### REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD.

### To The Citizens of Salisbury:

In presenting this our annual report we would say that we endeavored to act faithfully and impartially in discharging duties to the best advantage of all concerned. We endeavored to procure Teachers well qualified for their work and assigned them to the schools that in our judgement they were best adapted to, all but to have came up to our expectations, while some have exceeded them, with such a limeted amount of money as was raised the past year, and no money raised for repairs, we were obliged to be very prudent in all of our affairs. The wages paid for teachers in the three largest schools is so small that it is very difficult to find teachers that are qualified for the duties that they are called on to fill, we have repaired the shed at the South Road, shingled the house at the North Road, we were obliged to procure a new Stove and Pipe for the North Road, our School Houses now are in very fair repair, and will compare very favorable with those of other towns equal wealth and Population. We have bought Books and other supplies as required by law, but this department will always call for an annual outlay, as the Books in the hands of the Schollars fast come to pieces.

Reported by L. N. Sawyer. as follows.

In the Raccoon hill School much interest has been taken by the parents especially during the fall and winter terms. This school though small made commendable progress during the year which is usually the case where an interest is shown in the education of the children.

The school at the Heights, has, we are sorry to say, given the Board some trouble, we have here some Students, bright and active, as good scholars as can be found anywhere, others two lazy to study but two stubborn to willingly submit to the teachers authority.

Parents and Guardines, this is largely your fault, for we have noticed that children who are obedient to parental authority at home are usually submissive in school. The teachers here have worked hard and we are sorry that some have been shown so little respect. The school has shown as good improvement as could be expected under the circumstances and at the close of the year was in good subjection.

Reported by James S. Shaw.

The spring term was taught by Miss Sadie M. Stevens, Miss Stevens is a teacher of much experience, keeps good order, requires perfect lessons, and labors hard for the benefit of her scholars. The final examination was of much credit to pupils and teacher. This is the most advanced school in town.

The fall and winter terms were taught by Miss Sarah E. Sawyer of Webster. Besides teaching many other schools, Miss Sawyer has taught in this district for 13 terms, which very clearly proves that she is an excellent teacher. She maintains her wide reputation by honest faithful work, and

leaves no stone unturned or subject unexplained that is of any benefit to her pupils. Under the instruction of such teachers as Miss Stevens and Miss Sawyer the school could not help but make great advancement.

### Smiths Corner.

The spring term opened under the instruction of Miss Edna P. Rand. At the close of the sixth week Miss Rand was obliged to leave the school on account of sickness in her family.

The remaining three weeks of the term were taught by James S. Shaw. Miss Rand stands in the front ranks of our teachers. She is practical in her instruction through in her work, and firmly believes that order is heavens first law. The scholars from the Greely District attended this school this term.

The fall term was taught by Miss Julia F. Baldwin of Andover. Although this was Miss Baldwins first term she plainly demonstrated that she knew what was required of a first class teacher. The order was good, her work was thorough and modern. Her prospects far a successful teacher seems very bright.

The winter term was taught by Mary L. Currier of Warner. Miss Currier possesses rare obilities as a teacher, she was deeply interested in her work, and inspired her pupils to make the best use of their school house, many teachers older in experience would do well to practice Miss Currier's method of instruction. The order was perfect.

Summer and Fall terms, both terms of eight weeks each taught by Mrs. Grace N. Sawyer, of Warner, Mrs Sawyer proved a very good teacher and worked hard for the good of the school

Winter term of 8 weeks We were disapointed in not getting the teacher that was engaged for this school. Miss Winifred D. Kneeland of South Waterford Maine was recommended to your committee, this school started in with 35 Scholars but as far as a teacher she proved a perfect failure.

North Road, Summer Term of 8 weeks, taught by Miss Lucina M. Roby of Salisbury. Miss Roby is a teacher of large experience, a good and faithful teacher, but she has taken a life term and we shall have her services no more.

Fall and Winter term taught by Grace N. Piper, of Franklin, 8 weeks in each term, this was Miss Piper's first school, she met with good success, with a little more experience she will rank as one of the best of teachers.




