TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L. S.]

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Kingston in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Kingston Town Hall in said Kingston on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing by Australian ballot, the polls to close at 6 P. M. for voting purposes, and other articles in the warrant to be taken up at 8 o'clock P. M.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for road construction, the Town to raise \$1,155.00, the State to pay \$2,310.00.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 to put in culvert and drainage near Christie's Poultry farm, in order to give sanitary conditions and take care of surplus water in that vicinity.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for White Pine Blister Rust control, to be spent in co-operation with the State Forestry Department.

6. To see if the Town will vote to tarvia, patch and repair the Newton Junction Road from the Newton line to Whittier's Corner, So. Kingston and make appropriation for the same.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$200, for hose and other equipment for the Fire Department.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1500, the State to pay \$4500 for the permanent improvement of the main highway, known as the Derry Road, leading from the recent construction to the Danville line: said amount to be proportional 3 to 1.

9. On petition of Arthur R. Judkins and others: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800, for repairs on Little River Road, so-called.

10. On petition of Walter P. Merrick and others: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1500, for repairs on Scotland Road, so called.

11. On petition of William Sjostrom and others: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600 for gravel re-surfacing on the Hunt Road, so called.

12. On petition of Eugene N. Nason and others: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800 for construction on the highway starting at Stella Cheney's corner and working toward Walter Bartlett's Corner.

13. On petition of Walter A. Pratt and others: To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1200 for the repairs on North Danville Road, so called.

14. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 to continue the recent construction of the road leading from Harry S. Clark's corner to Frederick Nichols' Poultry Farm.

15. On petition of Henry W. Robinson and others: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500, to be expended for the continuance of a permanent tarvia road on the West side of Kingston Plains.

16. To see if the Town will vote to tarvia the recent construction on Bartlett Street, West and South Kingston, and Scotland Street and raise and appropriate money for the same.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$262.02 for breaking roads.

18. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

To the Taxpayers of Kingston:

In the year of 1932 the country-wide reduction in employment and the tightening of credit has made it more difficult for the working man. The Town of Kingston has been fortunate the past year that it has been able to give employment to 97 people with a total payroll of approximately \$20,000 from State and Town. We have tried to divide this work so that every man out of employment would receive his share. The Town at the present time has a hundred able bodied men out of employment. The unemployment situation is one of the worst we have to face.

We have been able to cut from our town poor account, in board at the Farm, groceries, and wood, approximately \$1500 for the coming year.

This winter we have had cut 481/2 cords of wood on land owned by the Town. This wood will be used for the schools, Town hall, library, and town poor, at a cost to the Town of \$3.50 per cord. We have had cut about \$250 worth of cedar posts on the same land at a cost to the town of about \$22.00; all this money was spent in aiding the unemployed.

We have built this past year about two miles of new construction. This includes the state aid and special town appropriations. The state took over our trunk line and state aid maintenance. This they are doing for 1933.

The year of 1932 we had a tax rate of \$2.92 made possible by careful budgeting and a thorough inventory. This is the lowest rate since 1922.

I hereby express my sincere appreciation for the helpful support given me by my fellow town officers. I also tender my sincere thanks to the townspeople for their splendid loyalty and their earnest interest in town affairs.

REPORT OF TOWN MEETING

March 8, 1932

At a legal Town Meeting, duly warned and holden at Kingstown Town Hall, Kingston, N. H., County of Rockingham, on Tuesday, March 8, 1932, the checklist having been duly sworn to by the Supervisors, before the Town Clerk, the Moderator, Perrin W. Nichols, called the meeting to order at 9:30 A. M., and read the warrant:

Notice of Direct Primary, to elect delegates to the National Convention on same date as above, was read by the Moderator.

Voted that polls for Direct Primary be kept open until 3 P. M.

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers.

Voted that Moderator cast one ballot for Ralph H. Bake for Town Clerk. Ralph H. Bake received one vote and was declared elected by the Moderator.

Proceeded to ballot for Selectman.

Whole number of votes cast	268

Warren G. Bakie had	125

Laburton G. Cilley was declared elected by the moderator to serve as Selectmen for three years.

Voted that the salary of the Town Treasurer be increased to \$75.00 per year.

Voted that the Clerk cast one ballot for Warren H. Tucker for Treasurer. Warren H. Tucker had one vote and was declared elected by the Moderator.

Motion was made that taxes be collected for 1% of total.
Motion not carried.

Proceeded to ballot for Tax Collector.

Clinton Avery was declared elected by the Moderator.

Proceeded to vote for Road Agent.

Eugene C. Kimball was declared elected by the Moderator.

Voted that Moderator cast one ballot for election of Edward B. Clark as Trustee of the Trust Fund. Edward B. Clark had one vote and was declared elected by the Moderator for term of three years.

Frank W. Foster resigned as Trustee of the Trust Fund.
Resignation was accepted.

Voted that Roland W. Cheney be elected to fill the unexpired term of Frank W. Foster. One ballot was cast by the Clerk and Roland W. Cheney was declared elected by the Moderator for the term of one year.

Warren H. Tucker asked that a vote be taken to see if the Town would favor accepting his resignation as Trustee of the Trust if he should decide to give it.

By a show of hands the Town indicated that it would not be in favor of accepting said resignation.

Voted that Walter E. Webster and Warren G. Bakie be elected as auditors.

Voted that Clerk cast one ballot for Z. Willis Kemp for Library Trustee. Z. Willis Kemp had one vote and was declared elected by the Moderator.

Voted that committee of three be appointed by the Moderator to bring in the remaining Town Officers.

Following committee was appointed: Elmer Collins, Harry L. Carter and Arthur Judkins.

Voted to turn to Article III.

Art. III. Voted that Town elect its Town Officers at its annual meeting by the Australian Ballot. Said vote to go into effect in March, 1933.

Voted that all candidates for Town Officers file their names with the Town Clerk, not later than six days previous to the annual town meeting and that a filing charge of \$1.00 be made to cover the cost of printing the ballots.

Art. IV. Voted that the Town authorize the Moderator to appoint a committee to be known as a "Finance Committee of Town of Kingston." Said committee to co-operate with the Selectmen in any way they may determine, but more especially in the preparation of a budget for the approval of the voters at the annual Town meeting. This committee to be made up of 13 members, five to be appointed at each annual town meeting.

Voted to return to Art. I.

The committee appointed to nominate the remaining town officers nominated the following:

Janitor—Beverly Chamberlain.

Surveyors of Wood and Lumber—Roland Cheney, Herbert Nason, Guy Warren.

Fence Viewers—Freeman Nason and Warren Locke.

Fire Wards—George B. Stevens, Frederic Nichols, Edward B. Clark.

Hog Reeve—Norman Milbury.

Police—Harry L. Carter, Arthur Tucker, Melvin Martin.

Sealers of Weights and Measures—Daniel Bakie, Irving Nason.

Above were declared elected by the Moderator.

Voted that the Librarian be appointed by the Library Trustees in the future.

Voted that Howard C. Page be elected as Health Officer.

Voted to return to Art. II.

Art. II. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,145.00 to defray the town charges for the ensuing year.

Art. V. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for breaking roads.

Art. VI. Motion made that the Town accept State Aid for road construction and raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,132.50. (The State to pay \$2,264.00.)

Amendment voted that said sums be spent on the Derry Road between Great Pond Bridge and the Danville line.

Art. VII. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00. The State to pay \$6,000.00 for State Aid maintenance.

Art. VIII. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for Trunk Line maintenance (State to pay \$2,400.)

Art. IX. Voted to accept the new piece of road below the residence of Geo. Bakie.

Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to resurface said highway and do whatever railing may be necessary.

Art. X. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the completeing and taring of the recently construction,—and for further construction of—the highway leading from Walter Bartlett's corner to Stella Cheney's corner.

Art. XI. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to repair the No. Danville Road from Patten's Corner to the Danville line.

Art. XII. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for repairs on the Little River Road, so-called.

Art. XIII. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to be expended for the continuation of a permanent tarvia road on the West side of Kingston Plains.

Art. XIV. Voted to discontinue the road between the Plains School and the late Stephen Nichols Homestead.

Art. XV. Motion made that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for permanent construction on the road from Harry Clark's corner to the Nichols Poultry Farm.

Amendment voted that the sum of \$400.00 be raised and appropriated on the road described above.

Art. XVI. Voted to indefinitely postpone Article XVI relating to the control of White Pine Blister Rust.

Art. XVII. Voted that the Town Treasurer give to the Board of Selectmen at the end of each month and not later than the first of the following month, a written report of the exact standing of the treasury. That the Town Clerk shall render a written report at the end of each month, and not later than the first of the following month with remittances to the Town Treasurer and a copying of such report to the Selectmen at the same time. That the Tax Collector shall render an account to the Selectmen on the first and fifteenth of each month of the amount of taxes he has collected. That the

Trustees of the Trust Fund shall render at the close of the year an itemized account in full.

Motion made that the Selectmen and Treasurer be authorized to borrow a sum of \$5,000.00 in anticipation of taxes.

Amendment voted that Selectmen and Treasurer be authorized to borrow a sum not to exceed \$7,000.00 in anticipation of taxes.

Voted that a municipal court be established in Kingston, and that a Judge be appointed.

Voted that all special police officers shall be appointed for a period or term of not more than one year and that such term of office will expire at the annual town meeting. All new appointments will be made by the Selectment. This vote to take effect upon its passing.

SCHOOL BOARD'S REPORT

Fellow Citizens: School Boards everywhere are struggling with the hardest of all municipal budget problems. They must reduce expenses and at the same time increase their services, for the depression has both added to the number of children in school and added to the importance of keeping them in school. Out of school they enter competition with adults for what employment there is, or they add to the jobless migratory youth who are giving concern to all social agencies. This year with more high school pupils in the state, budgets have been reduced about five per cent. This has been achieved by the most careful cutting to avoid vital stops. A Street Department may stop operations and resume when times are better, and there is little permanent loss. But if the School Board economizes at the cost of the children now in school the loss to that generation cannot later be made up.

Most communities have made it plain that they want their school children to be the last to feel the pinch of retrenchment. The rising cost of education has been no mystery and no scandal. An abiding faith in education as vital to a democracy has led our people to increase both the quantity and the quality of the schooling of their children. When 20 years ago one pupil in six went beyond the elementary grades, now one in three or better goes on to high school. This means not a doubling but a quadrupling of the cost, for high school instruction costs double that of the lower grades. School programs have been broadened to include subjects of practical use to the lives of the majority of the pupils. Things required to be taught have multiplied. As everyday life has placed limitations on home training the school has tried to take up the slack. School Boards realize that the support of the

schools does not depend upon any statute. It rests upon the determination which the people of Kingston or New Hampshire have always shown to provide for the welfare of their children even at their own sacrifice.

School authorities, like everyone else, undertook expenditures in the boom years that would never have been started on present income. These expenditures were largely the result of demands made by those not primarily interested in education. So it is vital that the necessary economies in the schools shall be made by those qualified to make them. This is the intent of the School Board of Kingston. We invite your cooperation toward that end.

You who are interested in education know that schools are feeling the effects of the depression along with other national industries. Wise and sane leadership of both laymen and educators is needed, if our schools are to weather the storm safely. Reducing salaries of trained teachers to the level of unskilled labor is only one manifestation of the hysteria resulting from the chaotic economic conditions. The seriousness of the situation calls for the combined efforts of all. Interested citizens need to inform themselves on the conditions in their communities, and take a definite stand against further reductions in school facilities.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Kingston:

It is my privilege, as Superintendent of Schools, to again present my report, the sixth annual. In this report I invite your consideration to the following topics: The Pupils' Progress, Economic Conditions and the Schools, Our Needs and the Future.

THE PUPILS' PROGRESS

In line with my last report I wish to continue the tabulation of test scores. The eighth grade was tested separately with the "Standard Graduation Examination" and grades four to seven inclusive used the "Otis Classification Tests." The results are grouped below:

These results are very satisfactory and commendatory. They are much above our expectations. The standards were

somewhat higher this year than last and so the commendation is all the more deserved. Your pupils are making excellent progress under splendid instruction. The two factors are evident in the results obtained.

ECONOMIC CONDITIONS AND THE SCHOOLS

Walter Gifford, Chairman of the Unemployment Committee, says, "One body of our citizenry remains immune from all blame and responsibility in the difficulties with which we are faced and must be held in special guardianship during the period of readjustment. I refer to the children." Who can deny the truth of this statement? Yet we fear there are hostile agencies afloat who would imperil the greatest socializing agency in America, our public school system. Due to the great economic stress considerable pressure is being brought to bear upon public officials to reduce the burdens of government with schools asked to take a large share in it since they are a large factor in the make-up of the total. Some will advocate as high as reductions of fifty per cent. Such procedure would be disastrous not only to the schools and the children but to our American Civilization, to our political stability, and to our capacity to return to a reasonable level of prosperity. No one of good understanding would advocate a radical reduction in the money devoted to our public schools. America is not, never has been, never will be so poor that it must starve and cripple its most effective agency of strength and stability.

Education is the balance wheel of civilization. It preserves the best of the past and helps each generation to fashion them to the needs of the future. How much more important just now is this service? Have you not been amazed at the almost negligible amount of lawlessness and disorder during the past year and a half? Have you ever stopped to ask yourself how far the schools are responsible for this control? Schools also contribute to economic stability. Supporting the schools is supporting the grocer, the tailor, the manufacturer, the builder, because the money spent flows directly into these channels of activity.

Proposed retrenchments threaten to reduce the pay of teaching to that of unskilled labor. If such retrenchments are adopted, expensive preparation for teaching must be abandoned. The practice of false economy will require that the school curriculum be stripped to a point which will provide only the type of education needed for "horsecart days." Training for sound health, worthy home membership, lifelong learning, good citizenship, vocational skill, useful employment of leisure, and ethical character must be greatly reduced or eliminated. The abandonment of these educational objectives, called forth by the demands of an increasingly complex social and economic system, will be a greater national calamity than abandoning the automobile and reverting to the days of horse and buggy.

We hear much about school costs. Some say they have increased too rapidly since the war. Let us examine some of the reasons for the admitted increase. First, attendance in the United States has increased approximately 70% since 1914. Since we have not found a way to educate children by machinery, an increase in attendance involves a proportionate increase in school expenditure. Of course we could have prevented the growth in costs due to increased attendance, by allowing fewer children to attend school or by forcing them out of school at an earlier age. Most of us, however, would question whether such a policy would mean a real saving. Second, school costs have increased because the greater demands of the changing times have been exacted. Better trained teachers have been demanded. Better constructed and more healthful buildings have sprung up all over the land. The enrichment of the curriculum to meet the varying needs of individual pupils has become imperative. All of these items conforming to our own greater personal needs contribute to an added expense of operation and are reflected in the public opinion of every school district whether these items are of direct or indirect concern. Third, school costs increased between 1914 and 1926 due to the decreased purchasing power of the dollar. Figures are not available for recent years but

various estimates place increased present day costs due to decreased purchasing power at 25% of the increase whereas in 1926 it was 50%. When these three factors are evaluated, most of the increase in school costs is accounted for.

Today your community as well as every other community is studying its schools and every other agency of government to discover what economies can be made to bring expenditures within the community's capacity to pay. Care should be exercised to avoid economies which are shortsighted. The quality of instruction your child receives will depend largely upon what you pay for it. Wise buyers know that there is really no such thing as a bargain. Parents owe it to the children to weigh carefully the many proposed methods of economizing in school expenditures. A false step here can cripple the fundamental services of the schools. In the years just ahead of us lie important problems. These problems cannot be solved by a blighted generation.

NEEDS AND THE FUTURE

With past successes alive in the present, we are lead to believe that the future is not barren and dark. Many improvements in personnel, buildings and equipment have taken place. More satisfactory and better trained teachers have been employed and retained. Lights have been added to every building. Much painting and redecorating has been done. Added toilet facilities have been installed. Playground apparatus has been built. Better teaching equipment is being added from time to time. So we might ask—what is the next step? For improvement of educational opportunity and general value consolidation is both logical and practical in your district. Another imperative improvement is the installation of improved toilet facilities at the Patten School. The present equipment is unsanitary, antiquated, and belongs to a by-gone era. I hope you will see that improvement is made.

I am deeply appreciative of the support of the School Board, the assistance of a good force of teachers, and the cooperation of parents and friends. The year has passed with

a maximum of effort and a minimum of difficulties. "The everlastin' teamwork of every blooming soul" has been our watchword.
