NOTICE OF THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Rumney in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Rumney on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

3. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for highways in addition to the amount required by law.

4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of the library

5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day, and choose a committee to expend the same.

6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lights.

7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and a propriate for care of Common.

8. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of Cemeteries.

9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,081.50 to secure from the state \$1,081.00 for state aid construction.

10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate\$600.00 to secure \$1,200.00 from the state for state aid maintenance.

11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,000.00 to secure \$4,000.00 from the state for trunk line maintenance.

12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to buy snow fence.

13. To see if the town will vote to allow a 2 per cent discount on all taxes paid before July first.

14. To see if the town will vote to have the inventory blanks distributed at the time of taking appraisal of property.

15. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money in anticipation of uncollected taxes.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 to secure \$2,000.00 from the state for permanent road from Rumney Village to Stinson Lake.

17. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for oiling the so-called permanent road to Stinson Lake.

18. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for oiling the streets of Rumney Village already oiled.

19. To see if the town will vote to discontinue that part of the East Rumney road washed out by the flood and replaced by new road; commencing at the foot of the Schoolhouse Hill so called and continuing to the intersection of the new road.

20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 to pay damages occasioned by discontinuing the Doetown Hill road so called.

21. To see what action the town will take in regard to unexpended balances of previous appropriations.

22. To see if the town will vote to appoint a committee to investigate the merits of a town forest and pass any vote relating thereto.

23. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum sufficient to reimburse J. A. Rogers for expenses incurred at the B. & M. R. R. hearing at Concord in September 1928. Also to reimburse J. A. Rogers for tool house lot.

24. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SOME STATEMENTS ABOUT THE CURRENT SCHOOL YEAR, 1928–1929.

Schools opened Tuesday, September 4, with enrol ment as follows, by grades: grade 1, 14; 2, 17; 3, 29; 4, 22; 5, 24; 6, 7; 7, 19; 8, 15. And 25 enrolled in Piymouth High School. These made a total of 147 in the elementary schools and 172 in all schools.

The schools have the same teachers as last year except Mrs. Minnie R. Church of Bradford, Vt., who takes the place of Mrs. Etta Pero and Miss Lena French of Rumney who takes the place of Miss Bennice Boswell.

The money appropriated in March, 1928, for improvements at the Lake School has been expended and the results are worthy of much commendation. The committee in charge of the work was made up of the School Board and Messrs E. H. Kendall and W. J. Hall. The committee accepted for the school district from Mr. H. A. Seveigne of Nashua, a lot of land directly o posite the site where the school house did stand. Mr. Seveigne deeded the land to the school district as long as it may be needed for school purposes. Much appreciation should be felt toward the doner. The school house was moved during the summer and school opened in September on the new site. After the building was ready for occupancy Mr. George C. Frolic of Newton Highlands, Mass., offered to give the committee paint to cover the cuts de. The offer was accepted and the paint was delivered to be put on in 1929. Again much appreciation is due. The vard around the schoolhouse is to be graded some and a fence placed around it, matters that should receive attention this coming summer.

Storm windows have been placed on the windward side of the Quincy school house.

The painting of the inside of the Depot building was completed during the summer of 1928.

The health work in the schools has been much more efficient this year. At the time of the dipther a epidemic the school nurse was very helpful. The first half of the year, the nurse, Mrs. Edna J. Gilbert, R. N., made examinations, weighed, measured, tested the eyes and ears of the pupils and recorded results. The last half of the year much effort will be placed on corrective work. The greatest need for corrective work seems to be defective teeth and an attempt will be made to arrange for a dental clinic later in the year after the roads are settled again. There are also some bad conditions of tonsils and adenoids and a few bad cases of defective eyes.

The work of the Parent-Teacher Associations has been very pleasing. The Village Association has continued its second year with officers as follows; president Mrs. Clifton Watts; vice-president, Mrs. Arlene Schaffner; secretary, Mrs. Ruth Russell; and treasurer, Mrs. Laura Ford. A new association has been organized at the Depot School and has been working hard under the following officers: president, Mr. Asa P. Colby; vice-president, Mr. Lloyd French; secretary, Mrs. Emilie B. Barney and treasurer, Mrs. Ella Mc-Ginnis.

The village association has piped water to the school building which is a very much wodthwhile project. The Depot association has put electric lights in the school building and piped water to the building.

Any others of the school communities may have assistance in organizing Parent-Teacher Associations and by co-operation may do equally as good projects

for the welfare of the schools as those associations already organized.

The co-operation of the citizens in the Quincy School community should not be overlooked in helping the school to earn money for new pictures and toward a fund for a new victrola. A victrola has also been placed in the Village and Depot buildings by the efforts of the teachers and pupils.
