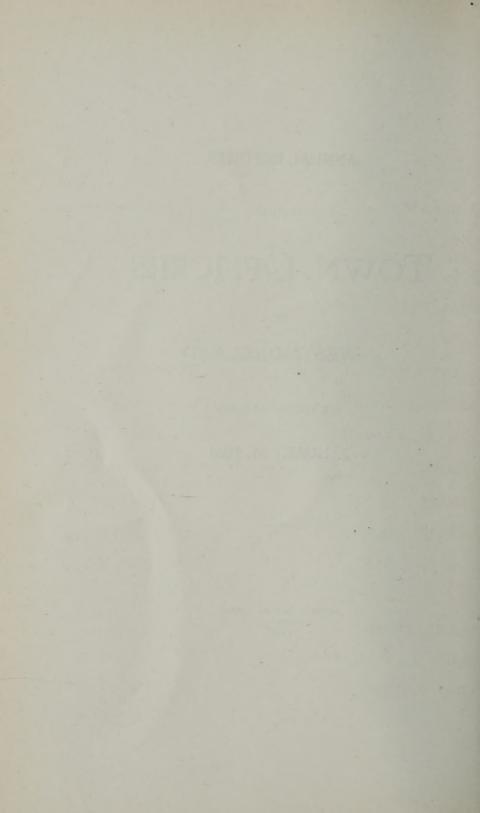

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the town of Westmoreland in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town hall in said Westmoreland on Tuesday, the Tenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of same.
- 3. To elect a forestry committee, hear report of present committee and take action thereon and also elect a tree warden.
- 4. To see what sum of money in addition to what is required by law the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of highways and bridges.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to apply for State Aid for State Road Maintenance and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to apply for State Aid for Trunk Line Maintenance and raise and appropriate money for the same.

- 7. To see if the town will vote to apply for State Aid for state road construction and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$500 for snow removal.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400 to cooperate with the state for the purpose of eradicating White Pine Blister Rust.
- 10. To see what disposition the town will vote to make of the income from the Jotham Lord Fund.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for the support of the library.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to erect and maintain street lights and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to discontinue or petition the court for its discontinuence of the old road leading from the Corner school house so-called towards the Horace Renold place so-called to the Westmoreland and Chesterfield town line and all other roads leading from this road to the present river road so-called.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to lay out a road from Westmoreland Depot down what is known as the Depot Hill to the road leading from Elwin C. Clough's past Forest F. Hall's and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to grade back the banks or widen the road so as to make a less dangerous corner near the Myrtie Lund place and raise and appropriate money for the same.

- 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to pay for its labor for the ensuing year.
- 17. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF HEALTH OFFICER

To the Selectmen of the Town of Westmoreland:

The following report covering the period from December 5, 1930 to date is respectfully submitted.

18 cases of scarlet fever were quarantined at the North End.

4 houses and the North End school house were infected. All quarantine has now been removed, all the houses and the school house have been disinfected and fumigated.

During the scarlet fever epidemic the North End school children were inspected frequently for early symptoms. All public gatherings involving all parts of the town were discontinued until danger of contagion was over. Four suspected cases were visited and discharged.

31 cases of mumps have been reported in the South Village section and are still being reported. Most of these have been light cases with rapid recovery.

No other contagious disease has been reported.

I wish to thank the Selectmen for their assistance and cooperation in the recent epidemic. Also Mr. Thompson, the school superintendent, and Mrs. Stone, teacher at the North End school.

SCHOOL WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Westmoreland, qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said district on the tenth day of March, 1931, at two o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a member of the school board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the school board and truant officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose agents, auditors and committees in relation to any subjects embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.

- 9. To see if the district will vote to make any alterations at the Depot school, and raise money, or otherwise provide means of payment for same.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Westmoreland:

I submit herewith my third annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

ORGANIZATION OF SCHOOLS

Only two of last year's teachers returned to Westmoreland this year. A regular teacher is employed at the East Westmoreland primary school in place of the Keene Normal school cadets of the three previous years. The new teachers are as follows: At the Corner school, Miss Mildred Neal of Acworth; at the Village school, Miss Marion Carey of Keene teaches in the upper grades room, and Miss Florence Anderson of Nashua in the primary room; Miss Marion L. Bassett of Fremont teaches in the East Westmoreland primary room.

THE EAST WESTMORELAND SCHOOL

In accordance with the vote of the district the school building at East Westmoreland has been altered and enlarged to include two school rooms. These rooms are so arranged as to receive the light from only one side of the room from the pupils' left. The two rooms are separated by a folding door partition which can be opened to permit using both rooms as one for school functions and community entertainments.

The equipment of the building is in keeping with its construction. Kaustine Chemical toilets have been installed. Each room is heated by a Kaustine school room heater. New desks, of the single unit movable type were furnished in the primary room. The windows are fitted with double roller shades which permit the admission of light from any part of the window. The material of the shades is of heavy canvas, a very durable material.

THE OTHER BUILDINGS

During the past summer the Village and Depot schools were painted. At the Depot school new concrete steps were constructed and new doors were hung.

The Westmoreland Depot Parent Teacher Association has wired the Depot school, and installed electric lights there.

For the coming year I would recommend the installation of chemical toilets at the Depot school. New shades also are needed there.

Through the generosity of Mr. Charles Hussey, a set of the Macmillan Measured Library has been furnished the Corner school. This contains much reading material for all grades of the school. In communities where the children do not have access to a public library the value of a gift of this type cannot be overestimated.

I wish to express my appreciation of the kind cooperation of the School Board, parents, and teachers in carrying on the work of the schools.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

To Mr. L. O. Thompson, Supt. of Schools, Walpole, N. H.

Dear Sir:

I respectfully submit the following report as School Nurse from January 31st, 1929 to January 31, 1930.

117 pupils were examined.

7 pupils were underweight.

83 pupils were in need of dental work.

34 pupils were unvaccinated.

13 pupils showed defective vision, uncorrected.

3 pupils showed defective hearing.

20 pupils had enlarged or diseased tonsils.

Dental clinics were held at East Westmoreland and the South Village on April 11th, 22nd, and 29th, 1930, with work done as follows:

Number of cases treated,	40
Number of cases receiving complete care,	29
Number of extractions,	32
Number of silver fillings,	43
Number of porcelain fillings,	12
Total number of operations,	87

The total bill for this work was seventy-nine dollars and seventy-five cents, (\$79.75), paid for by the parents of the children having work done.

Eight pupils had their teeth cared for by their own dentist. Five pupils had special eye examination and defects corrected. One pupil was treated at a tonsil clinic at the Mousley hospital, and one pupil was treated privately.

Two underweight clinics were held, May 27th, 1930 at East Westmoreland and the South Village schools, at which fifty-six pupils were examined by Dr. Robert Kerr of the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association.

I wish to express the appreciation of the district to the Local Chapter of the Red Cross for financial assistance.

I wish to express my appreciation of the co-operation of the parents in the work accomplished in the past year.
