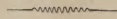

Since the opening of the Library, two hundred ninety-one cards have been issued. Quite a number of new cards have been taken during the year, and among them we are pleased to note several by the small children. This is as it should be. A library is and should be made an important factor in the education of the young. There are very interesting and instructive books which may be read individually or taken into the schools by the teachers, and used in connection with their work. Yet careful thought will convince all that the appropriation is inadequate to the needs of the people. About two months of the year the supply does not meet the demand of the reading public. The addition of twenty-five dollars, or making the whole appropriation for *books* one hundred dollars, would give a very reasonable amount of reading for the entire year, and could not increase the burden of the tax-payer but a trifle. There are plenty of books that can be bought at very low rates, but the binding, type, and the subject matter itself, make them unsuitable for general circulation. All books, however, are bought at one third discount and some at forty per cent. There have been added for the year, ninety-six books at an average of seventy-seven cents each; some of them, of course, are much higher price than that, and some much less. It seems that no one enjoying the privileges of the Library, and in many instances having from two to four cards in the family, could hesitate or be unwilling to increase the fund to one hundred dollars for the coming year.

# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.



The schools throughout the town have been in session 24 weeks.

The School Board have tried to use the money intrusted to them, for the best interest of all the scholars in the town. In several cases, where the scholars have lived much nearer the schools of other towns, it was thought advisable to send them there, which was done, we think, to the satisfaction of all concerned.

The teachers whom we have hired throughout the town for the past year have proved themselves very competent. The average progress has been made in the various studies; and we think, without exception, any pupil who has attended school for the sole purpose of learning has been able to make good progress. The School Board would still urge the parents that they support the teachers in sustaining good order in the school-room; and also see that their children attend school regularly and are there on time; and in this way we shall make it easier for the teachers, better for the scholars, and we shall have better schools.

The school on Dickerson Hill was taught the entire year by Miss Alice G. Shaw, of Northfield. The spring term at the Centre was taught by Miss Mary E. Taylor, of Bristol; the remaining part of the year by Miss Idella Farnum, of Danbury. At the Village the spring and fall terms were taught by Miss Mary A. Tuck; the winter term by Miss Jennie Dickerson. A furnace has been put in the Village school-house at a cost of \$79.42, which heats the house with perfect satisfaction.
