

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

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH.

The financial report of the selectmen found in another column, which shows the total expenditures of the board for the year as less than six dollars, does not measure our activity. We had on hand sufficient formaldehyde for disinfecting purposes.

There have been four deaths from tuberculosis in town during the past year. In each case the house where the death occurred was thoroughly disinfected as soon as practical after the funeral. One case of diphtheria has been reported. The disease however was not contracted in town.

We have made a number of official calls, when such calls seemed advisable and in nearly all cases our suggestions, requests, or orders were cheerfully and promptly complied with.

Cleanliness and good sanitation are being more and more considered as the key notes to good health.

There are a few things we desire to see corrected which we will mention:

Don't throw your rubbish of any kind along the banks of the highways or river. It is unsightly and unsanitary.

The town has provided a dumping place, so situated that it is easily reached, where fire can safely be applied and several times during the summer all combustable matter is so consumed.

Don't throw swill, such as table scraps, bones, vegetable parings and the like, out upon the ground or into the vault. Cremate in the kitchen stove.

Don't throw dead animals, such as dogs, cats, hens, into the river. They may float away out of your sight, but soon find lodgement upon the banks and become a source of danger to others.

Don't bury dead animals, such as horses, cows, hogs, dogs, within the limits of the village. They should be taken well outside and covered four feet with earth, so as to prevent their being dug up by dogs or foxes.

We feel that there is need of one or more public convenience stations in our village, to be provided and cared for the town.

We hope at the coming town meeting, favorable action will be taken upon this matter.

All good citizens desire that our town shall be the cleanest and healthiest in the state. We bespeak your best efforts to make and keep it so.

#### SCHOOL REPORT.

In our report a year ago we advised the employment of teachers with a normal school training as fast as vacancies should occur. This advice was approved by the action of the town meeting, and an increase in the school appropriation was voted to meet the probable additional expense. With some difficulty we succeeded in procuring teachers with the required training They were necessarily such as had little or no experience in teaching, and, as was to be expected, have shown varying degrees of skill in their work; yet upon the whole we are sure that a forward step has been taken, and, so far as we know, this is the opinion of our citizens generally, and we confidently look to the continuance of this method as the fixed policy of the town.

We are frequently asked why we do not have drawing taught in our schools, and during the past year there has been some discussion in the columns of the Transcript on this subject. We are thoroughly impressed with the desirability of making some skill in drawing a part of every child's education, and can only say that our neglect to have it included in our course of study is due to the fact that, with the funds at our command, we have not seen any practicable way of having it successfully taught.

Some years since an effort was made in this direction. A drawing teacher was employed to come several times to our town to drill our teachers in methods—a system was adopted and printed directions put in the hands of the teachers. The effort was carried on for a year or more with fair results; but as new teachers were employed, most of them did not have the requisite skiil, and finally the attempt was abandoned. The conclusion was reached that it is useless to attempt to introduce drawing into our schools unless a special drawing teacher is employed by the year, whose duty shall be to visit each school at stated intervals—probably once a week—and drill the pupils and give directions to the teachers how to carry on the work. Should the people of Peterboro show by their votes at the coming school meeting that they wish this addition to their school exercises, we shall be glad to carry out their wishes.

Perhaps the most vital question that will come before the school meeting is that of School Supervision; or, in other words, of empowering the School Board to unite with the School Boards of other towns to employ a Superintendent of Schools. Upon this subject there is a wide diversity of opinion in the community, and even the School Board is not unanimous. It has been presented to the citizens of Peterboro for several successive years, and has been invariably decided in the negative. While this might seem a reason for not bringing it up again, yet we find by records that there is a steady and an increasingly strong drift throughout the state in favor of this method of school supervision, and for aught we know it may have influenced enough in our town to reverse the decision of other years—it can at least do no harm to have a vote taken upon it.

We will not here take space to give any of the arguments for or against this movement, but will call attention to the fact that judging by the drift of opinions and events, we shall soon be in a helpless minority. Our adjoining state, Massachusetts, passed almost precisely the same law that is on our statute books in 1888. In fourteen years towns had adopted its provisions so extensively that ninety-four per cent. of all the teachers and ninety-six per cent. of all the children of the state came under expert supervision. In 1902 the measure was made compulsory upon all towns and cities. Our own law was passed in 1899. The first adoptions were in 1900. For the first three or four years the adoptions were but few, and several towns gave up the system after a year's trial; but in the last two or three years the number of adoptions have increased largely; in 1905 there were fifteen, in 1906 nineteen, and there are now fifty-seven towns besides the cities under the supervision of superintendents, and these towns and cities contain more than sixty per cent. of the population of New Hampshire. There are now but four towns in the state as large as Peterboro without a superintendent.

There is one thing more to be considered, viz: that if we ever intend to adopt this system we are losing valuable opportunities by waiting. Had we voted for an adoption last year we might very likely have been able to unite with Antrim and Hillsboro and this would have been a very good district. This chance is lost now, for these town have united with Henniker. The only remaining towns of any considerable size, conveniently located, for uniting with Peterboro, are Jaffrey and Bennington. If we wait until these have united with other towns, there will be left, if any, only such smaller towns as Hancock and Greenfield, and consequently our share of the expense for a superintendent will be much greater than if we

should unite with larger towns.

The committee appointed at the last school meeting to make such changes as they deemed advisable in the heating and

sanitary arrangements of our center school building, have replaced the old and unsanitary water closets, by new and sanitary ones. With one or two slight improvements to be made later, they would seem to be altogether satisfactory. The change to be made in the heating apparatus has been deferred to the coming Summer vacation.

An appropriation will be asked for at the coming school meeting to cover the expense already incurred, about thirteen hundred dollars, and to pay for the estimated cost of installing a new heating plant.

### TOWN WARRANT.

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Peterborough, qualified to Vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said town, on Tuesday, the 12th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1st. To choose all necessary town officers and agents for the ensuing year.
- 2nd. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of the schools, for the maintenance of the poor, for the laying out and repairing of highways, and all necessary charges arising within the town, and appropriate the same.
- 3rd. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of the fire department, public library, and for the Grand Army on Memorial Day.
- 4th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate toward paying the town debt and interest.
- 5th. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 6th. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to appoint a police officer whose duty it shall be to preserve order in and about the public places in the town, and perform such other duties as required by the selectmen, both day and night, and to raise and appropriate money to defray the expenses of the same.
- 7th. To see if the town will vote to construct and maintain one or more toilet rooms for public use, and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 8th. To see if the town will vote to accept legacies and gifts given to the town in trust by different individuals, the income to be used in the care of cemetery lots.
- 9th. To see if the town will vote to put in a sewer on Pine street, to extend on Concord street to such a place as is best adapted to carry it to the river, and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 10th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the expenses of observing Old Home Week.
- 11th. To see if the town will vote to repair their concrete sidewalks, and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 12th. To see if the town will vote to sell its present Electric Light Plant and purchase a new plant, or erect a steam plant in some other part of the town, or procure additional power for the present plant or extend the commercial lighting so that any person who desires may have lights in their buildings in any part of the town, and take any other action in relation to said electric light plant, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

13th. To see if the town will vote to repair, regrade or improve the highway north of the farm-house of John A. O'Keefe, in the easterly part of the town, by cutting down the granite ledge which is situated in the travelled part of the said highway about half way between said house and the farm-house belonging to the heirs of the late Patrick O'Keefe, or to change the location of the travelled part of said highway, or take any other action in relation thereto, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

14th. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the highway leading past the house formerly owned by Charles Barber, now owned by Olive O. Howland, beginning at a point in the highway about fifteen rods south of the south line of the Barber farm, so called, thence to a point about forty rods north of the said Barber house; whenever a new road between said points shall be legally laid out, constructed without expense to the town, and accepted by the selectmen.

15th. To see if the town will consent to have the grade of the road bed raised on the highway leading from Peterborough to Jaffrey, where said highway passes through land of A. W. Noone between the new stone bridge and the Jaffrey line, or take any action relating thereto.

16th. To see if the town will vote to construct a concrete side walk from Grove street to the depot and from School street to Main street, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

17th. To see if the town will vote to construct a foot bridge across the river, near the house of Charles E. Peaslee, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

18th. To see if the town will vote to put in a sewer on Elm and Winter streets from a point near H. B. Needham's house to a point near the house of John D. Hannon, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

19th. To see if the town will vote to rewire the town hall building and raise and appropriate money for the same.

20th. To see what action the town will take to prevent the sand crossing the highway near the Puffer corner, so called, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

21st. To see if the town will vote to place one or more fire escapes on the town hall building and do any other work found necessary in connection with the same or take any other action in relation thereto and raise and appropriate money for the same.



# Report on Mode of Improvement of Electric Light Plant.

With a view of obtaining reliable information on the different plans suggested to increase our electric light system, we had an examination of the present conditions made by a competent engineer to report as to whether it would be best to increase the power by (1st) improvements on the present plant, (2nd) arranging to connect with the Dublin electric light plant, after prospective improvements are made by which the power of that plant will be doubled, or (3d) by the installation of a completely equipped steam plant near the railroad track, where coal could be unloaded directly from the cars. The report is as follows:—

BOSTON, MASS., MARCH 2, 1907.

ELECTRIC LIGHT COMMISSIONERS, PETERBOROUGH, N. H.

Gentlemen: — I have made a careful examination of the present conditions at Peterborough, N. H., and, after a careful consideration of the different aspects of the problems submitted to me, would report as follows:—

I. I am of the opinion that the best interests of your town would be secured by developing the present location of the town lighting plant to its ultimate limit, as follows:—

a. Excavating tail race some 12 to 14 hundred feet down stream rom present plant, so as to obtain 6 or 7 feet more fall of water, costing roughly, \$2,000.00.

b. Installing a pair of new horizontal wheels, with draft tubes and iron pen stock, together with a Jackshaft and clutch couplings to admit of easy change from water to steam power, costing roughly \$3,-000.00.

c. In addition to the above, if the dam can be raised without infringing on any existing rights, 3 feet additional head could be obtained on the wheels, as well as additional storage capacity to conserve the power, costing \$2,000.00.

In this connection, I am of the opinion that it would be to your advantage to ascertain if some action could not be taken by which your present practice of running the water by your present station, during the daytime, could be avoided, as almost any investment, in reason, in this line, would be commercially profitable.

d. The cost per horsepower from your water power plant cannot exceed \$8.00 per horsepower per annum, and, even in conjunction with your auxiliary steam plant, probably does not exceed \$15.00.

- 2. The cost of a 3-wire lighting circuit from the Dublin plant to your present station, approximately 1½ miles, with the switch boards and regulators, would cost, approximately, \$4,000.00. Power obtained in this way, at the rate of six cents a kilo-watt-hour, would mean, approximately, \$138.00 a horsepower. I, therefore, should not advise this move.
- 3. A steam plant, located alongside the railroad track, in the center of your town, would cost, approximately, including land and building, \$20,000.00. With coal at \$4.50 a ton, a horsepower on a 10 hour basis, for 308 days in the year, would cost you \$72.60. With coal at \$5.00 a ton, \$77.10.
- 4. If it should become imperative to build a power plant in the center of the town, you would do much better to build a gas producer gas engine plant, which would cost about \$20,000.00, and in which you could produce a horsepower per hour, on the same basis as above, for from 32 to 35 dollars, these figures including, as they should, all interests on land, buildings, machinery, taxes, insurance, repairs, and renewal charges, so as to entirely renew the plant at the end of twenty years.
- 5. I am, therefore, of the opinion that your best policy would be to develop your present water power plant to its ultimate capacity, if necessary putting in a new boiler, on which you can carry, at least, 100 lbs. of steam.
- a. If the present boiler can be repaired so that the Insurance Inspectors will pass it for 80 lbs. of steam, it should be done, and the setting entirely renewed. Your engine should be overhauled and put in good shape, with a new governor attached, and a rearrangement of the boiler, engine and generator should be made, so that they all would stand upon adequate foundations. A new boiler, completely installed, would cost you \$1200.00. Repairing the old boiler and engine, and resetting them, would cost about \$1,000.00, but would be money well spent.
