

## **TOWN WARRANT**

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inbabitants of the Town of Mason, in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in

#### Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified at Town House in said Mason on Tuesday, the eleventh (11) day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for the same.

3. To choose one Trustee of the Boynton Common School Fund.

4. To choose one Trustee of the Stearns Common School Bequest.

5. To choose one Trustee of cemeteries for three years.

6. To choose one Trustee for Mason Public Library.

7. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for repairs of highways and bridges.

8. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for Library purposes.

9. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for care of cemeteries.

10. To see if the town will vote to accept the provisions of the State Law necessary to receive the benefit of the State Aid for permanent improvements of highways.

11. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for Memorial purposes.

12. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to purchase ladders for town use.

13. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

14. To see if the town will make some provision toward graveling the road from the Eaton farm to the Brown farm.

15. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to observe Old Home Day.

16. To see if the town will make some provision toward graveling the road between the Spear place and the Ingalls place.

17. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to place gates or bars on roads the town voted last year to close.

18. To see if the town will take any action regarding a permanent water supply for the center of the town and raise and appropriate a sum of money for the same.

19. To see if the town will vote to go fifty-fifty with the state to finish the state road to the Townsend line, and authorize the selectmen to bond the town for the same.

20. To hear reports of agents, auditors, committees and officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

21. To see if the town will raise and appropriate two hundred dollars (\$200) for control of the White Pine Blister.

## Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board and Citizens of Mason:

I submit my seventh annual report as Superintendent of Schools:

#### School Organization

The Centre School has the same teachers as last year. After five years of very satisfactory service at the Number Six school Miss Howe resigned to be married. In her place we secured Miss Marjorie Hutchinson, a graduate of the Keene Normal School. Miss Bowden resigned as music teacher after three years' service and Miss Elsie Wheeler of Greenville is doing that work this year. Special work in drawing is being given this year for the first time by Mrs. Alice Berry.

The statistical report following shows a decreased enrollment from 72 in 1927-28 to 63 last year and a further decrease to 49 the first sixteen weeks of the current year. The per cent of attendance last year was slightly higher than the year before but about one-half of one per cent below the state average. The attendance is about one per cent better for the first sixteen weeks this year than for the corresponding period last year. Tardiness was reduced last year but is somewhat greater this year, especially at Number Six.

It is ten years since the school law first provided for a standard school year of thirty-six weeks. Since 1924 no school in New Hampshire has had less than thirty-six weeks. School enrollment has increased and the per cent of attendance has been raised from 91 to 94.5. Pupils are staying in school longer,—85 per cent now complete the eighth grade as compared with 75 per cent ten years ago; 67 per cent enter high school in place of 55 per cent; 43 per cent graduate from high school instead of 31 per cent; 23 per cent continue their schooling beyond high school instead of 11 per cent. High School enrollment has increased from 12,087 to 16,097, an increase of 33 per cent in ten years with only 5 per cent increase in elementary schools.

While every school in the state is open for at least thirtysix weeks, the number of days school is actually in session varied last year from 169 to 187. The average for the state was 177 and this average has been maintained for the past four years. The Mason schools were open 175 days last year, a number that was exceeded by 130 towns and equalled by 32 others, while 78 towns in the state had fewer school days. The Mason schools were closed two holidays (Labor Day and Washington's Birthday), and three days for Teachers' Institutes.

#### SUPERVISION

The division of my time between class room visiting or supervision, and office work does not vary materially from last year, and as usual a considerable part of the office work has to do with the tabulating and interpreting of the scores from standard tests. The Stanford Achievement Tests were continued last year as in former years and the results were in general handled in the same manner as indicated in last year's report.

The standardized test in silent reading mentioned last year was repeated in October 1929 and the results compared with those obtained a year previous. The class work in silent reading during the year interval between tests laid emphasis upon the particular features in which the first test showed the pupils to be deficient, and pupils who scored D or E on the first test were given special attention. The results of the second test indicate that our efforts were effective to a considerable degree, since there were 11 per cent fewer pupils getting scores of D or E than in the first test. This must stand, however, as a record of progress and not of complete attainment of the goal, for there are still at least 8 per cent more pupils getting D's and E's than would be expected in a normal group of pupils.

Besides these two series of tests given for purposes of measurement, several other types of tests are being used frequently by the teachers for diagnostic purposes. An oral reading test is used in the first three grades by means of which the teachers determine from time to time what progress each child is making and in what respect improvement should be made. Similarly two types of language tests are used at intervals through the year to check up on the pupils' progress in mastering the correct use of language forms.

While these standardized tests and many other less formal tests devised by the teachers are useful in certain fields, we must keep constantly in mind the fact that there are many more phases of education that do not yield to such exact measurement, and also the fact that progressive attainment in those phases not readily measured is probably more important in the equipment of our young folks for their future lives than the things we are thus able to measure.

#### MEDICAL INSPECTION

The medical inspection was made in October by Dr.Pease with the assistance of the nurse, Mrs. Gilbert, who have reported the following:

Since the medical inspection the nurse has made a number of home visits and has found the parents very willing to follow her suggestions and to have remedial work done where it is necessary. She is trying to keep the expense within the budgeted amount of \$50, and this will probably mean that some of the less urgent cases needing her attention will have to wait until another year. I suggest that the medical inspection as well as the follow-up work be conducted by the nurse next year, thereby saving the amount paid the doctor and increasing the amount available for the nurse; it is the follow-up work that really counts and without it the inspection is hardly worth while.

#### FINANCES

The Budget proposed for 1930-1931 calls for a larger sum for teachers' salaries to cover the drawing work and possible increased salaries of other teachers; an increased amount for high school tuitions on account of the larger graduating class in both schools this year. The remaining items do not differ materially from former years. The large balance expected at the close of this school year makes it possible to apply a major portion of it to the reduction of the total sum recommended to be raised by taxation.

I appreciate the interest and support of the Parent-Teacher Association and of the parents and citizens generally. With this, the efforts of the School Board and the daily work of the teachers is not only made more pleasant but more effective as well.
