipline. The number of pupils in my division has been 283, a considerable increase over last year. The schools have been almost uniformly successful as shown by the apparent approval of parents, the marked improvement of pupils, both in mind and manners, and the pleasure and content of teachers in the discharge of their business. I have deemed it unnecessary to pay any compliments to any district or individual. I append my suggestions, drawn from the experience and observation of the year, and if any face is shadowed in them, either for praise or reproof, the owner will be most likely to recognize his counterpart.

TEACHERS.

I have licensed fourteen teachers during the year, nine of whom were experienced in their business and six of whom taught the full year in the districts where they were employed. With a single exception, they have proven faithful and efficient and are entitled to my warm approval and endorsement. With a single exception no pupils or graduates of the State Normal School have been employed, and I regret to say that I cannot recommend their employment in any mixed school until there is a radical change in the course of study, arrangement

of terms and general methods of that institution. The graduates therefrom may leave it fitted for well graded schools in the larger villages and cities; but they have proven too slow in action, too devoted to the envolving of fine spun theories, and too talkative in the class-room. In fine, too exalted in their views of their "mission," in every way too "cultured" to deal with the poor human children that gather in our country schools, with only old-fashioned, plain sense to guide them and to build upon. Again, when the arrangement of terms is so modified, that a girl from our hills, dependent upon her own resources, can have opportunity to teach a portion of the year without prejudice, there will be an infusion of young womanly blood that will both benefit the public and secure for the State Normal School the recognition that the people of the State have for several years refused it.

SCHOOL BUILDINGS, ETC.

As I have repeatedly reported, new school buildings are imperatively required in District No. 9 and 11. There is nothing in or of them of any value. Both Districts, however, should be consolidated with adjoining ones. In District No. 3 there should be immediate provision for an additional class room. If one can be obtained by a small addition to the present building, very well,—but if not, some other arrangement must be made. For the last two terms two teachers have attempted to instruct in the same room at the same time. I need not say to any one that such an arrangement is unwise and injurious. It becomes necessary in such case to drill pupils to answer in low tones (and the result is that their replies are not audible across the room) or there is the wildest confusion. In No. 13, which has this year registered 104 different pupils and where the population is steadily and rapidly increasing, there must be an additional school room provided forthwith and the schools re-graded. There is at present desk room for but 78 pupils,

and I anticipate an average attendance the coming year of at least 25 in excess thereof. Nearly all the school rooms require additional black-board facilities or improvements in them, Dictionaries and Outline maps. No. 12 has been provided with all these and a valuable terrestrial globe within the year.

PRUDENTIAL COMMITTEES.

I recommend you to personally see that your school buildings are put in good order, and properly provided with apparatus before the opening of each term. Don't send a boy—go yourself. Ascertain at the earliest possible moment the amount of school money you have to expend,—first collecting into your own hands all funds unexpended by all your predecessors. If possible employ, a teacher for the year, and secure an experienced one. Hire early, so that you can have some choice. Arrange your terms so that your schools will close in February. All Town and District business is understood to be closed up the first of March, and beside, March is the stormiest and most sickly month of the year. Call your next School Meeting so that it may be held in February, (under the law you may call it any time after the first Tuesday in January) and the School Superintendent can have the names of the new officers for his report, and the year's supply of fuel can be more conveniently and cheaply obtained.

Report to the School Committee the names of any children who ought to be in School but are not,—and if your school begins to “peter out,” either from a falling off of pupils or any other cause, give like notice.

SCHOOL COMMITTEE'S REPORT.

Districts Nos. 1, 2, 6, 7, 8, 14, 17, 18,
19, and 20.

To the Citizens of the Town of Haverhill :

I submit a report of the schools under my charge for the year ending March 1, 1884.

The attendance as a whole has been good. An examination of the registers shows but four names as attending the school year every half day without being tardy :

Dist. No. 2, Mattie C. Buck. Dist. No. 18, Hattie H. Large. Dist. No. 19, Lizzie M. Blumley and Minnie M. Merrill.

Quite a number have attended two terms out of a possible three, while some fifty names appear as attending one term without being tardy. I have concluded to confine myself in this report to the dry facts furnished from the registers, as far as possible, knowing that you are all now well informed as to what ought to be done for our schools under the law, the abuse of which often keeps us in ignorance of how it is done.

Miss N. Della Buck taught in Dist. No. 2, about thirty-two weeks, about twelve weeks being the winter term. The teaching for the year has been of great benefit to the school. Everything was in order and the results satisfactory. Whole number of different pupils attending the school, thirty-six. This school has made excellent improvement.

The first term in Dist. No. 6 was taught by Miss Emma Carbee. Length of school ten weeks. The only fault in scholars was the moving of lips in study. This was partly remedied. All that a resolute and thorough teacher could do was possible with this teacher. The second and third terms were taught by Miss Louise Page, in a very quiet and self-possessed manner. With good judgment Dist. No. 20 cast in their lot and money with

this school, thereby giving both an advantage of several weeks more schooling, being twenty-nine weeks in all. Whole number different pupils twenty-five.

Two terms of school in Dist. No. 7. Miss Nellie Putnam teaching the summer and Miss Mary Arnold the winter term. The attendance both terms was small. The pupils were earnest and faithful during the first term, with length of school of ten weeks. Whole number of pupils seven. The winter term closed with but one visit.

The school in Dist. No. 8 is still in session with Miss E. May Eaton, teacher. The first term was taught by Miss Mary E. Burbeck. Length of school ten weeks. The second and third terms Miss Laura K. Nelson taught, in all eighteen weeks. The whole number of pupils thirty-four. The school room, as the desks are now arranged, is not large enough to give the desired elbow room for each pupil. It makes very hard work for any teacher to keep good order with four pupils in one seat six feet in length. The school will have to undergo some change before the good of the books is fully secured.

Miss Emma V. Eastman has taught in Dist. No. 14 twenty-five weeks. The teacher is energetic and industrious. The order is excellent. The examinations showed faithful work by the pupils. Whole number of scholars thirty-four.

Miss Laura E. Cass commences teaching for the first time in Dist. No. 18, and continues two terms, in all eighteen weeks. Twelve weeks are devoted to the winter term. Success crowns the efforts of the teacher, and the improvement made in this school is equal to the best.

Dist. No. 19 is fortunate in securing the services of Miss J. E. Rollins, who in every respect maintained the high standing that she attained in this school last year. The two terms of nearly twenty-one weeks were very beneficial. The advancement in reading was particularly marked. Whole number of different pupils seventeen.

District No. 20 wisely arranged to hold their school with No. 6. I would advise the same action again.

I am unable to make a full and complete report of the school held in Haverhill Academy for Dists. Nos. 1 and 17. The summer term of twelve weeks was taught with Mr. J. H. Dunbar as principal, and Miss M. Grace Woodward and Miss Kate Child teachers respectively in the Academic, Intermediate and Primary departments. The register for the Intermediate school shows eighteen different pupils in attendance. The other registers have not been returned. Everything appeared to go on satisfactory in the several departments; teachers were content and pupils happy and tractable, until near the close of the term, when "An enemy entered and sowed tares" in the school, to whom unfortunately the teacher in the Academic department unwisely listened, thereby directly disobeying the express rule of your committee, as unanimously endorsed by the Committee of Districts and Trustees.

I was prudential committee in Dist. 17, and under the circumstances was compelled to resign. I regret the cause, not because I had been chairman of the board of committees since the school had been held in Haverhill Academy, and intimately connected with the rise and progress of the school, but more especially because the board seem to have been struck with paralysis since I resigned, and have wholly neglected their duties in the matter of the school, refusing to comply with the law themselves or to act or co-operate with me in carrying out the same, and thus hindered me from making other or further report to you of them. In closing it may not be improper for me to suggest for the consideration of the districts, whether the prosperity and well-being of the school does not require a change of the prudential committee in at least one of them; and whether or not the trustees by a partial change in their executive or prudential committee could not do great credit to themselves and greatly benefit the school. A change in the series of arithmetics has been made this year and promises to work good results. Respectfully submitted,
