Report of the Board of Education.

The amount of money raised by law for the support of schools for the year 1898 was five hundred and forty dollars. Forty-three dollars and twenty cents literary fund. It was voted to raise fifty dollars extra, and to take one hundred dollars of the dog money.

As the pupils are mostly small that attend our schools now, we thought best to have it in the warm weather as much as possible. Accordingly we had twelve weeks schooling in the spring term, eleven in the fall and eight in the winter.

The Harper's Geographies having been in use a number of years and being badly worn, we made a change and introduced the Werner series, which are giving satisfaction.

As the register for the spring term was destroyed by fire, the statistical report is incomplete.

The stormy weather and sickness have interfered quite seriously with the attendance of our schools this winter, but as a whole good progress has been made the past year.

We would urge upon parents the need of visiting our schools more, showing by their presence that they are interested in the progress of their children. It would be a great help to the teachers and scholars alike. We are too apt to find fault with the teacher before we have visited the school and found out for ourselves whether she deserves condemnation or not.

One great trouble is that the scholars are not constant in attendance. Parents should see to it that nothing but sickness keeps their children from school. It is impossible to make good progress if absent half of the time.

NORTH SCHOOL.

Teacher, Miss Sarah A. Green. Miss Green is experienced and has fully sustained her reputation as a good teacher.

WEST SCHOOL.

Teacher first term, Miss Elizabeth E. U. Tyler of Exeter. Miss Tyler has taught this school for three years and, by her ladylike ways and thorough instruction, won the respect of scholars and parents alike, and all were sorry when she resigned.

The fall and winter terms were taught by Miss Abbie M. Moore of Fremont, a graduate of Sanborn Seminary. This was Miss Moore's first school; the scholars were so used to Miss Tyler it was difficult to get accustomed to a new teacher, but at the close of the winter term we found Miss Moore was doing good work and commendable progress had been made.

EAST SCHOOL.

The spring term was taught by Miss Mary L. Palmer of this town, who, we believe, gave general satisfaction. The fall and winter terms were taught by Miss Nellie E. Mace of this town.

At our several visits to this school we found the scholars very studious, although the school was small. Miss Mace was very thorough in her work. The entertainment given by her scholars on Christmas Eve was very interesting and enjoyed by all present.
